Bus driver nabbed in drug raid

A man who works as a bus driver for a local Christian school was one of two people arrested during a drug raid conducted early Wednesday morning by the Martin Police Department.

Assistant Chief Fred Mynhier said Wednesday that Martin police descended on the home of Larry Greer and his live-in girlfriend, Diana L. Svacina, shortly before 4 a.m. Wednesday. Police had obtained a search warrant from District Judge Eric Hall.

Once inside, police found what Mynhier described as a "large quanity" of drugs, mostly prescription medications. Mynhier did not elaborate on the nature of the drugs, saying they are still being inventoried.

In addition to the drugs, Mynhier said police also con-

Harrassment suit to go to trial in February

A case originally filed against the Floyd County Board of Education in the Floyd Circuit Court and later transferred to the U.S. District Court in Pikeville has been scheduled to go to trial in February.

The case alleges that the Floyd County Board of Education is guilty of sexual discrimination against women, a violation of the 1st Amendment to the United States Constitution.

The plaintiff, Amy J. Stevens, a resident of Pike County, claims that the Floyd County Board of Education denied to grant her a teaching position within their school system in order to grant the position to another, less qualified, applicant who is a male.

Rates State's Congressional delegation to stay same

Eastern Kentucky will not see the return of the old 7th Congressional District, according to information released Thursday.

The first numbers from this year's census are in, with the U.S. Census Bureau releasing population figures on a statewide level Thursday.

According to the census, Kentucky's population now stands at 4,049,431, an increase of 9.8 percent from 1990. That figure ranks the state right in the middle — 25th — of states by size, down from 23rd in 1990.

Kentucky's population did not grow fast enough to warrant the addition of another representative in Congress, but the state will not lose one, as it did in 1990, either.

Four states — Arizona, Florida, Georgia and Texas — will gain two representatives each, while California, Colorado, Nevada and North Carolina will each gain one.

Stumbo files hot topic bills for 2001 session

With the state's first midterm legislative session fast approaching, one Floyd County legislator is leading the General Assembly in the number of bills he has prefiled.

House Majority Floor Leader Greg Stumbo has filed the highest number bills prior among both houses of the legislature prior to its 2001 session, which starts next week. However, unlike some legislators who came under criticism for filing an excessive number of frivolous bills during the legislature's last session earlier this year, Stumbo's lead comes after having filed only five bills.

None of the bills filed by Stumbo would be considered frivolous, either. Instead, most of the proposals, ranging in everything from taxes and litter to schools and religion, could be among the meatiest pieces of legislation considered during what many consider to be an rather uneventful session.

Two of Stumbo's proposals were filed during the month of November.

One would gradually eliminate the state's property tax on motor vehicles, while the other would place restrictions on the ability of former legislators to work as lobbyists.

Stumbo's motor vehicle tax proposal would completely eliminate the levy by 2004. In the meantime, state car tax rates would fall to 30 cents per \$100 of assessed value in 2002, and 15 cents in 2003.

The measure would not completely eliminate car taxes, however, only the state's portion of car tax bills. Local governments such as cities, counties and school systems would continue to levy their own taxes on motor vehicles.

The car tax repeal appears to have broad support among Democrats and Republicans in both houses, and it has been among the most visible proposals heading into the 2001 session. A similar measure has been proposed in the Senate by Sen. Bob Jackson.

Stumbo's lobbyist proposal would limit the salary such legislative agents can make to \$1,000 a year, plus expenses, for lobbying members

Earlier this month, Stumbo also filed a bill which will revisit an issue he devoted much of his time to in the last session, to no avail - a bottle bill.

Stumbo's earlier effort had proposed to place a 5 to 10 cent fee on beverage containers and to require mandatory garbage collection across the state, but died after running into stiff opposition from soft drink bottlers. However, the new proposal seeks to make an end run around such opposition by placing the issue before vot-

amendment would only allow such a referendum on the issue of the bottle bill, however, and would not give voters the power of ballot initiative.

The proposal also would not automatically place the issue on ballot. Instead, the bill would merely allow the General Assembly to later pass a law setting up a mechanism for such a referendum.

The amendment stipulates that a bottle bill could be placed on the ballot following the submission of a petition containing a number signatures equal to 5 percent of those voting in the preelection.

In all, therefore, the bill would require two votes on the issue - one on whether or not to allow the General Assembly to put the issue before voters, and another actually voting on the bottle bill itself. Under such a setup, the earliest a bottle bill could be passed would be 2003.

Should the bottle bill itself be defeated, it could not be brought up for another vote for two years.

Stumbo's two other legislative proposals both deal with education. One would reintroduce the Bible and Ten Commandments into schools and the other would raise the dropout age.

Under the religion in education proposal, schools would be able to offer elective courses in history, ethics, civi-

However, Stevens claims that South Floyd Middle School, whose she was later informed that the holder of the "music resource specialist" position could not work fulltime in the Floyd County school system. This information, claims Stevens, led her to withdraw her application for employment.

Following this action, claims the suit, a male was hired into the position and was additionally offered full-time employment.

This male, claims Stevens, did not possess a teaching degree, or a standard teaching certificate, and also had less teaching experience than did Stevens.

Stevens claims that he was grantbased on his sex.

The suit alleges that once the Floyd County Board of Education became aware of the fact that Stevens had filed an active cause of action against them, after being notified by the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission that she had a right to sue, that the Board then retaliated against her by the fabrication of forged documents.

One of these documents is allegedly signed by a "Zenith Hill". (a reference to the principal of

'Baseball has been good to me," Stengel told reporters, "and I felt it was time for me to give something back to the game."

Nice sentiment only totally unfitting given the treatment the expansion Mets would receive at the hands of the other National League clubs.

