Chinese Climbing Perch
Travel but Don't Climb

The Chinese climbing perch is so called because many years ago a student of fishes found one of them in a small tree. Since that time extensive research and experiments have been carried on in an effort to get them to climb trees or limbs in captivity without success.

Although the experiments indicate that the fish will not climb, he makes good progress over flat or slightly inclined ground. In their native habitat, southeastern Asia, ranging as far north as southern China, the climbing perch travel overland between pools and ditches.

In making these merland excursions the fish extends its gill covers at right angles to its head. These gill covers are equipped with spines when in locomotion. When on the go the fish wiggles its tail and rolls from side to side as it uses the spines for leverage. The result is a wobbling gait that doesn't result in any appreciable loss of, but is sufficient to get the fish where he wants to go.

They are related, to the Siamese fighting fish in addition to their gills they have an air chamber in the head over each gill. These chambers serve as a source of air when the fish leaves the water. When in the water they occasionally rise to the surface to take a breath of air and it has been reported that it is possible to drown them by denying them access to the surface. They reach a length of ten inches. They are a golden olive color, darker on top and lighter below, and usually have a dark spot at the base of the tail. There are no external differences between the sexes.

Modern Orchestra Goes Back to Bow and Arrow

What is an orchestra? In the modern orchestra, the instruments developed nearly 400 years ago, save a writer in the Kansas City Star. Within that short span of time the human imagination had found more widely differing modes of expression through music; the conception of string melody and instrumental melody had changed radically; the various musical instruments have undergone vast improvement and some have definitely been discarded to the museum. But throughout this entire period the orchestra has been undergoing a fascinating evolution.

The modern orchestra may be said to go back to the bow and arrow as its starting point. For the orchestra, as we know it, was built around the string quartet; and the string quartet was composed of the violin family. Musicologists assume that the origins of the violin may be traced to the time when primitive man in letting fly the bow from the arrow heard the sound made by the bow string as it vibrated. A primitive idea was developed until it found its perfect expression in the Oboe and clarinet and violins. A modern's examination of the violin will convince the observer that the instrument is in principle the same as the bow which the hunter used.

No Other Sport Equals That of 'Coon Hunting

There is a strange appeal to 'coon hunting that can be compared to no other sport. There is a cleanliness about 'coon hunting, too, as it is done in the Detroit Free Press, that bears evidence of the uniqueness of this type of sport. It is more than that the 'coon by far, is the dog, for without a dog there would be no 'coon chase, no music, no thrill of 'barking up' no so-called 'coon war' through the night-bushes woods, following the hound whose nose is a hunter's true guide, that is, a human.

Within the past few years, 'coon hunting has been developing more and more as a sport and less as a killing game. It is true that the 'coon hunt does play a part in the economy of the 'coon hunter's set-up, but they consider their coon hunt as a money crop which is a source of ready cash with which to purchase and maintain their dogs. This seems to be the attitude among the 'coon hunters, and with the development of a more 'sporting' attitude, comes the greater enjoyment of a 'coon chase. Of course, the destruction of den trees is out of the question, as well as against the law, and the climbing of trees to get out the 'coons is frowned upon by every self-respecting 'coon hunter.

For the night is one that follows a 'coon hunt, the hunter's 'mood' against the earth's surface, 'mood' the time when dogs are at their best, for the moisture holds the scent.

Natural Ice Caves
According to Hopley's Geology, there are a hundred or more known ice caves in the temperate zone of both the old and New world, and especially developed in mountainous districts, such as the Alps, Carpathians, Jura and Tiro mountains. One of the largest and most beautiful of these is the Dolomieu cave of northern Hungary near the foothills of the Carpathians (near Felsobanya in Czechoslovakia). Its area is about 100 square yards, and of which are covered with ice of crystalline purity, many of the blocks assuming fantastic shapes. Another large European ice cave is the Kolovrat cave, near Salzburg, Austria. Probably the best known ice cave in this country is the one at Comstock, Pa., but others have been found in Iowa, South Dakota, Michigan, etc. There are also numerous dwellings known as ice earth holes or sometimes in many parts of Europe as well as in this country; it is probable that some of these are still in use as dwellings.

Teazel Growing
One of the curious crops grown in England and in Europe is the teazel. The teazel is used for raising the nap of the best cloth and blankets, no machinery having been invented that answers the purpose so well. Teazels are the flower heads of the tree of that name, and are very prickly, having long straight bristles all over them. The cultivation of this plant has been carried on for centuries chiefly in Somerset and Gloucestershire. The journey to the Yorkshire hills used to take as long as a week or ten days in olden times and was a dangerous undertaking owing to the footpads who infested the highways.

