**Mine Workers' Trial For Bonding Delayed**

Commonwealth's Attorney Alvin Laska and six witnesses have been summoned for this term of court in the 2½-year-old case. He said he is negotiating with attorneys for the defendants for a settlement without trial. Ed J. Morgan, president of U.M.W. District 23, and 18 union members were indicted on charges in May, 1946, following mass picketing at several independent Hopkins county coal mines during a nationwide coal strike.

**SPORTS AFIELD**

Among the few places left in this country where you can entirely escape from the noise and confusion of modern living are our national forests and parts west of the Great Plains. The total area of such public lands runs about 400,000,000 acres, and probably half of this is pack trip territory, reached only by saddle travel. There you almost certainly will be riding a western horse, and according to outdoor writer Arthur Carhart, these animals are not like your bridle path horse. The average saddle horse for trail use is a product of blending strains that have proven highly serviceable for this kind of work. He will weigh about 1,000 pounds in weight, chested, close-coupled, stout-legged and possessed of a lot of trail experience.

Your corral boss or head guide will introduce you to the horse you'll ride. On first meeting, don't try to make it old horse week. That horse is sitting out just as certainly as you are appreciating him. There are a good many reasons for you to take care of your horse during this part of the business of saddle travel; a traditional responsibility. It's a portion of the horse's neck which faces the way of travel. If you are totally green about handling saddle tackle, your guide will help you get the hang of it.

Perhaps the outstanding difference between managing other horses and the western pony lies in the way they are guided. Well trained western horses "lead" with the reins in your left hand, and the straps (lying along either side of the horse's neck, move your hand over toward the side which faces the way you want the horse to go. A knowing horse will move away from the rein applying slight pressure. You'll speed a western horse if you start dragging on the rein to pull him toward the side you are urging.

On the trail the rule is easy. You don't rest in a western saddle. You sit on it and ease just a little with the feet solidly in the stirrups. Let your pony handle his own feet. Over rough terrain, give him his head. He knows best. After you've lived with him awhile, you'll find yourself in partnership with a four-legged outdoorsman that is worth knowing.

**OF INTEREST TO VETERANS**

Student veterans whose dependence status ended during the summer vacation are reminded by Veterans Administration to submit proof of additional dependency as soon as possible to the appropriate VA regional office in which the records are filed.

Veterans with dependents, who are studying full or part-time in schools and colleges under the G. I. Bill, are eligible for additional subsistence payments because of the dependents. However, legal procedure, such as certified copies of public records of birth, baptism, marriage, divorce or other evidence must be in their VA training file in order to qualify.

Single veterans studying under the G. I. Bill are eligible for monthly subsistence allowances up to \$75. Veterans with one dependent may receive \$108 per month and veterans with two or more dependents, \$120. Veterans should submit evidence of dependency at once, rather than wait until enrolling for the fall semester in order to insure receiving prompt payments of subsistence at the higher rates.

World War II veterans still may reinstate their National Service Life Insurance. Veterans Administration branch office officials in Columbus, Ohio, explained this week.

Some veterans are under the impression they can no longer obtain this government insurance. World War II veterans who can pass a physical examination may reinstate their lapsed insurance at any time. The deadline for reinstating NSLI without a physical examination was July 31, 1948, VA explained. Prior to the deadline, a veteran could reinstate lapsed insurance by certifying that his health was as good as it was when the policy lapsed.

This deadline confused some veterans, who feel they should be reinstating insurance since the deadline was passed. Veterans may reinstate their insurance at any time by passing a physical examination. If the policy has lapsed less than three months, it still may be reinstated without taking a physical examination.

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**  
Q. Will VA pay for the medical care of dependents?  
A. No. Under existing laws, only eligible veterans are entitled to VA medical care.

Q. May I complete my last year of grade school and take a commercial course under the G. I. Bill?  
A. Yes.

Q. I intend to be a bartender and would like to know if I can take a course in bartending under the G. I. Bill.  
A. First, you must submit to VA complete justification that the course is in connection with your present or contemplated business or occupation. Then you must receive VA approval before you start training.

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

**KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH**

We'll call the guy Duke Hodd. The name is fictitious. Has to be, because there are tens of thousands of Duke Hods in the United States. They are people who go to a bar for one or two or more drinks. And we must not overlook the Annie Hods, women who drive when tight. Of course, one might say there are one fifth as many women as men who drive when tight.

But let's get back to Duke Hodd. Ordinarily, he is a law-abiding man. Burns an honest living, is well respected by neighbors and friends. The possibility of killing somebody never enters his head.

Duke drives to town with friends—a town where drinks are sold. After stopping for a week's supply of store goods, he goes to a bar for one of them buys a round of drinks.

