Wayland meeting questioned, called off

Tuesday night, the Wayland City Commission held a special meeting that was, by nature, illegal to begin with, according to Wayland Mayor Tom Murphy.

The meeting was called to address several items, including the legal status of Commissioner Curt Tufts. The bulk of the meeting's agenda, however, was to provide the new commissioners, namely Carl Ray Martin, who some members of the commission say resides outside city limits. More changes than the acquisition of a new football field are underfoot at Prestonsburg High School. With the announcement of the resignation of principal Coy Sammons, the search for a replacement will soon begin.

In an interview yesterday afternoon, Sammons confirmed that he will be leaving Prestonsburg High in mid-February due to his acceptance of the position of director with the "GEAR UP Project," a federally funded regional analysis and public policy branch program that will work in conjunction with a partnership between Morehead State University, Prestonsburg Community College and Pikeville College.

According 10 Sammons, "GEAR UP" will work to gain early awareness preparedness for undergraduate students by focusing on their needs beginning as early as the seventh and eighth grades.

Coy Sammons The program will focus its attention on approximately 7,000 students over an initial five-year period.

Students in Floyd, Pike, Johnson and Martin counties will be targeted,



vide students with tutoring in regular school sessions, as well as afterschool sessions. Also, Saturday and summer school programs will be available.

In addition, some students will be offered "mentoring" services, pairing

One newsroom staff member has left, one is being promoted and two more will be hired at The Floyd County Times.

Kathy J. Prater, who was hired as a reporter for The Times in September, has been promoted to the position of features editor.

As features editor, Prater will be responsible for many of the same duties as former Senior Editor Pam Shingler, who resigned Wednesday to take a position with the Eastern Kentucky Center for Science, Mathematics and Technology.

Prater will oversee The Times' Lifestyles and Leisure sections and will be responsible for human interest and feature stories, as well as school and business news.

Although she has enjoyed her duties as a reporter, Prater said she is looking forward to her new position.

"Actually, I'm quite thrilled, now," Prater said. "At first, I approached the change with some trepidation, mainly because I have enjoyed reporting so much. It's been a really good experience for me, seeing the inner workings of the courthouse firsthand and reporting on new developments in our community. Although I'm sure there will be aspects of reporting that I will miss, I am nonetheless excited about what is to come with this new position."

Prater lives in Prestonsburg and has three children, Emily, 13, Elliott, 12, and Elizabeth, 10.

In the wake of Prater's promotion, Sheldon Compton has joined The Times as a reporter.

Compton's name may be familiar to regular readers of the paper. Back in 1993, when he was 16 years old, Compton performed freelance work for The Times' sports department. He also began writing a general interest column under the heading "Think About It" for the paper that year, continuing until 1995.

In addition to his previous work at The Times, his writings have appeared in the Floyd County school system's defunct literary magazine, Mountain Magic, and in Forward in the Fifth Magazine. One of his short stories will also be published in an upcoming issue of Wind Magazine.

20-percent improvement over that percentage," said Sammons.

'We plan to do that by providing assistance to teens, and preteens as well, that are targeted as 'at risk.' One of our main goals is to try to improve parental involvement throughout the Floyd County area, by providing as much information as possible to families. Many families don't realize the amount of aid that is available to students. A college education can be a reality for any student regardless of family background and resources," he went on to say.

In response to how he feels about leaving his post at Prestonsburg High, Sammons said, "It was a tough decision. I feel that we have made a lot of progress here and that the progress will continue. I have had good experiences here at Prestonsburg and have been treated exceptionally well by the community, parents and staff; and though I am a little apprehensive about how it will feel to leave, I am excited about this new opportunity.

"I suppose the timing is really not the best it could have been, but I've learned that you have to take advantage of opportunities when they arise," said Sammons.

Sammons is a native Floyd Countian who earned his high school diploma at Betsy Layne High School and then went on to earn his Bachelor's Degree in social studies, secondary from Alice Lloyd College.

He then received a Master's Degree in education from Morehead State University and later earned his Rank I in Secondary Principalship from Union College in Barboursville.

