## Kentucky Senators Hear Big Sandy Co-op Leaders Explain Power Program

Several officials of the Big Sandy Rural Electric Co-op, which serves 4,200 rural people in this area, journeyed to Washington last week to attend a dinner honoring Kentucky's congressmen.

They were George Jones of Thelma, Kentucky; Russell Goble of Tumbaw, Kentucky; Cran Kinkade, of Faintville.

Both of Kentucky's senators, John Sherman Cooper and Thurston B. Morton, and four of the eight representatives were on hand to hear brief summaries of the rural electric co-op program in Kentucky. In brief responses, the congressmen reviewed their past support of the rural electrification program and assured the group of their future support.

In his brief response, Senator John Sherman Cooper assured the 18 co-op representatives present that "a good man will be chosen" to fill forthcoming vacancy on the board of directors of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

"I can bring you this news," declared Cooper. "I know that the character and background of the man being considered are proof that a good man will be chosen."

Regarding another matter rural electric co-op spokesmen were concerned about, Cooper said: "I hope that soon we will have before the Senate a self-financing plan for the T. V. A."

The representatives present were John M. Robison of the Third District, Brent Spence of the Fifth District, William M. Fletcher of the Second District, and Carl Perkins of the Seventh District.

## COAL GAINING LOST GROUND

Totals at Mid-March Show Production Lag After Flood Reduced

Coal production in the field represented by the Big Sandy-Kincaid Coal Operators Association, which added to a low of over 20 percent less in the flood week ending Feb. 2 as compared to the corresponding period last year, has narrowed the production lag percentage until it is now slightly less than three percent behind.

Latest figures released for the week ending March 16 by the Association's office in Pikeville show a decrease of 17,670 tons less than the corresponding week last year. During the flood week ending Feb. 2, there was a decline of 37,680 tons or more than 20 percent. The next week's percentage of decline was less, but the number of tons had added to 314,400 short of the corresponding week in 1966.

Only five mines in the group reported for the week ending March 16, less than three days in the week ending Feb. 2. Eighteen mines worked either one or two days, probably Monday and Tuesday preceding the flood. The average for the week was 1.86 days.

Four weeks after the flood, for the week ending March 16, tonnage had risen to a total of 2,383,410 or 112,810 short of the previous year's record still over eight percent lower. Days worked were more normal that week, having an average of 4.51. Few mines worked less than five days that week.

The latest report of the Association, for the week ending March 16, shows a shortage of only 17,670 tons under the period of last year and a percentage loss of only 2.86. Rail way cars, of 80 tons each, loaded the last reported week stood at 6,240.

Truck mine operations, perhaps the hardest hit by the flood, are now running far behind last year's figures. As of March 16 their tonnage was only about half the tonnage they had loaded in the same period last year.

Cooley Elkhorn Coal Company was shown as temporarily closed in the last report.

## DENTAL CLINIC TOLD TO QUIT

Appellate Court Holds Free Clinic Does Good But That Work Illegal

The Cody Free Dental Clinic, of Knott county, conducted by W. C. Lewis, was ordered to terminate its operations Friday of last week although the Court of Appeals said it was contributing a good and worthwhile service. The court said the clinic was not licensed and therefore could not operate.

The case, originally heard by Special Circuit Judge E. D. Stephenson who ordered Lewis to cease his work, was taken to the appellate court on the grounds the clinic was performing an essential service for mountain people.

Lewis had suggested the Appeals court could "exercise its equitable powers" and forego statutes requiring a license from the Kentucky Board of Dentistry.

"Doubtless, under the circumstances of the present case, the good outweighs the bad," the court conceded.

The trainees get certificates instead of degrees. Free service is given to individuals as a means of providing practical training.

"The free clinic actually performed dental service—filling, cavities, extractions, and some plates—for 1,500 persons during its operation," Lewis' brief said. "And when it was closed, there were several thousand on the waiting list."

"But the appellant's laudable purposes and his charitable and helpful services do not justify bypassing the sanctions of the Kentucky Board of Dentistry."