There are a few minutes of pleasant conversation. The little group is joined by more men and there is a second round. And a third and a fourth. The barkeep sees the men getting woozy, but he is there to make money for Duke. He knows, which may be an individual or a club, deeply interested in civic betterment. That he is, making possible the killing of the man who has been serving too many drinks never occurs to the barkeep.

Well, Duke Hodd and his friends get into the car, with Duke at the steering wheel. There are two or three street lamps where there's only one, but he refuses to admit to himself that he is too drunk to drive.

Before the Hodd party has gone a mile there is a head-on crash. A child is killed, its mother crippled for a year, the father, as often happens to persons at the steering wheel, suffered bruises and contusions only.

The state highway police were soon at the scene of the accident. They learned readily that Hodd and his friends were intoxicated. The "tippy" boys were not hurt seriously. They were relaxed when the crash occurred. They were taken to the police station and booked for drunk driving. Putting a manslaughter charge against them was deferred until the evidence was heard next day.

The father was the only eyewitness who could testify for the prosecution. The mother, of course, was a bit jumbled. Hodd and his friends were very good witnesses for themselves, but they said enough to get what might be called an even break with the prosecution. Some of their friends came to their defense with good character references.

Yes, this was a Kentucky case. And under our traffic law the minimum penalty for driving while intoxicated is \$102.50.

Duke Hodd paid his fine, 30 per cent of which went to the city prosecutor if the case was tried in police court, or 25 per cent to the county attorney if the trial was in county court or before a justice of the peace. The law was vindicated. Or was it?

A child was reborn of its life. A woman was crippled for a year. The same fate or worse may be in store for persons reading this column because, according to the National Safety Council, one out of every five drivers in fatal crashes last year had been drinking.

I think that if I were in the next Kentucky Legislature I would work for the passage of a stiffer penalty for drunken driving—mandatory 90 days in jail in addition to the present money penalty. And I'd try to reach barkeeps selling to persons already groggy. This latter offense should merit six months in jail.

of the sale price. The federal government, it was said, will receive the remainder. When purchased 10 years ago, Flatwoods cost \$9,000.

Wells explained, following a meeting of some 100 interested Eastern Kentuckians and state officials, that plans to undermine the Pike county property made it unfeasible to go ahead with the conservation project.

The mining, he said, would deplete the water on the land, known as the "Flatwoods," and wild life could not propagate on it.

The tract, of 2166 acres, is located on the Pike-Leitcher county border, 25 miles southeast of Pikeville. Among those who attended a meeting to decide the future of the Flatwoods were Earl Wallace, of Frankfort, director of the Kentucky Game and Fish Commission, and A. L. Blum, of Frankfort, president of the Kentucky League of Sportsmen.

It was indicated that the state would accept bids on the land, or that other means would be found to dispose of it.

Three coal concerns, the Big Sandy Company, Heller Coal & Coke Company and the Consolidation Coal Company (Ky.) own the mining rights.

At the time of the purchase, coal had not yet been discovered in the district, and the surface rights were considered sufficient for the planning of the game preserve.

However, three veins of coal underlie the tract, one of them less than 30 feet below the surface. It will be strip-mined.

the Kootzes acquired the 98,000 voting trust certificates, carrying practical control of Elk Horn, by means of a scheme, fraudulently conceived, carefully concealed, and deliberately executed.

"They capitalized upon the confidential and peculiar knowledge gained by them as counsel for the receivership, which knowledge had been secreted from the Receivership Court, and jealously concealed from others. Through self-interest Kootzes attempted to appropriate unto himself the property which in justice should have gone to those who put their trust in him."

The certificates were purchased at several sales from the estate of the late C. W. Watson, Fairmont coal operator. They were issued to him, along with \$9,000 to Arthur Kootzes, to centralize control of the firm during its reorganization in 1937.



Resurrecting themselves from the disastrous "Battle of Everts" and sharpening their claws for the coming encounter with strongly favored St. Xavier, the Prestonsburg high school Blackcats scratched out a 33-22 victory last Friday night over Russell in the railroad town's Sportsman's Park.

"They drew a bunch of quitters," Benedict said. "They scored a touchdown and then quit, seemingly satisfied on some sort of supposed past glory and expect to win the game while standing upright amid field sleep on their feet!"

"At Russell my boys showed improvement for the first three quarters. At the end of the third quarter Prestonsburg was ahead of Russell, 33-8. The opposing team's touchdown was the fruit of a first quarter fumble. It's possible to overlook that, but—in the last quarter the usual case of sleeping sickness overtook the boys and they were smashed over two touchdowns. One of them was the outright gift from a second fumble."

"At this game had lasted a little longer at the rate Russell was going . . . Coach Benedict finished his summation by sadly shaking his head at his thoughts of the possible outcome.


The Blackcats, rated by some sources as 34th in state competition this week have been working overtime in their preparation to face the 10th place Louisville team. Both are out to improve their standings.






