

**CASE CLOSED AS TWO DIE**  
**Akers, Meeks Both Dead After Waging Gun Battle; Cause of Fray Unknown**

Two Johnson county men, both of whom had relatives in Floyd county, waged a revolver duel to the death at Offutt, Sunday afternoon.

Clude Akers, 44, died where he and Pete Meeks, 48, emptied their revolvers. Meeks died at the Paintsville hospital, Sunday night.

Sheriff D. B. Trimble of Johnson county, was in early reports of the gun duel quoted as saying an old grudge led to the shooting, but this later was questioned by conflicting versions of the battle and of the backgrounds of the two men.

Trimble said Meeks discussed the shooting before he died at the hospital and that he gained from him this description of the fight:

Meeks and his wife were walking along the railway tracks, about 50 yards from Offutt railway station, when they saw Akers sitting in a pickup truck parked near the tracks. Akers approached the couple, drew his gun and asked Meeks, "Are you ready to die?" As Mrs. Meeks fled, screaming down the tracks, the two men began firing at close range.

It was said Meeks fell first but continued firing. Akers was hit three times, once in the head. Meeks was shot through a kidney and died on the hospital operating table.

Both men, Sheriff Trimble said, had served pen terms for slayings. "I guess this closed the case," said Trimble.

Akers was a step-son of Mrs. Bert Arnett, of Lancer, near here, and his four half-sisters, Mrs. Andrew Stephens, Mrs. Henry Whitaker, Mrs. Virgil Grimsly and Mrs. Royce Mayo, live in Prestonsburg and vicinity.

Meeks has a brother, Willie Meeks, whose address was listed as Wheelwright.

Akers widow and four children survive: Clyde Herman Akers, with the army in Germany, Charles Akers, Shelbyville, Mrs. Irene Kendrick, Walters, W. Va., and Mrs. Sarah Pruitt, Ford's Branch, Ky.

Meeks is survived by his wife, Ava, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Isaac Meeks, one daughter, Mrs. E. B. LAND OWNERS ORDER TREES
Individuals, Firms To Plant Seedlings For Reforestation
Thirty-two thousand trees, ordered by Floyd county landowners to reforest idle acres, were delivered last week. It was announced by Forest Ranger Palmer Crum.
The seedlings, usually shipped by common carrier at the buyer's expense, were delivered to the Forest Ranger's office by a Kentucky Division of Forestry truck and then taken by the ranger to the purchasers. "This new method of transporting trees is being tested in an attempt to get the seedlings to the buyers in a much fresher condition," Crum said.
Shortleaf pine led the demand for trees with 25,500. Other species were black walnut 5,000, ash 1,000 and white oak 500. "The pine was grown at the Division of Forestry nursery, Dawson Springs, and the hardwoods at our Louisville nursery," Crum said.
Floyd landowners who ordered trees are: Dr. T. J. Chandler, Betsy Layne; G. S. Martin, East-ern; Princess Elkhorn Coal Company, Davidson Springs; and the Zinc and Steel Company, Wheelwright.
"These landowners," commented Mr. Crum, "have taken a forward step which will not only benefit them but others through reforestation and erosion prevention but also serve as an example to their neighbors."

Cousin of Mrs. Brown, One of Three Murdered, Prestonsburg Resident
One of the three persons shot to death at Dover, N. J., Saturday night by a 16-year-old boy was a cousin of Mrs. Grade Hubbard, Prestonsburg. The Times learned this week.
This victim was Mrs. Myrtle Brown, wife of Everett Brown, Methodist minister and C. & O. Railway Company employee, at Shelby, Pike county.
The others killed by William A. Nickle, 16, nephew of the victim, were Charles Brown, 49, who was considered dying of cancer, and his wife, Mary, 42, a telephone operator and registered nurse.
The youth confessed the triple murder when apprehended in Delaware, a few miles from the scene of the crime.
Police reconstructed the crime in this way:
The boy met his aunt Mary as she returned home from work Saturday night and shot her in the face and stomach with a .22 calibre rifle which he reportedly had borrowed "to kill some squirrels." He then went into the living room where Mrs. Myrtle Brown was either reading or asleep and shot her in the back of her head. From there he went to the bedroom and shot the invalid Charles Brown in the head.
He then took the Browns' automobile and drove to Pearson's Corner, Del., where he told his parents the Browns had given him permission to use their car. It developed that the boy had been previously reprimanded for taking the auto without the owners' consent, and this is believed to have led to the slayings.
The boy had been in trouble, two years ago, with authorities. Mrs. Myrtle Brown had gone to New Jersey, a few weeks ago, to assist her sister-in-law in caring for her husband. Mrs. Sid Hamilton, of Teabery, also is a cousin of the Pike county woman.

Poolroom Operators Must Have Permission Of Parents of Minors
Frankfort, Ky.—A poolroom operator must have written permission from parents or guardians of minors before letting the youngsters play pool or billiards.
If the minors are merely playing for fun, the written permission still is required. Asst. Attorney General John B. Browning advised W. E. Caldwell, Hickman.
An operator convicted of letting minors play pool without parental consent is subject to a fine of \$100 and forfeits his right to keep pool tables, he said.
In an opinion sent to Judge C. P. Holt, Great Falls, Mont., Browning said Kentucky law subjects motor vehicle operators who leave the ignition keys in their parked autos to fines of not less than \$10 nor more than \$100.
The same penalty applies to owners who park their cars on perceptible grades "without effectively setting the brake and turning the front wheels in the curb or side of the highway," Browning said.

