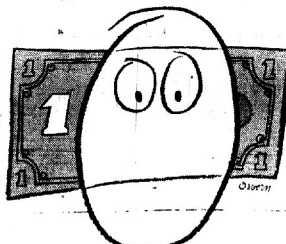

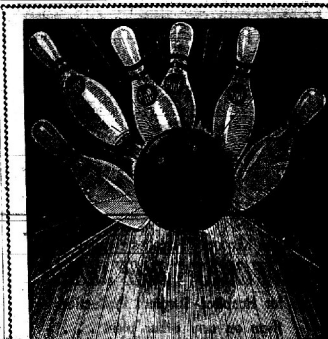

Surviving her are "dick son," C. Craft, of Russellville, and a brother, Jake Sutton, of Lebanon, Knott county.

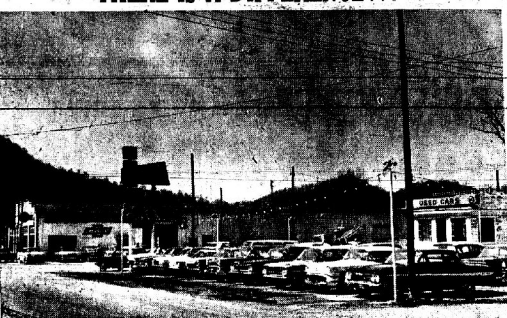

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# Pre-Entrance Exams Stated by Hospitals; First Tests At Harlan

The schedule of pre-entrance examinations for the Miners Memorial Hospital Association School of Professional Nursing, beginning February 16, was announced recently.

First tests will be given at the Miners Memorial Hospital and Pikeville Memorial hospital on February 16, under the program set up by Miss Irene Healy, head of Nursing Service and Education for the Miners Memorial Hospital Association.

The MMHA administers hospitals in Kentucky, West Virginia and Virginia for beneficiaries of the United Mine Workers of America Welfare and Retirement Fund.

The School of Professional Nursing is located at the Harlan Memorial hospital. Application forms may be obtained by writing the director of the school at that address.

To be eligible, the applicant must be between ages 17 and 35, be a high school graduate or senior at the time of these tests, with above average school record and be in good health.

Following the tests, applicants will be interviewed by Miss Healy or members of the faculty. Those taking the examinations should be prepared to stay all day for the interviews and testing.

Those eligible for the three-year course must also be accepted for entrance at Morehead State College, Morehead, Kentucky, where the first year of preclinical or academic courses is provided. Subjects include English, sociology, psychology, chemistry, biology, microbiology and nutrition. The second and third years are at Harlan Memorial Hospital, where classroom and clinical experience are offered, leading to a nursing diploma.

Students pay their own way at Morehead, although loans may be arranged, and there are a limited number of scholarships available from the John L. Lewis Scholarship Fund for qualified students of this program. These are awarded to outstanding students who are sons or daughters of UMWA coal miners or members of District 50, DMWA.

On completion of the 36-month course, graduates of the MMHA School of Professional Nursing are eligible to take state examinations to qualify as Registered Nurses.

### Thirty Years Ago (February 3, 1933)

County school superintendents will continue to be appointed by county school boards under a decision of the court of appeals Friday, holding unconstitutional a 1932 act attempting to provide for popular election. Floyd county's total indebtedness for the last year was \$850,000. W. M. Greenwald, proprietor of the Greenwald Service Station here, sustained the loss of a Willipet sedan, which was destroyed by fire, and approximately \$35 worth of cigarettes, cigars and candy taken from the service station by burglar, Tuesday night. The Sandy Valley Coal Company, incorporators of which are J. R. Hurt, Charles Alley and G. W. Rorer, will operate the mines of Prestonsburg Coal Company, from which it has leased property on Bull Creek. A county-wide poll among schools to determine the site of this year's district baseball tournament resulted in a tie between Martin and Maytown, and the decision is now up to the state high school athletic association. Although the Beaver Valley Golf Club has voted to abandon the golf course near Allen, the course there will remain open this year. Martin high school will initiate basketball play in its new gymnasium, Friday night, when the Blue-Grays take on Virgie. There died: Bill Osborne, 70, of Prestonsburg.

### Twenty Years Ago (February 4, 1943)

Tuesday, this week the last payment on the \$45,000 firefighting equipment, now made, by the city of Prestonsburg was made. Mayor E. P. Arnold announced. To qualify Floyd county for its share of approximately \$25,000 of the state's \$2,000,000 rural highway fund, the Floyd court last week listed 20 projects covering approximately 128 miles of rural road in this county on which the fund may be expended. As stipulated in an agreement reached by representatives of the Southern Coal Producers' Association, last week, miners in this and other southern districts producing more than 100,000,000 tons of bituminous coal annually will work on a six-day basis with the sixth day optional and time-and-a-half to be paid after 30 hours a week. The War Department recently awarded a letter of commendation to 18-year-old James Paul Conners, formerly of Auster, citing the young seaman for "devotion to duty and courage" during the sinking of an enemy submarine by a merchant vessel on which Conners was a member of a gun crew. Selective service headquarters here this week estimated that between 2,700 and 2,800 Floyd county men are now in the armed forces. Floyd chapter, American Red Cross, will begin on March 1 a drive to raise a War Fund quota of \$15,000—the greatest Red Cross drive ever assigned the county in a single year. A strike of the Inland Steel Company's plant at Indiana Harbor, Indiana, resulted in a halt of all coal shipments from the Inland Steel Company at Wheelwright, idling approximately 1,200 miners there.
