Sticky Time
Humidity continues to drench almost as quickly as the lurking rain. Today's weather calls for 70 percent chance of thundershowers, according to the National Weather Service at Jackson. Highs in the low- to mid-60s, with nighttime lows in the mid-60s.

Partly cloudy skies are forecast for Thursday through the weekend, with highs ranging from the mid-80s to mid-90s. If possible, Friday's air promises to be even more humid. Night lows over the weekend are expected to be in the 60s and 70s.

Can You Bear It?
Two Floyd County men say they spotted a bear Monday near the Dewey Dam spillway at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park. Estill Robinson of Prestonsburg and Keith Smallwood of Wheelwright say they were in the parking lot about 6 p.m. when a bear came running across the lot and into the woods. "It acted like it was running from something," Robinson said.

Park officials say other park users have reported bear sightings in the last few years. Bears have also reportedly been seen in Johnson and Lawrence counties recently.

Rah, Rah, PCC!
Prestonsburg City Council passed a resolution Monday evening urging heftier state support for Prestonsburg Community College.

The resolution urges the Kentucky Council on Higher Education "to strongly recommend that the 1990 Kentucky Legislature authorize a catch-up appropriation large enough to lift the community colleges to the statewide average and to fully fund Kentucky's higher education formula."

The document, unanimously approved, will be forwarded to area legislators Greg Stumbo, Bennie Ray Bailey and David LeMaster.

Hammond Spends \$63,000 Of Own Money

\$100,000 Spent In Attorney's Race

Nearly \$100,000 was spent by two candidates for county attorney during the primary election, and over half that amount was the personal expenditure of one man.

According to election finance reports filed by yesterday's deadline, Jim Hammond, elected by Floyd voters as their new county attorney, spent \$69,227 during the primary election; \$63,594 was his own money.

Hammond received only \$5,633 in donations from individuals.

His opponent, David Barber, spent slightly over \$35,000. Of that amount, Barber contributed about \$15,000.

Barber said the remaining funds came from individual and in-kind donations.

Unlike his opponent, Hammond received no in-kind donations, nor did he hold a fund raiser.

According to state Election Finance officials, candidates can recover up to \$10,000 of their own funds if a surplus exists as of midnight May 23. Hammond repaid himself \$1,283. Barber said he doubted that he would recoup any of his personal expenditures.

Hammond, saying he sought the office out of a sense of civic duty, said he spent his own funds, accepted few

contributions and solicited none.

"I wouldn't solicit. I want to feel like I can answer to the people, instead of interest groups," he said.

"Through the grace of God, I have it to spend," Hammond said. "The Kennedys spent millions of dollars to get John elected. It's all relative. Why do constables spend \$6,000 or \$8,000 to get elected?"

The attorney-elect, previously a state senator, set a record in 1975 for the amount of funds expended during a state senate race.

Hammond said he had budgeted more than \$80,000 for his campaign, but did not spend the full amount.

"This is what it takes. I didn't go out and buy votes, and I didn't put myself up to be bought, either," he said.

Barber, who saw his opponent spend virtually twice as much money as he during the campaign, questioned why a candidate would spend more on a campaign than an office pays.

He said that statutorily, a county attorney may earn no more than \$55,000, a figure lower than the \$67,000 to \$68,000 offered by Hammond.

Barber said he received about \$54,000 in total salary and fees for his

Area C-sections Amount To More Than Statistics

Four area hospitals ranked in the top 10 on a recently compiled list of hospitals with high percentages of pregnant women delivering babies by Caesarean section.

Data gleaned from birth certificates by state officials at the request of the Louisville Courier Journal show Highlands Regional Medical Center having a 53 percent rate of Caesarean births, the highest percentage in Kentucky.

Williamson Appalachian Regional Healthcare in Pike County had a 45 percent Caesarean birth rate; Our Lady of the Way Hospital in Martin, 39 percent, and Paul B. Hall Regional Medical Center in Paintsville, 36 percent. (McDowell Appalachian Regional Health Care does not have an obstetrics unit.)

The average across the state, and nationally, for Caesarean births as opposed to vaginal childbirth is about 24 percent. In Caesarean births, generally called C-sections, the infant is

taken from the mother's uterus through surgery.

The findings have prompted the hospitals to reexamine their records on numbers of C-sections performed. Russell Briggs, assistant administrator at HRMC, said that facility's quality assurance committee regularly examines physician surgery records, but is now reevaluating procedures based on the study.

"We're looking at the number of C-sections by doctor, whether a C-section was performed on a patient


for the first time or whether it's a repeat operation, and the justification in each case," Briggs said. The committee, he said, looks at the facts and makes recommendations through a chain of command to the hospital board.

"For Caesareans, it's a doctor's call," said Briggs, whose hospital has three affiliate physicians who deliver babies. "I know of doctors who have turned patients away because the patients requested C-sections for convenience."

C-sections have come under fire by critics of health care systems in recent years as frequently being unnecessary operations and because of a reported higher chance of infection than in vaginal delivery. Briggs said HRMC's infection rate is "very, very low."

Briggs and other local health care professionals say that some factors put Appalachian women at high risk in pregnancy and prompt the decision.

Eureka!
If Floyd Countians hadn't seen enough rain already this year, last Wednesday's gusher from a water service line in Prestonsburg probably would have been welcomed by passersby. A Mountain Enterprises machine operator tapped into the water line while doing extensive repair work at a trouble spot near the intersection of US 23 and KY 1428. Between 15 and 20 residences were without water for "a short period of time," according to Prestonsburg Utilities Chief Bill Harvey Howard. Trying to correct a continuous pothole, workers dug more than eight feet and filled the hole with layers of drainage material, gravel, rocks and finally black-top. As of Tuesday, the road surface was still smooth.

Property Transferred By City

The Prestonsburg Holding Corp. voted Monday evening to accept the city's real property holdings following a move by the council to convey the holdings to the corporation.