"We must recognize the ancient maxim that equity follows the law and that the appellant has colluded with the law."

"Lewis, a man of 70, has a degree from Michigan State, Columbia University, and the University of Chicago."

Lewis said he and his trainees make no pretense that they are licensed dentists or instructors.

"A person in Knott county suffering from a toothache is relieved by having the tooth pulled or pain eased, even by a practical novice, properly equipped, although not licensed, and we doubt that an African aborigine who may be served in the future by these students would care whether their instructor had ever been licensed or not."

### Holifield Gets Governor Award

Frankfort, March 26 (Sp.) — The  
first annual Governor's Medallion  
for "exceptionally meritorious con-  
spicuous and long-standing public  
service" has been presented.

It went to Asst. Atty. Gen. M. B.  
Holifield, 65, an assistant under  
seven attorneys general since 1928  
and the oldest assistant attorney  
general still active in the nation.

Gov. A. B. Chandler presented the  
medallion to Holifield's secretary,  
Mrs. Lucy Rodman, as sev-  
eral hundred State employees watch-  
ed the ceremony in front of the  
Capitol. Holifield was ill in a Lex-  
ington hospital at the time.

The Governor said the award will  
be made yearly on June 1, the  
Commonwealth's birthday anniver-  
sary.

Holifield is considered the fore-  
most authority on the Kentucky  
Constitution. The citation of the  
award in an executive order signed  
by Chandler described Holifield, a  
Graves county native, as an "out-  
standing citizen and public ser-  
vant, cherished legal, civic and in-  
religious scholar and mentor, grand  
dean of Kentucky jurisprudence and  
lawyer's lawyer, gracious gentleman  
and upholder of the Christian faith."

Chandler read a letter to Holifield  
which stated:

Many of your achievements have  
earned the undying gratitude of the  
people of Kentucky. Perhaps most  
notable was your successful hand-  
ling of the legal struggle that freed  
Southern rail shippers from discrim-  
inatory freight rates.

"This outstanding example of  
your ability, which was amplified  
most dramatically by your brilliant  
representation of the Common-  
wealth's interests before the Sup-  
reme Court of the United States  
and the Interstate Commerce Com-  
mission, has saved Kentuckians mil-  
lions of dollars."

Chandler read a letter to Holifield  
which stated:

When nominated and elected I

For Engineers  
Held Important

Frankfort, March 26 (Sp.) — The  
proposal to put state highway en-  
gineers under a merit system has  
been called "one of the most for-  
ward steps the Department of High-  
ways has taken since its inception."

The speaker was Highway Com-  
missioner Robert Humphreys. He  
told the Kentucky Highway Con-  
ference at the University of Ken-  
tucky, Lexington, that he wanted  
the engineers to stay out of politics  
and do the engineering.

Dean D. V. Terrell of the univer-  
sity college said the merit system  
"should have a far reaching influ-  
ence on young people thinking about  
coming into the highway depart-  
ment."

Gov. A. B. Chandler has said he  
will prepare an order to bring  
under the merit system all gradu-  
ate or licensed engineering personnel  
of the road agency.

Humphreys expressed confidence  
the state's 100 million dollar road  
bond issue would be declared valid  
by the courts in a test suit and said  
the Commonwealth's vast road pro-  
gram would depend more upon en-  
gineering than financing.

Li. Gov. Harry Lee Waterfield  
said "there's not going to be any  
trouble selling the bonds." He de-  
clared he was confident the state  
would get the highest available rat-  
ing in the bond sale, because Ken-  
tucky has no general bonded indebt-  
edness, though there is some revenue  
bond debt.

# Red Cross Expenditures Noted by Representative At Recent Kiwanis Meet

# FOOD NOTES By Dixie Thayer Home Demonstration Agent

The Home Canning Institute of America predicts that 2,000,000 families or approximately 50 percent of all U. S. families will do some home canning this year. Floyd countians can join this trend by planning their canning as they plan their gardens.

