COOPER PICKS FLOYD NATIVE

Asks Ike To Appoint Ted Gearheart Marshal Succeeding John Moore

Senator John Sherman Cooper announced Tuesday in Washington that he would recommend to President Eisenhower the appointment of Ted L. Gearheart, Ashland, as United States marshal for the Eastern District of Kentucky.

Gearheart for a year and a half has been district detective attached to the office of Commonwealth's Attorney William B. Arthur. A native of Floyd county, he served 12 years as a member of the Ashland police department and two four-year terms as Boyd county jailer. He is 48 and is a son of Fred Gearheart, of Ashland, formerly of Hueysville.

Presidential action on the recommendation is expected in a few weeks. The new marshal would succeed John Moore, Pikeville, who has held the post for 19 years. The Eastern District courts are in Catlettsburg, Lexington, Frankfort, Covington, Jackson, London, Pikeville and Richmond.

Two Teen-Agers Drown In River Here, Tuesday

BOY'S EFFORT TO AID SISTER MADE IN VAIN

Muddied Water Hinders Rescue Workers; Bodies Float onto River Shoal

Mary Alice Hicks, 15, and her 13-year-old brother, Patrick H. Hicks, were drowned in the Big Sandy river here Wednesday afternoon.

The boy's death was ascribed to his heroic efforts to save his sister after she had walked into a "step-off" in the river, a short distance above where Trimble Branch empties into the Big Sandy.

Bodies of the two, son and daughter of Arthur and Julia Slone Hicks, of Prestonsburg, were found at 4 p.m., about 45 minutes later, approximately 150 feet below where they disappeared in the muddy water.

Jay Crace, who had gone to the river with the Hicks children, said Patrick leaped onto his back in an effort to reach his sister while Crace was attempting to rescue her. The current was swift at the point she entered the water, and muddiness of the water made the search for the two almost futile.

The boy's body was first sighted, then the girl's, at the shoal below the scene of the drowning. Their recovery was made by two Crace boys, Woodie Salyers and Raymond Joseph who had been stationed at the shoal by Fire Chief Vernon Blackburn.

Blackburn said both were dead when found and that no attempt at resuscitation was made.

Mary Alice Hicks was a sophomore in Prestonsburg high school, and she and her brother were regular attendants of the Freewill Baptist Sunday School here. They are survived by their parents, six brothers and two sisters, Jay Hicks, of the army in Texas, Charles Eugene, Martin Thomas and Janie, all at home, Jonathan and Carl Hicks, both of Mansfield, O., Mrs. Cleo Henley, Portsmouth, O., and Arthur Hicks, Jr., Dayton, Ohio.

Funeral rites for the brother and sister will be conducted Friday morning at 10 from the Freewill Baptist Church here, the Revs. Chas. Rowe and W. H. Horn officiating. Burial will be made in the Hicks family cemetery on Middle Creek under direction of the Moore Funeral Home.

NAME CLARK DEPT. HEAD

Sanitarian 19 Years To Lead Health Dept.; Sizemore, Consultant

The Floyd County Health Department, it was decided Wednesday at a meeting of the Floyd County Board of Health, will operate under the direction of a public health administrator who is not a medical man.

The Board of Health recommended to the State Board of Health, whose representative promptly accepted the recommendation, that Montaine V. Clark, who for 19 years has worked with the late Dr. Marvin Ransdell as senior sanitarian with the health department here, be named health administrator in charge of the department's program.

Dr. John Sizemore, of Prestonsburg, was named medical consultant to serve 2 1/2 days a week during the medical clinic in the health department office here. He will have no other duties. Dr. Sizemore quits retirement of a few years to render this service.

Although the work of the health department will not be directed by a doctor, Mr. Clark said every effort will be made to continue its program along the lines developed by Dr. Ransdell. Recommendation of the same type of service was made by the Board of Health, and the belief was expressed that Clark's long acquaintance with the work and Dr. Ransdell's methods make him suited for the post.

J. M. Stumbo, sanitarian, was advanced at Wednesday's meeting to the post of senior sanitarian, succeeding Mr. Clark. Mrs. Regina B. Mayo was employed, effective July 1, as fulltime public health nurse.

MANTON GIRL RIVER VICTIM

Miss Perkins Drowns In Scioto River; Body Is Returned to Martin

The third Floyd countian to drown Tuesday met death in the Scioto river at Columbus, O., at 4 p.m., the hour at which the bodies of the two drowning victims were being recovered from the river here.