Comprised of the council members, the corporation met immediately after the regular Monday meeting of the council.

During the corporation meeting, city administrator Fred James was authorized to purchase equipment for the city and to lease it back to the

city at the purchase price. James was also authorized to refinance the city's riverbank parking lot.

The corporation exists, James said, because the city cannot legally have indebtedness beyond a budget year. Debt incurred by the city for the purchase of expensive equipment and other items can be placed into the holding corporation, he said, and then leased to the city.

The arrangement is a common one for municipalities, James said.

P'burg Council Authorizes Truck, Equipment Purchases

Prestonsburg City Council spent more than \$75,000 on vehicles and equipment and sent another purchase request that will total more than \$40,000 back into committee during two and a half hours of deliberation Monday evening.

Council received bids from three companies in response to an advertisement for two 3/4-ton pick up trucks. On a motion by Charles Hale, seconded by Danny Hamilton, Council accepted a bid of \$10,352 each from Music-Carter-Hughes of Prestonsburg. Also bidding were Ed Walters of Prestonsburg and R.F. Steiner of Huntington.

A high bid of \$33,981 for a dump truck and bed was accepted on a motion by Mike Vance with a second from Paul Joseph. The winning bid was on a Mack diesel truck with a May bed, submitted by Worldwide Equipment of Prestonsburg.

Lower bids from Steiner and Music-Carter-Hughes were passed over after council members agreed to go with the Mack line over three other proposed models.

The city will soon have a Jaws of Life mechanism, used to extricate victims in automobile accidents. Council accepted a bid from Ashley Fire Equipment of West Jefferson, N.C., for a demonstration apparatus costing \$10,800. More than \$2,000 have been donated by local individuals and groups toward the purchase, according to Fire Chief Thomas Blackburn.

A motion by William Callihan, seconded by Joseph, led to the bid acceptance. A bid for almost \$2,000 more from the Howell Co. of Moraine, Ohio, was turned down.

Eight bids, offering a variety of mixes of truck and packer makes and models, led to a decision to postpone the purchase of a new garbage truck for the city. Bids ranged from \$44,000 to more than \$52,000 for the combination truck and packer.

After much discussion and on the recommendation of city administrator Fred James, council voted to refer the matter to the buildings and equipment committee for further study. James said the city needs "to reevaluate" its garbage collection system in light of recent developments in the solid waste disposal industry.

"Several cities are going to smaller trucks, dumping them into larger dumpsters for fewer trips to the landfill," James said, adding that in government circles solid waste problems are attracting increasing attention. He urged council to "take time to look at all the factors" involved in the local system.

Council also voted to purchase several pieces of radio equipment to be used by fire and police dispatchers. The equipment, to be bought from Highland Communications, has a price tag of \$10,211. The motion to

purchase was made by Adrian Blackburn, seconded by Callihan and agreed on by all members, except William O. Goebel III who abstained.

In other business, Blaine Hall was reappointed to the Prestonsburg Housing Authority, and council agreed to use state price contracts for patching the surface of city streets and for additional curb and sidewalk construction.

As a result of concern expressed by Vance, Mayor Ann Latta said she will write a letter to the state highway department requesting that the speed limit on KY 1428 near the new Prestonsburg Middle School be lowered from 55 to 45 miles per hour.

Council also authorized James to attend a state police car auction in July to purchase new cars for the city police force.

At 9:30 p.m., council members went into executive session to discuss litigation, which was not made public. All members were present except Jim Yates. The next council meeting, on the reduced summer schedule, is set for July 24 at 7 p.m. at the Municipal Building.

A Vietnam veteran, Pitts is survived by his parents Shade and Ruth Riffett Pitts of Blue River, his wife Fayette Conn Pitts and a son Keith Randall Pitts of Martin. The funeral was Monday at Nelson-Frazier Funeral Home, with burial in the Conn Cemetery at Arkansas Creek.

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

sion to opt for surgical delivery. Pregnant teenagers, for instance, are often high risk cases and frequently deliver by C-section. Sr. Mary Fanning, Our Lady of the Way administrator, said that more than 10 percent of the women who deliver at her hospital are between the ages of 14 and 18.

Dr. Narong Chalothorn, known commonly as Dr. Charlie, said he sees a great number of pregnancies in young women 14, 15 and 16 years old. Earl Compton of the Floyd County Health Department said his office has seen pregnancies among 12- and 13-year-olds.

In teen mothers, the pelvic area is frequently not developed and natural delivery is not safe, said Chalothorn, whose practice along with other area obstetricians is reportedly being monitored by the Kentucky Board of Medical Licensure because of the number of Caesareans performed.

In Chalothorn's office at Archer Memorial Clinic on Monday, for instance, was a young woman who at 16 has just had her second child by C-section. She was 14 when she had her first baby.

"The first baby weighed eight pounds and was 20 inches long and she couldn't have delivered it naturally," the physician said. She also experienced complications with the second baby, which was delivered by another doctor while Chalothorn was away at a continuing education program on perinatal care.

According to statistics from the state Cabinet for Human Resources, more than 20 percent of births in the

Big Sandy region in 1987 were to women under 19 years old.

Chalothorn also said that about 80 percent of his patients are poor and have to use a subsidized medical card. Some do not see a physician until late in their pregnancy, resulting in less than optimum prenatal care.

Other factors that increase birth risks and encourage C-sections, he said, are obesity and smoking, both of which are believed to complicate the birth process and endanger the fetus. Both conditions are also common among women in the area.

The University of Pittsburgh-educated physician said he has seen many women go into the delivery room with a cigarette between their fingers, even though he has warned them of the risks to the baby and has them sign a paper acknowledging the risks.

He added that women over 35 are also considered at higher risk in birthing and sometimes need to have C-sections. Katherine Johnson of Wheelwright, a patient of Chalothorn, bears witness to that factor. She had two children after turning 35.