According to Dr. Paul Fanning, superintendent of Floyd County Schools, the process of hiring a new principal for Prestonsburg High School began last night when he met with the school's site-based decision-making council. "The hiring of a new principal is a very structured process," said Fanning. "The site-based council must first attend a formal training session before they can enter into the process. Then, I will submit the applications of qualified candidates to the council, and they will then go through the interviewing and selection process until they present their choice of candidates to me. It is a very structured and formal proceeding that takes great care." The selection of an interim principal was not complete at the time of Fanning's comments.

Two Floyd County residents were allegedly threatened at gunpoint in a recent incident that will be heard by District Judge James R. Allen later this month.

Steven Hunter and Teresa Jones both filed charges on January 23, the day following the alleged incident, against Eric Kevin Akers, 29, of Prater.

Charged with wanton endangerment against both parties, Akers was said to have allegedly pointed a gun at both Hunter and Jones, saying that he would "blow off their heads."

Akers is not to have any contact with Hunter and Jones or any of their family members in the time remaining before the set court date.

Akers is to appear in Floyd District Court on February 21 to face the charges.

The maximum civil penalty violating Kentucky Administrative regulations is \$25,000 per day, per violation.

Mix religion and politics carefully

he past few weeks have seen a renewal in the argument over precisely how religion and politics should intermingle. Unfortunately, there still seems to be as much inconsistency in the debate now as there has ever been.

Two actions by President George W. Bush have clouded the picture further. On Monday, Bush created a White House Office of Faith-Based and Community Initiatives, which, in part, is charged with the responsibility of helping religious charities compete for federal funding.

Some decried the move as an effort to sanction religion. but Bush has said that federal money would not be used for proselytizing. Instead, the president says that funding would be used by local organizations to provide secular help to the needy.

We find nothing wrong with Bush's reasoning and would welcome the development if not for one troubling fact - the president took the exact opposite viewpoint in terms of abortion just the week before.

Bush signed an executive order his first week in office denying federal funding to overseas family planning groups who also advocate abortion. Never mind that federal money was never used to promote or provide abortions. If an agency counsels women that abortion is an option, through funding from other sources, then that agency is prohibited from receiving money for activities unrelated to abortion.

The president can't have it both ways. The simplest and fairest thing to do is to provide funding to both groups or to neither. To show favor to one or the other is illogical and is evidence of bias. That would be true if the roles between religious groups and family planning groups were reversed, as has been the case in the past.

If providing funding to abortion advocates for family planning activities unrelated to abortion somehow endorses abortion, then providing funding to religious groups for non-religious activities endorses religion. If providing money to religious groups for non-religious activities does not support religion, then providing money to abortion advocates for

Committee hears governor's garbage collection plan

Governor Paul Patton's pro- sion of the Kentucky General posal to require statewide mandatory garbage collection most every Kentuckian to pay and penalize those who refuse to pay for garbage service received mixed reviews from a legislative committee yesterday.

The governor's proposal one of three major solid waste proposals before the 2001 sesAssembly - would require for garbage collection by 2003. The proposal would let counties levy an increased property tax penalty on residents who consistently fail to pay their garbage bills. It would also allow the state to penalize counties that do not meet mandatory collection and Environmental Protection standards by withholding state funds.

Members of the state's Interim Joint Committee on Agriculture and Natural Resources questioned whether the proposal would require property owners to pay the tax penalty for tenants whose garbage bills are in arrears. The proposal would allow counties to place those charges plus a 20percent penalty on the property tax bills of residents who fail to pay six or more months of garbage bills. The current penalty allowed under state law is 10 cents per \$100 of assessed property, according to the governor's Deputy Secretary Jack Conway.

The 20-percent tax penalty, fees and franchise options would make mandatory collection possible with no new state spending, say state Executive Branch officials.

Some committee members said the proposal should emphasize anti-litter education more, while others perceived the proposal as an unfunded mandate.

"The thing that has made me the most furious is having to vote on something because the federal government has said 'if you don't do this, than we're going to cut your funds," said House Natural Resources and Environment Chairman Rep. Jim Gooch, D-Providence. "It would be very difficult for me to pass that on to the customers."

