THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW—

About How The Alcoholic Beverage Business Will Be Handled In Prestonsburg Under The New Law

CITY ADMINISTRATOR--

The City Council must create by ordinance the Office of City Alcoholic Beverage Control Administrator. The Council may either delegate the duties of City Administrator to a presently established City Office or if the Council does not do this the Mayor must appoint a City Administrator.

LICENSE QUOTA--

The State Board at Frankfort will conduct an open hearing as to the license quota for Prestonsburg and any person or group of persons may have his say regarding how many licenses should be issued. The present State Board has co-operated fully with local citizens in setting quotas.

ZONING--

The City Council may, or may not, zone the area in which alcoholic beverages will be sold in Prestonsburg. When zoning does not seem advisable, the law still provides ample means for restricting the location of licensed premises in accordance with community welfare and the wishes of local citizens.

APPROVAL OF LICENSES--

The City Administrator must approve every applicant for a license before his application must be sent to Frankfort. THEN the State Alcoholic Control Board will thoroughly investigate the character and fitness of the applicant. Only local persons of good reputation will be considered for licenses by the State Board.

ADVERTISEMENT OF NOTICE TO APPLY FOR LICENSE--

Each applicant for a license will be required to advertise in local newspapers for at least two weeks, his intention to apply for a license. (Any person with reasonable grounds may protest the issuance of such license.)

NO SALOONS--

Contrary to continued statements and rumors of the Drys—There CANNOT be any saloons in Prestonsburg—Under the NEW LAW ONLY PACKAGE STORES will be permitted to operate. (Kentucky Revised Statutes 243.230.) Liquor cannot be sold by the drink or consumed on the premises. It will be sold only by the package.

NO ROADHOUSES--

Contrary to continued statements and rumors of the Drys—There CANNOT be any roadhouses in Prestonsburg. License will be issued only within the corporate limits of the city, and only in locations and premises approved by the City Administrator and the State Board.

STATE BOARD WILL CONTROL--

All licenses come from Frankfort. They are issued only by the State Alcoholic Beverage Control Board. The present State Board, appointed a little more than a year ago, has already demonstrated its purpose to improve conditions in the liquor business throughout the state. Liquor retailers who violate the law are having a very rough time, and many of them have already lost their licenses. We feel that the good people of Prestonsburg will appreciate these assurances of more vigorous law enforcement.

pany to sell to Floyd county residents gas produced in Floyd county. "Your people are as good as the people of other states where this gas is going—they should not have to starve in a land of plenty," argued Mr. Burchett.

Before that, Senator Eays had declared "these are the best people in the world, and most of them Democrats."

The company contended the Public Service Commission has nothing to do with the matter, basing its argument on the statement that it is engaged in interstate commerce and is governed by the Federal Power Commission as to 98 per cent of its product.

Mr. Burchett countered with the argument that the company's delivery points are its compressor stations in this county, from which points the gas is conveyed in lines owned by the two main consumers, the Louisville Gas & Electric and the Pittsburgh-West Virginia, thus removing Kentucky West Virginia from interstate business.

The company has 688 meters located in Floyd, Knott, Pike and Johnson counties for service to individuals. The Commission was told, Burchett argued that it could not act as a public utility for these 688 individuals without being a public utility for all.

He pointed out that, exclusive of Prestonsburg and Paintsville, all but 2 per cent of Kentucky West Virginia gas volume is going to two companies. The gas company, it was stated, is a subsidiary of these two firms, 40 per cent of its stock being owned or controlled by Louisville Gas & Electric for 17½ cents per thousand cubic feet and to Pittsburgh-West Virginia for 15½ cents. At the same time, it was shown, gas sold by the company to individuals is at the rate of 40 cents per thousand.

At that, company officials stated, it has not enough gas to divert part of its supply to private sources, Mr. Burchett countered with the argument that the Inland Steel Company's contract for 1,500,000 cubic feet a day has been cancelled and thus made available for diversion elsewhere; also, that only one-third of the company's Eastern Kentucky acreage has been developed.

The Commission was told that the 688 meters placed for homes where the company is selling gas to individuals does not represent the actual number of consumers. One of these individuals, Furner State Representative J. P. Howell, of Price, said 26 of his neighbors get gas through his meter. The same thing is being done elsewhere, it was said, upon refusal of the company to sell gas.

