The phone system in each of these cities includes several nearby communities. Weather city is served by Southern Bell.

Other independent telephone systems in small cities and rural areas also are unaffected by the strike. An unusual situation existed at Stanford where the exchange was operating because employees are not unionized even though the plans is part of the Bell system.

Asked about the danger of a breakdown in the operations of the telephone system, an official said a sudden spurt of calls such as result after "scare" would snarl the system. However, the emergency workers could untangle the tie-up, he added.

One real danger, he said, would be a major storm. If lines were knocked down by high winds, the phones knocked out would just have to remain out until the strike is over, he said.

## A START TOWARD REAL SERVICE

THE Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club, THE TIMES believes, is altogether within its rights, and is right, in seeking an honest and equitable assessment of Prestonsburg property for taxation purposes.

It is a civic organization, and has for its motto, "We Build," a slogan Kiwanians have never seen the need for improving. Being a club dedicated to the theme of building, of rendering service to its community, it cannot close its eyes to community needs. Otherwise, it betrays its motto, it cannot build or even attempt to build.

Now, this movement to effect an equalization of assessments will cost most us—some, more than others. But

the result should be a financially stable community, able to do at least some of the things expected of modern communities. Moreover, if the job is done right, the shocking injustices wrought under the present system of assessing property values will end, and that should make less onerous to most of us the tax burden, inasmuch as all will feel that we are in this thing together, every man (or woman) sharing his or her part of the load, and his or her part only.

A sound and just system of taxation, coupled with the practice of proven business principles, will eventually place the town in such financial condition that the tax rate can be reduced, with none of us finding local taxation burdensome. And this reduction of the tax rate is something toward which the community must work, if it is to attract new businesses. For one of the first inquiries your visiting industrialist will ask is, "What is your tax rate?" The stranger proposing to locate a business here will naturally shy away from a high rate, for he will not expect from a board of supervisors the "favors" that a "home-town boy" could ask and get.

Any community worth its salt is self-supporting. Its citizens should bear the expenses and it should not expect the visitor to contribute a part by feeding a parking meter.







LOOK!—JOHN, MARY, BILL Monikers, Sans Numbers Cause Major Headache To Record-Keepers Frankfort, Ky., April 8 (Sp.)—The Jones Bros. and Smiths and their failure to include their social security number in all their correspondence, are proving a major headache to the Kentucky Unemployment Compensation Commission. Commission officials said today that similarity of names and lack of Social Security numbers by which to properly identify correspondence and claimants slows down procedural processes and has resulted in great numbers of persons receiving and cashing benefit checks to which they are not entitled. For instance, it was pointed out that there are 378 John Joneses in the Commission's Social Security files; 850 John Smiths; 375 Mary Browns, and 625 William Smiths. Finding this multiplicity of name duplication, the commission said it should be readily apparent how confusing the whole thing may be. "We cannot go solely by names in handling the program," these officials said, "for the very reason that has been pointed out. Claimants and correspondents can be properly identified only by our having their Social Security number. This should be included in every letter a claimant writes to the Commission. Persons who do not furnish the Commission with their full names and Social Security numbers are themselves, bringing about delays in processing their claims. Time lost in trying to ferret out the proper claimant when only a name or part of a name and no Social Security number are given, could be saved and the claimant receive better and quicker service. If all necessary information is included in every letter."

J. Foley Snyder, assistant director of the Commission, said today that so many benefit checks have fallen into the hands of the wrong people that the Commission has called in district federal postal inspectors in an attempt to halt this practice. Snyder cited many instances where as many as four people having exactly the same names have been getting checks meant for only one of their number, and have been able to have these checks cashed at the bank. The assistant director has urged that banks and others always ask that a person seeking to cash a benefit check issued by the Commission show his Social Security number. This number is on every check and if a person's Social Security number does not correspond with that on the check, banks and others should decline to cash the check, regardless of whether the name is the same on the check as that of the man or woman offering it. Snyder indicated that federal court action was in prospect in many cases where checks have been fraudulently cashed.

