



STRAIGHT ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS

In answer to questions propounded to me last week by Woodrow Burchett through a Taxpayer, my answers are as follows:

- 1. I have held office as Circuit Court Clerk 12 years and as Circuit Judge 6 years.
2. The salary received during my time in office never exceeded the Constitutional limit.
3. Since I never at any time received any excess income I never required of me to file a statement of income and expenses. Since I never collected any excess money I had none to turn back. No tax money ever stuck to my hands.

The first six years I served as Circuit Court Clerk, the office did not pay more than fifty dollars per month, and I paid out to W. O. Hill Goble one half what I received for assistance.

The second six years I served as Circuit Court Judge, my salary was fixed by the state bill and exact conditions prevailing. There was no more or less.

As a taxpayer and an individual citizen I am interested in the County Court more than twenty years ago to correct some of the conditions that now exist. I did not see my assistance from anyone at that time although I paid several hundred dollars in attorney fees.

While I was Circuit Judge, I investigated the Grand Jury as directed by the Grand Jury at that time and the financial condition of this county.

But the people were not aroused as they are now. You should see the report of the Grand Jury made at the September term 1946, which I was Judge as to what was taking place in your fiscal affairs at that time and the County Attorney who was Woodrow Burchett was directed to take action but none was taken, which accounts for the deplorable conditions now existing.

If there are any other questions, I can be called upon to answer them. I know them. I will gladly do so.

Mrs. Davis also stressed the fact that the confusion in the American mind and society as a whole is reflected in the controversy within our public schools and in the minds of our youth in the past generation. It was also revealed in this review that many teachers and the popular education had deteriorated. Mrs. Davis read this quotation by a well-known educator who made this remark to Dorothy: 'The present situation is getting down all the standards of university education.' A general discussion followed this review of this important topic and members agreed that the schools definitely need 'SOS'.

Next Mrs. W. Howell told about Kentucky's worst schoolhouse, Tabernash No. 2, in Adair county. This school formerly was a tenant house with no running water or artificial lights and the 24 pupils are crowded together in the heat foot-candle space. Mrs. Howell brought out the fact that one of the main causes for this condition is isolation and that because of this isolation pupils cannot attend schools in adjacent towns. The fact that the school was clean and a happy place was mentioned and this condition was known about but no efforts and genuine interest in the pupils by the teacher, Mrs. Howell reported according to a recent article concerning this school, that is not an unresolvable problem but authorities agree that it symbolizes a problem that only federal aid can solve. The next topic for review and discussion was, 'Who's Trying to Run our Schools?' Mrs. Beecher-Harwick gave a resume of the topic by Arthur D. Morse, in which the shocking fact was given that our public education is under the heaviest attack in all its history and that their attack is aimed at its destruction. This problem has been discussed by the National Education Association. 'We place the greatest importance upon this attack and in recent months campaign against our schools have been intensified in number and effectiveness. Since they strike at the very roots of our system of free public education, they are a very real menace to democracy.'

Mrs. O. J. Williams then read and discussed a letter as it appeared in the Point View in the Courier-Journal recently, concerning the fact that the school plan should be discussed before it is voted upon. The members agreed with the writer that the voters should not only be told why amendments should be voted for but what plan has been worked out to succeed the present one. 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



Two-State Commission Is Sought for Breaks

FRANKFORT, Ky., May 26—A suggestion that Congress authorize the states of Kentucky and Virginia to establish an interstate commission to develop the Breaks of Sandy as a tourist attraction was made here today by Conservation Commissioner Henry Ward.

He said it is his opinion that Congressional approval is necessary before the two states could take such action. The recommendation followed a visit to the Breaks of Sandy last week by the 11th Governor's Tour, and a referendum by Governor Lawrence W. Workup of Kentucky's interest in the development of the area.

"The U.S. Constitution provides that one state shall not, without the consent of Congress, enter into an agreement or compact with another state," Ward said. "Under this section, it is my opinion that Kentucky and Virginia could not jointly enter into a compact to develop the Breaks of Sandy without the sanction of Congress, even though both decided they desired to do so."