Each franchise had to make players from their respective rosters available to the Mets who could then select the personnel they wanted. The catch was that

the other eight NL teams made very sure no bona-fide major league performers peopled this list. From the very outset the Mets were doomed to the agonies of last place.

"It was so thoughtful of them," Stengel said concerning the team owners. "I'd like to thank all of them who wanted us to have these men and picked them out for us. It was generous of them."

The truth be known Stengel and company did inherit a ballplayer or two of note. One of them was Gil Hodges, late of the transplanted Brooklyn Dodgers, and another Richie Ashburn, a former standout centerfielder for the Philadelphia Phillies. But both men were old and well past their respective primes. The rest of the Mets acquisitions could lay claim to no such illustrious past.

Easily the most famous of this

breed was "Marvelous Marv" Throneberry, a much traveled first baseman who had a happy affinity for overruning and fail-

ing to touch bases, dropping throws, booting grounders and being caught out of position.

When questioned as to Throneberry's costly miscues Stengel could merely shake his head and sigh.

"The man makes bonehead

plays," he said. "But there ain't anything I can do about it. I can't change a man's life. Right now, I've got four or five guys who can make it up here. The rest of them, we've just got to get along with. I'm not gonna start breaking furniture over them and what they do wrong. Marv's the best of the worst and we're stuck with each other. ORDINANCE NO.: 15-2000

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY BY WHICH THE CITY MERGES THE POLICE AND FIRE DEPART-MENTS INTO ONE DEPARTMENT KNOWN AS THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY.

WHEREAS, the City of Prestonsburg established in prior ordinances separate police and fire departments which employ individuals having separate and distinct qualifications and training; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council after due deliberation having determined that the best interest of the City and its residents can be better served through the merger of the police and fire departments into one department whereby the police officers and fire fighters shall receive identical training which will then qualify them to serve the City in a dual capacity as both a police officer and fire fighter; and,

WHEREAS, the merger of the police and fire departments into one department with cross-training for the employees thereof which will provide the City with better combined police and fire protection; and,

WHEREAS, the merger of the police and fire departments into one Department of Public Safety will provide better trained and equipped officers with superior coordination and lines of supervision; and,

WHEREAS, the establishment of the Department of Public Safety will allow the City to coordinate and consolidate the city's personnel classification and compensation plans and provide for a more uniform method of compensating the city's police officers and fire fighters; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council, through passage of a resolution whereby the Council and the various committees created within the Council were directed to study the proposed merger of the police and fire departments and to report to the Mayor and Council at large their findings, and it having been reported to the Mayor and the Council at large that it is advantageous for the merger of the police and fire departments into one Department of Public Safety to occur, and the Council being otherwise fully and sufficiently advised;

NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF PRE-STONSBURG, KENTUCKY AS FOLLOWS:

Section I: ESTABLISHMENT

There is hereby established a Department of Public Safety in the City of Prestonsburg created through the merger of the police and fire departments into one unit

Section II: **OPERATING DIVISIONS**

(A) The Department of Public Safety shall consist of three (3) divisions. Those divisions are the Division of Police; the Division of Fire and, the Communications Division.

(B) Each division of the Public Safety Department shall have a chief administrative officer whose general duties shall include the day-to-day supervision of each division. The division of police shall operate under the immediate supervision of a police chief and assistant chief. The day-to-day operation of the division of fire shall be supervised by a fire chief and assistant chief. The day-to-day operation of the communications division shall be supervised by a dispatcher supervisor. Each division chief and supervisor shall report to and is supervised by the Director of Public Safety through the Assistant Director of Public Safety.

(C) All divisions of the Department of Public Safety shall meet all statutory requirements of the Commonwealth of Kentucky, the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council, and any other state and federal requirements as to training, qualifications, and certifications as may be applicable to cities of the fourth class.

Section []]: **ADMINISTRATION**

(A) The Department of Public Safety shall be under the direction and supervision of the office of the mayor who shall appoint a director of the Department of Public Safety, an Assistant Director of the Department of Public Safety, who shall be responsible for the over all direction and supervision of the three divisions of the Department of Public Safety.

(B) All administrative officers of the Department of Public Safety, Police Chief, Assistant Police Chief, Fire Chief, Assistant Fire Chief and Dispatcher Supervisor shall be appointed by the Mayor and may be removed by the Mayor at will except as tenure and terms of employment are protected by statute, ordinance, or contract. (C) No person shall be appointed or act as a member or employee, in any capac ity, of the Department of Public Safety unless such person has taken the oath required by section 228 of the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

(D) Qualifications, training, and compensation shall be as set forth in a personnel compensation plan for the Department of Public Safety. Training for those persons currently employed by the divisions of the Department of Public Safety shall be scheduled and commence as soon as practicable after the date that this ordinance is passed by the City Council and signed by the Mayor.

Section VI:

AUTHORITY TO CARRY CONCEALED DEADLY WEAPONS (A) All members of the Public Safety Department who carry deadly weapons on or about their persons in their regularly scheduled duties as Public Safety Officers for the City may carry concealed deadly weapons on or about their persons at all times within the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

(B) Deadly weapons that may be carried by members of the Public Safety Department within the Commonwealth of Kentucky are those weapons that are usually carried by such officers in performing their duties while on a regularly scheduled shift of duty for the City.

Section VII: CREATION, MEMBERSHIP QUALIFICATION

(A) There is created and established an Auxiliary Public Safety Department to be known as the Prestonsburg Auxiliary Public Safety Department, the membership of which shall consist of no more than 20 persons.

(B) The Prestonsburg Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall be made up of persons who would qualify to be members of the Public Safety Department of the city as regular full-time members of the Public Safety Department. Regular full-time members of the Public Safety Department shall not, however, be eligible for membership in the Prestonsburg Auxiliary Public Safety Department.

