The loss was 223 pounds of 18-foot python.

The big snake, which arrived here Monday from California, India, escaped from its cage some time between 2 p.m. and 6 a.m., and had not been found today noon, despite an intensive search of the show grounds and neighboring fields and river banks.

A C. Brown, handler of the python and other snakes, reported the escape is harmless, except for a taste for chicken when it is hungry. He said a liberal reward will be paid for information as to the snake's whereabouts. He'll recapture it himself.

The python escaped through a six-inch hole which was covered by coarse wire netting. The wire had been forced at the bottom. During the night a boy slept in a cot inside the cage of the snake. The python apparently slithered beneath the cot and on through the hole while the younger slumbered.

Brown said the snake cost approximately \$1,000 and was not insured. He isn't worried, however—the snake had killed a cool place near the show grounds and enjoy a lengthy siesta.

Of the python's taste for chicken, Brown explained that was typical. In the Morshand floor of 1929, he said a snake of the same size was lost by Brown and was later found in a chicken lot. The owner of the chickens did some counting and reported the python had devoured 18 of his choice fowls.

Says Pure Water Supply Available from Lake

Editor, The Times:

We have read with a great deal of interest your recent editorial regarding the pollution of the Big Sandy river from which all the cities adjoining it receive their drinking water supply.

As we all know, during the extreme low water season most of the water is heavily polluted, with sewage and highly acid mine water; in fact, during the summer months we are practically drinking the purified sewage of the upper Big Sandy as Wheelwright is the only town that can boast of a sewage disposal plant.

Is there anything that can be done to alleviate this situation? As to the overall picture, we think not; at least for a long time in the future, due to the extensive cost of cities installing sewage disposal plants, which would require reampanying their sewage systems.

However, Prestonsburg, if we so desire, can do something about it NOW, about having to drink the doctored sewage of our own and neighboring towns.

With the completion of the Dewey dam within the next few months, it would be a very simple engineering job which would not cost too much to run a water line of sufficient size to the lake to furnish Prestonsburg with an abundant supply of pure lake water from Johns Creek, one of the few unpolluted streams in the state.

What citizen wouldn't much prefer drinking the pure lake water properly filtered and purified to the doctored sewage of the Big Sandy, even if necessary at slightly increased cost? We understand that our water plant pumping facilities will soon have to be enlarged to take care of increased demand. This new line would solve the problem, as it could be installed so as to siphon the water from the lake to the water plant.

Why not have an immediate survey made and steps taken with the proper government authorities relative to this matter?

Due to our strategic location and short distance to the waters of the lake, Prestonsburg is the only town in this section to which the Dewey lake water would be economically available. We believe this would be one of the finest advertisements that our town could possibly have and would encourage new business and residents to want to locate here.

Let's get busy and make pure water available to the public instead of doctored Big Sandy sewage. It will pay big dividends in more ways than one.

Or it may have been a psychic compensation for his semi-serfdom as he rebelled to free the branch from the tree for we know from subsequent happenings that the lord was ruthless toward him.

The act of the lowly tenant came to the ears of the great one and he had Peter seized and, whether by due process of law or not, he was sentenced with his family to exile in America. The terms of banishment must have allowed him to take with him his personality as there exist today in the possession of a descendant pieces of chinaware of English manufacture brought over by the family to the new land—exquisite chinaware which shows signs of great age but which has survived rather well the last two centuries.

We do not know where Peter landed in America or where he lived during the Revolutionary War, but it is a task to imagine part in the rebellion we can surmise without much ear of contradiction that he did not assist the British. He was a man of the old, restless and ever in search of new lands and a new frontier, came to Floyd county, at or near where is now Irel. There he settled permanently and finished out his allotted years—recounting stories of his exile, of how he plucked the riding stick, of the terrible sea voyage that caused such hardship and suffering.

His daughter Susan grew into womanhood and married John Sellards, a son of Ezekiah Sellards, of Virginia. Her husband was a brother of Jennie Wiley, famous pioneer.

mother and Indian captive of the wild borderland. Susan, according to her descendants, was a very small woman but lived to a great age, surviving her husband by several years.

John and she lived on Buffalo Creek, a tributary of Johns Creek in this county, as there a part of the Sellards family of Ezekiah Sellards had settled when coming to Kentucky. Later, as their family grew up, they sold their Buffalo farm and moved to Irel. As she grew old she recounted, too, the story of exile as her father had done, but to this story she now added a new story for her children—the sad borderland episode of the Indian captivity.

And the name Sullivan, in the first of this series, has ceased to exist with the descendants of Peter Sullivan. But like the descendants of the pioneer John Ross, the descendants of Peter Sullivan, exile and pioneer, live on in Eastern Kentucky under other paternal names.

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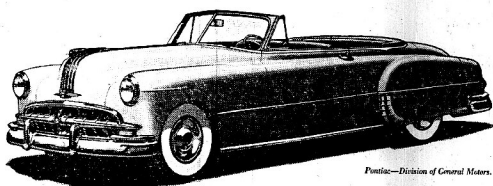

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY

Few will fall out with you if you insist that Kentucky is what it is because Kentuckians are what they are.

The following that line of reasoning a little further by saying Kentuckians are what they are largely because the food they eat is what it is.