Anybody Seen Mr. Andrews-- Who Turned Water to 'Gas'? Washington, April 11—Has anybody here seen John Andrews? Just about 30 years ago—in April of 1917—a man sat in the office of Secretary of the Navy Joseph Daniels and said: "Mr. Secretary, I can furnish a substitute for gasoline at a cost of 2¢ a gallon which will put every oil company in the world out of business and I have come to offer it exclusively to the navy." Daniels looked at him in amazement. All he knew about the man was his name—John Andrews, who claimed to be a Portuguese inventor. Daniels demanded proof Andrews answered calmly: "You don't have to take my word for it. Just give me a chance to demonstrate." Daniels repeated this conversation to his assistant—a young man named Franklin D. Roosevelt. Roosevelt assisted the inventor should be given the test. A few days later Andrews gave the test. He put about a gallon of water into a can and then added something to the water. He poured the mixture from his metal can into an engine's empty gas tank. One of the navy men interrupted him. "Mr. Andrews," he said, "while it is a chance to prove his statement, you mix the liquid and we cannot certify that you used the water in your can—even if it runs the engine." Andrews replied, "Get me another bucket of water so you'll know that I'm not hiding anything. It is at least one-half water." This was done. Andrews poured another half-gallon of water into the tank. A mechanic started the engine. It roared to life. Next day Andrews was taken into a court room. There was no plea to hide anything. He was searched carefully. This time the officer took a look at what he put into the water. It was a greenish-colored liquid in a four ounce vial. He poured six or seven drops into the gallon of water. The test engine using the fuel operated as if real gasoline were being used. Daniels congratulated the inventor. "How much do you want for it?" he asked. Andrews' reply was quick and to the point. "Two million dollars, Mr. Secretary." Daniels agreed that if the mixture was all it seemed to be, \$2,000,000 was cheap. But he told Andrews he wanted to know if there was a large enough quantity of the mysterious

chemicals used, and if the production cost would be prohibitive. Andrews refused to give any assurance as to quantity and price. Daniels insisted and Andrews became angry. He stormed from the office, shouting, "If the United States doesn't want my mixture, I know a country which won't hedge over price." Daniels asked naval intelligence to check on Andrews' whereabouts. It failed. But the story leaked out, and a reporter for a New York paper traced Andrews to the suburbs of Pittsburgh. Andrews had disappeared—and no trace of him ever has been found. 

### NEWS FOR THE VETERAN

#### MACHINES AID IN CARE OF VA MENTAL CASES

A comprehensive program in recording and interpreting "brain waves" is being expanded by the Veterans Administration in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky to aid in the diagnosis of neurological disorders. Officials at the VA's regional branch office in Columbus, O., said this week.

Technically known as electroencephalography, the process of recording brain waves by machine is becoming an increasingly important diagnostic method in VA hospitals and mental hygiene clinics.

The machines are now in operation in Cleveland (Ohio), Chillicothe and Dayton, O.; Dearborn and Ft. Custer, Michigan; Lexington and Louisville, Ky. Positions also are open in VA mental hygiene clinics in Cleveland, Cincinnati and Dayton. Salaries range from \$4,149 to \$6,975 annually. Applications should be sent to the VA's Columbus Branch Office.

#### VA HAS OPENINGS IN PSYCHIATRIC PROGRAM

The Veterans Administration has several openings for psychiatrists in its hospitals and mental hygiene clinics in Ohio, Michigan and Kentucky. The three states which are under jurisdiction of the VA's Branch Office No. 8 in Columbus, O. Openings are available in VA hospitals at Cleveland (Ohio), Chillicothe and Dayton, O.; Dearborn and Ft. Custer, Michigan; and Lexington and Louisville, Ky. Positions also are open in VA mental hygiene clinics in Cleveland, Cincinnati and Dayton. Salaries range from \$4,149 to \$6,975 annually. Applications should be sent to the VA's Columbus Branch Office.

#### VA EXEMPTS DRILL PAY FROM INCOME REPORTS

Veterans in school and in job-training programs under the G. I. Bill may receive drill pay as members of the National Guard and National Reserve. This pay is not reported as income. VA officials explained that drill pay is not considered compensation for aggregate labor and therefore is not reported against assistance allowances veterans receive from VA.

#### ADVISE DISABLED VETS OF TRAINING BENEFITS

Education and job-training benefits available to disabled veterans are more liberal under the Vocational Rehabilitation Act (Public Law 49) than under the G. I. Bill (Public Law 349). It is emphasized by officials at the Ohio-Michigan-Kentucky Branch Office of the Veterans Administration in Columbus, Ohio.

#### VA OFFICIALS SAID THAT IN NEARLY every instance it is to the advantage of a disabled veteran to receive his schooling or job-training under provisions of Public Law 16.

Under the G. I. Bill, veterans may be entitled to one year of education plus the time they spent in service up to a maximum of four years. Job-training courses under the G. I. Bill generally are limited to two years. Also, under the G. I. Bill, veterans are affected by the \$175-\$300 monthly income-subsistence ceiling.

