CITY COUNCIL VOTES WATER RATES BOOST

Ordinance Here Voted To Meet Needs on Bonds, Planned for '56 Issuance

The Prestonburg City Council at last week's meeting voted to increase water rates to meet increased principal payments on water and sewer revenue bonds to be sold for early issuance. The council specified that the new rates are to become effective upon adoption and publication of the ordinance.

The new rates follow:

\$2.25 minimum on the first 2,000 gallons or less; \$1.20 per 1,000 gallons on the next 3,000 gallons; \$1.05 per thousand on the next 5,000 gallons or less; \$1 per thousand on the next 10,000 gallons; 65c per thousand on the next 20,000 gallons; 50c per thousand on the next 40,000 gallons; 50c per thousand on quantities in excess of 100,000 gallons.

Another springtime, and those interested in the future of Dewey Lake, the No. 1 attraction in this part of Kentucky, resume wondering what will be done this year to develop Dewey Lake State Park all that the name implies.

A home for the park superintendent was built last year, and a well-appointed restaurant at the boat-dock was only recently completed. A new boat-dock is being built and now horseback riding has been added to the attractions of the park.

Yet Dewey has a long way to go to take its place among the most-to-goodness parks in the state's splendid parks system. Roads remain to be built, a lodge and vacation cabins remain on the drawing board.

For here at Dewey Lake is a park site that has everything. A twenty-two-mile-long lake bordered by woods, hillsides, fishing, boating, swimming, horseback riding—as much as any Kentucky lake has to offer, more than some.

Yes, it will cost a lot of money to make Dewey's park such that all ready have been created out of what certainly is more picturesque. But the potential is there. It is a great potential and one that should be developed.

To the Battle-Wary

Hearings were held in Washington, the other day, with a view to getting an appropriation which would adequately finance another study of the Big Sandy River, the need of the nation for water transportation, and the cost of such an undertaking.

Announcement of the hearing date caused scarcely a ripple of interest here. If the Big Sandy was represented at the hearing by a Congressman, Perkins, Senator Clements, Commissioner of Conservation Jackson and possibly one or two others, we have not heard of it.

The Big Sandy, apparently, is battle-wary after almost a hundred years of surveys and studies, and scientific Washington onslaughts, with canalization of the river the prize hopefully sought.

STRIKE ENDS AT SCHOOL

Perry Pupils Plead For Return To Classes

The week-old walkout of students of the Perry high school at Hazard ended Wednesday when returned to classes. Brick barricades at the school doors were removed Monday after Principal Walter Martin, Jr., a native of this county, made a plea to the students to return and work out a substitute plan of action.

The strike by some 750 students began last Tuesday as a protest against a report that Martin might not be re-elected by the Perry County school board.

About two thirds of the students returned to school Monday. A "truce" called in advance of a meeting scheduled for last night by the School Board to discuss the problem.

But a full-fledged strike was resumed Tuesday when the board's meeting failed to materialize. School superintendent Gilbert Bowling said other members failed to show up for the special meeting called by Chairman Mass Giamatti.

Students picketed bricks in front of entrances Tuesday and about 200 of them manned a picket line. The entire student body remained away from classes, but teachers were permitted to enter.

The statement drawn up by the Student Council said would be given to the board to present its grievances before students to return to classes at a meeting to be held at 10 o'clock.

The pledge also asked all students who had reached the voting age of 18, would do so by the next Monday election to be held to vote "to support our cause."

Martin said the Student Council intended to him that it would issue a campaign against the reelection of any incumbent members of the School Board. The board members are to be elected in November.

The Student Council's statement also objected to threats it said some teachers had made to fill grades for each day of classes missed by students because of the strike.

The statement also said that the school board had been wrong, but called it the "only weapon we have."



"We thus reject the position of the respondent (bureau director) that the mere underground connection of previously separate mines is alone sufficient to render them a single unit under the act obviously if the connection, even though open, is such that a reasonable degree of protection from disaster is retained or restored between the areas, it would not affectuate any statutory objective to hold that the separate identity of the area is destroyed."

In upholding the bureau director's second contention, the board said:

"We turn then to the controlling question in this case, namely, are the underground connections between Wheelwright No. 3 and Wheelwright Nos. 1 and 2 and Buckingham, as now constituted, such that the men in those respective areas are subjected to any reasonable likelihood of danger from a disaster of a type sought to be prevented by Congress."

"Contrary to the position of the applicant (bureau director), we have found, as a fact, that the present connections between Wheelwright No. 3 and Wheelwright Nos. 1 and 2 and Buckingham, as now constituted, comprise parts of a single mine."

"The board pointed out that its ruling is in variance with positions taken in the past by the Bureau of Mines here, it said:

"Because of the reliance of the industry on the past conduct of the bureau we believe, as a matter of equity, and to the extent the applicant (bureau director) should be permitted to take such action now which, if taken before the finding of the critical samples, would have evidenced the easy classification to Wheelwright 3."

"Specifically, if within 60 days after the date of this decision the board is shown by the applicant that proper measures have been initiated and accomplished to restore a reasonable degree of protection from disaster between Wheelwright No. 3 and Wheelwright Nos. 1 and 2 and Buckingham, we shall revise our determination herein and we shall find that Wheelwright No. 3 constitutes a separate mine and that the easy classification should be confined to that area."

"If the board is not shown, within this period, that such measures have been initiated and accomplished, we shall issue a final order affirming the outstanding easy-classification order, dated December 23, 1954, which applies to Wheelwright Nos. 1, 2, and 3 and Buckingham."

Says Bus Lines Stop Not Fault of Drivers

"The Sparks Bus Bus Line has no trouble with its drivers, and we want the public to know that loss of bus service is not our fault," said Joe Maynard, president of Local 247, U. C. W., this week.

Ruling Prohibits False Advertising By Insurance Firms

Frankfort, Ky., April 9 (Sp.)—Commissioner of Insurance, C. P. Thurman today issued a series of regulations, effective June 1, to forbid false or misleading advertisements upon the part of insurance firms doing business in Kentucky.

He said the entire series of regulations shall be true and not misleading in fact or in implication, and that "words or phrases the meaning of which clearly only by implication or by familiarity with insurance terminology shall not be used."

Thurman explained that too many complaints have arisen by which persons have taken out insurance policies for protection of themselves and later found themselves not covered.

"Deceptive words, phrases or illustrations shall not be used in a manner which misleads or has the capacity and tendency to deceive as to the extent of any policy benefit payable, loss covered or premium payable." An advertisement relating to any policy benefit payable, loss covered and premium payable shall be sufficiently complete and clear as to avoid deception or capacity and tendency to deceive.

The series also forbid companies doing business in Kentucky to use testimonials as genuine, unless they represent the current opinion of the author, and being applicable to policy advertising and accurately reproduced.

Another order of Thurman, providing that policies covering only one disease or list of specified diseases shall not be advertised so as to imply coverage beyond terms of policies. He used as an illustration a frequently used phrase "this policy pays \$1,000 for hospital room and board expenses," and claimed such was incomplete without indicating the maximum daily benefit and maximum time limit for hospital rooms and board expenses.
