## TWO COAL TIPPLES DAMAGED IN COUNTY LABOR TIF F NOT BLAMED IN EXPLOSION

### McDowell Tipple Blast, Harold Mine Fire Come Only Few Hours Apart

One Floyd coal tippie was blasted by a heavy charge of explosives Monday night, and another was partially destroyed by fire.

Officers expressed doubt that any current labor dispute led to the dynamiting at 10:30 Monday night of the Columbia tippie of the Turner-Eckhorn Coal Company on the Hill Hall Branch at McDowell. They said they had not been asked to investigate the fire which broke out at the Little Mud Creek mine operated by E. W. Hale, of Harold. An old charge may have detonated the McDowell explosion, they said.

State Detective Chester D. Powell, who with Deputy Sheriff Samuel Hale investigated the McDowell blast, said a charge of possibly 20 sticks of dynamite had been tossed into the hopper of the tippie, blowing off the roof of the coal bin, the end of a supply building and moving the chute on its foundation. Damage was estimated at \$2,000.

The blast at the Hale tippie was discovered at 10:30 Monday night. Fire departments of (See Story No. 2, Page 8)

Floyd county is to have its first Homegrown Arts Festival next month.

The period, June 17-22, has been set as the date of the festival, which will be held at the Floyd County library here under the sponsorship of the library's board of trustees.

Decision to sponsor such an event to preserve and encourage the traditional culture of the county was made by the library board at its meeting Monday last week. Since that time the operation of leaders in the various phases of the arts has been studied, and enthusiastic support has been offered.

The programs and activities of the week will be arranged by a festival committee composed of interested and qualified artists, writers, musicians and other citizens of the county.

The Library Board and the festival committee have agreed that the purpose of the festival should be "to preserve and to encourage the greater appreciation of the traditional culture of the county; to promote a greater interest and participation in both the creative and the performing arts; and to provide an opportunity for sharing the artistic ability and achievements of Floyd musicians with other Floyd musicians and an interested public."

Each night of the week will be devoted to one area of the arts. The program for each evening will be arranged by a committee of qualified persons in a particular field of effort—art, instrumental music and folk-dancing.

## FRIDAY ENDS MARCH FLOOD RELIEF WORK

### 1,169 Apply for Aid In County, Roe Says; Cooperation Praised

The American Red Cross closed its emergency field office here last Friday after having spent a total of \$364,111.90 to help Floyd county's flood disaster victims.

Thus ended the work begun in this county as soon as the March floodwaters which invaded hundreds of homes and businesses had subsided.

Thirty-six Red Cross workers from New York, Virginia, Georgia, Texas and Wyoming had since that time worked tirelessly. Thirty-six Red Cross Chapter members and volunteers met the needs of those who could not help themselves.

## 1,169 Apply for Aid In County, Roe Says; Cooperation Praised

The 1,169 applicants for assistance outnumbered those of the 1957 flood, but the Red Cross outlay in each was greater in the earlier disaster. This year's expenditures were made in food cases: \$1,873.95; flood clothing and other maintenance, \$83,888.09; building and repair, \$63,193.82; household furniture, \$381,860.33; medical and nursing aid, \$1,772.02; occupational supplies and equipment, \$14,824.17.

The \$364,111.90 already spent may be increased by an additional \$660, Miss Ella Noel White, executive secretary of Floyd Chapter, said this week.

## With all this spent by the Red Cross for Floyd county citizens, and the Red Cross standing by to help when the next disaster strikes, here or elsewhere, attention of Floyd Chapter this week was turned toward trying to solicit from the county's citizens and business enough money to meet its Floyd quota of \$8,570.

"Floyd county will be given an opportunity to show what its gratitude amounts to," commented one volunteer worker. "The Red Cross fund drive will be conducted in four weeks."

## Nine organizations and 82 individuals are recognized by the Floyd County Chapter of the American Red Cross for outstanding service in the weeks following the March 12 flood, according to Chapter Chairman F. L. Hines.

