

President David B. Robertson of the firm's union told Steelman, Ross continued, that "our committee have voted to comply fully with the terms of the restraining order signed by Judge Goldsborough."

The lawyers, Robertson reported, went on to working out "terms to comply with this action of the committee."

Ross declared: "Robertson, speaking for the group, stated that messages are going out immediately notifying the railroad workers of the action just taken."

The first definite report that the strike was off came from Edward Gloss, press secretary for the firm's union. He told reporters, camera men and railroad people:

"The three brotherhoods will comply with the court order. Steps to that effect are being taken immediately."

He said the "steps" consisted of notifying the union members not to strike.

The order, which the union spokesman referred to as a court order telling the three unions to call off the strike and further, to do nothing to encourage one.

To paid the way for this order (a type of preliminary injunction) President Truman seized the whole vast network of trucks and trains in the name of the federal government at mid-day Monday and turned them over to the army for operation.

Possibly severe penalties are the alternatives to disobedience. Monday night's order was issued by Federal District Judge T. A. Sizoo Goldsborough, the same man who fined John L. Lewis \$20,000 and the United Mine Workers \$1,400,000 for just calling off a strike quickly enough this year.

The government invoked the power of the courts after the three railroad unions turned down Secretary of the Army Royall's request that they call off the strike.

Mr. Truman said seizure was necessary in the public interest, that the nation could not stand "a nationwide tragedy" such as a crippling railroad strike.

Judge Goldsborough's restraining order is returnable before him May 19. The union can argue their case then, but in the meanwhile they are on notice not to strike. To do so would risk contempt of court action. When the order is argued, the government no doubt will ask that the temporary order be made into an outright injunction.

Judge Goldsborough's order said that any railroad strike would "impair national health and safety and interfere and obstruct the effective performance in discharge of vital and necessary government functions, and will frustrate the powers conferred by the Constitution and by the acts of Congress upon the executive branch of the government."

first Monday in February, the second Monday in June and the second Monday in November, and the new act does not become effective until three days after the second Monday in June, leaving only the November term possible during the remainder of the year.

Section 128, in that in the "at-tempted creation" of the 38th district and in the attempted shuffling of the other districts the Legislature had no regard for the territory, business or population of either the 24th, 25th, 26th, 32nd or 36th districts.

It is pointed out in the petition that Knott and Magoffin counties, the 24th district as formed by the act, do not, except at one point, join, and that at the heads of Quicksand Creek and Licking River where no road connects the two counties. Also pointing out that much of the business of the district is in the matter of applications for injunctions and similar matters requiring attorneys, litigants and witnesses to travel from their homes to the judge where he may be holding court at the time, the plaintiffs contend that a distance of 80 miles would have to be traversed over Floyd, Johnson and Magoffin counties or over Knott, Perry, Breathitt and Magoffin between the two counties, Highland and Salyersville.

Section 233 is violated, it is claimed, in that it provides salaries of public officials shall not be changed during their terms of office; and the salary of Earl R. Cooper, Commonwealth's Attorney of the proposed 98th district (Knott and Magoffin) would be his salary slump from the usual \$5,000 to not more than \$3,600 a year.



Lewis Issues Call For Policy Board To Map Demands

John L. Lewis summoned the United Mine Workers' 200-man Policy Committee Wednesday to meet in Washington, D. C. Monday and discuss the demands he proposes to make before the mine operators this year.

The soft coal contract expires June 30. Negotiations with bituminous mine operators begin Tuesday. The anthracite contract has no expiration date, but Lewis has suggested he plans to end the agreement July 10. Negotiations with anthracite producers will begin May 20. About 80,000 Eastern Pennsylvania miners are in the anthracite group.

Committees from various union districts already have suggested demands for presentation to the soft coal operators, but Lewis has not indicated what he will ask.

SPORTS AFIELD

By TED RESTING

For years the quail population of this country has been steadily decreasing. No one quite knew why. No-hunting laws, refuge systems and release of pen-raised and wild birds failed to result in more quail. Now an answer has been found by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service. According to Verne E. Davison, biologist with the SCS, we have grossly overestimated the food supply. Quail have been starved out. Or maybe we have only failed to realize what food conditions a covey requires: As any rate, while experimenting with bi-color lespedeza, now acknowledged as one of the best foods for bobwhite quail, the SCS has proved that a serious food deficiency exists in almost every field, pasture and woods from Texas to Virginia.