Excellent booklets on food preservation have been prepared by the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. In addition here is a list of the points to check before starting home canning.

1. Plan early, before you have anything to can. Make a list of the kinds and amount of foods you want to put up.

2. Decide the size of jars and cans to use. You may want both pints and quarts of the same foods.

3. Get supplies of cans, jars, caps, rubbers, etc. early. Be sure to get enough—a few extras allowing for breakage or damage.

4. Examine all cans, jars and caps.

Check the pressure cooker to be sure it will function properly. The seal should be tight, the vent free of obstruction and gauge accurate.

Whether home canning is for fun or thrift, it means better eating.

# Philadelphia Women Leads Successful Voluntary Slum Beautification Program

A voluntary slum beautification program which might be duplicated in almost any community has been carried out in Philadelphia under the leadership of Louise Bush-Brown, an alert little woman in her 60's.

Lois Mattox tells the story in an article, "They've Made the Slums Bloom," condensed from the Christian Herald in the April Reader's Digest.

"Something wonderful has happened in the run-down sections in Philadelphia," reports the writer. "In the last four years almost 100 blocks once distinguished only by dingy, ramshackle buildings and trash-filled alleys have been transformed by flowering window boxes, shrubbery, trees and creeping vines. Vacant lots, cleared of rubbish, have become neighborhood gardens. Curbside houses have been whitewashed and doorways and window frames have been painted at the tenants' expense. "The people, too, have changed. There's a new neighborliness and a community pride. The neighborhood kids, who were once destructive hooligans, are now proud members of the 'garden patrol'."

## ELIGIBLE DISABLED WORKERS HAVE SHORT TIME TO APPLY

People who have become unable to work because of severe and long-lasting disabilities have a new type of protection under the social security law, but according to the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, which administers the new provisions, many are not applying for their rights. The Social Security administration office, at Pikeville, says:

For many disabled people, failure to file an application with their social security district office before the end of June will mean the loss of all their social security disability protection, and for some it will also mean the loss of their rights to any old-age and survivors insurance benefits for themselves and their families in the future. If a disabled worker dies without having filed an application to protect his social security disability rights, the survivors benefits payable to his family under the social security law may be greatly reduced.

The Bureau says that an estimated 700,000 severely disabled men and women in the country have worked long enough under social security to be eligible to have their social security records frozen under a 1954 provision in the law. When a disabled worker's record is frozen, the years when his disability keeps him from working are not counted against him in figuring the social benefits due him in the future or payable to his family in case of his death. Of the 700,000, about 400,000 people—those between 50 and 65 years of age—are eligible for monthly disability insurance benefits beginning with July.

Although social security district offices have been accepting applications from disabled workers since January 1, 1956, the Bureau reports that many of those eligible have not yet applied. Under the law, workers who were already disabled were given 24 years to apply to protect their social security rights. After June 30, 1957, the end of that 24-year period, an application will be effective to freeze a worker's social security record for no more than one year back.

A disabled person must meet certain work requirements at the beginning of his official "period of disability." He must have social security credit for at least 5 out of the 10 years before he became disabled, and at least a year and a half of the credit must have been earned in the three years just before his official "period of disability" began.

Control Annual Weeds In Strawberry Patches

Annual grasses and weeds in strawberry patches can be controlled by certain herbicides and careful attention to proved methods.

James Herren, University Agricultural Experiment Station weed specialist, says: "Crag Herbicide used as a spray (3 pounds wettable powder material per acre for actual area treated) is recommended for 1957. The first application can be made 10 to 14 days after setting first-year plants. Old patches can be treated immediately after harvest, when rows have been narrowed and the patches rejuvenated. The same rates apply as for the new plantings."

Treatment when needed (usually at 4 to 6 week intervals throughout growing season) are recommended, he said. The herbicide will kill most annual plant pests, such as crabgrass, pigweed, and lambsquarters.