The nine organizations are headed by the Floyd County Reserve Squad. These men not only provide in emergency need, but also provide help with rescue and food and supplies, but they could not be listed.

tion funds for construction of the North Fork of Paint Reservoir will be increased \$300,000, bringing the total to \$1 million.

Senator John Sherman Cooper said recently that the Corps of Engineers had advised him that it has available \$100,000 from previously approved funds for review work in the Big South River valley.

Cooper said the money would enable resurvey of such projects in the Big South River valley as **Head and Paint Creek Reservoirs**, local flood protection for **Marion** and **Quinn** communities, **Chickadee** and **Grand Creeks** in the Upper Kentucky River valley, **Line Creek** and **Walker Creek Reservoirs** and local flood protection at **Harold**, **Whitesburg**, **New** and other communities in the Upper Cumberland River valley. **Martins Creek Reservoir** and **Long Ford** would be included in **Marion**, **Middleboro** and other communities.

These projects were not included in the Corps in last year's report, Cooper said, but I believe that many of them can now be approved on the basis of the damage incurred during the recent floods.

Cooper said that another request he made in his resolutions and letters to the President was that funds be made available for dredging the Corps' navigation project in the **Ohio** at **Lawrence**.



**LOWELL HUGHES COMMENTS ON ATTEMPTED SMEAR**

Lowell T. Hughes made the following comments in regard to a handbill and to a political advertisement appearing in the May 2, 1963, edition of The Floyd County Times:

"I have worked for the Department of Revenue and I am very proud of having done so. I have earned, through hard work, all of the money which I have received from the State. I preferred to work my way through college and that is exactly what I have done. I am sorry that some people think I wasn't entitled to do so and that my doing so should be held against me."

"I think it is obvious to everyone that this is just the typical Chandler routine. Mr. Chandler and the people of his philosophy that support him do have a claim to fame, they are noted for their reputation of deceit and half-truths. I do not intend to attack any of these people personally, but you know who they are. I think my comments in regard to the handbill will serve to justify and bolster these reputations."

"I would prefer that my comments not be taken as a rebuttal or denial of the handbill. I regret even having to give the handbill and advertisement the benefit of comment. However, as is so often the case when we are dealing with the kind of people who surround Mr. Chandler, it is necessary to point out facts which they have conveniently ignored."

"The handbill and advertisement contain a complete, outright lie. They say that I was in school during the whole period referred to and that the records will show just that. In fact, and it would be no problem whatsoever to establish, during twelve full months which they make reference to I was not even in school."

"They talk about my being a full-time law student but conveniently neglect to point out that this only means that I spent twelve hours during the work-week attending classes. They deliberately failed to mention that I worked an adjusted work schedule so that I could make up the twelve hours a week. They conveniently failed to mention that it took me three years to graduate because of my work instead of two and one-half years. They conveniently failed to mention that I also worked my way through four years of undergraduate school. They conveniently failed to mention the other thousands of students who have worked their way through college."

"All of these deliberate omissions are typical of the type of persons who have associated themselves with the handbill and advertisement. Another thing which they neglected to do was to actually challenge the fact that I did the work. There is an explanation as to why they failed to do this. The type of work that I was doing required that I contact people personally and to prepare reports in regard to these conferences. In addition, in most instances I obtained the persons' signature on the reports. There are copies of all of this work on file in both the Lexington office and the Frankfort office. Once again, there is no problem in establishing this fact. I think this explains why they did not actually challenge the work."

"I wonder why the handbill wasn't even signed. Of course, the advertisement had to be signed before it could appear in the newspaper. If these people are sincere in their efforts, what is this man's name doing on the advertisement? Why didn't someone who is a somebody in the Chandler organization sign the advertisement? Could it be that they were so ashamed of the ridiculousness of it that they refused to take the credit for it?"

"I think enough of the facts which were ignored have now been pointed out and no further comment is justified. The assertions are so ridiculous that it makes you wonder what their purpose was. My guess is that their purpose was to draw attention away from the things which are so being read in the newspapers. The things which evidently are true because when they are asked to comment about them they refuse to do so."

