Immediately following the dinner at the Mansion the Committee went into a private session at the Mansion, the following full membership being present: Dr. C. Howard of Glasgow, chairman, Senator Cass Walden, as secretary, J. B. Everett,

as ex-officio chairman, Claude Hammons, Laurence Ashmore and W. G. Sizemore, also Assistant Attorney General Harry Wilson, counsel for the Commission, was present. After the Committee of Locations and Sites had thus come into private session the architect came in and handed to each member of the Committee a 65-page report. I then entered a motion which carried unanimously for the secretary to read the report. By the provisions of this

report, the following sites for the sanatoriums were recommended by the Committee, which report was then taken up by the committee, starting with District No. 1. In considering the site for District No. 1, the Committee voted unanimously for Madisonville.

In view of the fact that Hazelwood Sanatorium is already located in District No. 2, Louisville, this district was passed by the Committee.

Regarding the location in District No. 3, the Committee, with J. B. Everett not present and while we were in Covington had voted and incorporated in the report by a unanimous agreement making the location in this district No. 3 at Covington. When we came to consider this location in this district, Mr. J. B. Everett asked to be permitted to make a statement. He then requested the Committee to reconsider its report as to Covington and make the location in District No. 3 at Paris, and gave as his reason for his said request that Covington is on the banks of the Ohio river and adjacent to the state of Ohio and that it is commonly known that the Ohio river for many miles is located at Covington, and also that Covington is too close to Cincinnati to be a desirable site to vote to make the location at Paris.

When District No. 4 came up for consideration and vote, it appeared from the above mentioned written report by the Committee, by one vote, that the location in Floyd county, was recommended by the Committee. Commissioner Ashmore was the member of the Committee who voted against the Allen location and for Ashland. He cast his vote, notwithstanding his repeated pledges to me and the entire Committee that he would vote for Allen.

We then took up the location in District No. 5. The Committee then, at the location at Allen, Floyd county, voted four to one in favor of Corbin. Commissioner Ashmore again cast the dissenting vote for London, although he had repeatedly pledged to the Committee, and especially to Claude Hammons, that he would vote for Corbin.

We then took up the location in District No. 6. By a majority vote of the above mentioned report of the Committee by a unanimous vote, the Committee had recommended the location to be made at Glasgow and the report of the Committee at this meeting at the Mansion was unanimously adopted and the location made at Glasgow.

After the above action had been taken by the said Committee on Sites and Locations, J. B. Everett, asked the Committee and each member and everyone present as a whole not to reveal or disclose the above set out action of the Committee until it should again meet next day, Thursday, in the New Office Building in the Board members room of the Workmen's Compensation Board with the full membership of twelve Commissioners present. This request by J. B. Everett was agreed to by every one present. This meeting then adjourned as above set-out till the next day.

Immediately after the adjournment at the Mansion, another Commissioner and I went to our rooms at the Capitol hotel, where we had a conference with Commissioner Ashmore for the purpose of trying to find out why he had changed his position or pledge. He could give us no answer other than the meaningless statement that "There are things you fellows don't know about." This Ashmore's room where we found him talking to another Commissioner. While there a telephone call came out of the room, and asked us to await his return, which we did. Later another telephone call was made and Commissioner Ashmore was called out of his room and did not return before we left.

Early next morning, not later than 8:30, Ralph Roman, the Governor's secretary, appearing at the hotel. I immediately talked to him and told him that I was of the opinion that the "underhand" work was going on. He became angry and said to me, "There have been two locations recommended by the Committee and the location at Allen is one of the two that should be considered."

Upon the convening of the whole Commission at the New Office Building next morning, at 10 A.M., the above mentioned Sites and Locations Committee report, was read immediately upon it being read I moved for the adoption by the Commission of this report which would have made the location at Allen, Chairman J. B. Everett, who was presiding, took the vote of the Commission as a whole and the vote as actually stood at six to six. It was then necessary, which was done, to take up the location of sites district by district, and in the vote between Ashland and Allen the vote of the Commission as a whole was eight to four in favor of Ashland, again J. B. Everett and Ashmore voting for Ashland. It may be noted that J. B. Everett cast his vote in favor of Ashland and against Allen and made no explanation to the Commission as to his sudden change in attitude respecting the placing of one of these much needed sanatoriums on the banks of the Ohio river as explained at the Mansion the night before, as above set out.

The above mentioned 65-page architect's report, copies of which had been given to the Committee the night before, was for the first time handed the other members of the Commission not exceeding ten minutes prior to the time of their casting their above mentioned vote as between Ashland and Allen, neither of the Commissioners who had thus received this lengthy report had time to actually read or study the said report.

Again I say that this statement is made that the record might be clear, and the "wessel" worded explanation made by the Governor as well might be, but the Committee have issued a statement that he had nothing to do with the moving of the State Highway station from Pikeville, Ky., to Ashland, Ky. For reasons known, it seems only to himself, the Governor seems to have

acquired a habit of by-passing the Big Sandy region of Kentucky. It is commonly known that his success in this respect was primarily due to the clients represented by him in the Big Sandy region of Kentucky. It is a well known fact that he has literally stuck the dagger in a mortal wound to the backs of hundreds of members of his own party in the counties of Boyd, Lawrence, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin, Floyd and Pike. These men, as members of his party, were his earliest and truest friends and made great sacrifices in both time and money to further his, the Governor's, interest.

