Says Business Is Not Roadhouse or Beer Joint

Editor of The Times:
On the night of January 11, 1947, at about 12:15 o'clock, Deputy Sheriff Harold Gunn and a bunch of other laws came to my store and restaurant at Boldman, Ky., and forcibly entered without my consent and arrested Frank Hall, a neighbor boy, who was behaving himself perfectly. In just a few minutes Arthur Hall, a brother of Frank Hall, ran in at the store door and Deputy Gunn charged in after him without my consent, which could have happened in my home of place of business. Arthur Hall hadn't been seen in my place for an hour and a half or more before he came in at my store door. A man dodging the law and running into the officers in front of any man's place or even a man's home would have run in at the first open door he came to.

I want the citizens of Floyd county to know I am not running a roadhouse. My license from this county was issued for a grocery store and the signs on the windows are plain—"Toler's General Merchandise." That's where the event happened. We have a piccolo machine in the store and restaurant which is all in the same room. I have a 21-room house which is rented for the purpose of living quarters. My returns are of good character and are named as follows: Jim Ham, Cely Robinson and her father, Whitely Blair, Albert Tibbs, A. Womack and Milroy Damron.

I want the law to call on all of my renters and question them under oath as to what goes on around my place of business. Also the law is requested by me to question every citizen and all drunks if they ever bought or heard of any one buying liquor or beer from me or any one in my premises. Furthermore, if any of my renters are running a game of any kind in my premises, it is beyond my knowledge. I am between two liquor and two beer joints. Their trade comes to my place for eats. They have always been nice for drunk men. I do not approve of liquor or beer in any way. And while a drunk man comes around me I have it well understood that they respect me and my business.

I am not in the bed with no political clique or any outlaw clique. I am here as a business man, to make a legal and honest living.

Whoever wrote the article in The Floyd County Times Thursday the 18th to correct that part of their statement, describing my place as a roadhouse, or I will proceed with such legal steps as necessary for any damage to me. This is not a roadhouse and is as decent as any man's home.

For nearly two years I have scraped the country from state to state for food for the people who have come from an area of 20 miles around to get scarticles to feed their families on. I am still at the people's service. The public is cordially invited to keep calling on me. No changes—just the law forced in against my will. **E. H. TOLER**

Additional Safeguards Suggested for Koppers

Several supplementary safeguards for life and property have been prescribed by a federal coal mine inspector for the 1,200-ton-a-day Weeksburg mine, near Weeksburg, the Bureau of Mines announced this week. Operated by the Koppers Coal Division of Eastern Gas and Fuel Associates, the mine employs 328 men. The property was inspected in October by Matthew J. Duncan in accordance with the Kew-TLewis agreement of May 29, 1946.

Although commending the removal of the blower fan and tubular doors on main entries in pairs to form air-locks, the inspector said a similar air-lock should be provided at the 7th booster fan installation. Where air should be circulated in certain specified entries, crosscuts should be driven promptly, and pre-shift firebox examinations should be instituted. Each section foreman carried a permissible flame safety lamp and tested for gas in places visited, the safety report disclosed.

Since a previous inspection, mining machines have been frame grounded. Duncan stated in suggesting this protection for pumps. He also recommended the elimination of risky business practices, provision for unobstructed clearance and clean strike areas along main haulways and at main line track switches, use of permissible blasting units and incombustible strappings with explosives, prompt attention to unsafe roof in several locations, control of coal dust in the intake and more extensive rock-dusting underground, additional guards for trapper wires and improved installation of a positive personal-checking plan.



Ford Cuts Prices On Cars \$15 to \$50

The Ford Motor Company, Jan. 15, in a move to halt the spiral of mounting costs and prices, reduced the price of every Ford car from \$10 to \$50.

In making the announcement Henry Ford II, president, said, "Although more than one million of our customers are waiting for delivery of their cars at present prices, we are immediately reducing the price of every Ford car—some models as much as \$50. This is a down payment toward a continued high level of production and employment in the months ahead. We believe that the shock treatment of prompt action is needed to halt the insane spiral of mounting costs and rising prices and to restore a sound base for the hopeful period of post-war production we are now entering."

The price reduction was disclosed in a press conference at Dearborn in which the entire policy committee of the Ford Motor Company participated. The new price scale was wired simultaneously to Ford dealers throughout the nation.

Mr. Ford said the company had made a modest profit for the last three months of 1946 and intended to continue to operate in the black. He said that the millions of dollars lost since V-day had been accepted as "an item of the cost of a great and victorious war."

Because they must build up depleted cash reserves or because they are still losing money, many businesses may not be able to hold low prices, he said, "but we hope that our suppliers, our employees and our other economic partners will back each to his own ability, our attempt to return to the economic pattern which has helped to make America great, the principle that high wages and a higher standard of living for all depend upon lower costs and lower prices through increasingly efficient large scale production."