(C) Each member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall be in good physical condition, be able to read, write and understand the English language, be of good character and a person of sobriety and integrity and shall be an orderly, law abiding citizen. Each member shall be not less than 21 years of age and shall have a high school diploma or its equivalent.

Section VIII: APPOINTMENT AND SUSPENSION

(A) Appointments to the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall be initially made by the City Council. Any member may be suspended at any time by the Mayor on the recommendation of the Director of the Department of Public Safety.

(B) The member so suspended is entitled to a hearing to be conducted by the City Council of which hearing he shall be giving reasonable notice. The action taken by the City Council shall be final.

Section IX:

AUXILIARY PUBLIC SAFETY DEPARTMENT UNDER DIRECTION OF CHIEF OF POLICE; OATH OF OFFICE; BOND

(A) The Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall function under the immediate direction of the Chief of Police, or in his absence, the Assistant Chief of Police.

(B) Before entering upon his duties, each member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall take the subscribed oath of office or affirmation as provided by the statutes to be taken and subscribed by all municipal officers. After subscribing his oath of ofFice, each member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall be issued an official commission card signed by the Mayor and the Chief of Police. The card shall be retained in the personal possession of the member at all times.

(C) Each member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall promptly after being appointed, furnish bond in the same amount as is furnished by members of the regular Public Safety Department, the City to pay the premiums on the bond. Each member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall also prior to taking his oath of office, execute and deliver to the City Clerk/Tax Collector an instrument in form to be approved by the City Attorney releasing the city from all liability for any injury or death of such member in the line of duty as a member of the unit, excepting only such liabilities, if any, as shall be attributed to gross negligence on the part of the city.

Section X: POWERS AND DUTIES

Except during a period or probation, members of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall have all of the powers and authorities and shall be subject to all the duties as members of the regular Public Safety Department of the City, except that the powers of arrest shall be limited to those times when performing police functions, and only when authorized by the Chief of Police or his designated representatives. Even in circumstances where the power of arrest has been authorized, this power shall be subject to all rules and regulations of the Public Safety Department and all statutes and ordinances applicable thereto. It is specifically provided, however, that the membership in the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall not be construed in any manner as membership in the regularly constituted Police Force, Public Safety Department, nor shall any member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department be entitled to any rights or privileges of pension or any other similar rights, privileges or emolument attaching to membership in the regularly constituted Public Safety Department.

Section XI: PROBATIONARY TERM; TRAINING

(A) The initial appointees to the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall serve no probationary term. Each subsequent member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall serve on probation a minimum of six months and a maximum of 12 months following the date of his appointment. During the period of probation he shall have only such power, authority, and duties as are assigned to him, from time to time, and by the Director of Public Safety. Upon completion of six months, and at any time before expiration of 12 months of probation, the Director of Public Safety may transfer any such member from probationary to active status.

Section IV:

LAW ENFORCEMENT AND TRAINING FOUNDATION PROGRAM

(A) The city hereby declares its intention to participate in the State Law Enforcement Foundation Program established by KRS 15.410 through 15.520 and 5,990, as amended.

(B) Each officer of the Public Safety Department shall be paid by city funds an annual salary of at least \$4,350 based on a standard work year of 2,080 hours beginning no later than July 1, 1973.

(C) Each Public Safety Officer employed on or after July 1, 1973, shall have as a minimum educational attainment a high school degree or its equivalent as determined by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council. Each officer employed on or after July 1, 1972, shall, within one year of his date of employment, complete a basic training course at a school certified or recognized by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council. Such basic training shall be for a minimum duration of hours recommended and required by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council or statute enacted by the Kentucky General Assembly. In addition, each Public Safety Officer employed after July 1, 1973 shall be trained in response to fires and the extinguishment thereof as well as in the plans, preparation, procedures, practice and training regarding all types of residential and commercial fires and emergencies attendant thereto and as deemed necessary by the Director of Public Safety or Assistant Director of Public Safety or as required by law, regulation or advisories necessary to maintain or exceed the city's current fire protection ratings.

(D) Each Public Safety Officer, whether originally employed before or after July 1, 1972, shall successfully complete each year an in-service training course of 40 hours duration appropriate to his rank and responsibility at a school certified or recognized by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council, Each Public Safety Officer shall receive in each calendar year five days' time off with pay for the purpose of taking the required in-service training.

(E) No Public Safety Officer shall have his base salary reduced or be denied a normal salary increase to which he is otherwise entitled because of the salary incentive payments provided by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council under KRS 15.410 through 15.520.

(F) The Department of Public Safety and each officer thereof shall comply with all provisions of law applicable to local police, including the transmission of data to the Bureau of Criminal Information and Statistics as required by KRS 17.150.

(G) The Chief of Police shall prepare or cause to be prepared such quarterly and other reports as may reasonably be required by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council to facilitate administration of the Law Enforcement Foundation Fund and further the purposes of KRS 15.410 through 15.520.

(H) The Department of Public Safety and each officer thereof shall further comply with all reasonable rules and regulations appropriate to the size and location of a police department, issued by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council to facilitate the administration of the Law Enforcement Foundation Fund and further the purposes of KRS 15.410 through 15.520.

(I) The City Treasurer shall deposit in an appropriate account which can be identified separately from all other sources all monies received under KRS 15.410 through 15.520. Forthwith upon receipt of any monies under KRS 15.410 through 15.520, the City Treasurer shall pay to each public officer the full amount received on behalf of that officer, giving to each officer a check stub or receipt on which the gross amount of monies paid to him under KRS 15.410 through 15.520 is included and identified. All financial records relating to monies received under KRS 15.410 through 15.520 shall be retained for a period of three years and until the completion of an audit approved by the Kentucky Law Enforcement Council and the Federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration.