July Is Deadline Set For Most War II Vets To Begin GI Training
Veterans of World War II planning GI Bill education and training were reminded today by Mr. Roy E. Alexander, acting in charge of the Pikeville Veterans Administration office that the July 25, 1951, deadline for starting is only four months away.
This coming spring term will be the final start term that veterans may enter or re-enter before the deadline, Mr. Alexander said, adding that if they plan to enroll, it is not too early to start making arrangements.
The 1951 deadline applies to most World War II veterans—those discharged from service before July 25, 1947. Those discharged after that date have four years from their discharge date in which to begin training.
Veterans affected by the deadline actually must have commenced their training by July 25, 1951, if they want to continue afterwards, the VA representative said, a veteran must be in training at that date unless he has temporarily interrupted his course of vacation or for other reasons beyond his control. Once a veteran completes or discontinues his course of GI Bill training after the deadline, he may not start another course.
Veterans may obtain further information from the VA office located in the Connolly Building on Main Street in Pikeville. The office is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday of each week.

## To the People of Floyd County:

The biggest issue confronting Floyd County people right now is the War Memorial Hospital. Last November Floyd County people approved a bond issue of \$400,000.00 to pay our part of the cost. Approximately \$300,000.00 or three-fourths of the cost will be paid by the taxpayers in Magisterial Districts 2, 3 and 4.

The Floyd County Magistrates have unanimously selected the site for Floyd County hospital at Allen, Kentucky. The fiscal court's action in locating the hospital at Allen has been approved by three-fourths of the Medical doctors in Floyd county. Those doctors opposing the Allen site live in or near Prestonsburg.

Riley Hall, owner of the hospital site selected at Allen, Ky., appeared before the Fiscal Court, and told the Magistrates and County Judges that he would allow them to set the price on his land

themselves, indicating that he would sell the site at a reasonable price. It is reported that the other site considered, near Prestonsburg, will cost \$400,000.00 of the taxpayers money, which on its face appears exorbitant.

The site at Allen is level and far removed from noise of highway traffic. The Prestonsburg site is too near the highway, is down under the road, and unsuitable for our county hospital.

Three-fourths of Floyd County's people live above Allen on the Beavers and Mud Creek sections, and the Floyd County Hospital should be at Allen, because it would be better located for the vast majority. Even the people around Prestonsburg or Middle Creek could get to the hospital at Allen before a patient from Wayland or Wheelwright or the Mud Creeks could. The Allen site is just across the river from a good water system, whereas it will cost thousands of dollars to run water lines to the site near Prestonsburg.

People, this is your problem. The hospital should be built at Allen, because this is the best place for most of the people who will pay the tax bills. Let your Magistrates know you are back of their vote in putting the hospital at Allen.

Let the other politicians know you expect them to be for the people's welfare, instead of selfish interests in the lower end of the County. Write your governor at Frankfort.



**TEACHER STRIKE THREAT VOICED BY AFL OFFICIAL**

Teachers will strike in many Kentucky counties next fall unless those counties correct their property assessments, school finances, and teachers' salaries, Edward H. Weyler warned recently.

Weyler is secretary-treasurer of the Kentucky Federation of Labor. He has done organizational work for the Kentucky Federation of Teachers, a K.P.L. affiliate, since the resignation of Patrick S. Kirwan last September as K.F.T. president and organizer.

Weyler recently visited schools and K.F.T. locals in Ashland, Catlettsburg, Central City, Dayton, and Ruckelshaus.

"The K.F.T., he declared, has several thousand members in different parts of the state, and has the power to make a strike effective in approximately 15 counties."

He declined to list the counties. Weyler described the strike warning as the only way of arousing the public to a realization of Kentucky's serious educational problem. Educational facilities, he said, are "rapidly deteriorating."

Some of the schools, he visited were in a bad disrepair, he said. In all of them he found "the teachers very underpaid, as are most of the principals and superintendents."

The fault, he said, is not in the budgeting. For instance, one school district devoted between 70 and 80 per cent of its budget to payrolls, "but the teachers still were receiving only about \$1,700 a year."

Nor does the fault lie in the tax rate. Weyler continued. Most of the school districts, he found, had the maximum tax rate of \$1.50 for each \$100 assessed valuation.

The fault is in the assessments, he declared, "and the answer is a re-evaluation and re-assessment of taxes on property."

He cited two examples in the communities visited: "A bank building one couldn't buy for \$1,500,000 is assessed at less than \$200,000."

"A man recently sold a large lot for several thousand dollars. In order to transfer the deed, he had to pay taxes on the property for the past five years. He did so on a \$50 assessment."

In one community where officials had experts make assessment recommendations, "they cannot get any citizen of the community to accept the job of assessing prop-

erty in accordance with the recommendations of the assessors.

"The reason is that it would mean such a tremendous increase in property taxes for the privileged that this assessor would become too unpopular to remain in the locality."

Weyler went on: "Somehow if the people in our state could generally understand that education is the light that guides the progress of the human family, we'd stop being so miserly where school taxes are concerned."

He said he saw "leaking roofs, doors broken, and the desks at which children sit broken in many cases." He saw "little boys doing janitor work, washing outside windows during school hours." He also saw principals and teachers "doing janitor work."

"It's pretty bad when the front door almost breaks off as you open it, and the dust rises off the floor when you walk on it."

He learned some classes have as many as 68 pupils—"twice the number they ought to have." The parents are insisting on small classes, he said, but there isn't enough money to pay for more teachers.

"I think it fair to say," declared Weyler, "that the Kentucky system of schools right now is in no position to train a coming generation which must have the intelligence and knowledge to govern if we are going to continue as a democracy."




