

Give your old clothes, shoes, hats, pants, dresses, bedding, sheets, shirts, quilts, stockings, anything you have. Not, if every man, woman, boy and girl who has a steady job will give me one day's work or the price of one day's month for six months, we can take care of all the poor people with food, warm. Every school employee, every store clerk, every team driver, every doctor, every office worker, every gas employee, every farmer who is able to do so, every school teacher, every teacher, every busboy, help us.