About 49 out of every 50 adults who are working cheerfully for a living and doing their bit for the public good are well fed, which means good foodstuffs in the first place and first-rate cooking in the second place.

About people below par it is safe to put the ratio in reverse. Like a steam engine fired with inferior coal, a person who eats low-grade food doesn't perform well.

Thirty years ago I was talking with Judge Derieux about the kind of South Carolinians who elected Cole Blease Governor, then Senator. Derieux was a newspaper reporter on tour with Blease, who appealed to the most primitive prejudices of the state's backward voters.

"These people are what they are because they eat the very commonest grade of food," said Derieux. "Back-country people and none too well enlightened, but basically as good as you and me. They live on corn pone, salt pork, grits sorghum and grits. The same grub practically every meal 365 days in the year. That they should be morose, high-tempered, quick to respond to a demagogue, is perfectly natural."

Which brings us around to the high quality of food served in a large majority of eating places in Kentucky. In the last three or four years I have visited villages, towns and cities from the West Virginia line to the Mississippi river, from Mayville to the Tennessee border, and outside the larger cities I haven't found more than half a dozen good places to eat. In some of the good-sized cities all I can say for their best restaurants is that they are so-so.

The so-so eateries make money because they have no superior competition. The low grade places survive for the same reason. People have got to eat somewhere.

I haven't seen Duncan Hines' list of good Kentucky eating houses. But I'll bet you if it is nothing to brag about. If every Kentucky town of over 2,500 population had a restaurant on the list, the state would be a far more popular place for strangers to come to.

What's more, one good eating place in every town would not only prosper, but would force all other restaurants and quick-lunch rooms to raise their standards. The result would be healthier, happier Kentuckians capable of doing more and better work, making more money for themselves and taking a livelier interest in public affairs.

I have been eating in restaurants a good deal for 49 years, and I have never known a cook well managed, to fail. Serving good grub is the surest way of making money that I know of.

If I were 20 years younger I would start a restaurant myself. And, of course, I'd begin by hiring good cooks, not by promoting dishwashers or bus boys because I could get them cheap.

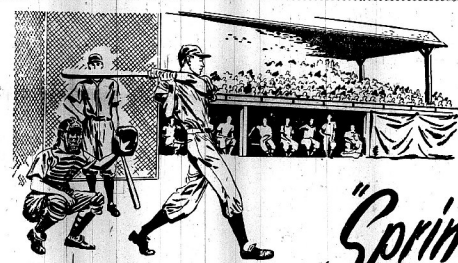

Hill as County Judge. In 1942, \$50,000 worth of bonds were bought; in 1943, \$30,000, and in 1944, \$10,000, making a total of \$90,000 the county has today.

Also in the bank, to be paid on this debt, is at this time exactly \$138,262.60.

All this is good. Nobody is more proud of this record than I, but I do not claim credit for making this possible. In fact, the credit belongs to no one individual.

It is a policy necessary to the county's sound credit and good name, and if elected County Judge I will not depart from it.

As a member of the fiscal court I have not, in my desire to get things done for my district, ever forgotten that I am a Floyd county man and that all Floyd county deserves whatever I could do for it. So, as the opportunity arose for other parts of the county to benefit, I have voted for such help.

As a candidate for County Judge I have no promises of miracles to make to the people. I do not want to make such promises, knowing I cannot fulfill them, and then have to face the people later, knowing they know I made false promises.

I can promise you, however, with complete honesty, that as County Judge I will work hard for all of Floyd county and for all its citizens in every walk of life. I will attend to the business of being your Judge, with no private axes to grind, no old scores to settle.

KENTUCKY ON THE MARCH

By EWING GALLOWAY

There's still gold in them thar red hills! To say it with another twist: Don't sell our clay subsoil short. Last year thousands of fields with all topsoil gone and after indifferent attempts at fertility restoration, yielded 70 bushels of corn. The best treatment: This land had received was a year or two's rest with mixed grasses and some grazing. In a less favorable year it would have produced 40 bushels to the acre.

Thirteen years ago I looked at an eroded, gullied field and told a real estate agent I didn't want it at any price. Subsequently we dug up three lines of tile in a 30-acre field along-side the hills and found the "made" soil 20 inches deep on the average. That much topsoil had washed down off the hillsides.

On the advice of Frank T. Street, a neighbor, I bought the hill. We filled the gullies with plow, dump scrapers, set slab dams in place, applied lime and phosphate, and sowed a mixture of bluegrass, hop clover, alfalfa and lespedeza. Now we have a good bluegrass pasture. It took five years to develop the pasture. Most of the red clay soil in Kentucky is much easier to reclaim. Much of it is not gullied. It all responds to reclamation legumes and grasses and to commercial chemical treatment. More than 50 per cent of Kentucky's red hills will go to permanent pasture in the next few years. Nearly all of them ought to.

This little piece is written to show the possible improvement created in the minds of land owners by enthusiastic soil conservationists that erosion is all but hopeless destruction of fertility.

Reilly, reclamation of our red clay hills is as much a part of the soil conservation as prevention of erosion. It is an all-important factor in state-wide conversion of hill land from grain production into pastures and livestock raising.

Don't sell Kentucky's red hills short!
