

Grand jury to hear Pharmacy case against a man accused in high-speed chase

A Floyd County grand jury will determine whether there's enough evidence to indict a Boyd County man who allegedly led police on a high-speed chase and tried to escape on foot.

John Nicholas Barker, 28, of Ashland, waived his right to a preliminary hearing in

Floyd District Judge Jimmy Marcum's courtroom on June 6. Marcum, who set Barker's bond at \$5,000, sent the case to the grand jury for consideration.

Barker faces numerous charges from an alleged chase on May 31. According to the ci-

tation, issued by Floyd County Sheriff Deputy Oliver Little, Deputy Derrick Blackburn

Opry begins summer season this weekend

PRESTONSBURG -

The Mountain Arts Center will open its doors for the first show of the Billie Jean Osborne Kentucky Opry's summer season this weekend.

The summer concert series begins at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday, June 16, and will return to the MAC nearly every Saturday through Aug. 4.

MAC Director Clayton Case said the shows will highlight country, bluegrass, rock and gospel music in a "movie medley" theme, featuring theme songs from popular movies, and each show will end with a "love medley."

"Toward the end of the show, we're doing what we're calling a love medley, but it's more about world peace and good will toward your fellow man," he said. "Toward the end of the show, we're doing a tribute to veterans and, it's more like what the world would look like if we reach out our hands and help our neighbors when they're in need."

Case and two other creative directors, pianist/keyboardist Jody Conley and lead guitarist Mark Stephens, developed this year's theme. They and other opry members have been hashing out ideas and practicing since March.

Case said the set will be staged like the Grand Ole Opry, and special guests will grace the stage on Saturdays from June 23 through July 28. Former opry member Brittany Taylor, whose original song "Hey Kentucky" will be performed by the opry this summer, is starring as special guest on June 23. Other special guests include Troy Burchett on June 30, Clarke Sexton on July 7, Nathan Arnett on July 21 and Jason Goble on Julv 28.

Case said it's a "variety show for everyone."

Each show opens with the opry's Junior Pros, made up of students from Floyd, Johnson, Pike, Magoffin, Breathitt and Fayette counties. The Junior Pros vocalists are coached by Jennifer Bersaglia and its band is coached by Michael Stevens.

Case said the Junior Pros apprenticeship program added two new guitar players and four new vocalists this season. The Junior Pros will also headline its own concert

on Aug. 11. Case said he is planning matinees for local schools.

With 18 members from Floyd, Pike, Johnson and Morgan counties, as well as Wayne County, West Virginia, the opry is made up of seasoned performers, many of whom have been a part of the opry since its founding. Case said Big Sandy Idol winner Aliyah Allen will also serve as a full-time opry guest this year, and Sara McCort from Van Lear, the niece of country music star Loretta Lynn, will also perform in the first three shows.

Stephens, in his second year with the opry, said planning this season has been fun. He enjoys the medley of songs from classic movies that will be performed.

He encourages people to come out to watch the opry to see some "homegrown" talent.

"We have some really good local talent," he said. "That's the thing that impresses me most about it. It's all local people. That's not what you'll find in Branson or Nashville, Tennessee. This is all homegrown talent."

"It creates a wonderful feeling of warm, Eastern Kentucky hospitality," he said. "It warms your heart, no matter where you're from to see those children perform and see the quality of the music they have and then to see the quality of the music with Billy Jean Osborne's Kentucky Opry. It's just something you won't see anywhere else."

Williams finalizes paperwork for judge-executive race

Robbie Williams, veteran and owner of Williams Tax and Insurance in Prestonsburg and several other businesses, finalized paperwork last week to run as an Independent candidate for Floyd County judge-executive. Talking about how the county's budget is decreasing because people are moving away to find work, Williams said he is running for the office because he wants to improve the county's financial future. "The county is at a point that if we don't get this budget and our finances in order and figure out how to expand our tax base, we won't be able to move this county forward," he said, noting that he has reviewed the county's budget. "People don't think it can get any worse, but it can. There's not a lot of cuts to make down there. We're going to have to get innovative and we'll have to work some different angles to get money." Williams will face Democratic primary election winner James "Jimmy" Rose of Martin and Republican John DeRossett in the general election in November.

