**SKYLINE MINE SET TO OPEN**

**Breathitt Strip Mine, Seen As Floyd Benefit, Has 60,000 Ton Output**

The Skyline mine of the Pond Creek Coal Company in Breathitt county will begin operation, April 15. It was announced in Huntington, W. Va., Friday.

This is the big coal operation referred to in an editorial in The Times, March 30, urging highway connection with the operation from this county.

Production was scheduled originally to start about January 1, but was delayed by disruptions in the industry.

The company opened its No. 1 shaft in the area near Brainard, Breathitt county, last July.

A strip-mine operation, it now has a capacity of about 60,000 tons a month.

Referring to the plant to be opened in mid-April, the report said it will be "one of the finest and most complete" ever constructed.

It also said that it will produce "one of the highest grades of bituminous coals we have ever produced."

Capacity production is expected to be 600,000 to 700,000 tons a year. The company's annual report forecasted during the coming year "a better market than (for) the industry as a whole" for high grade coals.

The report estimated the coal strike last year cost the company through loss of profits, maintenance, depreciation and overhead approximately \$1,753,000, and employees \$2,000,000 in wages.

**LIGON DRIVER DIES IN WRECK**

**Hamilton Victim in Pike On First Trip at New Job With Coal Mining Firm**

Hauling the first load of coal on his first day of employment, Charles Elliott Hamilton, 18, of Ligon, truck driver for the Thorpe and Hunt Coal Co., of Biggs in Pike county, was fatally injured beneath the vehicle at 9:30 a. m. Tuesday.

The accident occurred near the mine location. According to reports reaching here, he was driving the truck close to the edge of the road when the shoulder gave away. The youth attempted to jump clear but was caught under the vehicle.

He died 40 minutes later at Shelby hospital while on his way to the hospital. The son of Charles and Ethel Elliott Hamilton, he was born October 1, 1931 at Weathersburg.

He had lived at Ligon for four years. Surviving in addition to the parents, is a sister, Mrs. Dorothy Lee Hamilton Meade, Ligon.

**Telephone Wages Are Way Ahead of the Cost of Living**



## FLOYD GROUPS APPROVE PLAN

### Of Red Cross To Found Blood Center; County's Quota Only Half-Reached

The Floyd County Medical Society, the Floyd County Health Department, county hospitals and Floyd Chapter, American Red Cross concurred in a meeting last Thursday night at the Brown hotel here in approving the national blood program of the Red Cross and the county's participation in the program.

This action was one of the things necessary for Floyd county to benefit from the blood and blood derivatives to be stored at the Huntington, W. Va. center.

The other requirement Floyd county must meet is to attain its quota during the current fund drive for the Red Cross. As of Tuesday this week, the \$7,000 quota was little over half attained. Special gifts from larger contributors, however, had barely begun coming in at that time.

The Red Cross' blood program has been strongly urged by General George C. Marshall, chairman of the American Red Cross, as a measure to be taken against the eventuality of future war or disaster when the need for blood and its derivatives might be greater than ever before. The plan outlined for Floyd county provides 15 units a year to this county by a visit to blood units, and on each of these visits 100 units of blood will be asked.

**BANKERS PLAN FARMING AID**

**Decide County Cannot Depend Solely on Coal; Graham Addresses Group**

Floyd county's bankers agreed last Thursday that agricultural leaders that Floyd county's economy must not depend solely upon the coal mined from beneath its topsoil, that is, in the words of the speaker, "send above that soil figure prominently in Floyd county's economic future."

And so, the bankers agree, there must be something done for agriculture in this county. Plans were talked, generally, and later they hope to "get down to cases."

John Graham, agricultural expert of the Kentucky Bankers Association, was brought here for the meeting. His presence here was upon the request of J. D. Harkins, president of the Bank Josephine.

Mr. Graham met at the Brown hotel with Mr. Harkins, Russell Hazewood, cashier of the First National Bank, G. C. Spradlin, cashier of the State Bank, Martin H. D. Fitzpatrick, W. J. May and Adrian Collins, vice-president, cashier and assistant cashier, respectively, of the Bank Josephine, R. L. Shepherd, Vocational Agriculture teacher here, R. C. Barnett, instructor in the veterans' school, farming training program, and Billy Ray Wells, president of Future Farmers of America chapter in Prestonsburg.