A broader solid waste plan to eliminate roadside litter, increase recycling, regulate junkyard waste and create an anti-litter campaign in the schools will likely be presented by the governor during the 2002 legislative session, said

Secretary James Bickford. The annual cost of the governor's entire plan is estimated at \$30 million.

About 20 percent of Kentuckians do not pay for garbage collection, according to the Governor's Office. These residents are considered what Conway called "bad actors" of the law who may or may not contribute to the state's 3,400 illegal dumps.

Bickford said the increased tax penalty and other options in the proposal will pay for collection costs.

"It's like electricity, it's like water, it's like gas. If you generate trash, you're going to have to pay to have it taken away," he said.

Natural gas hearings

The Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) has issued an order on its findings from the public hearings on rising natural gas prices that were held around the state last fall.

The order issued in Administrative Case No. 384 requires the five major gas utilities doing business in Kentucky to immediately begin making monthly gas cost adjustment (GCA) filings. Monthly adjustments would allow utilities to pass anticipated decreases in wholesale natural gas prices on to their retail customers more quickly.

The order also requires Columbia Gas of Kentucky, Delta Natural Gas Company, Louisville Gas and Electric Company, The Union Light, Heat and Power Company and Western Kentucky Gas Company to submit reports to the commission 60 days from today outlining possible strategies for mitigating higher natural gas prices.

Wholesale natural gas prices are not regulated by the PSC, but are set by a competitive market. The recent national spike in price has been the result of market forces of supply and demand. Natural gas utilities recover the cost of the natural gas, but do not make any profit from the sale of the commodity. Instead, natural gas utilities make a profit on the delivery of the gas to the customer's home.

"In its investigation, the commission found the utilities have been reasonable in their gas purchasing," Chairman Martin J. Huelsmann said, "but the PSC wants to ensure that as the price of natural gas goes down, consumers see the timely reflection of that decrease in their monthly bill."

The PSC found that there is no expectation of a natural gas supply shortfall this winter. Although the commission found no shortterm solution to address the gas cost increase, it believes that recent increases in national drilling may bring some decrease this year.

The recent spike in wholesale natural gas prices, coupled with this winter's unusually low temperatures, has drawn much public attention because of the impact on customer bills. The PSC began efforts in July 2000, to alert customers to the rising prices, and encouraged customers to prepare for the higher bills.

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Local school board member recognized for advances in professional development

Last year, 81 percent of Kentucky's school board members met or exceeded the hours of training required by state law. However, only one in 10 reached higher levels of professional development established by the Kentucky School Boards Association (KSBA), and a member of the Floyd County Board of Education has achieved that distinction.

Johnnie E. Ross of Prestonsburg, has achieved Level One certification in KSBA's Academy of Studies for completing 30 hours of approved training.

KSBA President Wilson Stone of the Allen County Board of Education sad Ross' efforts go beyond what is required by law.

"School board members in Kentucky, depending on their years of service, are required to annually participate in between four and 12 hours of approved training," Stone said. "That means each level of the Academy of Studies represents a major commitment of time and work.

"Offerings through the Academy of Studies and related approved professional development classes are essential for a school board member trying to stay abreast of the changes in school laws and regulations," he said, "not to mention the innovations being achieved in other districts and other states that are available through many of those resources.

Training opportunities include approved individual instruction, self-study courses and local workshops, as well as participation in KSBA's state and regional meetings and attendance at national education conferences, such as those sponsored by the National School Boards Association.

KSBA's Academy of Studies workshops cover topics such as student learning and environment, finance, education law, superintendent selection and evaluation, construction, strategic planning, policy development, effective board meetings and community involvement.

Cold Weather, Higher Fuel Prices Cause Electric Bill Charges

Due to the record cold winter and skyrocketing natural gas prices, members of Big Sandy Rural Electric Cooperative will see additional charges on their bills in the upcoming months.

The exact amount of the charge for each bill will vary, depending upon usage, said David Estepp, Manager of Finance and Administration. The average amount of the charge will be \$2.07 for every 1,000 kWh used for December usage which will appear on your February bill.

"The main reason for these charges is that the cost of fuel to produce electricity increased substantially and because of the brutal cold winter," said David Estepp. "Kentucky experienced its third coldest December on record, which boosted demand for natural gas at a time when supplies were short all across the nation."