The Columbus tragedy victim was 17-year-old Shirleen Perkins, Martin high school student and a resident of Manton. Her companion, Dolores Sheets, 14, drowned with her.

Miss Perkins was a daughter of Leon and Beatrice Mullins Perkins, and she had been visiting her mother at Columbus. She and the Sheets girl drowned in about 10 feet of water, and their bodies were recovered about 30 minutes later. Boys fishing nearby heard their cries for help, and they notified police who arrived too late to locate the girls in the water. The two were dead on arrival at St. Francis hospital.

Surviving Miss Perkins are her parents and one brother, Jerry, of Manton. The body was returned Wednesday noon to the Hall Brothers Funeral Home at Martin. Although funeral arrangements were not complete Wednesday afternoon, it was announced that the rites will be held at 2 p.m., Saturday in the Childrens cemetery on Marrowbone Creek, Pike county.

Mrs. Mary Setser, 94, Dies at Daughter's Home; Burial in Mayo Cemetery

Mrs. Mary Etta Setser, 94, died here at 9:30, Friday night, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. L. B. Moore. Mrs. Setser had suffered a stroke some time ago and had been gravely ill for the past month.

A daughter of the late Fiem and Martha Perry Burchett, she was the widow of Jake Setser, who preceded her in death in 1927. A former resident of John's Creek, she had resided here with Mrs. Moore for the past few years. Mrs. Setser had been a devout member of the Methodist Church for 75 years.

PAINTS DARK COAL PICTURE

Moody Says Coal Sold At Loss in This Field; Group Names Floyd Men

Speaking at the annual meeting in Lexington Friday of the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Coal Operators' Association, Joseph E. Moody declared that in two Southern districts coal "sold at a loss since almost a year ago."

Moody, who is president of the Southern Coal Producers Association, pictured a dismal future for the industry unless there is some relief from the pressures on the producers.

Warned Moody: "Ghost towns pay no taxes. But that is exactly what will happen to Harlan, Pikeville, Pineville and the rest of the coal-mining towns in Kentucky unless some relief is forthcoming."

W. W. Goldsmith, Charleston, W. Va., a receiver for the Elk Horn Coal Corporation, was elected president of the Big Sandy-Elkhorn Operators' Association. Other officers named Friday were Virgil D. Picklesimer, Seco, vice-president; B. F. Reed, of Drift, chairman of the board of directors; C. W. Davis, Pikeville, executive secretary, and L. B. Brashear, of Manton, treasurer. J. H. Mosgrove, Pikeville, was again named safety director for the Association.

These disturbing figures were cited by Mr. Moody:

In 1952 and thus far this year, 103 mines closed.

That represents a loss of 15,000,000 tons production a year.

And their closing cost 14,000 miners their jobs.

As a result, "we have created a hoard of displaced persons, totaling close to 75,000."

It will take the combined brains of everyone in the coal industry to

DAMAGE CASE IS REVERSED

High Court Opinion Says Tragedy Not Fault of Driver

Before adjourning last week the Court of Appeals reversed the Pike circuit court judgment which awarded \$8,103 damages to the estate of Dan Luster, the Pike man who was killed in 1950 in a collision of his auto and a bus owned by Tom Calhoun and the late Jim P. Harris, of Prestonsburg.

As was always contended by Harris, the driver of the bus at the time of the tragedy, the court held that there was no evidence that he was to blame for the collision. The accident occurred while the Prestonsburg firm was operating a chartered bus to a Prestonsburg-Elkhorn City football game.

The high court at the term just ended set a record in the way it handled. It handed down 60 decisions, ruled on 14 petitions for rehearing and five orders. The court will convene for the fall term, Sept. 21.

One of the important decisions made at the late term was that written by Judge Bert T. Combs, Prestonsburg, holding that detailed financial statements must be published by governmental units and those handling or disbursing public funds.

UMW DISTRICT HAS BIRTHDAY

Caddy in Wayland Talk Cites Labor Progress; Local 5895 Plays Host

The celebration of the 20th anniversary of District 30, United Mine Workers of America, focused Saturday on Local Union 5895 at Wayland as UMWa officials and organizers returned to the home of that local to review the march of labor since 1933.

The Wayland local was one of the first to be formed in the organizing move which resulted in the formation of District 30.

Although the observance was heralded as a district-wide affair, the crowd was not as large as expected—probably 1,000. "It was just too hot," explained Carson Hibbits, Pikeville, district representative.

Sam Caddy, Lexington, president of District 30, reminded the miners and others at the rally that the workers are approximately \$17 a day better off than they were in 1933 when the district was organized.

