Insurance premium tax ordinance proposed

The Floyd County Fiscal Court held the first reading of a new insurance premium tax ordinance during a special meeting on Tuesday, Feb. 5.

If approved during a second reading and vote, a new 4 percent insurance premium tax will be implemented on July 1.

The county is currently collecting a 6 percent insurance premium tax for insurance policies that are sold to residents of unincorporated areas of the county, but that tax is set to expire in July because it was repealed by the fiscal court last

Floyd County Grand jury to consider drug trafficking charges

Floyd County А grand jury will determine whether there's enough evidence to convict three local residents for allegedly trafficking methamphetamine.

On Monday, three felony cases against Printer residents Steven Hunter, 37, Olivia Johnson, 35, and Johnanna Tackett, 33, were referred to the grand jury for consideration.

The trio was arrested by Floyd County Sheriff's deputies following a search of a home at Printer on Ky. 122 on Jan. 30.

deputies discovered a variety of illegal drugs that included crystal meth, suboxone, hydrocodone and marijuana, along with paraphernalia such as digital scales, plastic baggies and needles," a statement from the Sheriff's Department said. "Money that is believed to be proceeds of illegal drug sales was also seized during the search."

Grand jury to consider case of man charged with assaulting police

A Floyd County grand jury will decide whether there is enough evidence to issue an indictment against a Stanville man charged with assaulting police.

On Feb. 4, Rodney R. Thompson, 35, of Stanville, waived his right to a preliminary hearing in the case against him and District Judge Eric Hall referred it to the grand jury for consideration.

Thompson was arrested on Jan. 27 and charged with third-degree criminal mischief, her boyfriend, threat-

fourth-degree assault, theft by unlawful taking, second-degree fleeing/ evading police, resisting arrest, menacing and third-degree assault of a police officer.

Kentucky State Police Trooper Matt Martin reports in the citation that he was called to investigate a complaint of a man "screaming and yelling" at the Cardinal Mart gas station in Stanville on Jan. 27.

Martin reported he found a woman standing beside a car crying when he arrived, and she alleged that Thompson,

KSP: Two Floyd women

PIKEVILLE — Two Floyd County women were arrested on charges including methamphetamine possession after, Kentucky State Police said, they located the women in the parking lot of a Pike business at 2 a.m. Thursday.

According to the citation of KSP Trooper Mark Branham, he was passing the parking lot of Wesley's Pawn Shop in the Green Meadow community of Pike County at nearly 2 a.m. Thursday morning when he noticed two vehicles, later determined to be operated by Tabitha Casey, 47, of River Bend, Tram, and Rhonda G. Collins, 40, of Mare Creek Road, Stanville, which were sitting door-to-door.

When he turned around to pull into the parking lot, Branham wrote in the citation that the two vehicles were attempting to leave and he stopped both vehicles. Casey excited her vehicle and "was acting very nervous and walking back and forth from her car," and Collins "was very erratic and jittery

... (and) appeared to be under the influence of methamphetamine," the citation said.

Casey gave verbal consent for Branham to search her vehicle and the trooper located two baggies which Casey identified as containing methamphetamine, the citation said. Casey told Branham that the suspected methamphetamine belonged to her, according to the citation.

Collins was given field sobriety testing and was placed under arrest before giving consent to search her vehicle, the citation said. During a search, Branham located suboxone in Collins' purse, the citation said.

Casey was arrested on charges of first-offense first-degree possession of a controlled substance (methamphetamine), operating on a

suspended or revoked license and other traffic charges, court records show. Collins was arrested on charges of second-offense first-degree possession of a controlled substance, first-offense DUI, first-offense having a prescription controlled substance not in the proper container and traffic charges, court documents show.

Both were arraigned their respective on charges in Pike District Court Thursday, according to jail records.

Pike District Judge Tommy R. May ordered Collins held in custody on a \$1,000 cash bond with bail credit available and MCR monitoring and ordered Casey held in custody on a 10 percent payment of a \$2,000 bond with bail credit available, according to court documentation.

Judge-Executive year. Robbie Williams said if a new insurance premium tax is approved, it will cost 33 percent less than what county residents are now paying.

"This was the original tax that was 6 percent, that was put on, I guess, approximately 24 months ago. It was repealed. We're proposing to put the tax back on at 4 percent. We're going to reduce it by 33 percent," Williams said. "Our concern is that if we don't put the tax back on, we've got a lot of essential services in the county that we're going to have to cut."

He said the tax is necessary because the former fiscal court approved a \$2.2 million bond for road improvements and work at the county jail, and because the county now has to pay a \$1.8 million bond that remains for Southern Water — a bond that the fiscal court backed for the water district years ago.

Treasurer County David Layne confirmed in the meeting that the county pays about \$190,000 per year on the road bond and about \$170,000 per year on the Southern Water bond. Layne said that Southern Water previously paid the fiscal court \$100,000 a year for that bond, but the district stopped paying the county that bond following a Public Service Commission order issued in 2013. Prestonsburg Utilities paid the bond temporarily last year, as part of the asset transfer between Prestonsburg and Southern Water, but that payment was also stalled.