As of December, 1948, 600,000 cubic feet of gas was passing through these 688 meters daily.

"Kentucky West Virginia stated it is accepting no new gas applications and indicated it may, upon notice, cancel service to those permitting others to get gas through their meters."

The Commission withheld its decision. Pending that, the company has been directed to produce any existing contracts it may have for its gas.

Miss Gail Chaffins, 42, Discovered Dead in Bed, Heart Seizure Victim

Death of Miss Gail Chaffins, 42 years old, who was found dead in bed early Wednesday morning at the home on Rock Fork Creek, near Garrett, of her father, Robert Chaffins, has been attributed to a heart attack. She had shown no indications of illness when she retired, it was said.

Conley, Newport News, Va.; Mrs. Brock Craft, Mrs. Orville Eastery, Mrs. Theodore Sparks, all of Garrett, and Mrs. Bill Terry, of Mount.

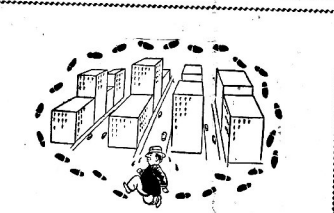

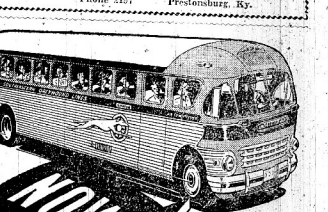

Basketball Rules Under Fire In National Coaches' Meet

Basketball coaches will consider changing rules, in a meeting of the National Association of Basketball Coaches Saturday, March 26, to standardize the size of courts, the type of ball to be used and more or less clean up today's odd-lot mixture of equipment.

Preparing for the session, the association's research committee headed by Georgia Tech's Ray Mundorf, sent out a two-section questionnaire last month to 1,000 American and Canadian college and high school coaches. Discussions are being based on the answers to the queries which were presented in the form of an opinion poll. The first section dealt with personnel rules while the second contained five pertinent questions on equipment changes. Findings of this survey is under consideration and it is highly probable that many recommendations by the committee will be enacted into rules within two weeks after the Seattle meeting.

On tab for consideration is raising the basket to 11 feet instead of the now standard 10 because of the outcropping of tall boys and the possibility of painting the rims a bright color to contrast with the blackboards to promote a higher scoring game. Another query of the questionnaire up for discussion is doing away with all shapes of blackboards but one—two types, rectangular and fan-shaped, now in use.

The top question on equipment wants to know if "The size of the playing space should be blank by blank" rather than stating approximate sizes by giving minimum or maximum dimensions as now is the case. A provision would be included in the new rule that floors now in use would not cause an "unofficial contest."

The possibility of limiting the ball to one type—either the leather, sewn ball or the moulded, rubber ball is on the meeting's agenda for debate. Seven of the questions put to coaches were a check-up on new rules put into effect last year. They were:

Do you favor the rule that does not require players to report to officials?

tourney games in 13 trips to the meet. From 1929 to 1937 they had eight consecutive journeys that took them no farther than the quarter-finals. A 1931 trip netted only a first round loss. Beginning another series of campaigns for the crown in 1946, their four years of pounding at the door of opportunity finally resulted in the 1949 glory. During the latter stretch, in 1947, they defeated Wayland, 56-46, in the first round.

Pikeville, the 1949 representative of 16th region, eliminated Glasgow, 58-42, in their first round match but bowed to St. Xavier, 58-48, in the quarter-final tussle. It was Pikeville's first trip to the state classic in 22 years and, also, a similar pattern of their 1926 excursion. That year saw Pikeville's Panthers defeat Italian (before the days of "Wah, Wah" Jones), 21-10, in the first round and run afoul of the St. K. Tigers, 24-17, in the quarter-finals. The Panthers, suffering no graduation losses, are already being noted as favorite to go back to the state basketball tangle-fest in 1950 for another crack at the title in face of stiff competition from Inez, Meade Memorial and several Floyd county teams.

Should the Pikeville Panthers successfully negotiate the route back to the state meet next year, they will very likely find this year's runner-up waiting for them. Lafayette, barring unforeseen mishaps, will be there with the starting line-up intact!

