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## FACE TRIAL FRIDAY ON MURDER CHARGE

Commonwealth Expects to  
Center Attack on Suitor of  
Dead Girl

Misadventure cases charged the attention of the circuit court here this week, with a murder trial of considerable interest slated for Friday.

The murder trial is that in which Ashland Collins and others are accused of the murder of Mary Burdett, 18 years old, (mother of the girl in the case are Mrs. Jessie Harmon, cousin of the dead girl; Mrs. Bert Wells, Miss Oney Ford and Darwin Wells, Jr., of the Ashland community).

The alleged suitor of the Burdett girl, Arrest of the other, came when the case assumed mysterious aspects and when no satisfactory explanation of circumstances attendant upon Miss Burdett's death was forthcoming.

Miss Burdett died instantly from a bullet wound in the forehead at the home of Mrs. Harmon at Ashland, where she had attended a party on the night of her death. At her death she held a number of letters in her pocket which were preferred.

The trial is expected to fall upon Collins and the other defendants. The Commonwealth expects to center its attack on the suitor of the dead girl.

Thanksgiving, in order for the members, Christmas was not to start.


While we did not come up to our quota, still we consider it was a success, and those who felt it impossible to join during the drive will be asked later to help in some way, as funds are needed for roll work.