He said Eastern Kentucky miners were working for \$1 to \$1.50 a day in 1933. Then, he said, the U.M.W. stepped in and organized them.

"Today," Caddy said, "you are making a basic rate of \$18.25 a day. We must work together to hold the gains we have accomplished."

The district president said, "I am 70 years old, but I hope the Lord will let me live to attend two more of your 20-year anniversaries."

David J. Stevens, international executive board member from District 7, and Garfield Lewis, international representative from District 2, both in Pennsylvania, spoke briefly of the 1933 organizing drive in Eastern Kentucky. Both were among the original organizers.

The Wayland local's membership paid tribute and presented gifts to the local's first officers.

John Morgan, the local's first president who is now retired and living at Tracy City, Tenn., was among those honored.

MOVE RESULT OF BOND SALE FAILURE HERE

Board Told Support Coming from State On Proposed Action

The Floyd County Board of Education has been advised to revoke its contract with the W. C. Thornburgh Company, Louisville, its bond agent, and will do so at once, County Superintendent Virgil O. Turner said Wednesday.

The move to cancel the contract will be made on the grounds that the Louisville firm has failed the board in financing through a \$445,000 bond issue the construction of a county high school building here. The board also contends that more effective service is available from another firm.

Mr. Turner said the Thornburgh company will be notified by letter of the board's intention as soon as the board and the fiscal court can hold a joint meeting. He added that he already is seeking this meeting within the next few days.

Revocation of the contract was advised at a meeting in Frankfort this week. The State Department of Education has promised its support of the Floyd board and court in this action.

At least one bond firm was found which is optimistic about its chances of financing the building here, he said. This was learned Tuesday when Superintendent Turner, Joe Hobson, attorney for the board, J. C. Spurlin, Prestonsburg insurance man, and others probed the possibilities of help from another source while in Louisville.

If, indeed, this step fails to produce funds, the prospects may be hopeless, the County Superintendent feels. On the other hand, the State Department of Education is less pessimistic, holding the view that in three to six months the present condition of the bond market will improve, with investors more certain of where they stand in the financial picture which has been receiving a reshuffling under the Eisenhower administration.

A few months, however, is a long

SUIT IS FILED TO BAR HORN

From Race on Ballot In Race for Sheriff; Good Faith Attacked

Jailer Guy Horn last week filed suit in the Floyd circuit court seeking to void the candidacy of Walter Horne, or Horn, of West Prestonsburg, for the Democratic nomination for Sheriff, the same post sought by the Jailer.

The West Prestonsburg man's candidacy is attacked on the grounds that he is not a bonafide candidate and is a "pretended, fictitious and dummy candidate who fled through the connivance and collusion and at the request and insistence" of candidates for the same office.

A temporary injunction was asked at the same time to prevent County Clerk DuRan Moore from causing Walter Horne's name to be printed on the official primary election ballot. The injunction was granted, but its permanence will depend on a hearing to be held next week by Circuit Judge Edward P. Hill.

The plaintiff also attacked the signature of Ray McKenzie as one of the two electors who purportedly signed the notification and declaration papers filed by Walter Horne. His petition alleges that the signature appears to have been a forgery and that McKenzie, who was purportedly a resident and voter in Auxier precinct, was never registered at that or any other Floyd county voting precinct.

The similarity in names, it is claimed, would damage the candidacy of Jailer Horn for Sheriff. The petition, which was prepared by Atty. Paul E. Hayes, claims that the West Prestonsburg Horne who is a candidate for the office is making no campaign for the office, is working in Ohio or some other state and that he left Kentucky for the sole purpose of avoiding service of process.



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

ASKS NEWSPAPER COOPERATION

Three editorials have been printed during the last thirty days, two by the editor of the Floyd County Times and one by the editor of The Paintsville Herald.

I am not asking that you discontinue writing in supporting the Dewey Lake State Park, but I believe that if you will give the directors of the Dewey Lake Park Association, a chance we will work for the betterment of all of Eastern Kentucky, and not continue a fight between Floyd and Johnson counties.

The board of directors of the Dewey Lake Park Association is composed of the following members: B. P. Bogargus, Pike county; Frank Crum, Martin county; Woodrow Burchett, Floyd county; William A. Johnson, Johnson county; Robert V. May, Floyd county; John Gaaney, Johnson county.

It is true that roads are necessary for the development of Dewey Lake, and where they will be built will be to the judgment of Commissioner William Curlin and the engineers that have given this matter serious consideration. Where the State Park is to be located will be in Floyd county, and I am sure that Commissioner Henry Ward will use his best judgment as to where the park will be located. It takes time for both of these projects, and I have confidence in both of the Commissioners.