Johnson said that when one child was born two years ago, she went to Pikeville Methodist Hospital where doctors would not perform a C-section. "I liked to die afterwards. I couldn't walk for two weeks and

couldn't straighten up for three weeks," she said.

For her last child, born recently, Johnson insisted on having a C-section. "I was afraid I couldn't go through that again," she said. "This time I was out of the hospital in a few days and felt really good. It made a world of difference. I'm really thankful to Dr. Charlie because he took in mind my mental and physical state."

Responding to an allegation that some obstetricians opt for C-sections because they get more money for the operation, Chalothorn said that he does not make any more money for performing a C-section than for a natural delivery. "The medical card pays the same price (for either procedure)," he said. He added that Medicaid reimburses less for a C-section

combined with a tubal ligation than for a natural delivery along with a tubal ligation.

Chalothorn also denied the allegation, made by some critics, that physicians choose C-sections to save time, so they don't have to wait for natural birth. "I stay with my patients through labor if at all possible regardless of the type of birth," he said.

Other sources indicated that the hospitals on the Courier-Journal's C-section list take more indigent cases and more cases where patients rely on medical cards for hospital services. The risk factors associated with pregnant women who are poor transpose to those hospital logs.

"Our job is to get people well and to save the baby and the mother," Chalothorn said.

work as county attorney last year.

"It's absurd for a candidate to spend more than they could possibly make from the office. It may well be all above board, but it just looks bad," said Barber. He said he favors spending limits on local and statewide elections, noting that often, the best qualified candidate is not elected because he or she "can't outspend the other people."

Pointing to Dr. Grady Stumbo, who previously ran for the governor's seat, Barber said, "Grady would have made the best governor that we've had in 30 years, but he just couldn't match the dollars people put in it."

FIRST REPORTING PERIOD
(Jan. 1 to April 18)

In the first reporting period, Jan. 1 to April 18, Hammond received \$29,159. However, only \$2,150 came from individuals other than himself. Hammond received a \$100 contribution from Robert Bowens of Prestonsburg, \$50 from Steve Conn of Ivel, and \$2,000 from Prestonsburg businessman David Layne.

The remaining \$27,009 were loans from himself to his campaign, all at 12.5 percent interest.

Barber reported receiving \$4,550 during the first reporting period, including \$2,000 from Paul and Sheila Whitt of Salyersville. He received \$2,550 in itemized deductions from 21 other individuals.

According to his campaign finance report, he also received \$6,323 worth of in-kind contributions. Of that, Barber donated \$3,341, while his law firm, Barber and Paxton, contributed \$1,255.

Other in-kind contributions included Ronnie Stone, billboards, \$700; Randy Hays, billboards, \$800; and Oris Hays, campaign buttons, \$226.

SECOND REPORTING PERIOD
(April 19 to May 8)

In the second reporting period, Hammond indicated he received \$4,235. Of that amount, he contributed \$4,000, while three other individuals made donations. He received \$100 from Curtis and Joan Hatfield of Ulysses; \$100 from Jimmy and Cathy Goble of Ivel; and \$35 from H. Salisbury of Martin.

Barber's report for the second period indicates he received \$7,900 in contributions, as well as \$8,535 from 82 people attending a fund raiser. He

also received \$178 in in-kind contributions.

Barber received \$2,000 from Lynn Parrish of Pikeville; \$500 from John Earl Hunt of Prestonsburg; \$1,000 from Peggy Dudleson of Hueysville; \$3,000 from Ross Harris of Pikeville; \$1,000 from Dr. James D. Adams of Prestonsburg; and \$400 from John Chafin of Prestonsburg.

In-kind donations reported by Barber included:

\$3,386 from himself; \$420 from Earl M. McGuire of Prestonsburg; \$23 from Julie Paxton of Prestonsburg; \$12 from Judi Calhoun of Prestonsburg; \$47 from Marguerite Martin of Martin; and \$33 from Linda McGuire of Prestonsburg.

THIRD REPORTING PERIOD
(May 9 to June 19)

During the final reporting period, Hammond received \$28,487 in contributions. Of that amount, he contributed all but \$3,000, received as a direct contribution from Virginia Layne of Ivel.

Barber's final election finance report was unavailable as of presstime; information will be published in next week's Times.



Wilkinson Seeks Disaster Declaration For Floyd, Other Counties Affected By Flooding

Gov. Wallace G. Wilkinson announced Monday that he is requesting a Presidential Disaster Declaration for seven Eastern Kentucky counties, including Floyd, involved in recent flash floods.

"I am asking President Bush to declare a major disaster for Kentucky as the result of the widespread storms and flooding that took place beginning on June 15," Wilkinson said.

The counties that are included in this declaration request, in addition to Floyd, are Bell, Clay, Knott, Knox, Leslie and Whitley, the governor said.

Estimated requirements for Floyd County include 25 units of temporary housing; 15 individual and family grants, totaling \$60,000; 12 emergency food stamp cases; minimal public assistance funds for damage to public buildings; Small Business Administration loans to two families, totaling \$14,000; and one Department of Education school grant for \$50,000.

Recent flash flooding affected McDowell, Drift, Maytown and Garrett elementaries, as well as McDowell High School.

when the figures are ready.

On a preliminary basis, the eligible flood-related damages for federal assistance which have been surveyed in the seven-county area are as follows:

Private residential, \$2.2 million; businesses, \$255,000; agriculture, \$500,000; public (state and local governments) \$2.4 million; total damages are \$5.4 million.

"I am requesting FEMA and the US Small Business Administration and other federal departments to make available to these disaster counties at the earliest feasible date, all of the appropriate federal assistance programs," Wilkinson said.

"I have designated the Kentucky Adjutant General, Brig. Gen. Michael W. Davidson, as the state coordinating officer for this request. Gen. Davidson will provide further information and justification on my behalf, as requested by FEMA," Wilkinson added.