The general plan discussed was to formulate a program for the benefit of Floyd county farmers, with the three Floyd county banks as sponsors and sharers of the expense involved. The program, which will probably start off in a small way, will serve as an agricultural stimulant. It is planned behind it all, it is explained, is the idea of increasing the county's agricultural income.

R. L. Shepherd, with other agricultural leaders, will work out a specific plan of action and submit it to the three banks for their approval and support.

Mr. Shepherd is now working independently of plans discussed at Tuesday's meeting, on the formation of a soil conservation district in this county. Reformation of the farm later to be developed as one part of the bankers' agricultural program. Seedlings are available to landowners at a cost of only \$4 per thousand, and the federal agriculture program will pay the landowner \$7 per acre (approximately 700 trees) for planting the seedlings.

Other phases of farming to be given consideration in the study of plans will be small aquaculture, vegetable growing, and beef and dairy cattle.

The resolution adopted by the Board is the auditorium-gymnasium at Del Rio, and bids on this project are being asked in an advertisement appearing in this edition of The Times. The Princess-Bikhorn Coal Company is a contributor on this work which was authorized some months ago by the Board but which has been delayed while approval of the State Department of Education was obtained.

Next is the Wheelwright gymnasium, including a cafeteria and rooms for the Industrial Arts and Music departments. The Inland Steel Company is to be a contributor on this work.

Third project mentioned is a new high school building and grounds for Prestonsburg. Other new buildings proposed are an elementary school on a new site at Iazon, the Katy Friend and Forks of Bull school buildings, a one-room addition to the Duale school which was included in the resolution, as were a cafeteria for the Maytown school and inside the school at the Druit consolidated school.

(The Prestonsburg Board of Education at its last meeting decided to cancel all commitments made to the County Board in setting a new high school building here. W. A. Spauldin, chairman of the City Board, said this week whatever agreement is reached will be the result of entirely new negotiations.)

All of these were described as badly needed projects which would represent considerable progress toward relieving the crowded situations which exist because of the accumulation of building needs during the war years of "no building" and increasing enrollment in concentrated areas.

The first part of the post-war building program saw the replacing of buildings burned during the war period by modern fireproof buildings at Wheelersburg and Lacey. The elementary building which was begun at Betsy Layne and stopped by the war was finished. Now nearing completion at Melvin is a modern fireproof elementary building which will help to relieve the extremely congested conditions in the whole upper Left Beaver area.

Detailed plans for the David building have been completed and bids will be received at the May meeting of the Board. Preliminary plans for the Wheelwright building have been approved by the State Department of Education and detailed plans are being completed.

Plans for the Prestonsburg building are being held up until a project is secured, Mr. Hall said. A modern high school building, representing the beginning of a high school plant sufficient to serve the larger area from which the school will draw its pupils for the next 25 to 50 years is contemplated, he said. The State Department of Education has frowned on the addition of further buildings on the present high school site. Negotiations for a suitable site are under way.

The Superintendent was authorized to procure plans and take the necessary steps toward effecting the other buildings and improvements mentioned. It is hoped that it will be possible to replace a few other rural buildings that are inadequate and to make improvements in many of the schools not mentioned in this main program," the Superintendent added.

If all the charges being hurled back and forth in this Floyd County Board of Education disagreement are true, perhaps a general housecleaning rather than a mere sifting of "dirty linen" is needed.

Mark this—we say, "If" We make no charges, though. We men involved in all this litigation are regarded by the writers of this editorial as his friends. No attempt is made to say all in or out as it should be in this corner of Floyd County's official hotbed.

But an impersonal, honest view of the whole affair leads the taxpayer and parent to reach certain conclusions:

If one member of the Board of Education, or two members, through business transactions violated the law to the extent that he or they forfeited their right to office, any others who "went along" with them in this alleged violation share their sin.

The law is plain as to the penalty for such aberrations. This statute surely has been known to all connected with the board, all along. Whenever was done, back there in those days when all was harmony, it has been within the full knowledge and consent of everybody who sat in on those meetings. In criminal law there are expressions such as "accessory before the fact" and just plain "accessory" which might apply.

The Attorney General or the State Department of Education might be interested. Apparently, the people of Floyd county aren't.