"I would like to point out that one of my real regrets is that I haven't had more time to devote to the gubernatorial campaign. The issues of a campaign have never before been so clearly defined for the people of our section of the state. We heard Mr. Chandler's promises when he was making the 1955 race, and we saw what he did for our section after he was elected—NOTHING. Contrast that record with the Mountain Parkway, the new lodge at the lake, the new junior college, the new schools in the county and the overall advancement of our educational system. When the contrast is made it is obvious that the right-thinking people of our section of the state must support the energetic and youthful Mr. Edward T. Breathitt."



Betsy Layne and Allen were called to the scene, and they are credited with preventing destruction of the entire installation. The owner said approximately one-third of the plant was burned and that his loss will range from \$20,000 to \$25,000. The fire was brought under control at about 3:30 a.m., and the firemen saved the coal conveyor system, a coal crusher unit, motors and other equipment.  
Mr. Hale said he could not at this time make a statement as to the origin of the blaze. He said he will rebuild the plant.  
Two juveniles, one from Baltimore, the other from Lennox, West Virginia, are in jail here after having broken into several places in this and Pike counties. Baltimore authorities are seeking the return of one of the boys to answer to charges there, but County Judge Henry Stanton said he had not, in view of the number of offenses in which the youth is implicated locally, decided to relinquish the prisoner.

tinued their assistance right on through the six weeks following the disaster, reported Dale E. Roe, area director for the American Red Cross. The Rescue Squad building was made available for a clothing warehouse so that flood victims could obtain continued clothing. He said.

Another of the nine organizations was the First Methodist Church here which made possible enough space so that volunteers could assist more than 1,100 families with the recovery plans. "Also on the list of organizations to whom we should like to express appreciation," said Roe, "are the two Floyd county radio stations, WDOC and WFRT, and the Floyd County Times. Very much needed in disaster relief operations is information such as how to apply, where to apply, and Red Cross principles and practices. It is vital that people know that they will be assisted, that the principle is to help people help themselves and that all Red Cross help is a gift, not a loan. Your newspapers, radio, and disaster relief, both for the Red Cross and for the disaster victims."

In extending appreciation to these organizations and to the 92 individuals who have been certified, and Disaster Chairman Harold Dicks, jointly said that such help made possible effective, quick, and humane service to these families which were hit by the March 12 flood.  
Each of the 92 individuals will receive a recognition certificate. If someone should receive one of these recognition certificates and has not, it would be appreciated if the name could be given to Miss Ella Noel White, executive for the Floyd County Chapter, American Red Cross.  
"It was a great pleasure to work in Floyd county, and greatly pleasing to see such a spirit of cooperation on the part of all organizations, Government officials, and the people themselves," Roe said.  
Disaster sufferers who were loaned coats, blankets and mattresses following the flood are requested to return them as soon as possible. Disaster Chairman Dicks said.

This equipment is government property, and it is needed in other disaster areas, he pointed out. Collections are being held in Prestonsburg, at the Rescue Squad building, in Martin, at the fire department, in McDowell, at the high school, in Garrett at Griffith's Furniture Store.

3. My opponent has publicized his failure to notarize his declaration papers properly. This issue was raised by my opponent, not me — another smoke screen. I shall not take advantage of my opponent's failure to follow the law. I want the people to vote and elect their Circuit Judge — and to choose the candidate also who will make a sober, discreet, law-abiding judge.

THE BIG HOAX CONCEIVED IN DECEIT -- EXECUTED IN FRAUD BONUS-AMENDMENT TEXT SENATE BILL NO. 296, 1958 GENERAL ASSEMBLY Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky: Section 1. The Constitution of the Commonwealth of Kentucky is hereby proposed to be amended by the ratification of a new section to read as follows: The General Assembly shall by law provide for the issuance and sale of bonds of the Commonwealth, notwithstanding the limitation of indebtedness in Section 49 or any other section of the Constitution of Kentucky, which shall be in addition to all other bonds of the Commonwealth heretofore authorized. The proceeds of such additional bonds, or so many thereof, as may be necessary for the purpose, shall be used and appropriated SOLELY for the purpose of paying a cash bonus not to exceed \$500 for service outside the continental limits of the United States, and \$300 for service in the continental United States to the veterans, their widows or heirs, or next of kin, of the Spanish-American War, World War I, World War II, and the Korean Conflict, who were residents of the Commonwealth at the time of their ENTRY into the service and at least six months prior thereto. The General Assembly at the same session authorizing the issuance of the bonds shall fix a tax upon all retail sales at such a rate as will pay the interest upon and retire the bonds in not less than 30 years, PROVIDED that retail sales of FOOD and FOOD PRODUCTS, MEDICINES and CLOTHING may be EXEMPTED from such tax. **POPULATION CHANGES**

