## COUNTY OFFICERS NAB DESPERADOES

Fugitives Fled in Tennessee  
Prisons Taken Last Saturday

Two of Tennessee's worst criminals, one a fugitive from an asylum for the criminal insane, were captured Saturday at Auxier, a small town, by Sheriff M. T. Stumbo and Deputy J. D. Fitzpatrick, Elston Kendrick and Bill Wills. The two whose names were given as Wesley Abbott and "Dirty" Martin, alias Gross, have been fugitives from Tennessee authorities for months following prison breaks. Abbott escaped the asylum for the criminal insane where he was serving a life term for the murder of his uncle in Nashville, Tenn. Martin is wanted for his escape from the Brushy Mountain penitentiary where he was serving a 15-year term for robbery, it is said.

Tennessee officials arrived here Sunday night and returned Abbott to prison when he waived extradition. Martin refused to waive extradition and will remain here until Governor Laffoon grants the requisition expected to be made on him for Martin's return to Tennessee.

Arrest of Abbott was not made without difficulty. He was found at the home of Bill Geese at Auxier by Deputy Elston Kendrick who, assisted by Deputy Sheriff Bill Wills,

Four shots fired by Kendrick failed to hit him and the officers found it necessary to chase him down afoot.

Whereabouts of Martin were not learned by the officers until they were en route here with Abbott. Evidently thinking that a relative of Martin had tipped the officers off as to his whereabouts, Abbott "squealed" on Martin after they left Auxier telling the sheriff where the other could be found. The officers returned to Auxier and arrested Martin without difficulty.

Authorities who came here for the fugitives had expected Martin's arrest but were surprised to find Abbott in custody also. It was not known early this week if a reward had been offered for the fugitives' apprehension.

**Former Floyd Teacher Succumbs May 3rd To Illness of Two Years**

Mrs. Verda Ratliff Jones, wife of Bert Jones of Transylvania, died May 3 at the age of 35 years after an illness of two years duration from tuberculosis.

Mrs. Jones formerly was a teacher, and was one of the county's best women. She was a member of the Baptist Church. She was a daughter of Henry and Mrs. Luvin Ratliff, of Harold.

Besides her husband and parents, Mrs. Jones is survived by five children, Pauline, Rachel, Joyce, Dora and Walter, and by seven brothers and four sisters: William Ratliff, Ashland; Mrs. Jane Green Craven, Ky.; Mrs. Draxle Ramsey and Mrs. May Ford, of Pikeville; Mrs. America Gott, Regina, Ky.; Mrs. Dorothy Staton, Road Fork, Ky.; Mrs. Molle Wright, Davie; George S. and Everett Ratliff, of Harold, and Milton, Ratliff, Jackson, Texas.

Funeral rites were conducted from the home of the victim's parents, the Rev. Jas. Stratton, of Banner, officiating. Burial was made in the Ferguson cemetery.

### CASH TRIPPLETT UNDER ARREST

**Sheriff Stumbo Goes To Alabama for Prisoner; Triplett Escapes**

The sheriff's office here Friday morning received a wire from Marion, Ala., that Triplett had escaped jail. O. H. Stumbo, office deputy was unable to intercept Sheriff M. T. Stumbo with news of the escape so the sheriff is making what appears to be a long trip to vain.

Cash Triplett, wanted for months by Floyd county authorities on a charge of wilful murder in the slaying at Lackey of Ben Scott, is in jail at Marion, Alabama, as this was written Thursday and Sheriff M. T. Stumbo and Deputy Sheriff R. B. Allen left Thursday morning to return Triplett to this county for trial. Triplett was arrested by Sheriff Reynolds at Selma, Alabama.

En route to Alabama, the officers took to Frankfort four prisoners one of whom was Harrison Frazier, to begin serving penitentiary sentence. Frazier was convicted a few days ago of the slaying of L. E. Crisp at Martin and given a life sentence. Others taken, by the officers their offenses and terms follow: Gordon Salisbury, shooting and wounding Ted Morgan, one year; Harry Johnson and Jimmy Salvers grand larceny, one year each.

Sheriff Stumbo has been in communication with Alabama authorities for several weeks, and Triplett's arrest has been expected for several days.

### NEWSPAPER ITEM CAUSES ARRESTS

The men gave their names as Calvin Barto, 27, Rockford, Ky., and Edsel Centers, 23, Gad, Ky. They later convinced police that they were connected with the Ousley slaying for which Billy Hughes is sought.

