SCHOOL MEN SEEK HIGHER TEACHER PAY

Following up the petition of the Kentucky Education Association calling on Governor Kem Johnson to call a special session of the General Assembly to increase the salaries of Kentucky's underpaid teachers, county school superintendents of this section joined school officials of the state this week...

FBI Police Conference To Be Held Mar. 16 At Paintsville

The Federal Bureau of Investigation will hold a quarterly police conference at the Paintsville country club Paintsville, from 8 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. EWT, Tuesday, March 16. Police agencies from the following counties, will be invited to attend this conference, which is one of a series being held during March throughout the state of Kentucky and the entire nation under the auspices of the FBI: Floyd, Billings, Johnson, Martin, Magoffin, Morgan, Pike and Wolfe.

Instruction is given at these conferences to local law enforcement agencies who are requested in some instances to make investigations as to the proper investigative technique, for example, in the handling of Security Service cases, espionage, sabotage, and other internal security investigations.

Circuit Judge J. P. Bell, Paintsville, and Capt. E. L. Smith, superintendent of police training, Kentucky State Highway Patrol, Frankfort, will be the principal speakers on the program in addition to instructional work to be given by a representative of the FBI.

The principal topic to be discussed by the FBI at this conference will be the use of the FBI technical laboratory in connection with internal security and criminal investigations, and this discussion will include the use of blood tests, firearms examinations, glass fragments, hairs and fibers, shrapnel fragments, document exhibits, tire tracks, footprints, secret writings, forgery, and development of latent fingerprints.

NOT even the march of 50,000,000 armed men can shut out our dreams. I was thinking about this while sitting at lunch with Frank Frisch.

"You are a long way from the dream you had at Bradenton, Fla. in 1935," I suggested.

Frisch smiled wistfully. "I remember that one," he finally said.

"Yes," Frank continued, "that was quite a dream. I remember the night Grandland Rice we sat under that Florida moon and you had me picked to be the first manager in five pennants and five world series in a row?"

"We had just signed Babe Ruth with a great young ball club. Back of the bat I had Bill Delaney, around 22, one of the greatest young catchers I have ever saw. Smart, game, everything."

"In the box we had the two Deans, Dick and Paul, both young and strong and both great pitchers. And I don't forget Pepper Martin. What a guy. I had Durocher at short, one of the best ever. If he never batted much over .300."

Coming Up

"And don't forget," I suggested, "the meet you had coming up next year."

"I haven't forgotten that either," Frisch cut in.

"One of them was a young racker by the name of Terry Moore, coming from Columbus. Another was PRITTY PAT LITKER by the name of Johnny Miss, heading in from Rochester. That wasn't all. We had a lot of good young farm ball players on tap, who have since been here. We had everything going our way for the next four years. Don't forget a fellow named Joe Medwick. I could name you many others. And then the fave blew out."

What Happened

What happened after that was entirely too morbid for Frisch to discuss at any length, as he stared out across New York from the balcony of Florida's palms and sunshine.

Twenty-two-year-old Bill Delaney, the catching find of the day, developed a laryngitis and had to quit active play.

The two Deans, each over 6 feet 3, weighing 185 and 190 pounds, lost their fire.

Each should have been good for 10 more years—and don't forget together they were good for 50 winning games.

After this, one thing and another began to happen as the Cardinals finally had to wait eight years before they finally overcame the Dodgers to win last fall.

They put Frisch out, although he had turned in a great managing job, and struggled along with others until they finally came to Billy Southworth, another able manager. And all this was something that Fate, not Frank Frisch, controlled along the rocky road to destiny.

Dix and Delaney

"There was the battery," Frisch said. "Dixzy Dean and Bill Delaney. I'd say in 1934 when Dix was right that he was the greatest pitcher I ever saw. Especially in a hot line."

"Don't forget he gave me and left me many a heady day. He was as content as a house as he came to the mound to ready to handle as he came."

"But he could pitch. Any time for my money. You know he wanted to pitch the entire series against the Tigers. I can't tell you how straight, Dix was, one or can win four out of five. I believe he could. Kibing speed, a great slow ball, perfect control, any sort of curve, a cool head and a stout heart—and perfect confidence in himself. He would never have quit baseball. He still would have made a fine first baseman or a good outfielder."

"Delaney? The greatest young catcher baseball ever lived at. Another Dickey, Cuchane or Hatnett. Maybe better."

"Let's wake up," Frisch said. "The dream ended eight years ago."

Frisch was one of the brightest football and baseball stars our two ending games have ever known. Favored with physical skill, Frisch was even more important on the quick thinking, competitive side.

"Too many people forget," Frank told me, "just how important any overlooked sport is. Competitive sport has a side that has been overlooked. And I mean in connection with any form of the war game we face today."

What Competition Means

"Hard competition," Frisch said, "means, first of all, complete concentration under fire. It's the fire of the football field, baseball, basketball, boxing and other games."



"The state of Kentucky has fallen far short in appropriation of funds necessary to provide an efficient system of public schools as required by our Constitution. We are not unmindful of the fact that small sums of money have been added to the school funds from time to time, but we all know and all should admit that more money is available and can be appropriated for public schools now! The state of Kentucky could and should appropriate four million dollars on a per capita basis for use in the school year 1943-44. Every day and week, we are losing our best teachers because of low salaries paid. We need leadership and action, rather than excuses.

"The Floyd county school system and its 360 teachers urge you to assume this leadership, and call a special session of the Legislature for the purpose of appropriating extra money for teacher salaries for the ensuing school term.

The action now under way has been under discussion in K. E. A. circles since the January meeting of the board of directors at Louisville. Meanwhile, the Eastern Kentucky Education Association, meeting at Ashland, adopted a resolution calling for a special session of the Legislature to raise teaching salaries to a parity with the increased cost of living.

The Ashland resolution points out that a special session could appropriate supplementary salaries out of the cash surplus now on hand. Treasurer Ernest Shannon's net cash balance as of close of business Feb. 27, was \$8,865,971. The anticipated surplus at close of this fiscal year, June 30, has been set from \$8,500,000 to \$9,000,000.

Gov. Cawthon's action is not an isolated example of unrest within Kentucky teaching circles. Franklin county, in response to demands, has raised teachers \$18 a month. City teachers at Newport have requested a raise of 1 per cent. Teachers at Ashland have asked for an increase to their 1930 salary standards. A salary increase at Lexington became effective March 1. It will amount to \$24,000 a year.

Only eight states pay lower teaching salaries than Kentucky. The average salary of teachers, supervisors and principals in this state is only \$828 a year, according to the National Education Association.

George L. Evans, director of finance for the Department of Education, has calculated the average annual salary of county business teachers at \$611; independent districts, excluding cities of the first four classes, \$877; and cities of the first four classes, \$1,296.

Governor Johnson, citing the fact that 50 cents out of each of the state's general fund dollars already is appropriated for education, said there is not enough money available to raise teaching salaries to the level of war wages.

"I am sorry that we are doing for them is not enough," the Governor said.

The Governor added that other state employes are underpaid, when their salaries are considered in comparison with war wages.


