HEALTH NEWS

YOUR FRIEND-- THE HEALTH OFFICER

YOU AND THE HEALTH DEPARTMENT

The new health program is not limited either to the cleaning up of sanitary nuisances or to health promotion alone. Instead, public health involves a wide range of activities, calling for the skilled services of the physician, sanitary engineer, laboratory worker, health nurse, and inspector.

We can realize better what these activities mean to our comfort and safety if we will but recall conditions as they were. We are prone to forget that only a generation ago typhoid was one of the major causes of death, while today it is a rarity; that smallpox was a constant visitor in our cities; that tuberculosis at the beginning of the century was still the chief cause of mortality, and that diphtheria caused but half the deaths it did only five years ago. In our comparative freedom from diseases like these, we forget that only our health departments stand between us and the conditions that we hope may never return.

The services of the health department is, make use of it. Know your health risks and learn what they have to offer, but most important, your share by joining whole-heartedly

in the health promotion projects in your community, for this co-operation is the keystone of successful health work. If you do your share, you'll conclude that you have worth-while friends in the health department.

"As state health officer," said Dr. A. T. McCormack, in discussing the use of dairy products in the diet, "I am naturally very much interested in the food that Kentuckians eat. I am interested not only in the sanitary quality of the food, but also in the 'bits' While nutritional fitness are not contagious, their prevention is of great importance. To this end, a varied diet including liberal use of all dairy products, milk, butter, ice cream and cheese is essential."

"Pointing out that many people are apt to regard ice cream as a summer dish, or a confection, Dr. McCormack pronounced it to be a year-round food. "Ice cream," said he, "is a dairy product containing all the food proper for the infant, with the addition of butterfat in the form of sweet butter or cream. The protein of milk and the vitamins of milk are retained in the ice cream; while the sugar used in its making is an energy producing food, as a satisfying and refreshing ending to a hearty winter meal, ice cream knows few equals. One serving gives an energy value greater

than that of a cup of whole milk by a little more than 10 per cent.

"The average commercial ice cream contains, in addition to the butterfat, a large percentage of milk solids, other than fat, glucose, milk solids, protein, bone and tooth-building material, calcium and phosphorus. One serving of ice cream has been shown to contain over one-half as much again calcium as a cup of milk."

He ising buy the sign, "We Always Cook With Butter," is sometimes seen in restaurants in the larger cities. Dr. McCormack said: "The housewives of Kentucky do not have to be told how to cook, but in some families the habit of buying is not infrequently curtailed on the plea of economy. Butter should never be considered just a fat, or a spread for bread. It is a distinctive food of unusual value, for which there is no adequate substitute. It is all food, no waste, and is easily and quickly digested. No other food is so rich in vitamin A as butterfat. This vitamin promotes growth and helps to build up resistance against colds.

"Demand good quality butter. Refuse to buy the bitter or bad flavored product. Good butter has a sweet, nutty flavor, a smooth, even grained body and a uniform color. It should be wrapped in clean paper and kept in a cool, sanitary place. Use butter at every meal."





COAL COMPANY LAND LEASED FOR GARDENS

The Consolidation Coal Company at Van Lear reported to County Agent R. T. Faulkner of Johnson county that it leased to employees this year 1,426 acres of land, on which a total of 457 gardens were grown.

The production of these gardens totaled 1,246 bushels of sweet potatoes, 2,700 bushels of Irish potatoes, 8,510 bushels of corn, 1,800 bushels of beans, 25,200 pounds of cabbage, 6,200 pounds of lettuce, 225 pounds of spinach, 157 bushels of carrots, 1,620 bushels of tomatoes, 900 bushels of onions, 1,530 pounds of radishes, 203 bushels of turnips, 20,575 pounds of pumpkins, 4,683 pounds of squash, 12,580 pounds of melons, 3,725 pounds of mustard, 835 bushels of kale, 225 pounds of peppers, 225 pounds of celery, 896 bushels of cucumbers, and 540 bushels of beets.

Two hundred and fifty-six families growing these gardens earned 41,364 quarts of fruit, 14,842 cans of vegetables, and 11,049 quarts of pickles.

'MULES' REVIVED FOR PROTECTION

Petty thievery, robberies and hold-ups have become so frequent in certain sections of Eastern Kentucky that the local citizens of the harassed communities are taking the law into their own hands by resurrecting the ancient order of "Mules" for mutual protection, according to a news story from London.

What is termed as an organized band of outlaws who have their rendezvous on the head of Natts Creek and Chestnut, near the Johnson county line, has been making its almost unbroken record of kidnapping, robbery, citizens of Richardson and adjoining communities recently took steps to reorganize the Mutual Protection Society, known locally as the "Mules."

Already hundreds of other various robberies and petty thievery, citizens of the Richardson and adjoining communities recently took action when two fat boys were taken from the park at the home of Sterling Price, of Natts Creek. The boys were driven up Natts Creek to a secluded spot and the hoodlums, according to reports of officers found only the heads, feet and other residue at the site of the butchering. The thieves, estimated their trail from this point on, declaring that although the officers searched an entire day and night, they found no trace of their whereabouts. Unable to secure sufficient evidence for a search warrant for suspected parties, the citizens commenced talking of reorganizing the Mules.

A Mutual Protection Society has already been organized on Little Blaine and it was said that they will assist in the reorganization of the Society in other sections.

Recently inhabited, heavily wooded, and unincorporated with abandoned, at times, the 20,000 acres of company lands on Natts Creek and Chestnut, provides an excellent site for the base of operations of outlaws, and it is said that a gang of ten or eleven have their rendezvous in that region, from which they stage bank robberies and even train robberies. During the past year, two stores, a postoffice, and a number of homes have been robbed. C. & O. manifest trains have been robbed a number of times in the section between Richardson and Offutt.

Officers have made repeated efforts to check their operations, but even when they are brought into court, it is said defense testimony is so well organized that no convictions are ever secured.