Ward said he has written to U.S. Senator Earle C. Clements, who is one of the leading advocates of development of the Breaks, and to U.S. Representative Carl Perkins recommending that Congress pass the necessary legislation authorizing the states to act. The Kentucky portion of the Breaks lies in Pike County, which is in Congressman Perkins' district.

"The legislatures of both Kentucky and Virginia at their 1952 sessions directed their Departments of Conservation to make studies of the Breaks and report their recommendations to the 1954 sessions," Ward said. "On the basis of my own belief that the Breaks fits into Kentucky's plan to develop the tourist and recreation industry, I am prepared now to make a recommendation that the two states authorize the creation of an interstate commission with authority to develop the Breaks. I understand that Virginia's study of the matter has not been completed, but I expressed to the Virginia officials our desire to co-operate with them."

"It would be most difficult for Kentucky to act alone to develop

the Breaks, inasmuch as the greater portion of the scenic gorge created by the breaking of the river through the Cumberland mountain lies in Virginia," Ward continued.

"The area logistically is one which should be developed by both states, or by the federal government. It is my opinion that eventually the Breaks of Sandy and the area between Elkhorn City, Ky., and Haysi, Va., should be taken over by the National Park Service as a part of the national parkway system."

Ward also suggested that an effort should be made to bring about an agreement on an appropriate name for the area between interested persons in Kentucky and Virginia.

"Kentuckians call it Breaks of Sandy, but Virginians say it is Breaks of Cumberland," he pointed out. "Actually the stream which cut the 1,000-foot deep gorge through the mountain is the Russell Fork of the Levisa Fork of the Big Sandy River. The confusion existing over the name isn't helping its cause."

Ward said that if Congress passed an enabling act, it would be necessary for the state legislatures of both Kentucky and Virginia to pass legislation providing for their cooperation and setting forth details under which they might act jointly.

Highway Death Rate Reported Up Slightly

FRANKFORT, Ky., May 26 (Sp.) —Deaths on Kentucky highways came at a slightly higher rate for the number of miles traveled during the first quarter of 1953 than during a similar period in 1952, but at a lower rate than during all of 1952.

A report just released by the Department of State Police shows that highway deaths occurred at the rate of .88 for each 100 million vehicle miles traveled during the first three months of this year, against a rate of .84 for the first quarter of 1952. The rate for all of last year was .94.

State Police officials do not see the increase over early 1952 as significant but believe it may be only the result of better accident reporting. Some death reports take months to reach here but reporting is generally better than it was a year ago, they point out.

There were 173 traffic deaths during the first three months of this year and 165 for the same period of 1952. Vehicle miles traveled in Kentucky through March, 1953, totaled 1,949,000,000, against 1,931,000,000.

The mileage figures are compiled with the use of a formula employed by the National Safety Council and taking into account the amount of gasoline sold within the state. The gasoline miles are determined by tax figures.

Through May 20, the police reported 277 deaths for 1953, compared to 286 for the same period last year.



GARDEN NEWS

SWEET POTATOES

IT IS TIME TO GET SWEET POTATOES STARTED. The best variety is the Virginia Heart and as the name implies, it makes only a small bush over the hill for easy tending and digging. The flesh is uniformly deep orange, and the quality aspect, the "red hot" variety is the "regular" Porto but may be used, or that earlier stored Nancy Hall.

It is important to use only slips known to have been produced from tubers treated for blackrot. This is the disease that results in storage loss. To avoid soil stain or scurf, which are these skin-deep blotches that later become "dry rot" in storage, the following should be done. In a 6-pound paper sack put several tablespoons of flowers of sulfur, insert 25 slips with the leaves protruding, gather the top of the sack around the slips and shake evenly until sulfur adheres to the stems and roots in large enough quantities that it can be seen.

If there is such a thing in the garden, a "good" slip should be chosen, two or three years away from manuring. If the land has been manured recently the excess amount of nitrogen will prevent the development of good quality potatoes. The other plant foods, phosphorus and potash, should be high, especially potash. Lime should be low, as sweet land tends to make only strings.

