THE PEOPLE SHOULD DEMAND LOWER TAXES

Nothing but a permanent increase of government expenditures and permanent increase of taxes can result unless there is a limit placed upon expenditures which the government is indulging in, especially the new Senator Borah, of Idaho, in a state our issued April 29.

WIREMAN SLAIN IN MAGOFFIN AMBUSH

Killing Tuesday Is Sequel to Pinks and Johnson Deaths

Word received here Wednesday morning states that Dave Wilmon, 40 years old, Magoffin county farmer, was shot to death on a road in a field near his home on Rising river, three miles from the Floyd-Magoffin line, Tuesday afternoon, as a sequel to the gun battle in which Branch Pinks and Frank Johnson killed each other.

Identity of Wilmon's assassin has not been placed definitely, though friends of the two Johnsons are suspected. Magoffin county officers are making an investigation at the scene of the ambush. It is said, Wilmon's body is said to have lain for three hours after the shooting when his relatives fearing to remove the body.

Dave Wilmon accompanied the posse which went in search of Frank Johnson on the Sunday on which Johnson and Pinks were killed. It is believed that he was snared by the net of the Johnson family for the same, which ended in Frank Johnson's death.

Wilmon is credited with six wives and several children. He was a son of A. A. Wilmon. Burial was made in the family cemetery on Rising river Wednesday.

The six who were jailed as a result of the Melvin fight are: Bill Johnson, (S. W. Johnson's son), Tivis Cole, Daniel Newsome, Harve Collins, Harvie Collins, Fred Colley.

The fight is reported to have begun in the Collins home where it is alleged Wright called Johnson an offensive name. ATTY. M. C. KIRK DIES MAY 29TH

Attorney M. C. Kirk, 63 years old, of Paintsville, died at the Chesapeake at 8:45 a. m. May 29, after an illness of only five days from pneumonia.

On Sunday, May 23, Mr. Kirk became suddenly ill with an infection caused by the opening of a small hole in his nose. He grew steadily worse until his family and friends became alarmed over his condition and rushed him to the hospital where an examination showed he was suffering from pneumonia, a virulent form of blood poisoning.

Leading physicians of the country together with his family were constantly at his bedside. The best talents of medical science were brought to bear upon his case in an effort to save his life, but to no avail. Death relieved him of his suffering Friday morning.

Mr. Kirk's life was characterized by hard work. He had fought his way from an orphan boy to the top of the legal profession, and was a first-class fighter. Never was the fighting spirit of a man brought more forcibly to the fore than in the game fight he waged against death at 6 and 60.

Many a man with a weaker spirit would have succumbed to the disease days before Mr. Kirk passed away.

The body was returned to Paintsville Friday afternoon, where it lay in state at the home on E. Second street, where relatives and friends from all sections of the Sandy valley called to view the remains and pay their last respects to his memory and friendship. Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock the remains were removed to the Mayo Memorial Church, where funeral services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. J. D. Bell, assisted by Rev. Herbert Hewlett, of Louisa, a lifelong friend of the family. People from all sections of the Big Sandy valley attended the funeral.

The crowd at the funeral and burial was one of the largest ever seen in Paintsville. The floral tributes were profuse and beautiful, attesting the high esteem and great friendship in which the deceased was held by all classes of people throughout this section.

Mr. Kirk was a member and official of the Mayo Memorial Church, a Mason of high standing, an Odd Fellow and a member of the Paintsville Rotary Club.

The legal profession was well represented at the funeral and burial. The Johnson County Bar Association attended in a body, while attorneys from all sections of Eastern Kentucky were present. He was well-known and highly respected in Prestonsburg and Floyd county.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Hester Cassidy Kirk, two sons, H. R. Kirk, of Sebastian, Fla., and W. H. Kirk, of Paintsville, and three grandchildren, all of whom were present during his illness and death, and at the funeral and burial.
