Application Deadline For Bluegill Is Set

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 19 (AP)—The deadline for applications for bluegill fish for farm pond stocking is Feb. 15, the Division of Fisheries reported today. Divisions of these fish will start on March 1 but the applications must be received at an earlier date so that they can be processed and the ponds of delivery mapped.

Fish are furnished free to any farm pond owner making application. If a farmer has a pond he wishes stocked he should contact the Conservation officer in his county. An inspection of the pond will be made as to size and depth. A basic delivery, usually started in May, will follow the bluegill delivery and these fish species will be stocked for a balanced fish population.

Wheelwright Maroons Tip Betsey Layne, 91-90

Betsey Layne suffered their first defeat in fifteen outings as the Wheelwright Maroons succeeded in turning back the Bobcats for the second time this season 91-90 last Saturday at Wheelwright.

The rebounding, heading Maroons of Hugo Miller outplayed the Bobcats as diminutive Home Osborne paired the Maroons with a 38-point collection.

Shooting percentages, astronomically high on both sides saw the Bobcats jump out to front of the Maroons 12-8 in the opening minute, then lay behind as the Maroons got hot and barreled past the Bobcats only to surrender the lead 19-18, at the end of the first quarter. Wheelwright, riding on the crest of baskets pitched in by Osborne and Curry, were leading 50-47 at halftime.

In the third quarter, Gary Daniels, stellar forward of the Bobcats, suffered leg injury which visibly slowed him down for the remainder of the game. However, Spears, who took up the slack, paced Betsey Layne as they rolled up 25 in the third quarter to keep within one point of the Maroons who led 72-71.

The lead exchanged several times in the last quarter with the Maroons maintaining their lead, 81-90, winning their fifteenth game.

Former Raceland Coach New Morehead Mentor, Succeeding Jamerson

Paul Adams, football coach at Raceland high school has been named head football coach at Morehead State College, replacing "Shorty" Jamerson, who resigned as head coach in October.

Adams' appointment came after a meeting of the college board of Regents last week and was announced on January 11 by Morehead President Adron DeLoach. Paul Adams was selected for this position after a thorough and careful consideration of persons available and off recommendations of representative alumni and the faculty Council on Athletics.

The new coach, who has a Little All-American selection during his playing days with the Eagles, will take over his duties on February 1. Adams is returning to his alma mater with an impressive high school record. During his three years at Raceland, he compiled a record of eighteen wins in twenty-four games. Raceland finished second in the Northwestern Kentucky Conference in 1955.

A graduate of Coal Grove (Ohio) high school, Adams played center at Morehead for four years under the tutelage of Ellis Johnson and Len Miller, achieving Little All-American honors in 1949. His college work was interrupted by a two-year hitch in the Marine Corps during the period 1942-46, but he returned to graduate in 1946. He played pro ball with the Pittsburgh Steelers for three seasons immediately following graduation, returned to Morehead as assistant football coach in 1950 and coached at Ludlow, Ky., from 1951 to 1953.

Adams is married and has a one-year-old son. His wife is the former Betsey Creech, also a Morehead graduate.

John Hill's Panthers, Paintsville, defeated Meade in a hard-fought game by winning Clark County 60-54 Saturday night. Winchester took a 3-0 lead in the first quarter, but the Panthers came back to win in front 32-24 at the three-quarter mark.

Junior player Tommie Adams scored 16 markers for the Panthers and Joe Allen countered with 14. Blue-souled Kelly Coleman, the scoring sensation of the game, poured in 45 as Wayland topped over M. C. Sapp 94-48 for its fifth win in six starts. This Coleman has gone over the 500 mark in basketballing his 147 per game average.

Excellent weather prevailed throughout the season, except for a few days of heavy rain and snow in the latter part of the season. Hunting for ducks, geese and geese was good.

Array of Experts Tell Growers of Opportunity; Say Market Is Unlimited

The strawberry show held Wednesday attracted a large number of growers and interested parties who presided and spoke on a variety of subjects.

Present were approximately 100 growers, mostly agents, representatives of farm organizations, processors and other specialists.

Purpose of the meet, according to W. W. Macell, strawberry specialist of the Extension Service, University of Kentucky, was to get growers ahead of production. We are here for a checkup on the strawberry program in Eastern Kentucky.

At the meeting, Macell stated that the strawberry market is unlimited. The grower's market is greater than that of Western Kentucky and you are closer to the big markets of Philadelphia, Cincinnati, and Pittsburgh.