New Program Offers Help, Hope For Rheumatoid Arthritis Sufferers

Because more than 2 million Americans have rheumatoid arthritis (RA) — a potentially crippling disease that often affects the entire body — the Arthritis Foundation has launched a new nationwide program targeted to people with RA.

The purpose of the program is to let victims know that there are methods of treating the disease that offer them greater hope and improved quality of life, according to Rebecca Cowan, board president of the Kentucky Chapter.

The new program is called the "Joint Movement Against Rheumatoid Arthritis." As part of the program, the Arthritis Foundation's

Kentucky Chapter is offering a free bimonthly newsletter reporting on RA research to the estimated 22,000 persons over 18 in Kentucky who have RA, said Cowan. The program will also expand the number of Arthritis Foundation support groups nationwide for people with arthritis, she added.

Social Security Help For A Fee? Don't Buy It, Says Local Official

A private corporation that is offering to help local persons in filing Social Security claims is not connected with the federal government and could be a waste of the claimant's money, according to Social Security District Director Jim Kelly.

A company called Federal Benefits Assistance Corp. is contacting persons in Floyd County to offer assistance in filing for Social Security retirement benefits for an \$18 fee, Kelly said.

That service is provided free by the local Social Security office, said Kelly. He added that use of the private company's service could "actually delay the processing of a claim" since applications are not officially filed until received by his office.

"The representatives in any Social

Security office will provide free all of the service you need to file your claim for benefits, including giving you the proper application form, helping you complete the form and telling you what documents you need and how to obtain them," Kelly said.

The director said that persons with questions about Social Security office services can call 886-8525.



Our Floyd County Parks: Virtual Beehives Of Activity

Back in the 1950s, Floyd County did not have the luxury of recreation parks as it does now.

Oh, there was Dewey Lake, but no Jenny Wiley. If one went swimming, it was in the lake, whether it was muddy or not. There was the old Beaver Valley golf course at what now is known as Allen Park. There were no swings, slides, etc. Most

people who wanted a place for a family outing went to the Breaks of the Mountains State Park.

All of that has changed. I have been to all of our parks throughout the county covering golf matches, or baseball games, and we have a lot to be proud of. Civic-minded city, county and state government officials have worked together to create a park system that can handle any recreational need.

For instance, the Allen Park has

become a showplace in park development. Once, all that was there was the old Beaver Elkhorn golf course. Today, visitors can enjoy the tennis and basketball courts, or swim in the pool on those hot summer days. Little League and high school baseball fields are used frequently. A park pavilion is available for concerts and other rallies. In the past two months, the newly-renovated Beaver Valley golf course has been opened.

Terry Sizemore has memories of the old course when all that was there was a golf course. "I loved the old course," Sizemore says. "We would go down to the old golf course around 9 a.m. on Saturday mornings and stay until dark. I learned how to walk across a swinging bridge there. Just keep your eye on an object across the bridge as you walk and you will not notice the swinging," I was told.

"There would be around 25 to 30 people there on a Saturday morning.

We would put our names in a hat and draw for teams and have a little jackpot we would play for. Just to have your name put into the hat to be drawn was a privilege. I have not played at the new course yet, but I intend to," Sizemore relates.

Jenny Wiley State Park, one of the most scenic parks in Kentucky, has a variety of things to offer the outdoorsman. Fishing, whether it be for bass, trout, catfish or crappie — Jenny Wiley is the place to be. Boating and water skiing are very popular with water enthusiasts. Hiking trails are open to those who want to get out and feel close to nature. For those who want to just laze around and see the view of the shoreline, paddleboats come in handy. Campsites and a picnic area with shelters have hosted many family reunions. A beautiful nine hole golf course welcomes the golfing fanatics. A spacious swimming pool is a great cooling off spot.

According to Park Ranger Randy Grubbs, overall state park usage has been down a bit, but the number of downstream (spillway) visitors has been up. "Last May we had 21,000 cars come in to the park, and this year in May, we had 24,000. It will fluctuate according to the weather. The Corps of Engineers part is up but the state's part is down."

Archer Park, a development by city officials of Prestonsburg, can boast of the county's only skating rink. The rink is open to the public and is also available for private parties. Tennis courts are available, as well as a large swimming pool. Little League, softball and Senior League baseball fields are in use daily. An indoor basketball court located above the senior citizens building offers the opportunity for indoor basketball in the winter time.


According to Park Director Ralph Little, the weather has played havoc

with the park schedule.

"Our schedule is in a mess right now," Little says. "On days we have been able to operate, our crowds have been bigger than last year. But overall the use of the park is down, only because of the weather. We'll get back to playing ball after the weather breaks."

Minnie Park, a smaller park than the previously mentioned two, offers quite a lot for its size. Basketball and tennis courts are available. Little League and softball opportunities are there also. The Minnie Park is used extensively by both children and adults.

Many opportunities of recreation, fun, or just a place to relax are available at one of the parks in the county. They offer a good place for a family outing or family reunions. Take advantage of them and visit, even if it's just to take the baby for a stroll, or walk old Blue.



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A Necessary Modernization Brought About At PCC Library

Some people may remember the way it used to be: a noisy social-like atmosphere, dead end rows of books, not enough seating, nowhere to study, hard chairs, librarians and staff standing on top of each other, and a slow checkout process.

The change the new Prestonsburg Community College Library offers is a welcome one. The library, housed in the new Magoffin Learning Resource Center, contains many new facilities and about 50 percent more space for the use of students and faculty alike.

A welcome change, currently being installed, is automation of many of the library's processes. To the average user this will mean a much faster checkout process and access to material on file at the University of Kentucky. To the library staff it offers assistance in inventory, makes cataloging easier and provides a system-wide base of information.

The librarians and staff have been receiving training on the computer system, and they will install bar codes on all the books. The bar code is similar to that on food items at a grocery store, each book and each user card (community users can get cards) will have one. All that will have to be done at checkout time is the scanning process, making checking out material considerably quicker.