Section V: PUBLIC SAFETY

(A) There is created a Public Safety Review Board, whose function shall be to hold hearings regarding disciplinary action relating to a member or members of the Department of Public Safety. Such hearings may be requested by the Director of Public Safety, the Mayor, or by an individual Public Safety Officer in appeal of a disciplinary action.

(B) The Public Safety Review Board shall consist of the Mayor, the Director of Public Safety, and three members of the City Council who will serve in rotating alphabetical order. In the event a Council member is unable to attend a hearing, the next member will be designated.

(C) Any person requesting a hearing before the Public Safety Review Board will notify the Mayor who shall call the hearing.

(D) Any hearing conducted by this Board shall adhere to the standards of conduct to deal fairly and set administrative due process rights under the requirements of KRS 15.520.

(B) The Director of Public Safety or his design shall determine the program for training members of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department in police and fire fighting work. The Auxiliary Public Safety Department may adopt its own bylaws and rules or regulations and amendments thereto but same shall at all times be subject to approval by the City Council and shall not conflict with any provision of this subchapter, being subordinate of the Department of Public Safety and to the order of the Director of Public Safety.

Section XII: COMPENSATION

No member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall receive any compensation from the city for his services as a member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department, except as may be specifically provided from time to time by official action of the City Council.

Section XIII: UNIFORMS AND EQUIPMENT

The members of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall furnish their own uniforms and other necessary equipment, without reimbursement from the city, unless the provisions shall be specifically provided for in the budget ordinance of the city, or amendments thereto. Uniforms shall be worn only when performing the duties as members of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department.

Section XIV: RECORDS

A public record of the appointment of each member of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department and the termination of his appointment shall be kept in the records of the Assistant Director of the Department of Public Safety. The records shall consist of a copy of the written order of appointment, the original of the written oath, properly executed, the bond executed by the appointee, a clear and distinct photograph of the appointee furnished before his appointment, and any written order terninating the appointment or the appointee's resignation.

Section XV: FINANCIAL ACCOUNTS

The financial accounts of the Auxiliary Public Safety Department shall be subject to audit at any time the City Council may designate by the Finance Director of the city or any other accountant or auditor appointed for this purpose.

Section XVI: GOALS AND INTENTIONS OF CROSS-TRAINING

Through passage of this ordinance it is the expressed intent of the City Council that each person employed as a Public Safety Officer receive and maintain the degree and level of training in both police and fire protection as would permit the Public Safety Officers to engage in and function in a dual capacity as a police officer or fire fighter in accordance with all state or federal statutes, regulations, or other lawful requirements imposed upon the police or fire departments of a city of the fourth class.

Section XVII: REPEAL OF ALL PREVIOUS ORDINANCES INCONSISTENT

HEREWITH

Upon the passage of this ordinance by the Prestonsburg City Council and execution hereof by the Mayor, the following ordinances are repealed and deleted in their entirety

Ord. 1 - 73; Ord. 320.2; Ord. 320.1; Ord. 3-75; Am. Ord. 7-82; Ord. 16-86; Ord. 3-75; 3-84; Am. Ord. 13-86; Am. Ord. 7-94; and Ord. 7-86 and as codified and contained in sections 35.01 through and including each subsection thereof in the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky Code of Ordinances.

Further, each Executive Order referred to in section 35 and each subsection thereof as contained in the City of Prestonsburg Code of Ordinances to the extent that same are inconsistent with the provisions of Ordinance 15-2000 hereinabove stated are hereby rescinded.

So ordained, and adopted, by the City Council of Prestonsburg this 23rd day of December, 2000.

'All the King's Men' kicks off third season of bookclub@ket

When Robert Penn Warren's "All the King's Men" was first published in August 1946, The New York Times called it "magnificently vital reading," "a book to read until 3 o'clock in the morning."

The Kentucky writer's fictionalized account of the rise and fall of Huey Long proved to be both a critical and popular success. It won the 1946 Pulitzer Prize and was later made into a film starring Broderick Crawford as Willie Stark, the charismatic governor of an unnamed southern state.

Included in the Modern Library's list of the 100 best novels of the 20th century, Warren's intense study of power and its farreaching effects is the January 2001 bookclub@ket selection.

Bill Goodman and his guests discuss "All

the King's Men" Tuesday, January 2 at 8:30 p.m. on KET2, with repeats Tuesday, January 9 at 11:30 p.m. and Saturday, January 13 at 12:30 p.m. on KET.

At the heart of "All the King's Men" is narrator Jack Burden, an ex-newspaperman inexplicably drawn to Gov. Stark. Under Burden's cynical gaze, Stark evolves from a gullible country lawyer to a power-hungry demagogue who will stop at nothing to achieve his ends. Through his association with Stark, Burden himself is entangled in a web of deceit and blackmail, willing to betray his own ethical standards in the service of expediency and power.

After the publication of "All the King's Men," Warren went on to win two more Pulitzer Prizes — both for poetry — and to become the nation's first poet laureate. At the end of his long life — he died in 1989 at the age of 84 — this native of Guthrie in western Kentucky was universally recognized as one of the nation's most distinguished writers and scholars.

News Of The Weird

In November, U.S. marshals in Detroit confiscated the belongings of Marie Antoinette Jackson-Randolph, a former highsociety, day-care chain owner, who is now in prison for scamming the government out of \$13.5 million in meal money for underprivileged children she allegedly fed at her centers. Among her "estate": 100 pieces of Baccarat, Waterford and Lalique crystal, 911 purses, 606 pairs of shoes, 165 pairs of boots, a roomful (floor to ceiling) of costume jewelry, and various fur and skin garments (leopard, coyote, mink, fox, sable, chinchilla, snake, lynx, rabbit, lamb, beaver, weasel and raccoon, in a variety of colors). (Said the owner of the company hired to sell the furs: "I don't know whether she hated animals or loved them. It's hard to tell.")