Areas to be treated should be weeded thoroughly before treatment. The herbicide is not effective on weeds more than a quarter inch to a half-inch high. Tests at University of Kentucky show a Crag Herbicide program in the growing season will reduce the growth of chickweed and henbit the following year.

So busy has Floyd Red Cross Chapter been with the disaster work that the annual drive for Red Cross funds is getting off to a delayed start, Miss Mildred White, executive secretary, said. Actually, the real drive will not be launched till next Monday. Some special gifts have been received already, but the canvases of individual homes and businesses will not start till next week.

"Those who work with the Red Cross are not thanks for themselves as individuals for the help that has been given, and I am among those workers," Miss White said here this week. "But I do hope that Floyd county will express its appreciation for what has been done by the Red Cross for so many in our county following this recent disaster."

An example of true appreciation, she said, was shown by a Martin woman who had been given a mattress after the flood. A few days later, she came here to contribute a dollar "so that somebody else can have the same woman's help."

## Insects Fight Insects

In Man's War on Pests

Fighting insects with insects not only saves millions for the nation's farmers but lessens worries about growing dangers from chemical poisons, Peter F. Bort, in the April Reader's Digest in an article condensed from the Rural New Yorker titled, "Biological Control vs. Insect Pests."

For instance, 15 years ago Japanese beetles resisted spraying, burning and trapping as they ravaged crops from New Hampshire to Ohio. Then U.S. Department of Agriculture entomologists found a bacterial disease was killing hundreds of beetles in New Jersey and that as the insects died, it left billions of spores to infect other grubs.

Mass produced in the laboratory, these spores were planted in 150,000 colonies in 14 states. As a result the beetles no longer rate as a serious pest.

About 50 U.S. entomologists, working with foreign scientists, have developed such "living insecticides" to stop about 75 percent of the world's most noxious pests.

Such biological control may be as simple as placing goldfish in a pool to eat mosquito larvae or as complex as the program planned to eliminate the screwworm fly, which has wiped out whole herds of livestock in the Southeast. In this case, the male screwworm is sterilized by atomic radiation and, as the female mates but once, releases of the sterilized male in millions, whittles down the pest population.

Tests have proven value of biological control in fighting the codling moth in apple orchards, pine sawfly in Canadian forests (a pest which six years ago was killing seven times as much timber as fire), corn earworms and alfalfa caterpillars. Ter's on the pink bollworm, untreatable cotton pest, also hold promise.

Insects have built up such a resistance to chemicals that today's biocontrol can tolerate a dose of DDT, 1,000 times as great as that of its ancestors of 10 years ago. This has led to use of poisons in such frightening amounts that three federal agencies are now preparing controls to protect consumers.

Thus, the establishment of some 90 foreign parasites and predators whittling away at our insect pests holds hope for less dangerous, more effective and less costly pest control.

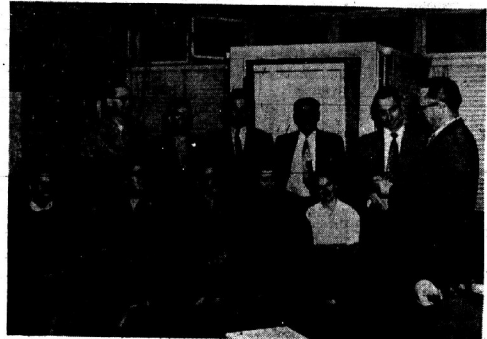

## MORE STATE HUNTERS VICTIMS OF ACCIDENTS

Frankfort, March 28 (Sp.) — Kentucky's hunters were more careless during 1956 than in 1955, according to a mortality sheet prepared by the Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources.

The report shows 15 persons lost their lives during the past hunting season as compared with 12 the previous year. Late returns may increase the total, officials said.

The report showed a decrease in the number of fishing deaths, from 16 in 1955 to four in 1956. Guns did not account for all hunting fatalities in the State. Ten of the 15 persons died from gunshot wounds, one from burns, two drowned, and two died after suffering heart attacks. Six hunters were killed by their own guns and four were killed by hunting companions.
