There is no law giving the City Council the right either to grant or reject a license. Any ordinance attempting to "regulate" the number or location isn't worth the paper it's written on.

Lexington in 1941 tried by ordinance to restrict the number of saloons. The State Board promptly ignored this. They kept right on issuing licenses. They took this problem to the courts. The Kentucky Court of Appeals decided in 306 Ky. 238 Dec. 19, 1947 that Lexington was at the mercy of the State Board.

The State Board cannot legally refuse a license to any person meeting the qualifications of the law governing the granting of licenses. This was decided by the Kentucky Court of Appeals, 297 Ky. 432, May 5,

1944, granting a whiskey license to O. L. Hall in Fayette county after his application was rejected by the County Judge, the State Board, and the entire community who by petition had vigorously protested the presence of this saloon.

5 c. milk 2 eggs 2 cups of water dissolved in 1 c. oil 1/2 c. sugar 1/2 c. shortening 1/2 c. salt 1/2 c. baking powder 1/2 c. corn meal 1/2 c. flour

Scald milk, add salt, Cool. Cream together shortening and sugar. Beat eggs. Add to sugar mixture. Add milk to soaked yeast. Blend with flour sifted into mixing bowl. Beat well. Add corn meal mixture. Mix. Knead into smooth dough. Place in greased bowl. Cover. Let rise until double its bulk. Knead dough down. Put back into greased bowl. Cover closely with lid. Set refrigerator. Each day punch dough down to let out gas, returning dough to the refrigerator at once. About two hours before rolls are wanted, shape as desired. Place in greased pan. Cover. Let rise in warm place until very light. Bake in moderately hot oven (375° F.) for 15-20 minutes.

Teacher Requirements Established By State Named By School Head

Regulations released by the State Department of Education, County Superintendent Palmer L. Hall announced last week, provide that six semester hours of college training will be required to reinstate or renew any elementary or high school emergency certificate. This work shall be done in residence or workshop.

Teachers entering the profession will be required to have 32 semester hours' college credit for an elementary permit or be a graduate of a standard college to get a high school permit.

Teachers who can meet these requirements may be employed by the Board of Education prior to the opening of the first summer term on the condition that they earn necessary credits before the opening of the school term for positions which cannot be filled by qualified teachers by that time.

All teachers who expect to teach next year on an emergency permit should plan to do at least one summer term, Mr. Hall said. It is not yet certain whether a workshop can be held in Floyd county this summer, but it is hoped this can be ascertained in time for teachers to make their plans, he added.

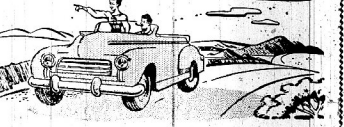

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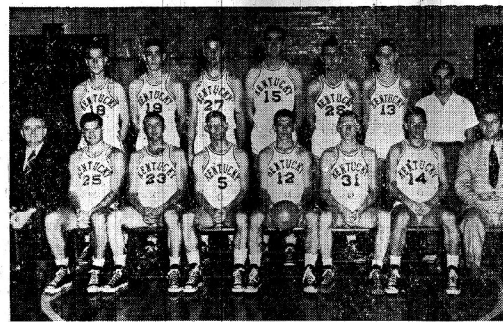

He stated that because of the national tourney restrictions on eligibility, the inability of some of the team members to make the trip and the possible lack of funds virtually eliminated all possibility of Prestonsburg's participation.

The limitations on the eligibility by players require that any team member in the meet must be a member, in good standing for the year, of a Veterans of Foreign Wars post.

Only four of the Rambler line-up meet the requirements while the remainder of the squad hold honorary memberships in the Prestonsburg VFW Post 5838. These memberships, though recognized in the recent state meet at Lexington, will not be honored in the Anderson tourney.

The Ramblers, who played their home games this season with little, and upon several occasions no, gate receipts, are without sufficient funds to bear expenses of the venture. Should the team be hastily re-organized for Kentucky's representation