According to a December Wall Street Journal report, Commodity Futures Trading Commission judge Bruce Levine has heard nearly 180 cases of alleged broker fraud against investors (who bet on future prices of beef, soybeans, foreign currencies, etc.) in his eight years on the job, yet has ruled against the investor every single time that he was called on to render a decision. (Some cases were settled privately, but even then, according to some parties, Judge Levine often pressured the investor to accept a tiny percentage of his original claim.) The other CFTC judge decides for investors about half the time.

Recent Research

From Susan Smith, a professor of health and safety sciences, University of Tennessee (July): People who use sign language have up to five times greater risk of hand and wrist injuries than people who don't use sign language. From zoologists at the University of Kerala (India), writing in Current Science (July): After eight impotent gerbils had alcohol injected into their eyes to blind them, five of them began to copulate (possibly due to the release of melatonin).

The Continuing Crisis

An October New York Times dispatch from India highlighted the growing problem of intra-family frauds in which one member will claim a living relative's land or wealth by swearing to the government that the relative is dead. An advocacy group, the Association of Dead People, helps aggrieved citizens figure out just how to prove that they are indeed alive, which can be a difficult concept for India's bargelike bureaucracies to accept. The association's founder said he remained officially dead even after he ran for office, filed lawsuits and got arrested just to get his name on public records.

California environmental activist Dona Nieto ("La Tigresa") appeared topless at several logging sites in Humboldt and Mendocino counties in October in a demonstration ("Striptease for the Trees," featuring "nudist guerrilla poetry") to save giant redwood trees; loggers' reactions ranged from embarrassment to a defensive recital of Bible verses. And in October, when three neighborhood planning officials in the village of Barlestone, England, arrived at the house of Brian Statham to supervise the councilordered clearing of his yard, Statham jumped in his forklift and systematically picked up the three men's cars and set them down on their sides.

In October, an appeals court in San Francisco became the first to test whether a relationship amounted to "dating" under California's new domestic-violence legislation that permits victims to collect judgments even if they aren't a cohabiting couple. The rejector, Joyce Oriola (who said she was stalked by Adam Thaler after she refused to go out with him), had to claim the couple were actually dating in order to qualify her for money damages. Thaler, the heartsick

rejectee, logically had to claim that the two were just friends. (The court ruled they were not dating.)

After 100 employees took ill (dizziness and nausea) at the National Pen Corp. offices in Rancho Bernardo, Calif., in September (with 24 being sent to the hospital), hazardouswhite-suited materials crews went over the building from top to bottom, looking for gas and chemical leaks, among other possibilities. The official cause, determined the next day by the San Diego Fire Department, was an excess of urinal cakes in a thirdfloor men's room.

In October, the prosecutor in a rape case in Lewis County, Wash., said he was thinking of subpoenaing Ramtha, a 35,000-year-old warrior spirit (via his Earthly channeler, spiritualist J.Z. Knight), who reportedly "heard" the defendants confess to the crime during a session at Knight's retreat in Yelm, Wash. However, Knight then told reporters that she had been "in a trance" during the session and therefore could not recall what the defendants and Ramtha had talked about.

In October, David B.

Smith, the lawyer who formerly represented North Carolina death-row inmate Russell Tucker, admitted that he had sabotaged an earlier appeal because he had come to believe Tucker was guilty and deserved to die. (Tucker's execution date has been postponed, anyway, on other grounds.)

People With Really Bad Luck

Wayne A. Louden was profiled in the Wichita (Kan.) Eagle in September for his history of at least 37 traffic collisions in the last 10 years (23 of them serious, though none of any kind this year); he admits to some problems (bad vision, diabetes, depression). And in July in Ponta, Texas, Charles and Jennifer Smith and their three preschoolers purchased a new Dodge Intrepid, which was totaled in a collision the next day; on Aug. 11, fire destroyed their trailer home; then Jennifer drove over the family dog, whose leg is now in a cast; and in September, after the community banded together to get the Smiths a new trailer home, a storm totaled that one, too.

Recurring Themes

News of the Weird has reported several times on husbands or wives who were victims of murder attempts by their spouses, yet who quickly forgave and asked the judge to forget the whole thing. In October in Denver, Tom Mason, 52, was sentenced to 12 years in prison for hiring a hit man in 1998 (really an undercover cop) to stage a fatal truck-crash murder of his wife (he had bought her a Hyundai Excel to reduce her chance of survival); the wife, who divorced Mason after that, remarried him in April and begged the judge not to send him to prison.

Least Justifiable Homicides

A 28-year-old man was allegedly shot to death by his first cousin during a dispute over how to paint a door at a construction site (Banner, Ky., October). And one man was shot to death and his killer then beaten to death by relatives and in-laws at a Labor Day barbecue, all because of a request by one of the relatives that another man move his car (Marshall, Texas, September). And a 30-year-old man was shot to death at a bar by a fan of race car driver Dale Earnhart who

The first of a series of churchapproved comic books on the life of Pope John Paul II was published, featuring little Karol Wojtyla skiing (yelling, "Outta my way!") and playing soccer (Rome).

Stronger than ever for Kentucky's economy, CSX Transportation turns 20

As CSX Transportation Inc. (CSXT) celebrates the 20th anniversary of its modern era, the largest railroad in the eastern United States has become more valuable than ever as an engine for Kentucky's economic growth.

Created from a merger of major railroads in 1980 and enlarged with a portion of Conrail last year, the CSXT system provides Kentucky's industries with access to a 23,000mile rail transportation network that stretches from Miami to Montreal and from Boston to New Orleans.

Residents and businesses throughout the Bluegrass State rely on the railroad in many ways. Industries depend on CSXT to transport raw materials for manufacturing and fuel for energy generation, and the railroad delivers a wide array of finished products to and from distant markets. CSXT also helps ease congestion on the state's highways by diverting truck freight to the rails - some 2.4 million truckloads in 1999.