In Kentucky, the average temperature across the Commonwealth dipped to 25 degrees in December-about 11 degrees below normal

David Estep stressed that none of the charges make a profit for the co-op. "The fuel adjustment is simply a pass-through of the fuel costs we incur during this high peak time," said David Estepp. "If fuel costs less, the customers' bill will reflect a credit."

INSIDE THE PRO FISHING TOUR Fritts Ends Long Drought

orth Carolina pro David Fritts, once the most dominant tournament angler in the country, broke out of a three-year slump Saturday by winning the \$500,000 Wal-Mart FLW Tour season-opening event on Florida's Lake Okeechobee

The former BASS Masters Classic champion, FLW Tour Championship winner and BASS Angler of the Year had not won a tournament since 1997. And he has rarely even been in contention for a win

during that time. That dry spell became a



distant memory on Saturday. "I needed this. I didn't think I had enough to win," said Fritts, who pocketed \$100,000. "You know, it's been since 1997 that I've had this feeling." To get into the finals, Fritts

boated 14 bass weighing 47 pounds, 4 ounces in three days. Under the FLW format, the final round's five finalists disregard their accumulated weight and start at zero. That didn't faze Fritts, though, as he got off to a fast start Saturday en route to

fashioning a five-bass limit weighing 17 pounds.

"I tried everything, but had success with an old wooden crankbait that I was throwing," Fritts said. "I had my limit by 8:30 this morning."

Throughout the week, the expert crankbait fisherman managed to cull quality bass despite Lake Okeechobee's record-low water level and the appearance of a cold front.

For most of the week, Fritts used a Storm Wiggle Wart crankbait and the homemade diving bait on relatively light line. He targeted eight spots in the lake's rim canal between Clewiston and Pahokee. "I've been fishing anywhere there's deep water next to shallow water," Fritts said. "The pattern was shallow rocks close to deep water."

With his latest success, Fritts, 44, became the first pro to win four FLW tournaments (his first three victories came in 1997) and qualify for 10 FLW top-10 finals. With another big first-place check, he moves into second place in total FLW career earnings with \$481,000 behind Missouri's Rick Clunn (\$668,000).

Not bad for a former tire salesman who used to earn \$12,000 a year.

Veteran Michigan pro Kevin VanDam finished second with a limit weighing 16-1, earning \$35,000. Behind him, fellow Michigander Kim Stricker and Mark Hardin of Georgia were tied with 12-6, but Stricker took third place by virtue of a tie-breaker. Missouri's Kelly Williamson (4-3) finished fifth.

The next stop on the seven-event, \$4.4 million FLW Tour is Feb. 14-17 on the Pascagoula River in Mississippi. The tournament will feature another \$500,000 purse.

Don't Let the Cold Keep You From Crappie

By TIM TUCKER, Outdoors Writer

rappie know no season.

They can be caught 12 months of the year in 6 inches of water or 60 feet or more - and in any water clarity from gin-clear to muddy as a puddle. They will bite in temperatures from 40 to 90 degrees, under adverse conditions or calm, with a barometric pressure either high or low. And they can be caught in more ways than one would ever imagine. They can even be caught during the coldest times of the year. But that means catching the tasty panfish when they are at their deepest. The dreaded deepwater fishing, where marine electronics replace the naked eye for locating fish, is no more popular with crappie enthusiasts than it is with their counterparts in bass fishing. Deep-water fishing offers none of the comforts of shallow angling, where sight comes more into play and crappie are both easier to locate and, generally, simpler to catch.

"Depth becomes even more critical in the winter. The fish will school up real tight, and if you present a lure that misses their depth by 2 or 3 feet, they won't bite it. You can fish up on the ledges or on top of a shelf and miss them totally, even though they are right below."

YOUR SPORTS Gunslingers Re-create Spirit Of Old West

or lots of folks, "Gunsmoke" still fills the air as they keep alive the spirit of the Old West

"Cowboy action shooting" is the trademarked name for the clubs that are popping up all over the United States, and Europe and Australia, too. The gunslingers dress in period costume and use authentic Old West weapons to engage in shooting contests.