For the first time in many decades not a single appointive administrative head of one of the state departments of government comes from either of the counties of Lawrence, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin, Floyd or Pike, whose appointment is in any way due to the Governor's influence. It is very "child's play" to say that the change in vote of the Commission respecting the location of the sanatorium at Ashland instead of Allen was not directly chargeable to the underhand, unfair and unbecoming tactics of the Governor working through his "Heutenants." That the record might be kept clear, it might be remembered that the Governor is in no wise entitled to any honor respecting the passage of legislation authorizing the establishment of the tuberculosis sanatorium at Ashland, and I will remember that for the first time in the history of Kentucky a Legislature convened and the Governor was unable to present it with the usual Budget Bill. He had taken the New York time "will-o'-the-wisp" Presidential nomination in Kentucky and it was a matter of common knowledge at the convening of the 1944 session that every member of the Legislature, regardless of party, owing to war conditions, desired to meet, pass the necessary legislation and adjourn at the earliest possible date after the "will-o'-wisp" for the first time for a Legislature to write its own Budget Bill, in its own special session, but as a result of the above mentioned "wisp" the special session was called. It is a matter of common knowledge that it must be admitted, the membership of the Legislature, including many of the leaders of the Governor's own party urged the Governor to call a general budget session and he was especially requested and urged to include in this act a call for an authorization for the necessary legislation for the tuberculosis sanatorium. The Governor at least three times issued statements that he would not make such a call. In spite of his repeated statements that he would not make such a call, the legislature of Kentucky, by almost unanimous vote, tried and

passed a general budget bill and passed the necessary legislation as to the tuberculosis sanatorium and it was only after such was done and after the members of his own party had joined with the Democrats in passing such legislation that the Governor was forced to and did make such a call.

He made these repeated statements with full knowledge that he was jeopardizing not only the chances of passage of enabling legislation but likewise as to the proper functioning of practically every branch of the state government.

Therefore, I again repeat, he can claim no honor for such legislation. The teachers of Kentucky who made the fight for their increase in salaries and it is a matter of such common knowledge that it makes it useless to repeat that the Governor "snuffed the ball" in respect to the teachers and they, the teachers, know who actually served them. The most noteworthy achievement of the Governor is that he has united the Democrats of Kentucky as never before and has split the members of his own party into warring camps in practically every part of Kentucky.

I went to Frankfort as a member of the Kentucky Legislature with only two things in mind as of particular importance: substantial aid to the poorly paid school teachers of Kentucky and passing of legislation to aid the thousands of Kentuckians suffering from tuberculosis and my record shows that I performed my duties in this respect. It is a sad state of affairs that after months of personal study and investigation by a committee selected for that purpose, the sick and dying of Kentucky are not to be truly served and to have the efforts of this committee nullified and held for naught covered by two or three selfish and uninformed politicians. It was in this case, I have nothing but the kindest of feelings toward Mr. E. W. Seaton, the Commissioner at Ashland, who as a member naturally insisted that Ashland be selected. However, the Governor of Kentucky should have, at least, been wise enough to see Kentucky as a whole. This he failed to do. Tuberculosis patients from the Big Sandy section will undoubtedly go to either Richmond, Paris or Lexington where they will, at least, get away from the "Ohio river fog" as expressed by J. B. Everett. Either of these places is approximately as close to the Big Sandy as is Ashland. "Again and Again and Again!" I say, let the record speak.

The Kentucky and West Virginia Power Company provides electric service in this and in 15 other counties in Eastern Kentucky. We serve approximately 35,000 consumers throughout this area, and a large percentage of the volume of our electric power is used to operate major industries, such as coal, steel, brick, oil, gas, chemical, and leather.

With the development and growth of the towns and urban centers, we have also been endeavoring to provide electric service to the rural sections of the area we serve. Rural Electrification, from a practical standpoint both to the consumer and the company, has been made possible only during the past fifteen years, with the development of new materials and methods to bring the cost within feasible reach of the people living in the rural communities.

During the past fifteen years, or rather from 1930 until the start of the war, we have extended our service along more than 900 miles of rural lines. The construction of these lines during this period which, in the majority of cases are main or feeder lines, now makes possible further extensions and has made power available to Rural Co-operatives serving in several of these counties. With our last rate reduction which became effective September 1, 1944, the consumers on these lines are receiving service on a monthly minimum basis of \$2.00 or less, or \$5.00 per mile, with a standard rate per kilowatt hour the same as in towns and congested areas. This is the lowest rate available in this area.

We have recently applied to and received the permission of the Public Service Commission of Kentucky to construct 1186 additional miles of rural lines in these counties. It is our plan to construct as many of these lines this year as may be eligible under present war-time restrictions and regulations. The remaining lines which are not eligible will be made ready for actual construction as rapidly as possible, looking forward to the time when materials will be available.

Any of our offices can advise you if your community is included in this immediate program. If not, and you desire us to investigate the possibility of securing service, we will be glad to do so. We are taking this means to advise you that it is our intention to make electric service available to every section of every county in which we operate just as rapidly as you desire or as conditions will permit.
