MARTIN CONVICTED IN KNOTT COUNTY OF BOY'S SLAYING

Former Deputy Given Life Term; Ex-Sheriff Is Charged

COMBS EXONERATED

See Martin, former Knott county deputy sheriff, was sentenced this week by a jury of the Knott circuit court to a life term in the penitentiary for the slaying of a 16-year-old youth in Elizabethtown last October.

Martin, 34 years, then sheriff of Knott county, and Monroe Combs, town marshal of Hindman, all were indicted for the killing of Earl Gearheart, of Bell County, of Troublesome, when Gearheart fled to evade arrest for a minor difficulty between the youth and another youth man on the streets of Hindman. The charge against Combs was diminished, however, investigation showing that he did not fire on Gearheart. Ex-Sheriff Martin has not been given trial.

Eleven men were acquitted last week of murder charges in connection with the slaying of Adam Hughes August 7, last, at the Wellsville-Camp Campbell mine camp on Jones Fork. Those acquitted were: J. D. Compton, mine manager; Jasper Compton, R. W. Stone, Lebl. Chambers, Deputy Jobber; John Jones, Sany Lilly, Ballard, Cozler and H. H. Burke.

Evidence produced at the trial of cases at night was shown that Burke, 34, had fired two shots at the mine manager, Hughes, in accordance with Mr. Compton's rules, had been discharged when he became drunk and had been arrested for disorderly conduct.

Both Floyd and Knott counties had been asked to come to the mine camp and afford protection, it was claimed. This failed to do so. Hughes and three others came to the Compton home late at night when the shooting took place, it was testified.

In a statement made this week to The Times, the mine official said that the Knott county officials were asked to come to the camp and make an investigation, but were engaged in counting the primary election vote and did not appear. Mr. Compton attributed the indictments to the work of an enemy.

Privat of a woman, owner of a restaurant at Sassafras, Knott county, charged with the poisoning of Deputy Sheriff Troy Adams, was under a pending sentence in a glass of beer drawn for the officer. It is claimed. He dropped dead a few moments after drinking the beer. With the end of this week, the Knott circuit court adjourns for the opening of court here Monday.

SIMPLIFY COUNTY GOVT FUNCTIONS

Five measures were given final approval by the General Assembly in the closing days of the session (simplifying county governmental functions and reducing operating costs), sponsored by the Kentucky Tax Reduction Association.

Nine county re-organization bills in all were passed for passage by the Association. Of these nine bills, two were defeated and seven passed by the House of Representatives. Five of these seven passed the Senate and are summarized herewith.

Saveage to the taxpayers as a result of the enactment of these measures will amount to more than \$5,000,000 a year for the next two years, it is estimated by Nat B. Seer, chief state inspector and chairman, who was primary responsible for their passage.

Inasmuch as the counties spend 30 per cent of state tax money, as well as all of the county tax money, every taxpayer in the state will be benefited by these economies in all counties, regardless of where his taxable property is located in the state.

The fact that part of this program was successful is evidenced by the same.

DISCUSS GAS SERVICE HERE

Kiwanis Club to Present Suggestions for Improvement to City Council

Gas service in Prestonsburg was the subject of discussion at the Kiwanis Club meeting here Friday with E. C. Lewis, of the Westcott Natural Gas Company, and Virgil Proctor, of the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company, in charge of the program.

A detailed report of service given by the Federal Public Service Corporation to gas consumers here, with suggested improvements, was received with much interest. The investigation developed the following unsatisfactory service conditions:

It was shown that at present the gas line crossing the river here is unburied, leaving the line in danger of being washed or torn out; that at the high pressure regulator only one-inch by-pass has been provided for gas to be sent through the entire town while the regulator is being repaired; and that gas lines in the town are too small to carry gas of necessary pressure.

Suggested improvements follow: Installation of a heater on the main line and after that a pressure gauge to provide proper pressure before the gas goes into the high pressure regulator; at least three inches in diameter around the high pressure regulator, so that the main regulator may be removed at any time for repair without disrupting gas service; A gauge between the high and low pressure systems to regulate the gas to a proper pressure.