I first want both of the editors to understand that I have not been directed by the Dewey Lake Park Association directors to write this letter, but I am doing it as a person that is interested in Eastern Kentucky.

We in Eastern Kentucky have been very fortunate in securing from the Clements-Wetherby-Beauchamp administration our share of road building in the past, and I believe if both of our papers in Prestonsburg and Paintsville will join with us to develop these projects, instead of attempting to have the people of Eastern Kentucky to think that these projects are a fight between Floyd and Johnson counties, we will be in a better position to secure these projects, and some day see a black-topped road around Dewey Lake, allowing the tourist from Ashland and central Kentucky to enter from Johnson county, those from West Virginia and Inez through Martin county; and all others above the Floyd county line through Brandy Keg and the Auxier roads. We need roads to develop the lake and the park, and it will be to our interest to get them built as quickly as the state administration can afford to give us the assistance.

It has been the pleasure of the writer during the Clements-Wetherby-Beauchamp administration to make a number of trips to Frankfort, to ask for roads not only in Johnson county, but also roads in Floyd and surrounding counties.

I have always believed that any road built in any of the counties of the Big Sandy was a help to Eastern Kentucky, and I hope that with the directors of the Lake Association and the help of both of your papers that we will be successful in our undertakings.

One other project that I wish could be accomplished and that is the name of the lake. I wish that it could be named "The Jack May Lake", as no one has had more to do with the success of the lake, than Congressman A. J. May.

I have never recommended the building of a dead-end road, and that is the reason that I asked Governor Clements when the lake was being built to build a road from Johnson and Martin counties into the lake, and I believe that I asked commissioner Henry Ward to work with the state administration for a State Park, long before the lake was completed, as I was convinced if the people of the Big Sandy valley were to get their share of the tourist trade that comes into Kentucky, that we would have to have something to offer them. We want to have them to spend a week or two with us, not to just pass us by to observe the most wonderful scenery in the state of Kentucky, and I believe in time we will have the best lake for fishing and camping in our state.

Allow me again to ask you to help us by "pulling together" and not fighting each other. After July first, we can present our plans to Governor Wetherby, Lt. Governor Beauchamp, Commissioner Curlin and Commissioner Ward, and they at that time will know how far they can go to help us in the Big Sandy valley and Eastern Kentucky, and make this the tourist paradise of Kentucky.

Give Them Credit

THE TIMES has been reminded that in the laudable effort to raise teaching standards educators and others may unwittingly adopt a smug attitude toward the so-called emergency teacher.

It should be remembered that most of these are teaching veterans who earned their certificates to teach in stiff examinations years ago. They are shy on certain credits, standards which must be set in order to attain a higher level of training and competency, but many of these teachers are women and men to whom the classification, "emergency teacher," certainly should not be applied as a term of opprobrium. For in some respects they are indeed superior to new beginners who sprang, full-panoplied, from a teacher-college with all the necessary credits.

One of the subjects these oldsters in the profession studied, years ago, was Theory and Practise of Teaching. Thus they came to know something of education psychology. What they learned of it was, on the whole, learned by digging for it, not by merely getting out of the course the required number of hours. The years have seen changes in both theory and practise—some good, some bad, all designed for the better—and of the two we'll say practise is the more important.


This is not to argue that the older teachers should not keep pace with teaching progress. Many of them are working their way to the status of fully qualified teachers by taking summer courses. And many of the teacher who now is fully qualified was, a few years ago, what is known as an emergency teacher.

There is nothing wrong with most of these folks that a few college credits will not cure. So, while they are coming to the rescue of the school system by filling teacher vacancies in the remoter, more isolated school districts, give them full credit, avoid using the term, "emergency teacher," too lightly.

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solve this problem, Moody said. "You coal operators have the responsibility of doing everything you can to offset the acute problem confronting the coal industry today," he asserted.

He cited statistics gathered by the S. C. P. A. that show the total tonnage of District 7, the low-volatile section, and District 8, the high-volatile area, was sold at a loss during the first quarter of this year.

"I admit the losses have varied from 2 cents to 3 cents in some districts to 25 cents in others, and have varied from month to month," Moody said.

No industry can sell a great part of its product at a loss month after month and stay in business long, he continued.

The figure of 103 mines closed may not include all mines that have abandoned operations, he said. The association has no way of knowing how many small mines, or mines not reported, that have closed.