Typical of these clubs is the Stateline Ridgerunners, a group of 30 or so Kansas folks who each month transport themselves back to the 19th century, when America was trying to tame a frontier. In those days it was done with single-shot Colt .45s and Winchester rifles.

On the second Saturday of each month, the group gathers in front of a mock saloon front near Pittsburg, Kan., where they take turns shooting at spring-loaded metal targets - the "bad guys" that pop up at random. You have to be quick to hit the target before it drops back to the ground. Scoring is by elapsed time, with a five-second penalty for each missed target. Just as in the Old West, the shooter with the fastest draw and most accurate aim is going to be the winner.

One of the leaders of the group is Randy Davis, 46, who is also a member of the California-based Single Action Shooting Society, the national umbrella organization that oversees the sport of cowboy action shooting and its estimated 30,000 participants.

The SASS encourages participants to adopt an alter ego, either a traditional profession of the Old West or a Hollywood character, and to dress and act the part. The group will even register your alias for your exclusive use.

Some of the participants re-create scripts directly from television shows of yesteryear. For many, the costuming is as much of an attraction as the shooting. And it's not just for cowboys, either.

"We had a woman in the club out here the other day with her long skirt of the period, dragging it through the mud with the rest of us," Davis said.

Like most of his fellow shooters, Davis loves the Old West.

"When I was a kid, you couldn't go a night on television without at least three or four Westerns," he said. That appeal extends beyond America, too. "It always amazes me that people in Sweden or

New Zealand take this up as well," he said.

Davis' story is typical of many. He has long been a hunter and shooter. A few years back, his wife gave him a Colt .45. He took to the Internet to look up a hobby he had heard about: cowboy action shooting.

"I was shocked," he said. "I found one right in my own town."

Davis, a former competitive shooter, found that cowboy action shooting is a whole new game.

"I had done competitive shooting for a lot of years, and there is lots of stress," Davis said. That's not the case with the

Stateline Ridgerunners and cowboy action shooting in general. The competition is spirited, but there are no purses. The people do it for fun - even though the costumes of the era are not always the most comfortable. "There was no such

ost crappie fishermen avoid deep water simply because they have never learned how to fish it. But during the 80 percent of the year when the popular panfish is not spawning, limits are rarely caught in shallow water. And fishing in the so-called off-season is so productive that it is worth the time and effort to learn the methods for going deep for crappie.

Tennessee crappie guide Steve McCadams most often finds winter crappie at depths of 18 to 22 feet. "Winter is when I fish the deepest for crappie," McCadams said. "Most people think they would be deepest in the summer because of the hot weather, but that's not the case.

agree that deep-water crappie can be very dependable once you master the techniques involved. New ball games call for new game

plans.

Once you locate deep-water winter crappie, the experts say, it is often

the same easy-tocatch creature that makes its shallowwater appearance each spring.

The first step toward finding deep-water crappie is studying a topo-

graphic map. Since crappie will probably be around invisible structure and submerged cover, it is important to look for deep-water ledges, creek channels, roadbeds and submerged sloughs. The elevation markings on the map offer an indication of areas that might contain those types of structure or cover.

from there, it takes a little skill with electronics to eliminate potential cold-water crappie

havens and then actually locate the fish. The consistent crappie angler has mastered the use of a depthfinder, which can read the bottom contour with amazing precision.

Many fishermen score consistently on deepwater crappie by trolling over potentially productive spots. It is common to see boats on reservoirs take on a spider-like appearance each winter as they troll across open water with poles sticking out in every direction.

News of The Weird

Former pro football player Rae Carruth's elaborate defense to the charge of ordering his pregnant girlfriend's murder (semisuccessful, in that he was convicted in January only of conspiracy) was financed by the state of North Carolina because the well-paid Carruth convinced Judge Charles Lamm that he was "indigent," according to court documents that Lamm had kept sealed for six months but which were discovered in January by the Observer. Charlotte Carruth earned about \$38,000 a week during the 1999 season, and when the prosecutor suggested the motive for the killing was to spare Carruth child-support payments, Carruth countered by pointing out that he made enough worth: (net money \$360,000) to easily support a child.

