## There IS a Law "Agin It"

MOST encouraging feature of the federal court trial of Harlan countians, charged with fraud in the election of Senator A. B. Chandler in 1942, is found in the court holding that the "big-boys", those who organized the one-gal-lus ward-healers into an election crime-ring, should suffer the heaviest penalties. Clarence Poer, former Harlan county Jailor, received the heaviest penalty of two years in prison and a \$5,000 fine as ring-leader; and Clyde Saylor, a former state employe, the next stiffest of two years in prison and a \$1000 fine as Poer's lieutenant. The other fifteen, "buck privates" in the war of politics, got off with a year and a day in the federal penitentiary and fines of \$100 each.

But the startling feature of the entire proceeding to those ordinary citizens and voters who have despised of election crookedness finding its just deserts is the fact that anybody at all was convicted.

These skeptics are the voters and citizens who have seen elections in their home counties dominated by money and by the thievery of election officials, with the law never overtaking any individual offender.

Said Federal Judge H. Church Ford, in imposing sentences:

"Harlan county has arrived at the point where public officers do not feel any responsibility to enforce the law. . . I want it clearly understood by every election officer from Harlan county who comes into this court that the penalties of the law will not be sidestepped. . . There is no difference between election thievery and the theft of an automobile."

And so the voters do at last see the law exacting just penalty from violators of a law which intimately concerns the lowliest and the greatest among us.

County and state courts have utterly failed to curb election fraud in local elections. In Floyd county, for instance, a scattered few are indicted from time to time for vote-buying or vote stealing; but many may be called for prosecution, yet few are chosen to suffer the consequences they richly deserve.

If the Harlan county election fraud case can be followed up over the counties of Kentucky and throughout the nation in every federal election, a clearer expression of the will of the people will result in all elections. Moreover, Senate committees will not be blindly reporting, as they did last week, the expenditure of near fifty millions of dollars in a national election without a trace of law violation.

HEADQUARTERS WITH INFANTRY DIVISION (Delayed)—Sgt. Billy Barga, 22, son of Mrs. Mary Hyden, Prestonsburg, Ky., has been awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in action against the enemy. Sgt. Barga, who has since returned to duty, is fighting with the American forces in the St. Nazaire and Lorent pockets in France. In addition he has been awarded the American Defense, American Ties and Good Conduct Ribbons and the Combat Infantryman's Badge. He enlisted Oct. 12, 1940 at Ft. Thomas, Ky.

## Ten Knott Countians In Same Hospital—But Not Patients

Probably the greatest concentration of Eastern Kentuckians in any space of comparative size overseas is in 132nd evacuation hospital, Sixth army group, in France.

In that hospital are 10 Knott countians—and they're not patients, either. All are members of the hospital staff. They are: Pfc. Alvis Fugate, orderly, Cpl. Maston Cornett, utility man, and Pfc. Willie Stone, ward orderly, all of Hindman; Cpl. Carl Pridemore, ward master, Amburgy; Pfc. Milton Hall, basic, Dry Creek; Cpl. Jasper Combs, truck driver, Garner; Pfc. Delmos Reynolds, ward orderly, Bigaspe; Pfc. Arley Combs, ward orderly, Red Fox; Pvt. Earl Breeding, ward orderly, Spider.

Lt. Col. George W. McCoy, a 19-year veteran of the army medical corps, hospital commander, said that skilled surgery and the use of blood plasma, whole blood, penicillin and sulfa drugs to prevent infection and build up the condition of the wounded, had produced an extremely low mortality rate for his hospital. Only four out of the first 2,000 patients died.

"I am particularly impressed by the guts of the American soldier," the colonel continued. "A soldier with the hell shot out of him will be brought in from six to 24 hours after he is wounded and you'll never hear a whimper out of him. He shows a complete confidence that what the surgeon does is right."



Lt. Morris Cites Need Of Army Service Forces For Clerical Assistance

Lt. Floyd O. Morris announced upon his arrival in Prestonsburg that the Army Service Forces with which he is connected, is in dire need of clerks, typists and stenographers for duty in Washington, D. C. A desperate Germany is now fighting back with everything they have, and with the Japanese being incited back only after the most bitter fighting, the War Department needs an ever-increasing number of clerks, typists and stenographers to maintain its efficiency, especially in such departments as the casualty branch, he said. Arrangements have been made for Miss Jean Peters to be at the U. S. Employment Service office here from March 26 through March 31 to interview applicants and make immediate appointments in the War Department in Washington. These U. S. Civil Service positions are available to both men and women who can qualify. "Washington, the nation's capital, is the hub of the world and here is an opportunity to serve this great country, help men at the fighting front and bring them home sooner," Lt. Morris stated. "It is not too difficult to qualify. Individuals must be at least 17½ years old and prove their eligibility by passing the U. S. Civil Service test. There are a limited number of positions open which do not require experience or a knowledge of typing or shorthand," Lt. Morris said. The War Department pays transportation to Washington, D. C., and new appointees are guaranteed housing facilities at moderate cost. Lt. Morris pointed out that, contrary to common belief, Washington is no more crowded than any other large city and that living costs are no higher. All appointments must comply with War Manpower Commission regulations, with the exception of World War II veterans.