In early 1963 a great deal of political air was coming from four counties along the Mississippi River, were put into a single district to elect a representative to the General Assembly of Kentucky: Fulton, Hickman, Carlisle and Ballard. Since these counties have played their part in my life and in the lives of some of my family, I was, quite naturally, interested in the news by day when the boundaries of districts were changed. The politicians discuss the merits or demerits of the law; what interested my own attention was that these counties have had great population changes since my earliest memories. In a way they summarize the whole change from small farms to big ones on a great, mechanized scale. When the horse and mule and the older plow were measures of how many acres could be farmed, it took many people to cultivate the fertile acres of these four counties. When I began my first school in 1907, my landowner regularly hired two Missouri mules each year to break wheat ground. Flocks of these giant hitched to a big plow gave a man or a boy plenty to do on hot July and August days, when the thermometer rose almost daily to 90 or beyond. In addition to the two mule boys of the farm itself, several hired men were employed in the fields plowing. I look a corresponding number of oxen to feed the hungry plowmen. On my way to this school district I had seen my first automobile, but nobody seemed to regard it as anything other than an expensive but unnecessary gadget. A year later, in an adjoining school district, when a car passed my schoolhouse, the big boys ran after the thing as though it were a pursued rabbit; one boy succeeded in catching up with it and usually perching on the rear end of it.

## Dogwood Tree Planting Promoted By Immigrant

Millions of Americans this spring will enjoy the beauty of flowering dogwood thanks to the enthusiasm of an immigrant nursemaid, the late Adolf Muller, of Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. He called the tree "the hero of the spring" and Arnold Nicholson tells his story in a May Reader's Digest article with this caption:

"When the dogwood man," as he came to be known, arrived from the Black Forest of Germany in 1897, dogwoods had been growing in Valley Forge since George Washington camped there. For the sensitive immigrant they became the symbol of beautiful America.

"They were a sort of poem," he once told Nicholson. "They left an All-American story on the most sacred historical grounds in all the United States."

Following the legendary footsteps of Johnny Appleseed, Muller spent 30 years grafting the sapling of the dogwood across the land. He gave away thousands of seeds and saplings. He planted the dogwood's stems with heartful words and color slides before women's clubs, senior groups, horticultural associations.

Adolf extolled his "heroes of spring" from Palestine, Texas, to Graceland Hill, Connecticut, where dogwoods were first planted ornamentally as early as 1785. One of his early grafts, made jointly with another nursemaid, went to a school in Montgomery county, Pennsylvania. He once gave Nicholson, while the writer was managing editor of the Century Gentleman, 25,000 packets of dogwood seed for free distribution.

The happiest year for Muller was in 1941 when the Men's Garden Club of America gave him their annual Johnny Appleseed award and he was chairman of the committee that planned the dedication of Valley Forge's dogwoods to George Washington and his army. Two years later, after a fatal heart attack, he was buried beside the chapel at Valley Forge near a grove of dogwoods.

# VETERAN'S QUESTIONS ANSWERED

Q—Is there an extent-of-time limit or an amount on a GI home loan?

A—There is no limit on the amount of the loan in the case of a guaranteed loan. The limitation is on the amount of guaranty that can be issued upon the loan, which is 80% or a maximum of \$7,600. VA-insured loans, instead of guaranteed loans, may not exceed \$26,666. The time limit is 20 years.

Q—Is there an age limit after which an orphan may be recognized as a dependent?


A—Yes. During the past six months the VA has recognized 123 orphan organizations, all 117 field stations as well as a Washington, D. C.