Sandra Robertson, head librarian, said she expected the system to be operational sometime during the fall semester. The system will enhance the inter-library loan process since all materials available in the UK college system will be cataloged on it, she said.

Assistant Librarian Trisha Morris said, "This is a very sophisticated system that goes from one end of the state to the other. UK has 2 million books and each of the 14 community colleges has somewhere in the range of 20-30,000. Library users will be able to access all of this material."

"This system will be like a computerized card catalog and will make 3x5 cards obsolete," she said. The PCC library will have four terminals available for public use and room to expand to six. "We will slowly phase out the manual card catalog," Morris said. "But I recommend that people not be computer-phobic because someday the old system will be gone altogether, and there will be no option."

Another addition is the a security system. "The purpose of the security system is to preserve the collection for the greatest number of persons," Robertson said. "The library's budget for purchases of new materials does not permit us to buy everything we

need to cover our subjects. Therefore, this system will keep the books available by preventing people from accidentally walking out the door with one or trying to steal a book."

She said that during the last inventory two years ago, \$15,000 worth of books were missing. This is the reason for the high-tech looking mechanism at the entrance to the library. It also counts people as they enter and leave.

The security system sensor emits an alarm, audible throughout the library, whenever a book that has not been checked out crosses through it. The alarm is not so loud as to be disruptive of those trying to study, but it is loud enough to be heard by the library staff.

During the check out process the books are desensitized and will not activate the alarm. Before the security system could be operational, all of the materials in the library had to be marked individually. The process is a covert operation, according to the

librarians, so they would not release any further details.

Besides the addition of the computers, other changes in the new library are noticeable. There is about 50 percent more room, including several special rooms: the Microform Room, Special Collections Room, Audio/Visual Room, Computer/Typing Room and the Technical Processing Room.

The Microform Room contains five machines called readers and two reader/printers. These machines help the user read microfilm and microfiche and print copies of the library's collection of newspapers, including the Floyd County Times back to 1930 and the New York Times back to 1851.

The Special Collections Room contains material such as genealogy works, church histories, census information, Foxfire books, works by Kentucky historians, guides to other

collections and more. This room can be used for historical research, as well as to help trace a family tree. The guides to other collections help the user to do research locally and then travel to UK or other libraries to get the actual material needed.

In the Computer/Typing Room, three Cannon AP110 typewriters and several computer terminals and printers for student and faculty use are available. Instructors can give out assignments on computer discs and the students are can complete them on campus, or users can bring their own software for the computers.

Audio visual equipment, such as VCRs and televisions, slide projectors, tape players and video cameras, is stored in the Audio/Visual Room. This equipment is for faculty use, but some units are set up in individual cubicles for previewing materials that are available at the library.

The Technical Processing Room is where all the behind-the-scenes work gets done before the books can go on the shelves also added were three librarian's offices, a workroom and a larger circulation desk.

The magazine section was expanded and new, more comfortable seating was added. The library subscribes to about 175 magazines, from the Ladies Home Journal to the Bioscience Journal. This reading material can be enjoyed more comfortably now due to the new couches and arm chairs which were hand picked by the librarians.

Robertson and Morris were responsible for decorating the library and they tried to chose colors and fabrics that are comfortable and pleasing to the eye. Robertson was also responsible for the library's design to best utilize space, provide a good

traffic pattern and provide for expansion.

"Another added benefit is the specially-designed, reflective lighting," said Morris. "It reflects off the ceiling and does not give off a glare which makes reading much easier on the eyes."

Robertson, PCC's librarian for 15 years, is pleased with the changes she and her staff are seeing and working hard to obtain. "This has been a nine year effort and what we are doing now is the culmination of it," she

said. Also located in the building is an art gallery featuring works by area artists, a computer laboratory, developmental studies laboratories, classrooms and faculty offices. It was named after one of the five counties which PCC serves. Other buildings on campus are the Johnson Administration Building, Pike Technology Building and the Martin Student Center. The construction for the Knott County Science building is scheduled to begin this fall.

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

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

Parents' Rights

The Sausage Principle — People who love sausage and respect the law should never watch either one being made.

We as private citizens and taxpayers have an "ace in the hole" (in addition to coal) here in Kentucky. The "ace" is the office of the Attorney General.

We can call or write that office and will be able to get answers to questions concerning laws we don't understand or need to have clarified.

The following information about the Attorney General's office has been taken directly from a handbook on Kentucky Education prepared by the Southern Appalachian Leadership Training staff.

"The office of the Attorney General has the authority to render opin-

ions on legal questions concerning statutory and regulatory provisions. Opinions of the Attorney General (OAG) may be rendered when requested by state and local school officials AND ALSO PRIVATE CITIZENS in those instances when the office decides that a legal question has significant application or is sufficiently wide-reaching. (An OAG opinion was instrumental in the lowering of charges per copy on information requested from the Floyd County Board of Education. The cost had been 20 cents per copy and was lowered to 3 cents per copy after the opinion was requested and received.) Although opinions may or may not have the force of law (this is a legal question in its self) which might otherwise necessitate the bringing of a test suit.

"The AG also has prosecutor authority in cases involving the unlawful or improper expenditure of STATE TREASURY MONIES, which include Department of Education funds. (The authority for prosecuting those charged with misuse of local monies is with the local prosecuting attorney.) In addition, the AG when, and only when, requested by any one of four state offices, the Governor, State Superintendent of Public Instruction,

State Board of Education or the State Auditor, has the authority to institute action to recover funds in cases involving the unlawful or improper expenditure of local school monies.

"The office has sole authority to insulate ouster proceedings in circuit court against local board members accused of violations of law in regard to the office they hold."

I, as a PRIVATE CITIZEN, and an education advocate have called or written the office of the Attorney General many times over the years and their help has been invaluable. I not only dealt with the AG as a member of the Floyd County Citizens Education Council, but as a concerned voter when I needed more information on regulations that affected a candidate for office.