**Three Stores Here Entered Early Friday Morning; Officers Chase Suspect**

By the simple expedient of forcing open front doors, burglars entered three stores here early Friday morning and escaped with \$200 in cash and merchandise valued at from \$200 to \$300.

The New Modern Drug Shop, Francis Cash Store and the City Drug Store were entered, all in the same manner.

An attempt was made to enter Hughes Drug Store, the lock being damaged by the burglar who evidently used a crowbar in prying the doors open, but this store was not entered.

From the safe of the New Modern Drug Shop \$125 in cash was taken. Curtis Clark, owner of the store, said that he had not found any merchandise missing.

The haul from Francis' Cash Store consisted of \$25 in cash and the following items of merchandise: four suits of men's clothing, three silk dresses, four pairs Nunn-Bush shoes, two pairs ladies' slippers, men's underwear, baby dresses, Arrow shirts and two suitcases. Nothing was taken from the City Drug Store.

Sheriff M. T. Stumbo and deputies Friday morning pursued a suspect in the robbers who left here in a Hudson automobile bearing a Pennsylvania license, but when this was written had not found him.

### SUICIDE THEORY IS HELD IN DEATH OF KNOTT DRUGGIST

**Shelby Clark, Son of Prominent Educator, Dies of Revolver Wounds**

#### IS THRICE SHOT

Shelby Clark, 26 years old, son of Prof. George Clark, noted Eastern Kentucky educator, died in the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, Tuesday night as the result of revolver wounds he is said to have self-inflicted.

Mr. Clark, a pharmacist and one of this county's finest young men is said to have stated that he shot himself is thought to have been

The shooting took place at Mollie Gearhart's restaurant, about five miles from Hindman. The young man is said to have drawn a .32-caliber revolver without warning to two other young men who had accompanied him to the restaurant, then fired the shots.

The victim is well-known in this county where his father formerly was a teacher. He was associated with his father in the Hindman Drug store. He is survived by his parents, one brother, Bramlett, and three sisters, Misses Thelma, Marjorie and Topay Clark. The body was taken to Hindman Wednesday, with funeral services and burial being conducted Thursday afternoon.

#### NO SURRENDER! SAYS REYNOLDS

W. J. Reynolds, of Martin said this week that he has no intention of surrendering the office of county treasurer as ordered by the fiscal court without a scrap. He said that attorneys now are preparing his appeal to the Floyd circuit court from the ruling of the fiscal court.

The fiscal court dismissed Mr. Reynolds as treasurer recently, asked for bids and hired George P. Archer, of the Bank Josephine as treasurer.

Reynolds was asked to surrender all records of the office but has 10 days in which to comply with the directions of the court.

### THREE OFFICERS ARE INDICTED IN MARTIN SLAYING

**Castles, Layne and Meade's Trial on Murder Charge Set For Tuesday**

#### EXECUTE BOND

As a result of the slaying at Wayland Saturday night of last week of French Martin, 23 years old, three officers a deputy sheriff and two Wayland policemen were indicted on charges of wilful murder here Wednesday by the Floyd

county grand jury in special session and a new murder trial is scheduled for next Tuesday in circuit court here.

Deputies Sheriff V. E. Castle and Policemen Ben Layne and Wood Meade, of Wayland, are the officers implicated in the slaying and each is under \$10,000 bond, which was executed shortly after the indictments were returned. The officers were also notified that a hearing on a plea for change of venue would be held.

Martin, a resident of Knott county, is said to have come into Wayland with a load of whisky. The officers sought to arrest him and, in doing so, pursued him to a point near the ball park at the upper end of town. A statement was not available from the officers this week, but their version of the slaying was given by a friend as follows:

When Martin, riding a mule, fled as the officers sought to arrest him, the policemen and deputy sheriff in an automobile cut him off. Thereupon, he opened fire on the officers, bullets from his revolver striking their car. The officers returned the fire. Martin falling with a bullet through his head and another through his chest. It was explained that the bullet which entered the back of Martin's head fired as the mule was whirling about during the gunfire.

Friends of Martin claim, however, that both bullets were fired into his body as he fled from the officers, that both struck him from the rear, and that he was offering no resistance to arrest other than an attempt to ride away.

It was said that Layne and Castle did the shooting. Meade participating only as driver of the car.

The officers' bonds were signed by W. M. Dingus, W. Moore, B. L. Sturgill and J. W. Burchett.