The list of displaced persons created by the closing of mines is a grave problem when you consider there is little other work available in mining areas, Moody told the group.

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



Floyd County Historical Notes

By HENRY P. SCALF

The Lane family of England had so many emigrants to America that the separation of the many different lines poses a genealogical problem of the first magnitude. In browsing through the records of Virginia and Kentucky one comes upon names familiar to generation after generation of Lanes. It seems that the parent stock bestowed upon their children generously in each generation the names of William and John.

William Lane, or as he often spelling it Laine, was the progenitor of the Eastern Kentucky line. Today this East Kentucky line spell it Layne. There were other Williams. One was the father of the above mentioned. In trying to untangle the web and maze of Williams in the family one is deeply baffled.

Sometimes, though, in all this browsing for facts a little note of history will reveal itself that recompenses for your futile genealogical digging. One of these compensations is a letter written by John S. Lane from Alabama to his father, Col. James H. Lane of Montgomery county, Kentucky.

Col. Lane was born in Loudon county, Virginia, in 1767. He came to Kentucky in 1789, lived a short while at Strode's Station in the present Clark county, and in either 1790 or 1791 he and his uncle Enoch Smith and a Captain Crawford built the first settlement in Montgomery county near the present Mt. Sterling. Later he moved to Bath county and built the first cabin in that county.

(The Enoch Smith mentioned above was in the present Pike county in the 1770's and attempted to survey land a few miles from Pikeville. Later he went to Montgomery county, becoming one of very first settlers of that county.)

The letter from John S. Lane to his father, Col. James H. Lane follows:

"Perry county, Alabama
Dec. 27th, 1834

"Dear father,
"I have just got home and hasten to give you a brief statement of my travels in the far west. After leaving brother James I journeyed down the Ohio until I got to a place called Rome, where I drove over into the state of Indiana and went about 30 miles into the country; found nothing either for myself or horse to eat and turned back and got on the Kentucky side and congratulated myself that I had once more got into a Christian country and crossed over into Illinois at Shawneetown; the inhabitants of this country on the southern part of it are a poor, degraded set of beings, who will neither work for themselves or anybody else.

"I went on through St. Louis into Missouri, where I was taken with the fever and was confined long enough to reduce me to a mere skeleton; as soon as I was clearly able to walk I started down the river with an intention of ascending the Red River to Natchetoches and thence across through the Mexican dominion towards the Gulf but after waiting at the mouth of Red River a week and no boat passing, on which to ascend I got on a boat and went to New Orleans and got on board a schooner and in eight days, during nearly the whole of which time I was seasick, was landed at Brasons in Texas. I bought me a mule and advanced about 150 miles towards the north, sometime on the Colorado and sometimes on the Brasens (?)—is very badly timbered and—very sickly. I had the ague and fever all the time I was in the country and it is hardly worth while after saying what I have to say I do not like Texas.

"On returning from Texas, we were in a four-day storm, which

blowed us to the 24th degree of North Latitude and I put this down on the log book of my life as the most trying—at one time we would be on the top of the surf capped mountain in view of a yawning gulf below—and in a moment we would be apparently swallowed up in the vortex with the crying surf dashing over the prow of the vessel. You will naturally suppose that I was frightened but I tell you I was so seasick all the time that I viewed it with perfect indifference.

"After looking at all the western country of the United States, & c. I cannot say I like any of them but am rather inclined to think I shall settle in Mississippi. "My health is at this time tolerably good. I shall as soon as I can write to brother Henry, in apology for not going by to see him. I assure you father, that I am truly sorry that I did not go by. I was offended that he wrote so many times while I was in Kentucky and never mentioned my name, but when I think that I was within 100 miles of him and never went to see him I feel emotions hard to express.





Moody Hits UMWA Welfare Fund At Recent Producers Meeting

SOMERSET, Ky. — The welfare fund of the United Mine Workers of America takes 40 cents out of each ton of coal sold, whereas 12 cents could handle the situation.

That was the opinion expressed here recently by Joseph E. Moody, Washington, D. C., president of the Southern Coal Producers' Association. He spoke at a luncheon during the spring meeting of the Central Appalachian Section, American Institute of Mining-Metallurgical Engineers, at the Hotel Beecher.

Concerning the union's welfare fund, Moody said, "I do not think it is the coal operators' responsibility to maintain a large social project."

Discussing the coal situation in far from optimistic tones, Moody said 103 mines in the association closed last year, displacing 75,000 workers. He said 411 wildcat strikes in association mines last year cost millions of dollars. He said that residual oil is making great inroads on coal because it is a cheaper fuel.