The AG's office is a very valuable resource to the citizens of this state. We are very fortunate to have this office at our disposal when we have questions dealing with matters that directly effect our lives.


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
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
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
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
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Thompson Wins Bausch & Lomb Science Award





Summertime is a time for being outdoors and using the grill. Many people don't realize the many different meals that can be cooked on the grill and what a great advantage it can be when entertaining.

Why heat up the house with the stove when outdoor cooking is so much more fun and easy and when there is less mess to clean up?

As a twist from the usual hamburgers and hot dogs, why not try shish kebab? When entertaining, thread a couple of skewers before guests arrive and place the rest of the ingredients — cubed vegetables, chunks of chicken breast and lamb, unshelled jumbo shrimp and sea scallops — into bowls arranged near the grill. Friends and family can then prepare skewers according to their own taste.

To round out the meal, offer steamed fresh corn, a large salad, zesty barbecue sauce (see recipe) and crusty bread.

Be sure to brush the grill with oil before cooking so food doesn't stick. Try adding some Royal Oak mesquite briquettes to charcoal to give food extra zing. Delicate cherry tomatoes and mushrooms should be added to skewers when the meat is almost cooked through.

Here are some helpful recipes to make any barbecue a success.

HOT SAUCE FOR BEEF

3 medium tomatoes, peeled and seeded
1 medium onion, quartered
1 medium celery stalk, cut in 1-inch pieces
4 medium cloves garlic, peeled
2 chili peppers, seeded
1-inch piece of ginger root
1/2 cup dry white wine

In food processor or blender, puree all the ingredients with 1/2 cup salad oil and 1/2 tsp salt. Transfer mixture to medium saucepan; simmer covered, 20 minutes. Strain through fine sieve, and serve.

CRUNCHY GRILLED BANANAS

Juice of 1 lime
1/4 cup shredded coconut
1/2 cup chopped macadamia nuts
4 large bananas, cut in 2-inch pieces
1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
Place lime juice in pie plate. In another pie plate, combine coconut and nuts. Toss banana pieces in lime juice. Brush each piece with butter; roll in coconut mixture. Thread banana pieces onto skewers.
Cook 4 inches from heat, on coolest part of grill, turning several times, until coconut is golden — about 10 minutes.

Serve with ice cream or sherbert. Makes 4 servings.

The next four recipes will make a wonderful meal and can be prepared in 30 minutes. First, prepare chicken and set it aside. Saute vegetable for rice, and make the salad dressing. While rice and chicken cook, assemble tarts. Then, cut lettuce; pour the dressing over the lettuce and serve.

CHICKEN YAKITORI

1 1/2 boneless chicken breasts, skinned and cut in 1-inch cubes
1 medium red pepper, cut in 1-inch squares
1 medium green pepper, cut in 1-inch squares
1 jar (15 oz.) baby corn, drained
1/3 cup teriyaki sauce
1/3 cup honey
1 medium clove garlic, crushed
1 1/4 tsp. ground ginger

Prepare barbecue grill. Arrange chicken and vegetables on eight long wooden or metal skewers. In small bowl, combine teriyaki sauce, honey, garlic and ginger. Brush on meat, vegetables.

Grill skewered chicken, 6 inches from heat, basting and turning occasionally, 12 to 15 minutes, or until meat is tender.
Makes 4 servings (2 skewers each)

SWEET-AND-SOUR RICE

1 pkg (4.6 oz) long-grain rice

with Oriental seasoning
4 green onions, cut in 1-inch pieces
1 can (8 oz) sliced water chestnuts, drained

In medium skillet, heat 1 Tbsp salad oil. Saute rice, green onions and water chestnuts 3 minutes. Add 1-1/3 cups water and the seasoning packet from package; bring to boiling. Simmer covered, 10 minutes, or until rice is tender.

Makes four servings.

ORIENTAL SALAD

1 medium head of iceberg lettuce
1/2 cup bottled Oriental-style dressing
2 Tbsp soy sauce
1/4 tsp ground ginger
Cut lettuce into four wedges. In small bowl, combine dressing, soy sauce and ginger. Pour dressing over lettuce.
Makes four servings.

LEMON TARTS

8 (3-inch) soft oatmeal cookies
Confectioners' sugar
1/2 cup canned lemon pie filling
Using a 1-inch rounded cookie cutter, remove and discard a 1-inch-diameter round from center of 4 cookies; sprinkle top of cookies with confectioners' sugar. Spread 2 Tbps lemon filling on each of the remaining cookies; top with cut cookie, sugared side up.
Another quick 30-minute dinner

using the grill can be made by preparing the dessert first and placing it in freezer. Prepare corn, and while it cooks, shape steak ovals. Grill steaks with corn during last 10 minutes of cooking time. Then serve with crisp rolls and assorted cookies.

STUFFED SALISBURY STEAK

3 lb. ground beef
1 pkg (2.5 oz) onion-and-mushroom soup-and-recipe mix (2 env)
1 roasted large red pepper, cut in six strips
3 oz. provolone cheese, cut in 3x1/2x1/4 inch strips
6 strips boiled ham (3 oz.)
3x1 1/2x1/4 inches

Prepare grill. In large bowl, gently mix beef with soup mix. Divide mixture into four large ovals. With thumb, make an indentation in one side of oval; fill each with a strip of pepper, cheese and ham. Press meat around filling to seal, and reshape ovals, if necessary.

Broil, 6 inches from heat, 5 minutes. Turn; grill 5 minutes longer for medium-rare.

HERBED CORN ON THE COB

6 ears corn on the cob, husked and washed
1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine, melted
2 Tbsp prepared horseradish
2 Tbsp minced fresh dill or 2 tsp dried dillweed

Prepare grill. Place each ear of corn on a large sheet of heavy-duty aluminum foil. In small glass measure combine butter, horseradish, dill, 1/2 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper. Brush on corn, dividing among ears. Wrap foil around ears, twisting foil at ends to keep in drippings.