In the low pressure system there should be two regulators, as in the high pressure system. This is basic to a gas meter to provide a uniform supply of gas. Another gauge, preferably a recording gauge, should be installed on the consumer's side of the low pressure regulator. This is needed to show if sufficient pressure is being supplied for the entire town.

Installation of an oil fund which would dispose of any sand or excess oil in a tank between the consumer's side of the regulating system; also a two-inch by-pass around the low pressure system, this to contain a low pressure by-pass regulator. It was also suggested that a fire proof regulator house, containing a heater, be constructed. After the needs for improvement in gas equipment were outlined to the club, it was voted to adopt Mr. Lewis' plan for the club to recommend to the city council at its April meeting.

Bryan Smith, of Hindman, Dies in Louisville Hotel Room Blaze

Bryan Smith, 37 years old, state banking department official and a native of Hindman, burned to death in his hotel room in Louisville shortly after midnight, Thursday morning, according to a telephone message received here by Circuit Clerk Troy H. Spradlin, intimate friend of Mr. Smith.

Details of the tragedy are lacking here, it is believed, however, that Mr. Smith was burned as he fled clothing caught fire while he slept.

SELLER NAMED TO NRA POSITION

State Re-Employment Director Is Compliance Officer for State

Methods of handling complaints of NRA cases will be facilitated in Kentucky as soon as a new set-up is perfected, according to Judge J. R. Layman, state director of the National Recovery Administration, who has announced the appointment of Edward F. Seltzer as state compliance officer.

Mr. Seltzer, who has been state re-employment director, supervises all industrial adjustment agencies and the code authorities that have been established within the territory. Under Mr. Seltzer's supervision a definite program of instruction and education of those subject to code regulations will be carried out to acquaint members of the industries, operating under codes, with their responsibilities.

One of the most important aspects of the new program will be the adjustments of complaints by a wide range of information concerning the scope and purpose of the codes. It is expected that fact-finding enterprises, which will acquaint other members of the industry with the practices of their associates, will bring about a strong public opinion in favor of strict adherence to provisions of the codes.

Conciliation, mediation and arbitration of disputes will be the usual method used in bringing about compliance with code regulations. But stronger measures will be resorted to when such methods fail. Such procedure is outlined in the code.

COUNTY SCHOOL HEAD ELECTION HELD IN DOUBT

Board of Education Has No Representative From District 1

With the court of appeals affirming the judgment of Judge John W. Caudill that neither Rev. W. H. Horn nor Sam Wells is entitled to the office of member of the Floyd county board of education from Educational Division No. 4 and election of a county superintendent scheduled for the board's meeting Monday, a possible deadlock between T. W. Hall and H. H. Hunter, leading candidates for the office, was seen this week.

Elimination of a member from Division 4 leaves only four board positions, and it is believed that these four are evenly divided in their support of Mr. Hunter and Mr. Hall. The court of appeals directed that the board select a member from Division 4 and in event of its failure or inability to agree on this member, such selection is to be made by Governor Laffoon.

It was held possible this week, however, that Jeff Meles, member of the board of education from Division 4, in event of its failure or inability, may legally hold office until a successor is named and legally qualified. If this is held legal, the deadlock is thereby broken.

Mr. Horn defeated Mr. Wells for membership on the board of education at the November election and acted as board member until he was disqualified upon trial of a contest filed by Wells. His dismissal was based on evidence showing that he had violated, directly or indirectly, the Corrupt Practices Act. Wells was adjudged ineligible to the office because he had not received a necessary number of legal votes.

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CWA SUSPENSION IN FLOYD TEMPORARY

In Belief As Federal Appropriation Made To Help State Relief Work

Through a federal appropriation of \$100,000 was granted Kentucky Tuesday for the continuation of the CWA. In the state until the legislature assemble in special session and provide funds for 25 per cent of the state's relief bill, the CWA in Floyd county was at least temporarily suspended Thursday.

