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



Lexington, Ky., Aug. 16—If you don't like those sky-high meat prices—start a fish pond.

That's the thing to do, according to H. H. Thompson, of the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture and Home Economics.

The most profitable acre on the farm could be a fish pond, Thompson said today.

He said a one-acre pond, properly made and maintained, would produce 400 to 600 pounds of fish a year at small cost.

Properly fertilized, an acre pond will support 100 bass and 1,000 to 1,500 bluegills, according to Thompson, who recommended these species for Kentucky.

But fish, like livestock, should be well-fed to be productive, the University staff member warned. They live largely on insects which grow in small plants called algae.

Scattering fertilizer in ponds stimulates the growth of algae—all of which means more feed for the fish. Approximately 800 to 1,600 pounds of fertilizer a year is suggested for an acre pond, using it at the rate of 100 to 150 pounds a week. Mixtures recommended are 9-9-4, 10-10-5, or 20-20-10.

The premiums may be raised to cover "unforeseen contingencies," under the plan. But the policyholders must be notified 20 days in advance, and the rate approved by the state commissioner of insurance. Anyone may join. The one of the major differences between the new proposal and a previous plan the K.S.M.A. considered. The previous plan was to be sold only to persons with low incomes.

Dr. Miller said that under state law 51 per cent of the physicians in each county must agree to join before any policies may be sold in that county.

"It is hoped, as experience is gained, the provisions may be broadened," he said. The insurance corporation would consist of the association's house of delegates. It could either hire somebody to run the plan or pick an established insurance company to do it.

Some of the indemnities in this plan follow:

Removal of appendix, \$100; removal of carbuncle, \$25; amputation of single breast, \$50; reduction of dislocated shoulder (closed), \$20; removal of cataract from eye, \$75; removal of kidney, \$150; single hernia, \$75.

The policy provides a waiting period of 10 months for obstetrical cases. It pays \$40 toward cost of pregnancy and delivery of babies, with certain limitations.

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**U.-K. Graduates Record Summer Class of 391 With 3 from Floyd Co.**

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 19—A total of 391 students, making up the largest summer graduating class in the history of the institution, received degrees at the University of Kentucky's August commencement exercises last Friday night, Aug. 13.

Members of the graduating class represented 91 of Kentucky's 120 counties, 26 other states and four foreign countries. The previous record for a summer school graduation was established last year when 334 degrees were awarded to graduates, a mark of 265 graduates in 1941.

Dr. A. L. Crabb, Nashville author and educator, delivered the commencement address on the subject, "Everything Begins at Home."

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
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**Father's Favorite SNOW BISCUITS**

5-1/2 c. sifted Snow Flour  
4 tsp. salt  
1/2 tsp. soft butter  
1/2 cup milk

Measure and sift dry ingredients into a bowl. Cut or work in fat until the mixture has a coarse granular appearance. Add liquid and combine thoroughly. Turn dough out on lightly floured board, gather up into a ball and knead lightly until the dough appears somewhat smooth. Roll to desired thickness. Cut or cutter into flour. Cut biscuits and place upon ungreased baking sheet. If cruddy biscuits are desired place about one inch apart, otherwise biscuits may touch each other. Bake in hot oven, (450° F.) for about 10 minutes.

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
