Frank Copley Killed Saturday in Auto Wreck in County; Two Others Hurt

Frank Copley, 23 years old, advertising manager for the

Sandy Valley Grocery Company, and one of the most promising young men, was instantly killed Saturday morning when the automobile in which he was a passenger was wrecked near the Lone Cabin Inn, on the Mayo Trail, a few miles below here. Two other companions, Bill

Stapleton, 22, driver of the car, and Bucky Boyd, 18, were injured, though not seriously. The three young men resided at Paintsville.

The tragedy occurred as the trio were returning to Paintsville from Prestonsburg. A heavy fog had been explained in the driver losing sight of the road. The auto turned over one time and skidded along its side a distance of approximately 90 feet. Mr. Copley was pinned beneath the wreckage.

Mr. and Mrs. Samuel N. Copley, who was a member of a well-known Johnson county family. He had been employed by the Sandy Valley Grocery Company for several years. His funeral rites were conducted Sunday from the Mayo Memorial M. E. Church, South, and burial was made in the Preston cemetery at Paintsville.



Miss Sarah Hays, area relief supervisor, left last week for Covington, Ky. Miss Hays will be greatly missed in this area where she has worked since November 1.

Case loads must be lowered because they are decreasing everywhere at this time of year. Deciding whom to take off and whom to leave on is indeed a problem. There are those who would remove all papers and others who insist upon closing border line cases, but neither rule can be applied hard and fast. Certainly it is hard help so long, and such fair to close some which have continued assistance, and to keep on a majority of new cases, usually families whose pride prevented their applying until work was available thru-out the country. Naturally, a definite reaction to closing cases is felt. Workers dislike to have to close cases, but it is a part of the work. Clients whose cases are closed should be grateful for what they have had and remember that all closed cases do not remain closed permanently. They should also try to see how assistance by home visiting cases will be back on the country. This will decrease the load some. The new road going up Left Beaver Creek will also lower it as some relief men will receive employment here. So no mines over the county are being closed and those families will require some help, so many farm cases must be closed. It is necessary for the men to farm some, anyway. Now is the time. More foodstuffs will be available in the gardens, and families have the necessities to purchase some clothing. Provisions in food and clothing are less in summer than in winter.