Moody was introduced at the luncheon by Prof. E. M. Spokes of the University of Kentucky College of Engineering.

Speaking at a banquet later was William G. Caples, Chicago, president of Inland Steel Container Company.

About 75 coal operators and mining engineers from Kentucky, Virginia, and West Virginia registered for the two-day convention.

Technical papers were read at the morning session. George Tarleton, Jenkins, and E. K. Newman, Benham, presided.

Herbert L. Jones, Lundale, W. Va., vice-president of Amherst Coal Company, discussed "Mining Practices in the Ruhr Area," where only 20 per cent of the coal mines were destroyed in World War II.

The coal industry, he said, is the backbone of Western Europe's recovery, and "coal is the most important commodity in Western Europe."

Although the Ruhr miner makes only \$4 or \$5 a day, he said, he has a good home. During the discussion after his speech, it was brought out that German coal miners live in better homes than the average American miner.

Lee Sliniff, Huntington, W. Va., discussed "Coal Mining in Turkey." He is associated with J. H. Fletcher Company.

The Turkish miner, he said, makes about \$2 a day less one third for social benefits. The mines in Turkey, he said are operated by the State.

Other papers were read by Acel Garland, Holden, W. Va., and M. J. Ankeny, Washington, D. C. Garland is director of industrial engineering for Island Creek Coal Company. Ankeny is safety director of the Bituminous Coal Operators' Association.

State Police Seek Additional Troopers

Frankfort, Ky., June 22 (Sp.) — Competitive examinations to fill openings as cadet trooper with the Kentucky Department of State Police will be held here Saturday, July 14, according to an announcement today.

Applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of Kentucky, between 21 and 40 years old, not less than 5' 9" tall and 150 pounds, have a high school education and possess a valid Kentucky operator's license.

Cadet troopers start at \$200 a month and after a four month training period are promoted to the rank of trooper at a salary of \$240.

Persons interested in taking the exams should contact the commanding office of the nearest State Police post for full details.

Police posts are located at Mayfield, Madisonville, Bowling Green, Hodgenville, Louisville, Williams-town, Richmond, Morehead, Ashland, Pikeville, Hazard, Harlan, London and Frankfort.

Garland discussed "Incentive Plans in Coal Mining." Ankeny spoke on "An Analysis of Public Law No. 552." This is the federal Mine Safety Law.

This law, he said, is the first permanent venture of the Federal Government into the field of compulsory mine-safety regulations. It is designed for the prevention of major disasters in mines.

"If the states can maintain the downward trend of mine-disaster accidents that has been taking place during the past several years, he said, "and in co-operation with the Federal Bureau of Mines can eliminate the major disasters, I do not think there will be any further on the prerogatives of the state to regulate the safety of the mines."

'Bear' Facts—

LEXINGTON, Ky. — During the off-season, summer months the average football fan probably has little more on his mind than the matter of how to keep cool, but for the coaching staff up here at the University of Kentucky this is the time for coldly laying plans for next fall.

One of the hottest subjects in this "cold war" planning often is not will be the value of the good little man versus the big man. You would think that in athletics, and football above all, there would be a premium on the young giant variety, but you could get some pretty neat arguments to the contrary if you were to sit in on some of our staff meetings.

Few coaches will go so far as to put themselves "out on a limb" either way in the matter of small men against the big athlete. In fact, we here at U. of K. certainly want all the big men we can possibly get if they are also good in the sense of desire to play, willingness to scrap every inch of the way and blessed with plain every day ability. But every so often we are surprised and pleased as much as the fans are in seeing a good little man come through to beat out a bigger player. In such cases, the reason always boils down to the fact that the little guy was the "blood and guts" variety who just wanted to play worse than the other fellow and simply outscraped his rival for the job.

Kentucky in recent years has been blessed with several top flight "little" men, such as our fabulous Jones twins, Harry (1A) and Larry (1B), who weighed in the the fly-weight poundage of about 155 and stood only 5'10" during four years' competition against gridiron heavyweights. Then there was Henderson's Wilbur (Shorty) Jamerson, a mere 5'9" and 168 in his senior year as co-captain of our 1950 SEC and Sugar Bowl championship team.

Even lighter was regular halfback Emery Clark of Carlisle, who was listed on the roster in his senior year as 5'9" and 162 pounds. There were many others too, more than space will permit mentioning, but I'll certainly never forget a couple of small guys who are now valuable members of the Kentucky coaching staff—Ernal Allen (a 160-pound quarterback) and Jerry Claborn (6'10", 170-pound end and safetyman from Hopkinsville).