The federal government's application, however, gives a measure of assurance that the work will be resumed in this county soon. The appropriation is for April relief needs.

Kentucky receives this relief appropriation in several installments. A portion of a recent installment to the CWA, Louisville, chairman of the Kentucky relief commission, when he visited Washington a few days ago, seeking relief funds, it was stated by the state authorities that the state itself would take immediate steps to assume a share of the relief burden.



I wonder how old a lie has to be before it becomes the truth?

"To be a Christian means to put Christ first in our life. It means to accept his loving will as the supreme guide to all actions and never to compromise with things which tend to separate us from Christ. It means to say "yes" to Christ, and "no" to one self in the light of this world very far from being Christian."
When real Christianity raises its head and displays its power to save souls and transform the lives of fallen individuals, the so-called "Christian" world is the first to be outraged. For now it must come to a final decision—and this decision may turn out to be that it is a serious business to be a Christian. So that must be given up. The "falling" becomes general and the gent of mankind becomes the greater because it pretended to be "Christian."

thing has been made. The issue is clearly drawn. Shall public offices be maintained to provide jobs, or to give value received to the people who pay the tax bill?

1. COUNTY BUDGET BILL

Provides for a uniform budget system for all counties and establishes a budget commission in each county composed of the county judge, county attorney, and one citizen holding no public office. The commission shall classify all expenditures of county funds to separate budget units, the total of which shall not exceed anticipated revenues. Liability of each member of the commission shall extend to any expenditure in excess of the budget amount.

2. COUNTY INSPECTOR BILL

Provides that the state inspector and examiner shall inspect and examine once a year the books, records and official papers of all county officers meeting and disbursing public moneys belonging to the counties. The present bill is entitled to examine only the records pertaining to the collection and disbursement of state tax money handled by county officials. This new state law will reveal among other things, the exact amount of fees collected by the sheriff, county clerk, coroner, and other officials.

3. JAILERS' BILLS

Consolidates the office of jailer with that of sheriff in all counties, effective at the expiration of the terms of the jailers now in office. The saving will be the difference in compensation paid a deputy sheriff as a condition of the bill, and the compensation of the present jailers, who are entitled under the constitution to keep for themselves an amount up to \$5,000 a year. Under the new county budget law, the salary of the jailer position will have to be shown in a budget which will be published in a joint newspaper, thus localizing and fixing responsibility close at home.

4. TRUSTEE OF JURY FUND

Abolishes the jury fund and the office of trustee of the jury fund, and provides for the payment of jurors by the circuit court clerk.

5. FISCAL YEAR-END COUNTIES

Enables counties to operate more nearly on a cash basis by providing that the fiscal year shall begin July 1, after the bulk of the tax money is paid in. Instead of being the same as the calendar year as at present.

Quartz Is Slow to Melt

Even in 'Hottest' Flames
Quartz is one of the most difficult to melt of all materials, says Canada News Bulletin. It softens and forms a glass only in the hottest of flames.

Such quartz spiral balances are used at the Forest Products Laboratories of Canada, Department of the Interior, by workers in the Pulp and Paper Division, Montreal, for the investigation of the relationship between water and paper-making pulps. The quartz is melted into a flame of oxygen and acetylene and drawn into long threads about the thickness of a hair. By the aid of a somewhat less intense flame, these threads are cooled into delicate springs about half an inch in diameter.

Enclosed in glass apparatus from which air is removed, they make possible the weighing to extreme accuracy of small samples of pulp. The extension of the quartz spring, read by a small telescope to an accuracy of one-thirtieth of an inch, indicates the weight of the sample suspended on it.