040 Latest British Research

British Antarctic Survey personnel (and helicopters) are now in the Falkland Islands specifically to learn whether penguins do, indeed, topple over when following the path of an aircraft overhead. And, commenting on Bremen University (Germany) study on gambling as an addiction, British psychologist Mark Griffiths and British gardening expert Alan said Titchmarsh in November that the findings should apply, as well, to the addictive activity of said gardening; Titchmarsh, "Once you've discovered the thrill of making things grow, you can't stop."

I Don't Think So

Former police officer Edward Ludaescher and a partner were charged in November after allegedly

attempting to rob an Oxnard, California, bank, but Ludaescher said it was all a misunderstanding, that he really was only studying up on the mind of the bank robber for a police training video he and the partner were planning to make. (However, prosecutors said that the two men badly needed money, having recently defaulted on a \$200,000 loan for developing a pepper spray gun.)

John Bradley Park's defense at his drunk-driving trial in Llano, Texas, in October was that he was perfectly sober while driving on the night of July 4. 1999, even though his car might have been swerving on the road, but that while sitting in the driver's seat after police officer Jody Deatherage pulled him over, he quickly began drinking, and that by the time he reached the medical facility to test his

blood-alcohol content, he was drunk. (He was nevertheless convicted.)

Twenty-six years after Mel Lastman (who is now mayor of Toronto) paid off a former long-time, married girlfriend, with whom he had had two sons, in a private settlement, the sons (now age 41 and 38) filed a lawsuit against Lastman, complaining of low self-esteem, anxiety, humiliation and delay in their personal development, for which they want Lastman to pay them \$4 million (U.S.) more. Nevertheless, said the 19year-old son of one of the plaintiffs, the lawsuit is 'not about the money.'

According to his campaign manager Jose A. Riesco, U.S. Rep. Lincoln Diaz-Balart of Florida did not retain illegal campaign contributions in the bank for eight months rather than issue immediate refunds as legally required

and as he promised to do. Rather, Riesco told the Miami Business Review in December, all 45 refund checks (totaling nearly \$30,000) were mailed out on time in February 2000. The reason none of the 45 recipients ever cashed their checks over the next eight months, said Riesco, was that somehow every single one of the 45 checks was lost in the mail, "poorly addressed, things like that," thus allowing Diaz-Balart full use of the illegal money for the recent campaign. Riesco denied any wrongdoing.

Not My Fault

In Edwardsville, Illinois, in November, Kwayera "Q" Jackson, 18, was sentenced to 40 years in prison in the death of his 5-month-old son, whom authorities determined was killed by a blow to his intestines.

Jackson (a recent high school football standout) said he might have gently thumped the boy's stomach, but only because he was trying to build up his abs so that he would be a better athlete when he grew up.

In November, a jury in Wilkes-Barrel, Pennsylvania, awarded Harvard undergraduate student Patricia Ryan, 36, \$363,000 from the Cabaret nightclub for a 1994 injury in her previous occupation as a stripper. In her act, Ryan was a fire-breather, but after accidentally dribbling out some of the 151proof stage booze, her chest caught fire, causing second-degree burns. The Cabaret's attorney said. "We didn't cause the fire," but Ryan argued that the club's employees declined to help her during the emergency.

A reader, Diane Johnson, e-mailed me recently concerning some questions she had about her aging cat. She would like to see some columns on older cats and dogs. Pet geriatrics can and do take up entire textbooks, so this week I will concentrate on one of her main concerns, which is tooth loss. I am paraphrasing Diane's description of her cat's problem: The cat is now 12 years old. He had his teeth cleaned five years ago when he was neutered, and he already showed signs of dental problems then, having already lost some of his front incisors. Later one bottom and both top canine teeth losened and fell out.

He still eats canned food

well and seems otherwise healthy. He will not let her look in his mouth. She is concerned about the cat's quality of life and whether he will still be able to eat if the tooth loss continues.

Obviously, I cannot diagnose a problem like this without seeing the animal. There are several problems that can cause tooth loss, but 1 am going to concentrate here on one that appears to be unique to cats. This may or may not be this particular cat's problem — he is due a dental appointment to see what exactly is going on.