MARY ORDELL RAY, WHEELWRIGHT GRAD, WINNER OF COAL COMPANY SCHOLARSHIP, MAY BE FLOYD'S FIRST WOMAN DOCTOR

Wheelwright's Mary Ordell Ray, who recently was awarded a John Hay Whitney Foundation fellowship while a student at the University of Kentucky, is a little girl with a big future if she continues work along the same lines she followed through high school and college, Floyd county acquaintances declare.

She was valedictorian of her class at graduation from Wheelwright high school in 1949, won the four-year college scholarship offered a non-employee's son or daughter by the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company, of David, gamed it through two years at Caney Junior College and is finishing up at the University of Kentucky next week with honors as a pre-medical student.

"She has a dogged persistence, the like of which you've never seen," said Wayne Ratliff, principal of the Wheelwright high school, this week while confidently predicting a brilliant future for Miss Ray.

She is one of the 11 children of Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Ray, of Bypro, and that \$500-a-year scholarship she received from Princess Elkhorn for her college education was sorely needed. Her father is a timberman for the Inland Steel Company, and the size of his family was a strain on his finances. But \$500 a year, as greatly as it would help, would not get her through the University of Kentucky, she figured.

So, on the advice of her high school principal, Mr. Ratliff, and through cooperation of David L. Francis, President of Princess Elkhorn, she took only \$150 a year of the scholarship fund for the first two years while attending Caney Junior College at Pippaspass. That left her \$850 a year for the next two at U. K. And she added to that by working as a laboratory assistant there. Now after attaining a near perfect 2.9 scholastic standing at the University (an even 3 is perfect), with her character and ambitions for the future helping her along, she has won the Whitney Foundation scholarship worth \$1,200 to defray her expenses at the University of Louisville School of Medicine.

She says she's coming back to Floyd county as a full-fledged doctor. Miss Ray stands only 4 feet, 10, but there's nothing small about her ambitions. She admits she found the going rough in pre-med, preparing for a profession dominated by men, but not too rough. "A girl has to work harder in pre-med to be accepted," she said last week.

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



An August chill is easily dispelled and as the heat increased the father got up from the hearth and threw open the cabin door. The house was too warm, he said.
He stood in the doorway, staring into the moonlight but directly he called to his children and wife to come and look at the moon and the sky. They crowded around the cabin door and, he pressed by those behind, stepped into the cabin yard.
The old lady, who said she was a young girl then, stood in the doorway, staring at the moon and stars. 



Not only will the program deal with hunting and fishing but will cover such subjects as forest protection, park development and soils and water resources.

The initial program, which is more or less an introduction of the series, features such speakers as Governor Lawrence Wetherby, Fish and Wildlife Commissioner Earl Wallace, Conservation Commissioner Henry Ward, Game and Fish Commission Chairman Tom Theobald. The announcer is Ronnie Rhody, who recently accepted a position with the Public Relations Division of the Department to handle the series of programs.

OIL INDUSTRIES GROUPS MEET

The regular biennial meeting of six county Petroleum Industries committees in this area was held at the Herald Hotel, Paintsville, June 2, under the auspices of the Kentucky Petroleum Industries Committee. Members of Johnson, Floyd, Magoffin, Lawrence, Martin and Morgan county Petroleum Industries Committees attended. Ellis Whit, chairman of the Johnson county committee, presided and Herbert L. Clay, state executive secretary of the Kentucky P. I. C., was the principal speaker.

Mr. Clay said that a recently completed survey of the condition of Kentucky's highways by the Highway Department indicated that about 2,400 miles of the state's 3,800 mile primary federal aid highway system is inadequate and \$183 million is required to bring this system up to adequate standards. At present expenditure rates it will require about 20 years for this work, Clay said, and meanwhile the whole state will suffer in many ways because of these deficiencies. He advocated a five-year accelerated construction program financed by revenue bonds so the business, economic, social and educational development of Kentucky may more quickly be fully realized. Improvement of these main trunk line arteries which carry over 50 percent of the entire rural highway traffic of the state, will also greatly increase travel and result in more road tax revenues with which to build even more roads. Better, safer roads promote increased travel, he said.

The meeting endorsed the newly formed organization "Project Adequate Roads for Kentucky" which will work with state administrative and legislative officials to bring this road program to speedy completion. All organized groups in the state, that are interested in highway use and road development, are urged to join the P. A. R. for Kentucky movement. This organization will actively support the program from the drafting of required legislation to the acceptance of the last mile of finished highway.