Williams suggested that the Floyd County reopen the Martin Community Center if the tax is not implemented.

"The tax is basically the same tax that we had on previously, but, basically, we're just not going to have the cash flow to provide essential services to the county if we don't have this tax," Williams said. "I mean, take a look at what's going on in Knott County. They've basically laid everyone off in Knott County. We can cut, cut, cut, but at the end of the day, we've got senior citizens centers, we've got fire departments, we've got roads that have to be maintain."

He continued, "Listen, folks. We don't want taxes. People act like we want to increase taxes; that as a politician, that's your duty to come and do what you can to increase. That's not the case. This affects me directly. I have parents who are on a fixed income."

Williams estimated that if the 4 percent insurance premium tax is approved, residents who pay \$200 a month for insurance will pay \$96 per year for this tax. The tax is expected to provide the county with revenues of about \$1 million, officials reported, and Williams previously talked about also reducing the county budget in order to lower the tax from 6 percent to 4 percent.

The 6 percent insurance premium tax, which provides more than \$1.4

million for the county, was a sticking point for some fiscal court candidates during the 2018 election cycle. Voters ousted three fiscal court members, including the former judge-executive, while some fiscal court opponents campaigned against the tax.

Although public comments were not permitted during the special meeting on Tuesday, one Prestonsburg resident, Charles Wright Sr., chided fiscal court members for considering the insurance premium tax.

"Did you fellers run on no taxes?" Wright said.

"I'm sorry," Williams

said. "All of you fellers, didn't you run on no taxes?" Wright said. "Wasn't that what you guys got voted in for — for no taxes?"

Williams reminded Wright that this was a special meeting and public comment was not on the agenda.

Williams pointed out that during the debate held by Appalachian Newspapers in 2018, he did not say he would repeal the insurance premium tax.

"Yeah you did," Wright told him.

"Did I campaign with anybody in this room and tell them I would repeal

There were tons of local candidates on the ballot last year, and there were a lot of important races. But still, the majority of residents of Floyd County — and Kentucky — did not vote.

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Legal action authorized against RCC Big Shoal

PIKEVILLE — The Pike County Fiscal Court voted Friday to proceed with legal action against a company that received a \$400,000 loan from the county, then failed to pay the principle and interest back and moved its proposal to build a facility from Pike to Floyd County.

During Friday's special meeting, the court voted unanimously to carry out action, which Assistant County Attorney Kevin Keene said could be filed as early as the coming week, against RCC Big Shoal, the company which received a \$400,000 loan from the administration of Wayne T. Rutherford in 2014 but has neither constructed its proposed natural gasto-liquid fuel plant nor repaid the loan.

Pike Judge-Executive Ray Jones said Friday that he and the current commissioners county met with the principals of RCC Big Shoal, and neither that meeting, nor what has transpired since have given him any confidence in the company or its claims.

"They are substantially in breach of the contract that was initially entered into," Jones said. "It is my opinion that this is not a legitimate proposal."

Jones also took issue with the agreement the company reached with then-Deputy Judge-Executive Herbie Deskins last year to stave off a

by that administration of the fiscal court, which would have seen much of the loan repaid over a period of a few months, but was never filed.

said, made \$100,000 in payments then stopped.

"Not only did they breach the original agreement, they're also in breach of this supposed modification," he said.

Jones also said that both he and Assistant County Attorney Kevin Keene have examined the agreement executed by Deskins and do not believe it can stand.

"Neither the county judge nor the deputy judge can enter into any contract unless it's approved by the fiscal court," Jones said. "I see that this agreement ... is completely unenforceable and invalid."

The agreement, Jones said, also would have waived the default and hundreds of thousands of dollars in interest the company owes.

The agreement, Jones said, is inappropriate and unenforceable.

"No one person has the authority under the law to waive \$400,000 in debt owed to the county," he said.

How the agreement came about, Jones said, will likely be revealed during the deposition stage of the litigation.

Keene said he attempted to work with the company on the matter, but was taken aback when he was told by the company's local repre-

lawsuit already approved sentation that, in order to review company information, confidentiality would be involved. That, he said, threw up a "red flag."

"Confidentiality The company, Jones agreements aren't really conducive to keeping the public advised," he said, adding the duty of the court is to represent the people.

> Aside from the confidentiality agreements, Keene said he has concerns about the company's business filings allowing corporations to be "hidden" behind other corporations, and also the way the company is registered, which causes confusion over which state's laws to which it would ultimately be held to account.

The court also approved allowing Jones to assist Keene in the litigation. Jones said he wants to assist due to the complexity of the matter.

"This is not going to be an easy task ... because we may end up having to expand this to sue the parent entity," he said. "We may end up filing an amended complaint at some point to sue the principals who were involved in this, the individuals.

"In the event we find out there has been fraudulent conduct toward the people of this county ... it would seem to me that we should pursue the individuals who are responsible so they cannot hide behind limited liability companies," he continued.
