

Conn Says German Shellfire Is Worst He Has Encountered





thern and eastern counties where temperatures were lower and where snow and ice has prevailed for weeks, the commissioner explained, but reports show considerable damage in other sections.

"The main roads have held up fairly well, considering the punishment they have taken," he added, "but rural roads and the thinner surfaces of the secondary roads are in bad shape."

Some county roads are impassable, he reported, and later inspection may show that conditions will get more serious, but that material is scarce and hauling equipment is the worst bottleneck.



BUY WAR BONDS! RRA lines were serving 43,750 rural consumers, but 75.7 per cent of rural homes were still without electric service. The Public Service Commission order handed down Jan. 22 gave Kentucky and West Virginia authority to make 151 rural extensions, totaling 1,156 miles, to serve 7,108 additional farm homes in the 16 mountain counties already served by the utility. The project is estimated to cost \$3,085,808, and is scheduled to proceed as rapidly as priorities can be obtained. R. E. Hodges, general manager of Kentucky & West Virginia, testified at the hearing that if the permit were granted he proposed to reduce rural rates in the aggregate of \$18,500 the first year and \$4,000 during the second year. Managers of the four co-operative utilities testified they already had projected plans to serve the territory in issue, signed up customers, secured rights-of-way easements and applied for allotments to finance the work as quickly as war developments would allow.