Under Public Law 16, disabled veterans may enroll in educational or training courses of sufficient length to permit them to overcome their handicaps. However, these courses usually do not extend beyond four years. They are advised to R. W. Smith, Hotel Whitehouse, Elsworth, Kansas.

#### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. I have a blue discharge from the army. Am I entitled to any of the benefits under the G. I. Bill?

A. If you have other than an honorable discharge, you may request VA to review the circumstances under which it was issued. If it is found that your discharge was issued under conditions other than dishonorable, you will be eligible for benefits under the G. I. Bill.

Q. Will VA accept collect telephone calls made by physicians who wish to ascertain whether they will be paid for emergency treatments given veterans?

A. Yes.

Q. Can I borrow on my converted G. I. insurance?

A. Yes. Any converted policy in force by payment of premiums one year or longer affords the insured the right to borrow up to 85 per cent of the cash value by submitting a proper loan agreement to the VA prior to the expiration of the grace period.

Q. I am a World War I veteran and I was married in June, 1945. Is my wife entitled to receive a pension when I die?

A. A widow of a World War I veteran, if she otherwise qualifies, is entitled to receive a pension if she was married to the veteran before Dec. 14, 1944, or for 10 or more years. Consequently, your wife would not be eligible for pension if you die less than 10 years after your marriage.

Q. Is there a time limit for filing for a waiver of premiums on G. I. insurance by the insured, and how far back may a waiver be granted?

A. Application for waiver of premium should be made by the insured immediately after he has been totally disabled for six months. Ordinarily, his waiver will not be made effective for more than one year prior to the date of application. However, VA may make the waiver effective in excess of one year where it is determined that the insured's failure to make timely application was due to circumstances beyond his control.

### Martin Street Work On Highway Program



The work at Martin includes sidewalk construction and is designed to relieve a serious traffic problem there where pedestrians shunning the mud and raking the highway, are endangered.





## AGAIN ASK GOV. WILLIS

### To Raise Salaries Of State Teachers For 1947-48 Term

Directors of the Kentucky Education Association Friday again renewed their request for a special session of the Legislature to appropriate funds for increased teacher pay in the state.

Resolutions adopted by the KEA directors follow:

Whereas, this Board of Directors of the K.E.A. did respectfully petition Governor Willis on December 30, 1946 to immediately call a special session of the General Assembly of Kentucky to meet the urgent needs of public education existing at that time by the appropriation of \$10,500,000 from surplus funds in the state treasury for the purpose of increasing the salaries of the public school teachers of the state for the calendar year 1947, and

Whereas, Governor Willis on February 5, 1947 informed the Board of Directors that he would give their request his immediate and favorable consideration and would notify this board and the public of his decision, and

Whereas, this Board of Directors did amend its petition to Governor Willis on March 19, 1947 to the extent that it was requested that the \$10,500,000 be appropriated for the school year beginning July 1, 1947, instead of for the calendar year 1947, said amendment being prompted by the lapse of time since the original request was made and the fact that the present school year is rapidly drawing to a close, and

Whereas, no decision has yet been announced by Governor Willis and

Whereas, it is now time for the payment of teachers for the school year beginning July 1, 1947, and a great many teachers have signified their intention of not renewing their contracts at present low salaries, and

Whereas, many school districts are now levying the maximum tax rate but have such a low valuation of property subject to taxation that substantial increases in teachers' salaries are impossible from local revenues, and

Whereas, any additional state aid for teachers' salaries must be provided within the very near future if it is to be most effective in securing well trained and qualified teachers for the coming year,

Therefore, be it resolved by the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Education Association, in session, this 4th day of April, 1947:

1. That it renew its request to Governor Willis that a special session of the Kentucky General Assembly of Kentucky be called immediately for the purpose of appropriating \$10,500,000 from surplus funds now in the state treasury to increase the salaries of the teachers in the public schools and state institutions of higher learning in Kentucky for the ensuing school year, beginning July 1, 1947.

2. That it respectfully request all members of all political parties to declare a moratorium on politics during such proposed special sessions to the end that the funds may be appropriated and the benefits of the increased funds may be secured to the school children of Kentucky just as speedily as possible.

3. That it invites all teachers, civic organizations and forward-looking Kentuckians to support this request, which is so vital to the future welfare of Kentucky, by sending letters, telegrams and other communications to Governor Willis asking that the special session be called immediately.

4. That a copy of these resolutions be released to the press and be mailed to the proper officials of all local educational groups and other state organizations.