C. D. Phillips, extension specialist of the University, spoke on "What Consumers Demand in Berries." He stated that consumers want berries that are sweet and juicy, and that the grower should select varieties that are adapted to the market, pointing out that it was possible to sell what the market wants.

Elmer Eversole, who is installing a processing plant at Hazard, attended, but C. H. Jones, Merchants State College, who was slated to discuss what processors demand in strawberries, was unable to present. He wrote instead an assignment to the growers that he would bring to the meeting.

The clinic had both a morning and afternoon session. A discussion led by W. J. Farmer of the University, led a preliminary questionnaire period.

Speakers of the afternoon were Paul Smith of the College and Vernon Warren, manager of Process-King, who discussed the demand for strawberries. Lawrence Kneib, lecturer and Urban Kneib, Kentucky strawberry farmer.

The counties represented included Floyd, Perry, Johnson, Pike, Breathitt, Lawrence, Knott, Letcher and Magoffin. A second clinic is scheduled for Morehead in the near future.



The Handman Democrat said Douglas told him the subcommittee will hold hearings on the Perkins' Seventh Congressional District, but has not yet decided on places and dates.

Perkins said the unemployment in the Eastern Kentucky area is 22 per cent, but that for the state as a whole, it is 12 per cent.

Total employment in Kentucky amounted to 272,000 last month, with total unemployment of 36,700 or 13.5 per cent, he said. But in the five Eastern Kentucky areas, the unemployment figures ranged from 8.5 per cent to 22 per cent.

He listed areas with employment, unemployment and unemployment percentages as follows: Hazard areas (Breathitt, Perry, and Letcher counties)—17,815 employed, 1,692 unemployed or 9.5 per cent.

Pikeville area (Floyd county)—19,935 employed, 1,631 unemployed or 8.2 per cent.

Portsmouth area (Martin, Johnson, Magoffin, Floyd, and Boone counties)—20,752 employed, 2,273 unemployed or 10.9 per cent.

Employment in the area totals 96,923 while unemployment totals 10,908 or 11.3 per cent.

Perkins said that there are families in the Seventh district without food and that children go to school without having been fed. He said that three out of every 10 persons there are subsisting on relief.

In the four years between 1950 and 1954, the district's population declined more than 10 per cent as a result of people being forced out by economic necessity, Perkins said.

These good people resent unemployment and the necessity of accepting handouts, Perkins declared. "They do not want more relief, but a program to provide them with jobs in their own communities."

The major provisions of Perkins' bill are:

1. It sets up an agency whose function would be to help distressed areas.
2. The agency administrator is authorized to make loans or grants up to 100 per cent of the cost for construction of industrial plants and commercial facilities, including commercial water, to attract new industries to depressed areas.
3. The administrator is authorized to construct needed public facilities, including secondary schools, health centers, and help established business.
4. Federal procurement agencies shall buy supplies and services to the maximum practicable extent from depressed areas.
5. The agency shall make available to depressed areas market research and other forms of technical assistance.
6. The secretary of labor is directed to provide suitable employment to trained and vocational school graduates in the distressed areas.
7. Unemployed persons in the distressed areas who attend them in order to receive occupational training are entitled to extension of an unemployment insurance for an additional 13 weeks.

PAYMENTS STOPPED
 Markket, Ky. Jan. 9. — Commonwealth of Agriculture Ben D. Wolfe announced today that he had stopped payments for cattle affected with bluetongue disease and sent to slaughter and for sheep and goats affected with bluetongue disease before they are vaccinated as an emergency measure. Wolfe estimated that he would save approximately \$3,000 for the remainder of the year.

Kentucky Aid Payments Contribution To Economy

Frankfort, Ky., Jan. 18 (AP) — Kentucky's largest grant last year in public assistance grants amounted to \$10,000,000, according to a report of the Economic Security Vice E. H. Barnes. The report also shows that the state's dependent children and blind—according to Commissioner of Economic Security Vice E. H. Barnes. This represents a substantial contribution to the economy of Kentucky as Barnes said that grants to these persons to live with a minimum of decency and respect. Agent persons on the rolls totaled 55,487, while aid to dependent children grants went to a monthly average of 14,796 families, and there were an average of 2,967 blind persons receiving checks each month. Old-age assistance payments totaled \$23,570,816; aid to dependent children grants totaled \$14,299,995 and aid to nearly blind, \$1,121,145. The figures were contained in a year-end report of operations released by Barnes. Total 1955 payment in flood grants distributed among the three types of recipients were: Old-age assistance, \$273,156; dependent children, \$273,128; and nearly blind, \$28,835 for a grand total of \$575,119 in the county.