Also in 1999, CSXT supported the state's economy - and the jobs it provides - by moving nearly 69 million tons of freight valued at approximately \$35 billion. Because railroad rates are generally lower than those charged by trucks, CSXT saved shippers an estimated \$162





million in transportation costs on 2,600 Kentucky freight

Moreover, CSXT's industrial development efforts in Kentucky in 1999 helped stimulate the construction or expansion of 11 industrial facilities, representing \$227 million in new investment and generating more than 600 new jobs.

Nationwide, railroads move 40 percent of all ton-miles of intercity freight, nearly as much as trucks, barges and airlines combined. Railroads also carry 70 percent of new cars and trucks from domestic manufacturers, 64 percent of the nation's coal and 40 percent of the nation's grain.

In Kentucky, CSXT handles many important commodities, such as coal, chemicals and minerals. CSXT is an important transportation partner for Kentucky's coal industry, having carried 54.6 million tons in 1999.

Census releases state population figures, apportionment counts

The Commerce Department's population increase, 14,790,890 At that time, each member of the Census Bureau released today the first results from Census 2000, showing the resident population of the United States on April 1, 2000, was 281,421,906, an increase of 13.2 percent over the 248,709,873 persons counted during the 1990 census.

"The participation by the people of this country in Census 2000 not only reversed a three decade decline in response rates but also played a key role in helping produce a quality census," said Commerce Secretary Norman Mineta. Robert Shapiro, under secretary for economic affairs, echoed Mineta. "Consistently on time and under budget, Census 2000 has been the largest and one of the most professional operations run by government," he said, adding that its conduct had "set a standard for future censuses in the 21st century.

and 10,411,850, respectively. The Northeast and Midwest also grew: 2,785,149 and 4,724,144.

Additionally, the resident population of the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico was 3,808,610, an 8.1 percent increase over the number counted a decade earlier.

Prior to this announcement, Mineta, Shapiro and Census Bureau Director Kenneth Prewitt transmitted the Census 2000 apportionment counts to President Clinton three days before the Dec. 31 statutory deadline required by Title 13 of the U.S. Code. (See tables 1-3.)

The apportionment totals transmitted to the President were calcuHouse represented about 34,000 residents," Prewitt said. "Since then, the House has more than quadrupled in size, and each member represents about 19 times as many constituents."

President Clinton is scheduled to transmit the apportionment counts to the 107th Congress during the first week of its regular session in January. The reapportioned Congress, which will be the 108th, convenes in January 2003.

First Amendment

Lately we've been haunted by a snippet from an old Joni Mitchell song: "You don't know what you've got till it's gone." Pretty apt words these days - no matter what it is you're missing. Others may miss the days when elections were tidy or when Americans could tell their candidates apart. As for us, we're missing the days when Americans really loved freedom.

Don't they still? Not so much as they think. The fellows who whipped up the Bill of Rights had a vision of freedom many folks now find hard to swallow. Oh, they want freedom for themselves, of course ---- to speak their minds, practice their faith, gather with their friends, do as they choose. What they're less inclined to favor is freedom for the other guy - especially for the one whose ideas they don't share.

This isn't fresh news, exactly. Every now and then, a think tank notes Americans' growing skepticism about free expression. One of the latest studies is "The State of the First Amendment 2000," issued by The First Amendment Center in Nashville, Tenn. The report details American doubts --- and plain ignorance - about the First Amendment's promises.

Consider press freedom, for instance: Half of Americans think the country has "too much" of it. Nearly one-third disagree that newspapers should be allowed to "publish what they think is appropriate."

A good 20 percent don't think newspapers should be free to publish "without government approval of a story." Nearly a quarter don't think newspapers should be free to criticize public officials. And, 43 percent say newspapers shouldn't be allowed to endorse candidates for public office.

If journalists heeded all these sensitivities, they'd have a mighty hard time reporting the news. They'd also be snubbing one of the First Amendment's founding premises: that democracy's survival requires a vigilant and vocal press, a watched government and an informed public.

Surely, Americans who feel the press has taken this freedom business a bit too far have forgotten all this.

They've lost track of the public service scrappy journalists perform by challenging the powerful, exposing sloth and stealth, seeking social betterment.

And they've lost track no just of what the First Amendment means to society, but what it means to ordinary Joes. That must explain why two-thirds of Americans favor limits on racially offensive comments, and why a good 40 percent believe musicians shouldn't be permitted to sing potentially offensive songs. It certainly explains the overwhelming public support for a ban of flag burning - the patriot's ultimate gesture of disgust with gov-

Christmas and that it is celebrated in England each year.

Well, not a Christmas has passed since that I haven't remembered this fact. As I was driving into work this morning, I thought, "Hmm, it's the day after Christmas ... Boxing Day." So, when I got into the office, I dug out the "B" encyclopedia and looked up a little history on this celebrated day. I thought I might pass along what I learned to you. (You can thank me later.)

Boxing Day is a holiday celebrated in Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand and Canada. It falls on December 26, which is also St. Stephens Day, which is traditionally celebrated in Ireland.

Stephen was the first Christian martyr. He was stoned to death outside Jerusalem some time after the crucifixion of Christ. He spoke against Israel for being slow to accept any dramatic, unexpected action by God.

The speech angered a mob, which in turn, stoned him to death. Stephen's feast day is December 26. The encyclopedia I scanned didn't give any information as to why St. Stephens Day is celebrated on the day after Christmas, but it did give some insight into how Boxing Day is celebrated and a few possibilities as to why it is celebrated in the manner that it is.

Boxing Day is traditionally celebrated by giving money or Christmas parcels in "boxes" to charitable institutions, needy individuals, and people in service industry jobs, such as postmen.

It is believed that the holiday dates from the Middle Ages, but its exact origin is unknown.