TIDBITS OF KENTUCKY FOLKLORE

CRADLES

JUST a few days ago some tourists came by my house with the customary luggage all over the car but with an unusual addition, an old-fashioned box-cradle. Somehow the idea of a box cradle and that of an automobile did not seem harmonious. One suggests a time reaching back to pioneer days and beyond; the other represents time as recent as one can imagine. In fact, cradles of any kind have almost vanished from the face of the earth, I am told. Modern health specialists, who have done away with drinking quinine and slates, have said that rocking a baby adies its poor little brain. And trotting a baby in a straight-backed chair is now under the ban, too. It was otherwise when we were growing up, even if the health specialists cannot prevent my rehearsing some of the things that many of us still living, added brains and all, remember with pleasure.

The oldest cradles I can remember were made of a goods-box with rockers added. The great advantage of this was the baby was easy to reach and, besides, he did not hurt himself if he jumped out. It was particularly handy once, rather unaccountably, in the case of a box cradle. One of our neighbors, feeling that restlessness that often attacks middle-aged people, sold his farm and moved his whole family to Oregon. After the sale was over, there was left only the box-cradle that had rocked his 10 children. Nobody wanted it. I took it home and used it for a degrading a box to which a certain amount of sentiment still clung.

As people rose in wealth and respectability, the cradles rose, too. Then came the highly ornate ones, with all the flutings and knobs and carvings that made the Victorian Age famous. It was in such a cradle that I was rocked, a strongly-built one, for it had rocked some nine before me, and it still had much service to render to some of the grand-children long after childhood days were over. I wanted to get back into that cradle when I was sick. It and the trundle bed are always associated in my memory as emblems of childhood dreams, whether of day or night. I just cannot remember the last time I slept in a cradle, but I felt like a big boy when my sister, two years older than I, begged to be put into the cradle when she had chicken pox. Mother had to lay the bed with feather beds and such like, for sister stuck out beyond the confines of the cradle. I recall that a checkerboard, properly padded, was added to make the bed long enough. It must have "hope," as some of our neighbors, and yours, would have said, for sister is still very much alive.

Group Would Abolish Farm Incentive Pay

Cincinnati, O., March 25—The Ohio River Division of the Mississippi Valley Association today recommended that the federal government abolish the present system of incentive payments to farmers for practicing soil conservation measures and substitute "adequate funds for technical services, education and research."

The result would be saving a "great deal of money . . . and more real conservation of our land and water resources," said the organization in a resolution adopted at the concluding session of its annual meeting here today.

During a discussion of soil conservation, LeRoy Ballinger, of Cincinnati, a member of the Ohio Conservation Commission, declared residents of the Central West are only about six inches away from the Great American Desert instead of many hundreds of miles.

"That six inches is the average depth of good topsoil in this region which we are letting wash away from under us down the rivers to the salt. I am glad to assure you, however, that the farmers in this region are taking an interest in soil conservation measures and that the bankers are sympathetic to their interests."

The principal speaker was Brig. Gen. Douglas L. West, Ohio River Division engineer, who advised other Ohio river states to "emulate Indiana's example" and set up special commissions to work with the corps of engineers in developing and recommending to Congress flood control projects.

FEBRUARY SAW WORK AT PEAK

For 6-Month Period In Area Coal Mines, USES Report Says

Employment at 14 coal mines in the area composed of Floyd, Johnson, Martin, Magoffin and Morgan counties stood with the end of February at the six-month peak of 5,812, according to employment data furnished by the U. S. Employment Service here.

Since last September the number of veterans working in and around coal mines of the five-county area has steadily increased, with a total of 832 ex-servicemen now being at mine work.

At the end of February, 230 additional men were needed at six Floyd county mines. Plumbers, brickmasons and other skilled building trades workers are in great demand in almost every urban area. Jobs are fairly plentiful in most sections of the country, but the lack of housing makes it almost impossible for outsiders to accept these jobs.

Of the 2,574 active applications for employment on file in the Prestonsburg office on Feb. 25, 2,050 were veterans and 524 were females. Many applicants with coal mining experience are now unwilling to accept employment in local mines. As a result of this, 12 coal mines from other sections of Kentucky were hired by Floyd county mines in February. Some of these men came from points as far as 250 miles away.

The USDS office was able to place five veterans as hospital attendants in a Veterans hospital at Battle Creek, Michigan in February. The rate of pay on these jobs, including overtime, is approximately \$200 a month. A minimum of an eighth grade education is required.