Fireworks Shipments Check To Be Started

Frankfort, Ky., June 23 (Spl.) — Another victory against the delivery of unauthorized fireworks in Kentucky has been won.

The American Railway Express Company has agreed with the State Fire Marshal's office to exact an affidavit from consignees of fireworks that the products are not to be used in violation of state law, which only recognizes supervised fireworks displays after permit has been granted by local authorities.

The ban, according to State Fire Marshal J. T. Underwood, Jr., is against the sale or unauthorized use of fireworks.

Substantial strides have been made since the anti-fireworks bill was passed in 1950, Underwood added, with the only major problem being that some "bootleg" fireworks are believed to be arriving by truck in some instances "but by and large most of the shippers are co-operating with us."

BUILDING POSTPONED

Frankfort, Ky., June 23 — Kentucky's tight budget situation resulted in its Building Commission shelving temporarily \$1,010,300 in requests from agencies for the coming fiscal year. Among projects shelved were:

Lincoln Institute, Shelby county, \$750,000; Kentucky School for Blind, Louisville, gymnasium, \$125,000; Morehead State College, gymnasium, \$100,000; Department of Military Affairs for single unit Army at Danville, \$35,000, and Tuberculosis Sanatoria Commission, for property near its Ashland hospital, \$800.



Officials of Two States To Meet June 30 at Breaks

Officials of Kentucky and Virginia will meet at the Breaks of Sandy, on the Kentucky-Virginia border near Elkhorn City, June 30 to inspect the area and discuss its development as a tourist attraction. Conservation Commissioner Henry Ward announced at Frankfort this week.

The meeting will be headed by Ward and Raymond V. Long, acting director of Conservation and Development for Virginia, and will be attended by advisors and planners from both states. It will be the first time that such a meeting has been held at the site.

Both the Kentucky and Virginia legislatures provided in 1952 that their departments of conservation make studies of the area and report their recommendations to the 1954 sessions.

Ward also announced that Sen-

ator Earle C. Clements and Congressman Carl D. Perkins have introduced legislation in Congress authorizing Kentucky and Virginia to establish an interstate commission to help develop the Breaks. The bill was introduced at Ward's suggestion and, under the United States Constitution, must be passed before the states can enter into a compact on the area.

Ward said the legislation is patterned after an agreement entered into by New York and New Jersey in developing Palisades Park on their borders.

The Breaks of the Sandy, called the Breaks of the Cumberland in Virginia, is a 1,600-foot gorge cut by the Russell Fork of the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River. The area under study lies between Elkhorn City and Haysi, Va., and most of it is in Virginia.

BREAK DIAMOND RECORD

Diamond production in Venezuela broke another record for that country when 98,280 carats were obtained; the previous high was 75,512 carats in 1948.

So long ago that I hate to recall the passage of time I took an oath to support the Constitution of Kentucky and uphold all the state's laws. That was when I was admitted to the bar in Henderson County. In those times official oaths were taken far more seriously than today. I have never knowingly violated mine.

That may be the reason why I just can't understand how some 80 members of the legislature or candidates for seats in that so-called august body could sign a petition asking Governor Wetherby to pardon two labor union organizers convicted of violating the law against banding together to commit violence—Kentucky's mob law.

The two men, Arthur Chaney and Earl Suver, were convicted in the Union County Circuit Court after a trial called fair by the Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court of the land. Every means was taken by the UMWA to beat the jail rap for Chaney and Suver. The men are doing a year in jail at Morgansfield.

When the 80 young legislators, or legislators to be, signed the petition they repudiated the laws they are pledged to uphold. I'll bet ten ginger cakes to one that not one of the signers know the facts. They signed the petition because they thought it was good politics to obligate the labor bosses. They may not have been smart enough to realize at the time that they were violating their moral obligations as citizens. If they had, some of them might not have signed the petition.

In a case where there is any doubt about the evidence or the ruling of the trial court, there might be a possible excuse for signing a petition for a pardon. In the case of Chaney and Suver the highest court could not find fault with the ruling of Circuit Judge Marlin Blackwell or with the verdict of the jury. So there was no excuse whatsoever for pardoning Chaney and Suver.

Maybe the signers of the petition can look their neighbors in the face. If I were one of them I could write Governor Wetherby renouncing my action and ask him to run a big blue pencil mark across my signature. And at bedtime I would get down on my knees and ask the good Lord to forgive me for violating a sacred obligation as a citizen.