It is best to choose some place outside the garden that meets with the above requirements, and use one of the following fertilizers: 2-12-12 or 2-10-10 at the rate of 100 lbs. round to 25-30 feet of row. The rows should be about 35 inches wide, and the slips set 15 inches apart, when setting. The soil should be loose. No insect or fungicide other than sweet potatoes, except that sometimes something is needed because of "waxing to death" of the slips before growth can start. The remedy is dusting with DDT or Dithionin as soon as plants are set.

Tending sweet potatoes is simple, requiring merely shaving the hills with a hoe until the leaves of the potato have and shade over 80% of the surface of the row when the vines are used. Use no advantage at all for the mistake has been made in selecting land that was too rich.

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

Floyd County Historical Notes

By HENRY P. SCALF.

A letter from James Taylor Adams, of Big Laurel, Virginia, under date of May 8, in regard to his ancestor, Thomas Lovelady, the Revolutionary soldier, is of interest. As noted by the "Floyd County Times" in a recent issue, Adams' letter an error in regard to the DAR chapter that was named for Lovelady appeared in the recent "Times" article. Mr. Adams corrects this. He writes:

"I read your article in the 'Times' on the career of Thomas Lovelady with much interest, as this man is my ancestor. Notice that you mention the DAR chapter at Wise, Va., considered naming their post for this Revolutionary soldier. It was the Lee County Chapter at Jonesville, not Wise; and they did name it The Thomas Lovelady Chapter."

"I am not a genealogist, whose name I do not remember, made a talk before a meeting of the Thomas Lovelady Chapter at Jonesville, and he stated that Thomas Lovelady was the first settler in what is now Lee County and that he settled in what is known as Lovelady Cove near the present town of Dumfries, in Scott county, and that soon thereafter his wife died and Thomas lived alone in his cabin there for some time.

"While I have no way of proving that this man is in error, I believe that he is wrong insofar as his wife dying soon after he made the settlement in Lovelady Gap. Both J. M. Sumner and J. M. Addison, recognized authorities on the early history of this region, state that Thomas Lovelady was an early settler in Lee county and that he established himself there about 1769. While I doubt the date, I have no way of disproving it. This I know (and it is borne out by his pension declaration on file in Floyd county courthouse) Thomas Lovelady was a settler in the Revolution in early part of that struggle from N. C. and resided for a second term, during later part of the war, while residing in Lovelady county, Va., which covered what is Lee and Scott now.

"I believe that Thomas Lovelady's wife dying, soon after he made his settlement at the gap which bears his name; if he lived alone, he had no children and I know that he had at least one child by his first wife and it is through this daughter (whose name is unknown to me and is assumed deceased, I believe that she married a Johnson and that her daughter married a Rodgers who married Thomas Roman, commonly called Thomas Davis because he was raised by Beales Davis, whose heirs here have a claim to 18000 acres of the richest coal land in Southwest Virginia and East Kentucky. I have only tradition for the above statement. It could be that Thomas Lovelady's daughter married a Roman and that they were the parents of Thomas Roman (or Davis). I do know that somewhere back there a Johnson is my ancestor, somewhere through the Rodgers-Roman-Davis line.

"There is a movement afoot to organize an association of the kin of Beales Davis here in near future and maybe then we will get all this straightened out.

Another letter of interest is from the dean of local historians in Eastern Kentucky. He is Lee Strickland, former Prestonsburg resident but now of Morehead and a columnist for the Rowan County News. The

State Highway Traffic Shows Gain in April

FRANKFORT, Ky., May 25 (AP)—Traffic on Kentucky highways showed a gain in April of 4.6 per cent over April, 1952, according to the monthly traffic survey of the Department of Highways.

The survey showed that truck and bus traffic increased 10.7 per cent over April of last year.

Fourteen permanent recorder stations spotted over the state help count the traffic and the Department of Highways has portable counters out most of the time.

Traffic last month was 181 per cent of that for the average month of 1941, the year of the highest traffic count before World War II and the heaviest used on Kentucky traffic surveys. Truck and bus traffic in April was 129 per cent of that for an average month in 1931.