Broil corn 6 inches from heat, turning occasionally, 15 to 20 minutes; or until corn is tender.
Makes six servings.

APRICOT-FLAVORED

1 pkg (3 oz) apricot-cream gelatin
1 pint vanilla ice cream, softened slightly
1 tsp vanilla extract
2 small apricots, pitted and sliced

In medium bowl, completely dissolve gelatin in 3/4 cup boiling water. Combine 1/2 cup cold water with ice cubes to make 1-1/4 cups ice and water. Add to gelatin, stirring until consistency of unbeaten egg whites. If necessary, remove any unmelted ice.

With whisk, blend ice cream and vanilla into gelatin until smooth — about 30 seconds. Spoon mixture into six dessert glasses, dividing evenly; place in freezer 20 minutes, or until set. Remove from freezer, and refrigerate until serving time. Garnish with apricot slices.
Makes six servings.





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
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Books And Things

Shaking The Ancestral Tree

by Trisha Morris

Shaking the ancestral tree has become a fascinating hobby for many. The Special Collections Room at Prestonsburg Community College's Library has drawn together numerous titles to help in one's search, guide one to other collections and tell one how to do it. The following are only a sample of what can be found in this special room.

The Source, edited by Arlene Eakle. This guide to American genealogy fills a need that has long been recognized by the genealogical society. This one volume identifies, locates and interprets all of the basic manuscript, microfilm and published record groups currently available for genealogical research between the beginnings of European colonization in America and 1910.

Much of the information presented is available here for the first time: Carny's analysis of prison records; Thorndale's state-by-state description of documents; and Azucs's exhaustive list of finding aids for American newspapers, plus many, many others.

This book was designed to be used by novices and professionals. Each record group is examined by source, record type, scope and quality, and

special problem in use. It attempts to be a comprehensive reference work and also a guide to the research process.

This is a good book to read before beginning any genealogical search.

Guide to the Draper Manuscripts, by Josephine Harper. The Draper Collection of Manuscripts is a vast collection of letters, documents, personal interviews, clippings and information pertaining to the early settlement of the American frontier. It contains a wealth of genealogical and historical data on pioneer America and could be useful for anyone searching frontier settlers in the Northwest Territory, Kentucky, Tennessee, Virginia, West Virginia and Western Pennsylvania.

The collection consists of 123 reels of microfilm and is available at the University of Kentucky Library. This book is an easy-to-use guide to the valuable collection and would allow research to be done locally so that time accessing the collection at UK can be spent reading instead of searching.

Kentucky Family Roots, edited by Jack Oldham. The book tells us that "the basic principal of roots research is to begin with what you know and work toward the unknown." Using the premise that we know ourselves best, it has included a chart which will provide a blueprint of a family, starting with the researcher.

Divided into two sections, with a county-by-county history of the state and biographies of families from all sections of Kentucky, it is a reference source that could prove invaluable in genealogical research. The book was compiled from material submitted by

family representatives, and often mailing addresses are included for those who desire more information about a family. Of special interest is the large collection of individual and family photos.

The Library: A Guide to the LDS Family History Library, edited by John Cerny and Wendy Elliott. This remarkable book is crammed with valuable information. Its 763 pages are a careful summary of the vast amount of resource material held by the Family History Library in Salt Lake City. Whether you research in your local LDS Branch Library or are planning a trip to Salt Lake City to the main library, this book will be an invaluable source for a first step in one's research.

The Library describes, in great detail, the largest single collection of genealogical information and sources in the world. Included here are chronological histories of state and foreign countries, explanations of settlement and migration patterns, concise description of record groups and what they contain, tips for accessing the collection and saving valuable research time, extensive bibliographies, what can and cannot be accessed at the Branch Family History Center Libraries, information available by correspondence, and facilities and services offered by the library.

Register of Vietnam War Casualties From Kentucky. On November 17, 1988, the Kentucky Vietnam Veterans Memorial was dedicated at Frankfort to honor the many Kentuckians who died or disappeared in the Vietnam War. This book is a listing of the more than 1000 Kentuckians

who were honored by the memorial. For ease of use, the list is arranged alphabetically by surnames and again by county of residence. It lists name, rank and birth and death dates.

Early Kentucky Householdors, by James Sutherland. This is a list of 34,000 names appearing in the Lincoln County Annual Tax List, 1784 to 1816. Forty-six of the 54 Kentucky counties are mentioned here so this is essentially a statewide tax list. The taxpayers are listed in alphabetical order along with the date of the tax list and an enumeration of all the other persons living in the household. The compiler has helpfully included a "Surname Directory" which groups the phonetic variations of each name under a common spelling.

Early Kentucky Landholders, by James Sutherland. This is a list of 17,000 landholders whose names appeared in the annual tax list for Lincoln County, 1787-1811, and was compiled as a companion volume to Sutherland's other work. Here landholders are those who claimed land, but did not necessarily occupy it. Taxpayers are listed in alphabetical order with the amount of acreage, the nearest watercourse and the prior owner noted.

Along with Sutherland's usual "Surname Directory" is a "Prior Assignee Directory" which links the names of previous landowners with present landowners.

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
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Poet's Corner

The Federal Emergency Management Agency gives notice of the proposed determinations of modified base (100-year) flood elevations, in accordance with Section 110 of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973 (Pub. L. 93-234), 87 Stat. 980, which added Section 1363 to the National Flood Insurance Act of 1968 (Title XIII of the Housing and Urban Development Act of 1968 (Pub. L. 90-448), 42 U.S.C. 4001-4128, and 44 CFR 65.4(a).