So here's our topic ready for a mouthful (no pun intended)? Feline Odontoclastic Resorptive Lesions. No wonder they're abbreviated FORL's. Feline, of course, nieans cat. You knew that one. Odontoclasts are a type of cell that breaks down the structure of the tooth. Resorption is just what is sounds like, and a lesion refers to any sort of abnormality.

Therefore FORL's are an abnormal condition that involves breakdown of a cat's tooth by odondtoclasts, causing re-absorption and weakening of the tooth. They have also been called "neck lesions" (affecting the neck of the tooth, where the crown and root meet), "root resorptions," and "cervical line erosions." They are a type of cavity, but since they are a specific type affecting a particular species, it is best to give them their own name.

I discovered just how lit-

tle I knew about these things while I was researching the problem on the Internet. For one thing, they are tremendously widespread. One source estimates that more than half of all cats alive today have one or more FORL. In the population of cats five years old or older, the number climbs to 72 percent.

How likely a particular cat is to have an FORL does not seem to be directly related to how inflamed its gums are, or how much plaque or tartar is present. Unlike human cavities, the tooth loss in cats from FORLs is not the result of bacterial enzymes or acids eating away at the enamel. The odontoclasts found in the defective area appear to be solely responsible for the tooth destruction.

This leaves researchers knowing HOW the tooth is destroyed, but not WHY. Several theories have been suggested, but none have been proven. Some scientists think this may be an autoimmune disease (where the body's immune system attacks some of its own tissues); others are researching the possibility that a virus or metabolic disturbance may

play a part. Others question whether the overall change in the way we keep cats as pets (indoor housing, commercial foods, etc.) might have some effect on the condition. No one really knows.

What do FORLs look like? They may appear as small defects or "punched-out" areas on the tooth, usually near the area where the tooth meets the gum; some occur beneath the gum line toward the root, and so are not visible. The best diagnosis is by x-ray, which can reveal root erosion ...

Although the problem starts on the surface, the tooth is gradually eaten away until the sensitive dentin, and then the pulp chamber, is exposed. Obviously, this can result in a great deal of pain, but surprisingly, many cats do not show signs of discomfort. This is probably due to the stoic nature of cats.

As a solitary hunter in the wild, cats cannot afford to show signs of illness as easily as a pack-type hunter like a dog. Other tip-offs that a cat may have a problem are excessive salivation, oral bleeding, or difficulty getting food into the

mouth and chewing. Once the tooth has been damaged to such an extent that it actually breaks off, the FORL is welladvanced - and there may have been absolutely no evidence above the gum line that there was a problem.

The progression of early lesions may be slowed by cleaning and polishing the teeth, followed by good at-home dental hygiene. The disease process continues, however, and the ultimate treatment is usually complete extraction of the tooth and any root fragments. Filling these "cavities" doesn't work well, because they continue to get larger anyway, and the filling eventually falls out.

Even with many missing teeth, a cat can generally eat soft foods well, and may even have an improved appetite once the oral pain is taken care of.

It might be a good idea to have a look in Kitty's mouth today. Now if they could only find a cure for "tuna breath."

People Different From Us

In January, Gainesville (Florida) police charged James Anthony Harmon, 39, with fraud after finding his house cluttered from floor to ceiling with as much as \$200,000 worth of unopened cartons of merchandise ordered under various credit-card names from Home Shopping Network. It appeared that very few HSN-ordered items were actually in use in the home. Said Harmon, "I just shop a lot." According to the Gainesville Sun, Harmon's neighbors said he is "a loner who often kept to himself."

Recurring Themes

Accidentally shooting yourself in the head with a nail gun is rarely fatal, as readers of News of the Weird know from several stories in which construction workers have inadvertently plugged themselves and earned little more than a terrific souvenir X-ray. In January 2001, a 25-year-old construction worker in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, apparently tried to kill himself with a nail gun because of the intense pain from having just accidentally severed his hand in a mitre saw mishap. At press time, he was hospitalized in stable condition after surgery to reattach the hand (and to remove the 12 nails in his skull).