It may have begun with the lords and ladies of England, who presented Christmas gifts in boxes to their servants on December 26. The possibility also exists that it may have begun with priests of the early churches who opened the church's alms (charity) boxes on the day after Christmas and distributed the contents to the poor.

So ... gifts wrapped up in "boxes" Boxing Day. That part makes sense to me. But, why the day after Christmas?

The servants and service workers weren't/aren't good enough to be given their "boxes" on Christmas Day like everyone else? And ... the people of England give gaily wrapped "boxes" out on Christmas Day, don't they? They

A challenge to democracy

An "epidemic of civic ignorance" is challenging democracy in America, according to an unsettling article in the new edition of The Futurist that suggests that ignorance is creating a kind of "cultural amnesia."

The article, by University of Windsor Professor Stephen Bertman, argues that a democracy rests on the civic-mindedness of its people. "It depends upon the wisdom and courage of ordinary people to do the right thing in situations where they are free to act selfishly and to do nothing at all," he wrote. The Futurist is the magazine of the World Future Society,

There are signs that argue that the civic-mindedness of the American people is not what it should be. Look at voter turnout (better in the Midlands, but still far from great) and the cynicism some people express about the political process. Look at the difficulty some communities have in filling elected offices with qualified, interested people willing to take the scrutiny and the guff that come with such a job.

Consider how hard some people fight against performing jury duty or working at the polls on

Election Day, Thing about Veterans Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, even the Fourth of July, and how ordinary, how without patriotic meaning and vitality, some people act as though those occasions have come to be.

This isn't an indictment of a person who wants to barbecue in the back yard on the first long weekend of the summer rather than decorate graves in the cemetery. It's more a lament for a culture in which decorating the graves of the dead of many wars -even remembering them and their sacrifices --- has become insignificant in the face of a few hours of selfish pleasure.

Bertman argues that much of the problem is that people simply no longer know or understand the past. History is the foundation on which the present is laid, and without it, today is built on sand.

In a democracy, he said, citizens' consciences must be "guided by spiritual beliefs and directed by the principles of justice" as written in the laws and con-

In a country where studies to understand how satisfying it was. have indicated that half of college students can't locate the Civil War in the proper half-century, where 60 percent of adults don't know which president decided to drop the atomic bomb, where far more people can name the Three Stooges than can list the three branches of government, where is the understanding of the laws and Constitution that undergirds citizenship?

Several things underlie the shallowness of the culture, Bertman suggested. Time, which clouds all memory, puts an emotional and intellectual distance between an event such as a world war and the people who should remember it. The number of Americans who can remember World War II firsthand declines every day.

Materialism, too, puts a barrier between people and the meaningful things of life, he suggested, as do the rapid advance of technology and the blinding pace of change. It's hard to remember the days when radio was a significant source of entertainment, and it's even harder

As the past recedes in the nation-

al mind, so, too, might the importance of the attitudes and ideas built from it. For instance, Bertman said, simply because Americans have freedom doesn't mean they will always have it. If they are ignorant of the historic sacrifices that made freedom possible, he said, it's less likely they will sacrifice again to safeguard those freedoms for future generations. Some policy-makers have worried that, for this very reason, it may be difficult, if not impossible, to reinstate the draft if it should become necessary.

Bertman's cultural amnesia may, he said, have something to do with the observation that many people have "come to feel something is wrong; that something is missing or lost, some part of us unfulfilled ..." It is a phenomenon noticed by other experts, explained in different ways. It has been suggested that the resurgence of traditional religion, or the popularity of New Age organizations or belief in the supernatural or paranormal, is an effort to fill this

Protect your wallet at the repair shop

(ARA) - Unless you're a repair shop can be a scary and mysterious experience. Your car goes behind the doors and minutes later, you're presented with a list of problems, and possibly a large bill.

Even if you aren't a car expert, there are things you can look out for to make sure your car repair is honest and necessary.

mechanic, taking your car into the repair estimates can be inflated. Calipers are the devices that push the brake pads against the disc. They can last up to 100,000 miles; so if the mechanic says they need replacing, ask if you can see how they aren't working properly or where the brake pads are wearing. An oil change is a fairly simple

task, but it can sometimes end up

Brakes are a common area where costing you more than you intend- chasing a new battery, it may be out. Federal law requires cars built ed. This is because there can be hidden fees, such as disposal fees. extra services included, or extra parts, such as new air filters or wiper blades, added on. Make sure you know what's included in the price of your oil change.

Mechanics typically recommend an oil change every 3,000 miles, but many car manufacturers recommend only twice a year or every 7,000 miles. Somewhere in the middle may work for you.

Surprisingly, if your battery is weak or dead, it may not be the batcheaper in the long run to have a reputable mechanic run an alternator and voltage regulator test. This will tell if your car's electrical charge system is working. If there's a problem, it may cost a few hundred dollars to fix, but it will save you hundreds in constantly buying new batteries while the problem goes unchecked.

When you go in for a new muffler, you may also be told you need new exhaust pipes, tail pipes, even a new catalytic converter. Make sure the mechanic shows you the damtery. Instead of automatically pur- ages on your pipes before paying

before 1995 to have catalytic converter warranties of five years or 50,000 miles. Cars built after 1995 have warranties of eight years or 80,000. If you're satisfied the work needs to be done, get the estimate and shop around for the best price.

The old standby, the tune-up, is an old-fashioned term these days. Yesterday's tune-ups included carburetor and ignition system adjustments. Today's computerized systems take care of that for you. All you may really need checked are the spark plugs, which should last about 30,000 miles and cost around \$20 to replace. If your car is running rough and you've noticed your fuel efficiency is down, explain the specific problem to your mechanic rather than just asking for a "tuneup.