These elevations, together with the floodplain management measures required by Section 60.3 of the program regulations, are the minimum that are required. They should not be construed to mean the community must change any existing ordinances that are more stringent in their floodplain management requirements. The community may at any time enact stricter requirements on its own, or pursuant to policies established by other Federal, State, or regional entities. These proposed elevations will also be used to calculate the appropriate flood insurance premium rates for new buildings and their contents and for the second layer of insurance on existing buildings and their contents.

Pursuant to the provisions of 5 USC 605(b), the Administrator, to whom authority has been delegated by the Director, Federal Emergency Management Agency, hereby certifies that the proposed flood elevation determinations, if promulgated, will not have a significant economic impact on a substantial number of small entities. A flood elevation determination under section 1363 forms the basis for new local ordinances, which, if adopted by a local community, will govern future construction within the floodplain area. The elevation determinations, however, impose no restriction unless and until the local community voluntarily adopts floodplain ordinances in accord with these elevations. Even if ordinances are adopted in compliance with Federal standards, the elevations prescribe how high to build in the floodplain and do not prohibit development. Thus, this action only forms the basis for future local actions. It imposes no new requirement; of itself it has no economic impact. Proposed base flood elevations along flood sources studied in detail are shown on the Preliminary Revised FIRM. Lessees and owners of real property in the Unincorporated Areas of Floyd County, Kentucky are encouraged to review these maps and related materials at the address cited above. 'Hee Haw' one of few variety shows still on

Humor, music make show a success

Hee Haw is one of the few variety shows that has survived the '80s, and chances are good that it will go well into the '90s.

For 21 years viewers have been tuning in to watch the down-home, typically American humor of the show, despite its cancellation by the network on which it debuted.

The program was cancelled by CBS after two successful seasons because the network believed the appeal of *Hee Haw* was too rural. It then went into national syndication, and became an instant success, with more than 150 stations—many of them CBS affiliates—carrying the series. Today more than 200 stations air the one-hour program.

Funny sketches and top-flight country music stars have made *Hee Haw* the No. 1 country music program on television today.

The show is hosted by Roy Clark, who has been with *Hee Haw* since its premiere in 1969. Clark has been called "a one-man variety show" because of his flair for comedy, his incredible musical range and his fancy guitar work.

Another *Hee Haw* original is Louis M. (Grandpa) Jones, a country singer and banjoist who adopted his "Grandpa" image while he was still in his twenties. Last October he was honored on the anniversary of his 60th year as a country entertainer.

George Lindsey is another *Hee Haw* notable. For seven years Lindsey pumped gas in Mayberry as Goober in *The Andy Griffith Show* and *Mayberry R.F.D.* before becoming a regular on *Hee Haw* in 1972. Lindsey said the variety show offers him the opportunity to try a bit of everything.

"I enjoy the comedy, sing a number now and then, and

work in some of the skits," he said. "I also write some of my numbers and spots for others on the show. And last but certainly not least, I'm the only fella on the show who wears a tie."

At the other extreme is Minnie Pearl, whose dowdy attire and straw hat have been part of her country comedy routine for more than 38 years. "I have very little talent," the Grand Ole Opry veteran said. "But when I come on stage with my old straw hat and worn-out shoes, people don't think of me as show business, but as a friend."

Misty Rowe and Marianne Gordon Rogers joined the show the same year that Lindsey did. Rowe said she was hired for *Hee Haw* because of her voice, not her appearance.

"I was reading for the producer with this little girl voice of mine and he sat up in his chair and said, 'Gosh, what a funny voice. Can you keep it up?' I said yes and I had a job on *Hee Haw*."

Clark credits the show's success to the camaraderie between the regulars. "We're a happy bunch and I think it shows on the TV screen."

TV Q&A

Even TV's golden age produced some turkeys

Q: The home videocassette TV Turkeys features episodes from some of the worst series ever made. Among the series spotlighted were The Hank McCune Show, The Buckskin Kid, Penny to a Million and The Arnold Stang Show. Could you tell me if any of these shows actually aired, and how long were they on? —Andrew Jones, Gladstone, Mich.

A: Yes, even during the "Golden Age of Television" there were some real turkeys. The Hank McCune Show aired from Sept. 9, 1959 to Dec. 2, 1959 on NBC. Hank McCune was the star of this slapstick comedy show whose only claim to fame remains that it is the first show to ever use a laugh track. The Buckskin Kid show that you mention is not listed as such. There is a Buckskin listed that aired from July 3, 1958 to Sept. 14, 1959. The half-hour western starred Tommy Nolan as young Jody O'Connell. It was introduced as a summer replacement for The Tennessee Ernie Ford Show on NBC. Penny to a Million aired on ABC from May 4, 1955 to Oct. 5, 1955, with emcee Bill Goodwin. The first question was worth one cent, each subsequent question doubled in value until a contestant could win as much as a million pennies (\$10,000), considered "big money" in those days. The Arnold Stang Show is not listed in any of my reference books. Stang brought his trademarks — formidable spectacles and inimitable nasal brashness—to many of the popular TV shows: Duffy's Tavern, Easy Aces, Milton Berle Show, Perry Como Show, Ed Sullivan and Bob Hope Show. He was the voice of several cartoons and appeared in many feature films.

Q: I would like to know if merchandise such as jackets and posters of TV shows can be purchased from their networks. If so, where should I write? If not, where do you suggest they might be found? —Tammy Weddington, Bridgeton, N.J.

A: On your next trip to New York City visit the NBC Store located at 30 Rockefeller Plaza. They carry a full line of souvenirs bearing their logo and sweat shirts, T-shirts, hats, etc. from all the shows on their network. I don't know of any other network that has a company store.

Q: Could you please give me some information about the shows of Ma and Pa Kettle? Have they been put on videos yet? —E. Hopping, Olathe, Colo.

A: That rustic but devoted couple, Marjorie Main and Percy Kilbride, evolved from characters in The Egg and I. They filmed a series of their popular films for Universal during the years 1949 to 1957. Unfortunately they are not available on video as of this writing.