SAYS COAL INDUSTRY THREATENED BY POWER. Chicago, Ill., March 20.—Information furnished the United States Senate, showing that 40,000 miners and thousands of railroad employees and others dependent on the coal industry will be forced into the ranks of the unemployed was given out here today by the National Job, Training and Investment Protection Bureau for the Coal Industry. The information was contained in a bulletin, issued by the National Coal Association, quoting from a speech made by Senator Jesse H. Hefner of Illinois, today in joint session with the Senate. Senator Hefner stated that not only 40,000 miners will be thrown out of employment by the governmental program, but also this would cause distress for 150,000 men, women and children. "Our drift toward federal financing of hydro-electric power is having a real tragic effect, and that is the change which is being done to the coal industry," said Senator Hefner. Senator Hefner, in this way, called the attention of the Senate to the economic hydro-electric program of the administration in Washington. Senator Hefner stated that the hydro-electric power developments of the government will displace 63,000,000 kilowatt hours. "We must assume that the production of electricity by water power will displace a similar amount of energy which would ordinarily be produced by coal and steam turbines," said Senator Hefner. "It is estimated that an average of one and four-tenths pounds of coal is consumed in the production of one kilowatt hour in a coal and steam plant. This would mean that the hydro-electric developments of the United States government will displace the use of about 63,000,000 tons of coal annually. I have to estimate that one mine is needed for the production of 1,000 tons of coal per year. On this basis the United States government will be responsible for the unemployment of forty thousand miners each year. This would mean distress for over 150,000 men, women and children. "Such a tremendous spread on the consumption of coal not only would have a disastrous effect upon the coal industry itself but would cause an unemployment problem among the mine workers of much importance. The whole country would feel the effect of it through decreased income to the railroads and to the mine operators themselves."

R. M. A. URGED TO CONTINUE ITS TAX FIGHT

W. Reed Embury, president of the Retail Merchants' Association recently urged Louisville merchants to carry united opposition against a sales tax into the special session of the Legislature anticipated in April.

Speaking at the close of a dinner meeting at the Brown hotel, Mr. Embury said the business administration would have passed a sales tax at the regular session if it could have not ten enough votes. The merchants, Mr. Embury said, still have the pledges

of the same Representatives who stood as a barrier against a sales tax at the regular session.

Dora E. Cross, vice-president of the Holthrop Hardware & Manufacturing Company, discussed experience of his firm in its business relations with retail merchants in the states.

"Business is getting better," Mr. Cross said, as he cited numerous indications of recovery in the hardware trade. The depression hit low in July, 1932. Mr. Cross said, and the Legislature anticipated in April.

"After all," Mr. Embury said, "it is the taxpayer who will foot the bill if a sales tax or any other tax is passed. The merchants could stand a sales tax, if one were necessary. The consumers could stand it if a sales tax were passed up to them, and don't let anybody tell you it won't be passed out."


"Our contention is that a sales tax is not necessary," he continued. "We don't believe any additional tax is necessary. Let those fellows at Frankfort do what business has had to do--live within their income by cutting out waste and reducing expenses. I am in favor of compelling the people who run this state to reduce expenses. I say compel them to reduce. They have raised the cost of government from \$18,000,000 to \$42,000,000 in 12 years. The more money you give them, the more money they will squander."

Reduction of the real estate tax, estimated to dip \$200,000 from the state revenue annually, is a fallacy, Mr. Embury charged. The reduction on an average farm worth \$3,000 will be only \$5 a year, he said, whereas the proposed sales tax on \$500 worth of goods the farmer must purchase every year would amount to \$10.

"This, as a matter of fact, this farmer's tax would be raised 100 per cent," Mr. Embury said. "They propose to trade this \$3,000,000 worth of real estate tax for \$12,000,000 in a sales tax. Who can put that much money in the hands of unscrupulous politicians and it's like pouring it down a rat hole."

Mr. Embury said it's time "to look for a nigger in the woodpile" every time the legislature does something for the farmer. As to the proposed "trade of \$3,000,000 in real estate taxes for \$12,000,000 in a sales tax,"

Mr. Embury said the politicians at Frankfort "consider themselves out for four."



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