It has only been within the last two years that the value of bicolor quail food has been recognized by both wildlife and agricultural circles. Today, bicolor strains hold the distinction of being the first plants developed and improved for the primary aim of benefiting an American game species. The future of quail throughout the south is getting brighter and brighter as new strains are introduced, and there soon will be hardier varieties for northern planting.

The SCS began gathering strains in 1940, and by careful selection several new strains have been developed that are much better than common bicolor. Four million plants of these new strains—enough for 4,000 acres of quail—were planted afield this year. A perennial shrub, it grows from six to 10 feet high. It can be established by transplanting nursery-grown plants or by direct seeding.

It has proved to be a most dependable and inexpensive shrub for erosion-control purposes—or by direct seeding. It is helping farmers recognize game production as a farm project which can solve.





VAN LEAR BOY WRECK VICTIM

School Net Star
Killed, Two Hurt
At George's Creek

Louis, Ky., May 10—Freelin Williamson, 18, star basketball player at Van Lear, Ky. high school, was injured fatally Sunday at 2:45 a.m. when the auto in which he was a passenger hit a bump and ran off the highway at George's Creek, about 10 miles south of Louisville.

Leonard Barker, driver of the car, was slightly injured and Kenneth Preston, a passenger, received critical injuries and was removed to a Paintsville, Ky. hospital. Paul Brickley, the vehicle's other occupant, was not injured.

Dr. Henry S. Young, Lawrence county coroner, said Williamson died of a broken neck and crushed chest, and that Preston suffered a compound fracture of the left leg, cuts and bruises on the head and a crushed chest. He added that Barker received only minor cuts and bruises on the hand and head and was dismissed from the Louisa hospital after emergency treatment.

The coroner asserted that Brickley told him the following version of the tragedy:

The group, all residents of Van Lear, had started to Huntington, W. Va., but when it was discovered that there was something wrong with the automobile they turned around and were headed back toward Van Lear. When they were crossing the bridge at George's Creek the auto hit a bump causing it to veer and go over a 40-foot fall and turn over three times. All were thrown from the car with the exception of Brickley.

Funeral services for Mr. Williamson, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Aulien Williamson, will be held tomorrow at 2 p.m. at the residence. The body is at the Jones Funeral Home, Paintsville. Surviving are the parents, two brothers and four sisters.

OF INTEREST TO VETERANS

The certificate of eligibility issued to a veteran upon his entrance into a job-training or school study course under the G.I. Bill loses its validity if the veteran discontinues his training. The Veterans Administration Branch Office in Columbus, O., said this week.

The trainee who has discontinued his training and later desires to resume his studies under the G.I. Bill must obtain a supplemental certificate of eligibility from VA.

Application for the supplemental certificate may be made through any VA office.

Veterans who lose subsistence, compensation or pension checks should notify immediately the appropriate Veterans Administration regional office. VA officials said recently.

A veteran losing such a check should write a letter giving his full name and address, his claim number and the date and amount of the check. He should state for which type of benefit the check was issued and the circumstances surrounding its loss.

On being notified of the check's loss, VA determines first if it may have been found and returned to the U.S. Treasury. If so, the check will be credited to the veteran. If not, VA will request the Treasury to stop payment and take necessary steps to reimburse the veteran.

A veteran who finds his check after reporting its loss should notify VA and hold the check until he has been advised by the Treasury that action to stop payment has been withdrawn.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Who is entitled to the compensation or pension check received prior to the death of a veteran?

A. The check or checks received prior to a veteran's death become a part of his estate.

Q. I am a World War II veteran and have been totally disabled for a few months. At the end of my sixth month of total disability, will I have to continue paying my National Service Life Insurance premiums or is a waiver granted by law?

A. No automatic waiver of premiums is ever granted. A veteran must be totally disabled for six months before he may apply for a waiver of premiums. You are entitled to file a claim for refund of those premiums you paid from the date on which the waiver became effective.
