TRIAL'S END NEXT WEEK

Is Judge's Prediction; Absence of Witnesses Slows Down Hearing

End of the May-Garrison trial in Washington definitely will next week, the ninth of the hearing, Federal Judge Henry A. Schweinhart predicted Monday.

Three more witnesses for the government and one for the defense remain to be heard. After that, a day will be devoted to legal arguments on the court's instructions to the jury, and then the defense and prosecution attorneys will be allowed a maximum of 12 hours for arguments.

One government witness, Congressman Charles A. Buckley, New York Democrat, however, was in Washington, but not at home at his office Tuesday, and it was undecided Monday if a defense witness, Joseph Freeman, would be called to testify in court. If Freeman, who was stricken by a heart attack while testifying, is unable to appear in court, his testimony will be taken at his bedside, it was said.

Pikeville, Ky., June 24—Dry forces in Pike county have launched a drive for a county-wide local option election, tentatively scheduled for September 29, a spokesman announced today. The move came just 10 days after the Court of Appeals nullified similar elections in four of the county's eight municipal districts.

R. H. Hobbs, treasurer and financial chairman of the Pike County Local Option League, said petitions for an election were being circulated and were expected to be filed with the county clerk "within a week or so."

At present six of the municipal districts are set and two—Nos. 3 and 5—are dry.

Dry victories in Districts 1, 3, 4 and 8 last September 30 were held by the state and federal governments because of failure to post legal notices of the election at all precincts prior to the referendum.

Strike Follows Bill Passage

The New Labor Law in Brief

Here are the major provisions of the Taft-Hartley bill which the Senate passed over the President's veto:

- 1. It would permit the government to obtain an 80-day injunction against any strike threatening a national emergency, such as a coal strike, while conciliators attempted to settle the dispute. If all settlement efforts failed, the President would refer the dispute to Congress. 2. It would outlaw future closed shop contracts, under which employers may hire only union members. It would prevent the mine camera union shop only when a majority of workers vote for it. Under a union shop agreement, the employer may hire anyone, but workers must join the union within a fixed time. 3. It would prohibit jurisdictional strikes and secondary boycotts, and would empower the National Labor Relations Board to obtain injunctions against them. Jurisdictional strikes are those called to force an employer to help one union against another in a dispute over which union should do certain work; secondary boycotts seek to force one company not to deal with another concern. 4. It would outlaw union-controlled health and welfare funds which have been established since Jan. 1, 1916. 5. It would make unions liable for unfair labor practices, as employers already are. Unions would be subject to suit for breach of contract and damages resulting from jurisdictional strikes and to release employers from any obligation to bargain collectively with foremen who have the authority to hire and fire workers. 6. It would ban unions from charging "excessive or discriminatory" dues or initiation fees, making the NLRB the judge as to what fees are excessive or discriminatory. 7. It would guarantee to employers freedom of speech in their dealings with workers, provided their statements about unions are not coercive nor threatening.

SENATE, HOUSE OVERRUN VETO OF PRESIDENT

The U.S. Senate joined the House of Representatives, Monday afternoon, in enacting into law over President Truman's veto the Taft-Hartley labor bill, and by Tuesday morning practically every rail mine in Floyd county was on strike.

Only the Sandy Valley Coal Company at Water Gap, the Diamond Elkhorn at Leno, Stephens Branch at Menton and Glorgora at Glorgora were working, a report received here Tuesday afternoon.

What the import of the work-stoppage remains unknown. There was no reliable evidence that the stoppage was a concerted move to protest against the new labor law, though the possibility was voiced that the stoppage would be general through the entire field, and that it would be a well-organized plan.

Thomas is attending an international trade conference in Switzerland. On 2 Senators who voted for the labor bill when it passed officially on May 13 by a vote of 80 to 24, changed their position on the veto—Democrats, Scott W. Lucas, of Illinois, and John Sparkman, of Alabama. Two Republicans with the administration counted on to override stayed regular. They are George D. Aiken, Vermont, and Charles W. Tobey, New Hampshire. Robert A. Taft, of Ohio, who as chairman of the Labor Committee, steered the bill through the chamber, lost only three members of his party. They were Wayne Morris, Oregon; William Langer, North Dakota; and George W. Malone, Nevada. He picked up 20 Democrats to offset the three. Of the 68 for overriding were 18 Republicans and 30 Democrats. For sustaining the veto were 22 Democrats and three Republicans.

The supposition that the Truman Administration was not exerting its full strength in an effort to sustain the veto persisted among labor leaders such as an extent that Truman sent to Allen W. Barkley, minority leader, a letter calling for the defeat of the bill. Barkley read the letter to the chamber, whose galleries were jammed and whose floor was crowded by visiting members from the House of Representatives.

