At the end of 1959, as federal social security was starting its twenty-fifth year, old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits were being paid in Floyd county to 3,802 persons at the ate of \$173,284 per month or 2,079,408 per year, according to ames A. Nationally, about 13% million Kentucky coal a year. persons were receiving old-age, survivors, and disability insurance monthly benefits at the end of 1959 at an annual rate of more than \$10 billion. At the close of 1940—the first year in which monthly benefits were payablebeneficiaries throughout the U.S. totaled 200,000. Almost half a million disabled-worker beneficiarles and their dependents receiving benefits at a yearly rate of over \$400 million are included in the figures for 1959.

The number of wives, husbands, and children of disabled-worker sawmill accident near Norton, Virbeneficiaries receiving monthly benefits increased sharply in 1959. Such benefits were first payable for September 1958. Nationally, from February to December 1959, the number of these beneficiaries more than doubled - from 60,-000 to 126,000.

Payments to a retired worker with no dependents receiving benefits averaged \$69 a month nationally at the end of last December; to a retired couple, both of whom were receiving benefits, the average payment was \$121. 