STATE TOURNEY RECORD MAKERS!

17-year-old Cliff Hagan set four new tournament records in the '49 state-wide basketball eliminations. Removed from the game with a full minute remaining of play, Hagan tallied 41 points against Lafayette to simultaneously set a new single game high and break the old final game record, 13 against St. Xavier, 23 against Clark County and 20 against Corbin for a new four-game total of 57 points, a new record for total tourney games, for an average of 54.25 points per game, which is a high average for three or more tournament appearances.

The total record was previously set by Owensboro's J. M. Gipe two years ago at 84 points when Hagan was his understudy. The old mark was also passed by Lafayette's Bob Mulcahy who aggregated 80 tallies. Harold Moberly, of Madison high at Richmond, established the previous tourney single game mark of 32 in the first round in 1947. Frank Fralley of Breckinridge, set the old final game record of 23 points in 1946.

Hagan beat the scholastic competition Armory mark of U. S. Alex Groza who recently tabbed 37 points in the Southeastern Conference meet. His season's play totaled 763 points while his team won 29 and lost three, including tourney games.

WHAT IS THE QUESTION

That You Will Answer With Your Vote?



Are You In Favor of the Sale of Alcoholic Beverages in Prestonsburg, Floyd County, Ky.?

Question: Would legalized, controlled sale of liquor and beer reduce drunkenness?

Answer: No. In 1946 when we had legalized sale of liquor the Police Court records show more than 900 arrests for drunkenness, against a little more than 300 arrests for drunkenness in 1948 when we were legally DRY.

Question: Wouldn't legalized sale of alcoholic beverages reduce bootlegging?

Answer: If it did in Floyd county and Prestonsburg it would do differently than it does in most other places.

Examples to prove the above. In Caldwell county when it was "WET" (60) sixty drunks were convicted in two months. In that wet county (50) fifty of the sixty drunks were drunk on illegal liquor. (Bootlegged.)

In Harlan county when it was wet state revenue men found that 65 pct. of all liquor sold was illegal. (Bootlegged.)

In 1942 United States Revenue records of (50) fifty dry counties showed only 300 bootleggers. Average 6 to a county, while the same records showed (2,225) TWO THOUSAND, TWO HUNDRED and TWENTY-FIVE BOOTLEGGERS in (51) FIFTY-ONE WET COUNTIES.

THERE ARE MORE BOOTLEGGERS OPERATING IN WET CITIES AND COUNTIES THAN THERE ARE IN DRY COUNTIES AND CITIES, according to all available government records.

Question: Then if I vote to favor the sale of alcoholic beverages in Prestonsburg, I am really voting to add legal sales to the present illegal sales and really multiply the users and the amount of alcoholic drinks used, isn't that right?

Answer: Yes, that is right. You will be voting for a great increase in the sales of all kinds of intoxicating drinks and a great increase in drunkenness and all the poverty and pain and crime that goes with it.

Question: But wouldn't the city get revenue out of the licensing of the liquor business if we vote wet?

Answer: Yes, the city of Prestonsburg would get fees for licenses and probably a lot more fines from drunks and others arrested, but probably not as much as it would cost the city to take care of additional policing and care of persons arrested.

Evidence: Some years ago after legal liquor came back into Louisville the Mayor of the city appealed to the Legislative Council in Frankfort for more liquor tax because, he said, "Louisville was losing money." Said he, "... Outlays for the keep of prisoners, their medical care and the care of dependents of liquor addicts have increased steadily." In eight years arrests for drunkenness had climbed from 2,155 in a "DRY" year to 12,200 in a "WET" year. And the controlled "saloons" had been responsible for attracting 4,000 boys and girls under age to become their customers, and led them to be such good customers that the 4,000 had been arrested for drunkenness while still boys and girls "under age."

Question: But won't having liquors sold legally in Prestonsburg bring business to our city?

Answer: There is no doubt but that it would bring a lot of business to Prestonsburg. Every policeman would have more business, the jailer would have more business, the men who sold the liquor, both legal and illegal, would have more business. Repair men at garages and relief agencies all over the county would have more business. Hospitals and doctors might have more business and poorer collections. But there is serious doubt about getting "more business" of the sort that would benefit Prestonsburg.