Origin of Knives and Forks
The knives we use at our meals are the successors of the dagger and hunting-knife which the man of long centuries ago found so handy for cutting his food, and the blade of which was a duplicate of our straight-pointed carving-knife. In those days the knives were used as forks, and it was only in Tudor times, when the enormous ruffes worn then made it difficult to reach the mouth with the fingers, that it became necessary to discover a substitute in the crude parent of the modern fork.

Children born in Mexican airplanes are Mexican citizens under that country's laws, says the San Francisco Chronicle. The same applies to children born in Mexican territory or on Mexican ships, whatever the nationality of their parents, and to children born abroad of Mexican fathers or Mexican mothers and unknown fathers. Nationality also may be acquired by naturalization or, in the case of women, by marrying a Mexican. It may be lost by accepting any office or title of nobility from a foreign government or by accepting without permission of congress any foreign decoration or title other than of nobility unless it be of literary, scientific or humanitarian rank; or by assistance to any foreign government or national against Mexico before any international tribunal.

England, Ireland Claim

Greenest God in World
An English poet and essayist declares that there is no grass so beautiful as English grass, and American who have fastened their eyes on the English award will be inclined to agree with him, declares a writer in the Boston Transcript. But an Irishman, the winner of the award, notes that the greenest grass is only to be seen in Ireland. "It is the greenest and most luscious grass," he says, "in all the world; now of the best things an Irishman remarks in England is the lesser brilliancy of the verdure; Emerald Isle has been well and truly named."

The truth probably is that any claim to excellence in the matter of grass by England, Ireland or Scotland would be as difficult to decide as the fabled claims of Minerva, Juno and Venus to possession of these matchless, moist weather of the British Isles; neither parching in summer nor killing in winter. It was congenial to the growth of other regions on earth. And if, added to that, there is taken into account the constant care of the turf in those islands, the victor from other countries must despair of matching it at home. But, as between Ireland and England, it would be a bold man who should venture to award the prize for grass to one or the other. Perhaps the palm should go to Ireland because the bright verdure of her hills and valleys gives her her sobriquet ages ago, and may have suggested the choice of her national plant, the shamrock, and the color of her national flag. The diplomatic way to express an opinion in the matter is to declare that all British grass is good but that some is undoubtedly better than others.

Killer Whale Small, but Match for Great Sperms

The Greenland whale, though huge, is timid and harmless, but the killer whale, much smaller, is one of the deadliest denizens of the ocean, and is the only species of cetacean which has a complete set of teeth. In both species hunters hunt in packs and are thus much more than a match for the great cachalot or sperm whale. notes a writer in The New York Times. In attacking the killers leap high into the air by the whale's side. Two or three of them attack his head, and their teeth pierce his skin. They then devour the tongue, which will frequently weigh as much as four tons, leaving their prey to die. The explorer also asserted that he had seen a pack of eight to twelve killers come to the ice-edge at his six feet from the water, as he discovered whether any seals were basking on it. If there were, they would dive underneath, smash up the ice, and collect their victims. If they were of commercial use killers would soon be greatly reduced in numbers, but, unfortunately, they are comparatively worthless and thus enjoy almost complete immunity from attack by man.

"Playing Possum"

From the opossum habit of feigning death when captured has come the phrase "playing possum." When he thinks he is in danger, the opossum curls up and waits his fate. If he is caught high up in the branches by hunters, he will wrap his tail around a branch and hang there, motionless. If he is caught on the ground, he will lie flat on his back, his tail curled up and his head down. The hunters may shake him, but he does not seem to bring him to life. The opossum may shake his head, but he will retain his semblance of death. He may even be picked up by the tail and carried away out as much as a mile. But by and by, for a few moments, and he comes to life quickly and makes for safety. Unlike the raccoon, the opossum has not learned to den up for the winter, which is the northern mammal's way of defense against the rigors of extremely cold weather.

Colored Girls Bleach

Men of the Guajira tribe, in tropical America, prefer girls with pale faces. So Guajira mothers wash their daughters with bleach to whiten their complexions and make them attractive to prospective suitors. This unique custom is reported by a representative of the University of Arizona, who made a study of the primitive Guajira Indians of northern Venezuela. Describing these Indians, she said that in Guajira households the mothers are supreme. The mothers have a system of selling their daughters to eligible young men of the tribe. Blood revenge of this primitive tribe. The number of the population meeting a violent death because of the payment of wrong demanded is not less than something appalling, she declared.

Poison Hemlock Common

The hemlock plant, source of the favorite poison of the evil Greek, is made from the leaves and the fruit.