Getting bodywork done can be extremely expensive - especially if the repair shop puts on used parts and charges you for new. You could also be charged for replacement parts when your old parts were simply repaired. If you suspect this might be done, tell the mechanic you'd like to see your old parts and the packaging and documentation that comes with new parts.

There's more to consider than the obvious when preparing your vehicle for changing road and weather conditions

you start to make your checklist for winter driving: Throw a shovel in the trunk, add a blanket, some boots and mittens, and change to your snow tires. This year, add one more thing to that listone that is often forgotten: check your windshield. For safety's sake, you need to inspect your windshield regularly for cracks and chips, particularly in the fall and winter months. Temperature changes can turn a small crack or chip into a major crack, putting you in need of a new windshield.

Windshield maintenance and proper installation ranks high on the scale of helping keep you safe in a crash ---along with wearing your seatbelt. When a replacement windshield is not properly installed, it can easily come

intact, it disrupts the safety system of the car, including the airbag system. Passenger-side airbags are designed to deflect against the windshield, and once activated, the airbag could fly out of the car rather than providing a shield to protect the passenger from hitting the front of the car.

If the windshield is not intact, the airbag system is not the only thing at risk; the entire support system of the vehicle has been sacrificed. The roof of the vehicle has more of a chance to buckle. Passengers are more likely to be thrown from the vehicle when the car is impacted if they do not have the shield of an intact windshield, putting them at risk for more serious injury or even death.

> Technicians should remove all dirt and foreign matter from the damaged area before beginning repair.

> If the temperature outside is extreme, the technician should cool or

warm the glass before repair. > The area should be completely dry until the repair is complete.

> Technicians should be sure that the materials harden properly by using all appropriate primers and adhesives.

> The car should not be driven for at least 10 hours after the windshield has been replaced.

"Properly installed windshields support airbags, contain passengers inside the vehicle, prevent debris from harming the passenger, and provide more strength in a rollover," says Inman. "Once a windshield is cracked or chipped, it can no longer be guaranteed to perform these safety functions."

(ARA) - The bad news is that gas prices are rising faster than at any time in the last 20 years, and it looks like the trend is going to continue. The good news is that there are things you can do to make your car more fuel-efficient and lessen the amount of money you pay to the pump.

The most important car care tip is to make sure you give your car a regular tune-up. Keeping your car in top condition means it will run efficiently and get more miles to the gallon. There's no hard and fast rule as to how often you should get a tune-up. Talk to your car care professional about their services checked or replaced.

Keep track of your gas mileage to make sure your car is not using more gas than it was designed to use. You may not notice a big drop immediately, or even in a few months. But by keeping your car in good shape, the Car Care Council estimates that you may save up to \$150 a year.

Check your tires to make sure they are properly filled. Low air pressure in your tires means your car has to work harder to move along, and that eats up gas. Tires lose pressure at different rates, so look at all the tires on a regular basis. Be sure not to over-inflate your tires and make sure your tires are also in good condition. Don't forget to have your wheels properly aligned as well.

Change your fuel filter at least once a year. A fuel filter can get plugged with debris. This not only

Avoid using the air conditioner as much as possible. Most air conditioning systems require more fuel to keep them going. If you can, keep the windows open and let Mother Nature do the job for you.

Consider modifying your driving habits. It may seem like the world is speeding around us, but driving at a slower, constant speed will help to conserve fuel. Try to reduce heavy acceleration and hard breaking. Overloading your car, especially on long trips, consumes more gas. Try to travel light.

And it may sound old-fashioned, but the best way to save on gas is to not use your car. Think about car-pooling, biking or walking. Instead of making tiny trips from store to store, park your car and walk between the shops to do your errands. The exercise will make you feel better, too!

Reducing road alligators: Dispelling myths about rubber on the road

avoided. Rubber tire debris, also known as "Road Alligators," can also be a potential threat to vehicle owners and other motorists on the road, not to mention dangerous and unsightly litter occupying America's highways.

The myth about "Road Alligators" is that they are caused solely by the use of retreaded tires that use recycled rubber for the tread of the tire. To try and continue to the nearest service station or truck stop is looking for trouble and can cause serious accidents, in addition to leaving tire debris all over our highways. "Tires that are run underinflated long enough WILL come apart. It isn't a question of if, it's a question of when, and it doesn't matter if the tire is a retread or one that has never been retreaded," says Brodsky,

> Not only is the Tire Retread Information Bureau dispelling the myths regarding retreaded tires, they are educating motorists on the unique benefits they offer to all drivers. Retreaded tires are a safe and economical alternative to new tires. Almost 100 percent of the world's airlines trust the safety of retreaded tires and use them on nearly all of their aircraft. They are used on school buses, military equipment and taxis all over the country. Even

order titled "Greening the Government through Waste Prevention, Recycling and Federal Acquisition," included a mandate requiring the use of retreaded tires on all government vehicles.

This mandate is a result of the reliability retreaded tires offer, as well as ecological benefits. According to the Tire Retread Information Bureau, it takes about 7 gallons of oil to manufacture one new passenger tire. A retreaded tire only requires 2.5 gallons, and the savings with truck retreads is even greater, resulting in a savings of approximately 400 million gallons of oil a year. The environmental benefits along with their lower cost, 30 to 50 percent lower than new tires, make retreaded tires a dependable alternative.

Although there will probably always be tire debris on our highways, truckers and other motorists can greatly help to reduce the problem by regularly checking the air pressure in their tires with a properly calibrated tire gauge, and by visually checking their tires for deformations, cracks and other signs that the tire might be getting ready to fail.

The retread industry is making the effort to educate motorists for their own safety and for the safety of all drivers on the roads, but it's up to the drivers themselves to follow through. Properly maintaining any kind of tire you own, retreaded or otherwise, can help lengthen the life span of your tire and contribute to the reduction in the number of road alligators loitering on the side of the road, and keep them in the swamp where they belong.