"The labor bill would contend those who have said the President vetoed this bill for political reasons knowing that it would become law anyway," the Truman letter said.

"Harry S. Truman is not that kind of a President, not that kind of a cheap politician."

The Truman letter said:

"I feel so strongly about the labor bill which the Senate will vote on this afternoon that I wish to reaffirm my sincere belief that it will do serious harm to our country."

"This is a critical period in our history and any measure which will adversely affect our national unity will render a distinct disservice not only to the nation but to the world."

"I am convinced that such would be the result if the veto of this bill were not overridden."

"I commend you and your associates who have fought so earnestly against this dangerous legislation."

"I want you to know you have my unqualified support and it is my fervent hope, for the good of the country, that you and your colleagues will be successful in your efforts to keep this bill from becoming law."

On the Republican side of the political picture, the enactment of such a controversial bill, after six months of hearings and debate, is an achievement for Taft. A defeat on the measure would have been used against him by his rivals for the Republican presidential nomination.

The bill becomes law immediately and its provisions take effect at once. One which is immediately effective is the section aimed at John L. Lewis and a prerogative coal strike.

Under the new law, the Attorney General may obtain a court injunction which would stay a coal strike for an initial 60 days. Then a second injunction could delay it again for 20 additional days, during which the miners would vote under supervision of the National Labor Relations Board whether to accept the last offer or continue the strike. If the vote is for continuing the strike, the President is to refer the problem to Congress.

Opponents of the bill argued that those who think Lewis does not speak for his union members are mistaken and that the effect of the new law simply will be to delay the strike for 80 days, starting in October instead of July 1.



Mr. Clements says that unless the present Governor calls a special session of the legislature to increase teachers' pay his first request, as Governor, to the General Assembly will be for an appropriation that will raise the teachers' pay to a figure of which they will not be ashamed.

He is for bettering the farm program and is a fighter for it as Congressman and since he is a farmer he understands the problems of a farmer more than any other man.

He is for establishing housing facilities at our state parks in order to attract tourists to our state to view our historical sites and to create additional sources of revenue. Mr. Clements made the suggestion in a radio address last Thursday night, saying that he would advocate a bond issue or direct appropriation to provide the necessary funds. The very next day our present Governor called for the first time in three years to act on this proposal.

He is for industrialization of Kentucky and promises to offer inducements to factories to locate within our state so that our citizens will not have to leave home to seek employment.

Mr. Clements is for increased aid to the Welfare Department, which has been struggling along with practically nothing to operate on. He is for improving the road system by changing the present set-up and letting the local government handle the rural road program. His experience as County Judge for two terms in his home county proves that he understands the rural problems and how to formulate a constructive road program.

Last, but by no means least, Mr. Clements served in the United States army for 28 months during World War I. Most of his service was at the 18th Division in Europe.

In a speech last week, he expressed his feeling toward the thousands of co-servicemen in Kentucky. He said that they have not been recognized by Kentucky and that they are demanding much but do not deserve to be penalized because of having served their country. He further stated that thousands of them are qualified and have special training which would enable them to help carry on the state government. He says that there is room for many in the different departments of state.

Harry Lee Waterfield, who was a young man when World War II started, did not go into service and I hold no grudge against him because of his not having served, but I am sure that he is less qualified to understand the problems of the veterans than is Earle C. Clements, who shared the hardships on the battlefields. The thousands of Kentucky veterans who have rallied to Clements' support have signified that they, too, share this belief.

Harry Lee Waterfield presents a fair platform but he states that he will appropriate tens of millions of dollars for various improvements but he has failed to tell where he will obtain the money for these huge expenditures. Yes, he says that he will increase the appropriations for various departments while at the same time he proposes to reduce the intangible tax rate and to give greater exemptions in the inheritance tax. You will hear a great deal about his proposal to levy a tax on

part-mutual racing tickets. Do you believe that a greatly increased budget can operate on the taxes from winning race track tickets? I would like for Mr. Waterfield to show how he will get all that money. All of us can spend money, which is an easy task, but it is hard to operate on a budget and keep the state out of debt without placing a greater tax burden on the people. Increased appropriations such as Mr. Waterfield proposes, mean increased taxation. I am afraid that he cannot follow his promises unless he, the people, pay dearly for them.

The above reasons are why I am for Earle C. Clements for Governor. I am convinced that it is my duty to do all in my power to help him become Governor of Kentucky. I am convinced that it is best for the welfare of the state, the farmers, the miners, the teachers and my fellow veterans, that I support and ask my friends to support Earle C. Clements.


