

## "Sound, Needful . . . and Should Be Constructed . . ."

EVERY group that has made a detailed study of the Big Sandy canalization program has given the proposed river improvement its unqualified approval. The Congress of the United States would be the exception, but it has made no detailed study of the projected improvements. Sectional rivalries, championship by legislators of economic causes and a dismal ignorance of the importance of the waterway contributed to last year's failure of the Congress to join those who had made a careful study of the program.

The Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company quite naturally opposes the program. Although its officials conceivably could feel, as many others do, that the waterway would not be injurious to the railroad in this section, they naturally do not welcome competition.

This newspaper has never been unfriendly to the railroad company. This attitude rises from two considerations: the railroad's pioneering in industrial development of this section and its contribution to the state's economy.

But now, with the railroad having richly profited on its investments in the Big Sandy, and with it threatened no more by waterway development than the Norfolk & Western was imperiled by canalization of the Kanawha, THE TIMES cannot condone its fight against a move that may mean the future industrial life of the section.

The U.S. corps of engineers, the U.S. board of engineers, the Rivers and Harbors committee of Congress and the National Rivers and Harbors Congress—all have given the Big Sandy project their unqualified approval.

The project is sound, needful, sufficiently advanced in status, and should be promptly constructed in the public interest." So reads the stamp of approval placed on the Big Sandy waterway program as one of twelve over the nation placed in "Class One" by the National Rivers and Harbors Congress.

The only by-product coal available to mid-continent America lies in the Big Sandy and Kanawha districts. The Kanawha has water transportation. Big Sandy has not. They are competitors for this great inland market. Railroad freight rates have been increased; they may be raised repeatedly. And Big Sandy coal will have to pay the tariff while Kanawha coal benefits from lower water transportation.

Indeed, the time may come when, boom days gone, the king that is coal in the Big Sandy may be dead because of inability to live in competition with coal that can be marketed with water at much less cost.

The Big Sandy waterway program is not dead, however. It suffered a setback in Congress, but it is now rising to fight again another day.

The production and economic life of the section depends upon this next fight in Congress. It is important that those who believe this cause to be just do a bit of battle on the "home front."

# Why I Am for Earle C. Clements For Governor of Kentucky

All of us can save money which is an easy task, but it is hard to operate on a budget and keep the state out of debt without placing a greater tax burden on the people. Increased appropriations such as Mr. Waterfield proposes mean increased taxation. I am afraid that he cannot fulfill his promises unless we, the people, pay dearly for them.



**Rural Power Co-Op State Meet To Hear Views of Candidates**

When will Kentucky's 150,000 farm families still live by kerosene lamp? That is a question that members of the Kentucky Rural Electric Co-operative Corporation wish they could answer, and one which will be foremost in their minds at state meetings to be held in Louisville, June 22-23.

The Big Sandy Rural Electric Co-op will be represented at the meeting by D. J. Gambill, president, Glenn C. Burchett, secretary-treasurer, Clabe Bingham, vice-president, Luther J. Conley, Curt Daniels and William H. Hiza, board members.

"Our Cooperative has had 282 miles of line in service," Mr. Gambill said, "and we are serving 1,888 members. We have 420 applicants for service from lines for which loans have already been approved. We have not received REA approval but for which information has been sent to REA and we hope to receive this approval at a very early date. In addition, about 500 farms in our territory in sections we have not been able to serve, must look to us for service. We want to finish the job we have started. We who have electrically now want our neighbors to get it at the earliest possible date. We are disturbed over the recent development in Congress when the House of Representatives cut the REA appropriation from \$55,000,000 to the administrative \$1,600,000 and we are going to try to do something about this at our Louisville meeting."

The KRECC is a statewide organization of Kentucky's REA-financed electric cooperatives. A majority of the rural electric co-ops are members.

The organization is inviting the state's senators and representatives, as well as the candidates for Governor and other state officers, to attend the meeting and express their views on rural electrification.

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