2. This contest is open to members of the Floyd County Fish and Game Club only, irrespective of residence, from January 1, 1950 to December 31, 1950.
3. No entry will be accepted of any fish caught outside the boundaries of the Seventh Conservation District as defined by the Division of Game and Fish, comprising the counties of Pike, Floyd, Johnson, Letcher, Martin, Knott, Perry, Leslie, Breathitt and Magoffin.
4. Fish must be caught with pole and line only to be eligible for entry in this contest. (Cane pole, casting rod or fly rod using live or artificial bait.)
5. No contestant may receive more than one prize. In case of ties, the first entry received will be adjudged the winner provided the contestant has adhered to all rules and regulations herein set forth.
6. No other species of fish except Smallmouth Black Bass or Largemouth Black Bass and Walleyes will be permitted to be entered in this contest. To be eligible for a prize the Black Bass must be at least 15" long and the Walleye must be at least 18" long. Measurement from tip of closed mouth to the longest part of the tail will be considered correct. Size of fish will be determined by length, not by weight.
7. Taking of the fish need not be witnessed. However, at least two persons must witness the weighing and measuring of your fish.

**ORDINANCE**

**PROVIDING FOR THE LICENSING OF TRINERANT MAGAZINE SALESMEN**

It is ordained by the Common Council of the City of Prestonsburg: SEC. 1 That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation, other than those having an established business in the City of Prestonsburg, to engage temporarily in selling or offering for sale any subscription to magazines unless such person, persons, firm or corporation shall first secure a license from the City Clerk of the City of Prestonsburg to do so. The price of said license shall be and is hereby set at the sum of \$5.00 per day.

SEC. 2 Any person, persons, firm or corporation violating this ordinance or any part thereof shall be fined not less than \$1.00 nor more than \$5.00 for each offense, and each sale or solicitation as above set out shall constitute a separate offense.

SEC. 3 All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

**ORDINANCE**

**BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY:**

SECTION I— That the City Attorney take necessary legal steps to annex as part of the City of Prestonsburg the following described territory, lying on the western city limits of the city, as it is now incorporated:

## ORDINANCE

### PROVIDING A CURFEW HOUR TO PROHIBIT LOITERING IN THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG:

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Prestonsburg:

SEC. 1. From the 10th day of March, 1950, it will be unlawful for any person to loiter on the streets or places of business after 1:00 a.m. All persons having lawful or legitimate reasons for being on the streets after this hour, such as employment, going to and from work, justice's doctor, etc., will be exempt from this law.

SEC. 2. Any person violating this ordinance, or any part thereof, shall be fined not less than \$5.00, nor more than \$10.00 for each offense, and/or not less than one (1), nor more than five (5) days in jail.

The Police Department is hereby instructed to strictly enforce this law.

SEC. 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SEC. 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect when passed by the Council and posted as follows:

Passed this March 6, 1950, 3-23-50.

## ORDINANCE

### DETERMINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF PRESTONSBURG, KENTUCKY:

SECTION I—That the City Council take necessary legal steps to annex as part of the City of Prestonsburg the following described territory, lying on the northern city limits of the City, as it is now incorporated:

Beginning on the east entrance to U.S. Highway No. 23 bridge at Cliff; thence running with Highway No. 23 right-of-way in a southerly course to the right-of-way of the Auxier road to a garage building of the Porter estate; thence leaving said right-of-way of Highway No. 23 and running with north boundary of said Auxier road to a junction with a county road leading up May Branch; thence leaving Auxier road and with the center of county road up May Branch to the end of a point leading up to the May cemetery; thence leaving the May Branch county road and crossing bottom and May Branch S 88° 40' W 500 feet to the foot of hill; thence leaving May Branch and running up point to the ridge between May Branch and lower limits city; thence running with top of ridge in a southerly course to a point above cemetery on ridge dividing said May Branch and Trimble Branch; thence with said ridge between Trimble and May Branch to a trap in ridge between Haunted Hollow, Trimble Branch and May Branch; thence with ridge dividing Trimble Branch and Big Sandy river to junction of area-act corporation line near city water tank; thence with said city corporation lines to the Big Sandy river; thence down said Sandy river to the beginning.

SECTION II—All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION III—This ordinance shall be in full force and effect when passed by the Council and posted.


