Odd Story About Old Gallows Elm Mystifies Mison

Fayette, Mo.—An old elm tree stands here as a monument of the hanging of an innocent man long ago. All of the great tree is dead except the limb from which the man was hung. It's contained life causes no small wonder among old residents. The story of the old gallows tree dates back to June, 1837, when, according to musty records, a man was killed in a nearby harvest field. John Chapman, a neighbor, was charged with the crime.

Despite his vigorous and continued protest of innocence, the man dragged through the courts for a year. He finally was found guilty and sentenced to death on July 16, 1837. Even so he was about to die Chapman maintained his innocence.

After the scene had been fastened around his neck and the rope thrown over the limb, Sheriff Lloyd McVary asked the condemned man if he wished to make a statement.

"Gentlemen, you are hanging an innocent man," replied Chapman. "As he predicted, years after another man substituting the hanging, he is dead, clearing Chapman's name."

COST OF FIRE HYDRANTS IN STATE CITIES CITED
 (Furnished through the Kentucky Municipal League, Lexington, Ky.)

According to a survey completed this week by the research bureau of the Kentucky Municipal League, the average yearly cost of standard class fire hydrants in Kentucky cities of the first four classes, served by private water companies is \$44,000. The survey includes all but seven of the 22 cities of the first four classes served by private companies. There being about 25 city-owned and operated water plants in Kentucky cities of the fifth class.

The report shows that the annual cost of fire hydrants having the standard 2 1/2 inch hose connection in the 22 cities for which figures were available ranges from \$10,776 for one city having the former and the latter. The report also shows that nine other cities have annual charges are made in the 22 cities these being as follows: (the figures in parentheses represent the number of cities paying the rate): \$11,350 (4); \$25,100 (2); \$25,100 (2); \$40,000 (1); \$40,000 (1); \$40,000 (1); \$40,000 (1); \$40,000 (1); \$40,000 (1).

The total annual cost of the hydrants in the 22 cities included in the report is shown to be \$1,100,000 or an average of \$50,000 per city. It is found that the annual amount for fire hydrants in some of the cities amounts to one-third of the annual tax income.

The annual per capita cost for hydrants in these 22 cities is \$2.71, the range being from \$2.71 to \$2.71 per capita.

JENNINGS' PEN TERM AFFIRMED

Paintsville Bank Robber Must
Serve 21-Year Prison
Sentence

The twenty-one-year prison term imposed on Wilson R. Jennings in the Johnson circuit court on a charge of robbing the Paintsville National Bank last March was affirmed by the Court of Appeals last Friday.

Jennings claimed he was in Huntington, W. Va., at the time of the robbery. He formerly lived in Ashland, Ky. He accounted for large sums of money the Commonwealth charged he had in his possession by explaining he was successful as a professional gambler and in playing golf at \$2 a hole.

"If you could see the witness," Commissioner W. T. Drury said in the court's opinion, "show the number by which the defendant established his alibi exceeds the number by which the Commonwealth establishes his connection with the robbery by identifying him, but all this was a question for the jury submitted to it under instructions of which the defendant does not complain and we have often written that a verdict will not be disturbed because the jury believed one set of jurors rather than another."

HEALTH NEWS

PELLAGRA
What Is Pellagra?
Pellagra is a disease that usually shows itself by a severe skin rash, burning and scaling of the skin. The person with pellagra usually also suffers loss of appetite, indigestion, diarrhea, soreness of the mouth and tongue, nervousness, low spirits and more or less mental weakness.

Is It a Serious Disease?
Yes. Because it weakens. Because it may lead to mental illness. Because it may kill.

What Is the Cause of Pellagra?
Pellagra is caused by eating the wrong food. It comes to people whose diet does not contain all that is needed to keep one in good health. The missing essential is a pellagra-producing diet essential to be a vitamin which Dr. Casper of the United States Public Health Service called the pellagra-producing factor or vitamin.

How Do We Know This?
We know this first, because people who eat the right kind of food do not have the disease; second, because when people who have the disease eat the right kind of food they get well and remain well, as long as they keep on with the right diet; third, because when people are fed the wrong kind of food, they develop the disease.

Is Pellagra a Contagious Disease?
No. Pellagra cannot be caught by one person from another, no matter how close and intimate the association between the sick and the well. There is no need, therefore, to keep a patient away from other people.

What are the Signs of Pellagra?
One should think of pellagra if a run-down condition of the health de-

velops; for with or without this indigestion and sore mouth appear; if nervousness, irritability, depressed spirits (the "blues"), poor sleep and itching of the hands and feet.

What Should We Do About It?
While these signs do not always mean pellagra they certainly show at least a poor condition of health, so that any one who has these should at once see the family doctor and be told what to do.

Without plenty of the right kind of food, medicines will not help. All of the foods that are especially valuable in pellagra are not yet known, but it is known that plenty of fresh milk or fresh lean beef will cure and prevent the disease. Dried powdered yeast is also very helpful. Special care should be taken that persons with pellagra should drink all the milk—fresh, can every day (three to six glasses, or more), or eat lean fresh fish (say, a quarter of a pound) of roach brook, steak or stew) having made sure of the milk or the meat (but not butter); one may satisfy the appetite with his usual food.

How Can Pellagra Be Avoided?
The prevention of pellagra depends upon eating the right kind of food at all times, winter and summer. To make sure that the diet is right, it should include plenty of fresh milk daily, some fresh meat and as many fresh vegetables, including the green whole wheat products as especially valuable. Having provided these essentials, of a proper diet, the rest may be arranged according to family or personal likes. In this way you may avoid this unnecessary and serious disease—pellagra.