Decline in coal generated power, PSC says

Coal is still the primary fuel source for electricity generation in Kentucky, but the demand for coalfired power is waning.

That was the word from Kentucky Public Service Commissioner Talina Mathews, who told the Interim Joint Committee on Natural Resources and Energy today that coal generated 83 percent of Kentucky's electricity in 2016, but preliminary data shows that percentage declined below 80 percent in 2017.

"I think that's interesting — and the gap is mostly made up from natural gas," said Mathews.

She directed lawmakers to charts illustrating changes in electricity consumption, especially in the industrial sector where Mathews said demand for electricity fell from over 50 percent in recent years to 37 percent in 2016. She attributed most of that drop to the closure of the Paducah gaseous diffusion plant, a federal facility that produced enriched uranium until 2013.

But electricity consumption in Kentucky has been decreasing for much longer than 2013, Mathews said, with consumption steadily decreasing since 2008. "We're using less - there's less electricity generated for all sectors in Kentucky," she said.

Also affecting coal-fired electricity generation in Kentucky are the retirements, or closure, of 12 coal plants between 2013 and 2017. Two other PSC-regulated coal-fired plants operated by LG&E and KU are planned for retirement next year, said Mathews.

The reasons for the closures are many, she said: low natural gas prices, the advanced age of the plants (each with an average age of 54 years), efficiency, federal regulatory rules governing mercury and air toxics standards, or MATS, and declining demand, among other factors.

As far decreased consumption, Committee Co-Chair Rep. Jim Gooch, R-Providence, wondered if conservation could also be at play. Mathews said yes, to some degree.

"I think some of it is. I think you buy a (new) refrigerator, it's going to use less electricity ... with the standards on appliances. I think it's mostly industrial load, though," said Mathews. "(And) yes, if you looked at the average household use of electricity, you're going to see it's declining."

While most of the plants being retired are coal-fired, not all are. LG&E and KU retired their Haefling #3 plant in 2013 after 43 years in operation — although retirement of natural gas plants is not the norm in Kentucky, per Mathews' testimony. And that's not just a question of fuel price according to testimony from Mathews, who said the price of coal is steady.

"I think the cost of extraction has led prices to go up, but it's not significant," she said. Natural gas prices, while "volatile" before 2008, have remained low for years, she said, and are expected to stay low for at least another 10 years.

The cost of electricity has gone up, however, said Mathews, for a variety of reasons including environmental costs, declining load and cost related to early closure of power plants.

witnessed Barker's vehicle run a traffic light on U.S. 23 at Allen that evening, and when Blackburn attempted to stop the vehicle, Barker pulled to the side of the road without coming to a full stop and "sped off."

Little alleges that Barker continued driving on U.S. 23, northbound, reaching speeds of between 75 and 80 miles per hour, and then he exited U.S. 23 onto Ky. 80 before returning to US 23, again, driving southbound.

Little claims that Barker crossed a grassy section of the road and came to a stop at Pops Chevy, where he exited his vehicle and ran into the parking lot. Blackburn chased Barker on foot. He allegedly ran into a "deep ditch" behind the car lot, the citation says, and Prestonsburg Police Department officials also turned out to help in the search.

The Floyd County Sheriff's K9 unit, Durango, located Barker "hiding in a deep weeded ditch,"

the citation alleges, and he resisted arrest.

Barker was taken to a local hospital for treatment of an injury that he claimed occurred when he drove into the ditch and he was lodged in the Floyd County Detention Center after he was medically cleared, according to the citation.

He was charged with speeding 20 miles over the limit, two counts of first-degree fleeing/evading, disregarding a traffic control device, driving on a suspended or revoked license, reckless driving and resisting arrest.
