The council suggested the authority should have a five-pronged program to promote:  
1. Economic water resource development and flood control.  
2. Fuller development and processing of natural resources.  
3. Economic rehabilitation through an educational and retraining program for adults and youth.

4. A more transportation system and equitable freight rates.  
5. A change in criteria used in existing federal aid programs to maximize the program's use in Eastern Kentucky and the entire Appalachian area.

Governor Combs said he has "been thinking along the lines of such an authority" as the means to redevelopment. He said the nature of it was less important than that the organization be one for action.

Asked whether he thought Congress would endorse such an authority plan, Roosevelt replied:  
"My frank answer to that is that I don't know what is politically feasible with the particular Congress." Highway Commissioner Henry Wadd explained that Kentucky has the money to start building the Selleville-to-Belleville and the Campbell-to-Whitesburg legs of the Mountain Parkway. But federal matching funds are not available rapidly enough to make a grant possible soon.

The two eastern legs will be primary roads, built with federal and state funds. The remainder of the parkway is a toll road built with bond money.

Roosevelt promised to see if money could be obtained for these legs under the Accelerated Public Works Program. The talking point was that U. S. 460, near Selleville, was cut by water after a day-long rain.



**Statewide Battle Slated Against Four Diseases; Free Vaccine Authorized**

Plans for a statewide battle against polio, tetanus, whooping cough and diphtheria among Kentucky's pre-school age children, have been announced by Dr. Russell Teague, state health commissioner.

A program to provide free vaccine for immunization against these diseases has been authorized by the U. S. Congress, but a bill to appropriate the needed money has not yet been approved, however.

Teague said the State Health Department has conferred with Kentucky doctors and medical societies and is working out details of the project. As soon as the appropriation bill is passed by Congress, Kentucky will be ready to present its plan.

Congress has scheduled a \$10 million appropriation, to be used nationwide, for the first year of the three-year program. It would be reduced to \$8 million the second year, and to \$7 million the third year. Kentucky's share will be about \$300,000 for the first year, and will be reduced proportionately.

The statewide immunization program would be along the lines of the mass oral polio vaccination clinics held throughout the state, Teague said. Only children under five would be eligible for the free vaccine.

Teague said his department has not determined whether there will be a charge for administering the free vaccine. It will probably be worked out on a local basis.

**WHAT ONE U. OF K. CENTER IS DOING IN IT'S THIRD YEAR**

(The following release from the University of Kentucky Southeast Center at Cumberland is furnished here, because it applies to the opportunities to be offered by the Prestonsburg Community College. It also points to some of the problems the college will face.—Editor.)

The University of Kentucky Southeast Center at Cumberland is doubtless one of the best developed three-year-olds to be found within the borders of the Blue Grass state. Yet, because of its brief history, many people in the area it serves remain unfamiliar with the Center and its reasons for existence.

What, then, is the Southeast Center and what can it do for residents of Southeastern Kentucky?

To begin with, the Center is a full-fledged branch of the University of Kentucky in Lexington, a member in good standing of the U. K. family. There, any qualified high school graduate may take his first two years of college work before transferring to the main U. K. campus or to any other college or university of his choice.

The Southeast Center—one of five U. K. centers now in operation throughout the state—was established in 1950. Nestled in a picturesque mountain setting on the outskirts of Cumberland, the Center's present quarters can accommodate 500 or more students. Fewer than 200 were enrolled during the semester just closed, however, so there's no immediate problem of overcrowding.

In the opinion of the Center director, Dr. Paul A. Clark, nothing can stop the Southeast Center from growing, although a lack of public interest can delay its growth. To help forestall public apathy and to create wider understanding of the Center's role in the overall educational outlook for Southeastern Kentucky, Dr. Clark relies heavily upon an advisory group of leading business and professional people from Harlan, Letcher, Bell, Leslie and Perry counties.

It is through such group efforts, Dr. Clark believes, that the Center will solve one of its top priority problems—that of creating public awareness that its facilities belong not to the local community but to the entire Southeastern Kentucky area.

In talking with prospective students, Dr. Clark and his aides bring a briefcase full of impressive selling points, not the least of which is that the Center offers Southeastern Kentucky youth a unique opportunity to complete their freshman and sophomore years at a fraction of the cost they would pay elsewhere.

To illustrate, a student who lives at home while attending classes at Cumberland will find his education costs only about \$270 a year—registration fees of \$110 a semester, plus about \$25 extra each semester for books and supplies. The cost of attending college away from home covers a wide range, varying with the individual's taste in living standards and the state of his bank account, but it may be found generally at from \$1,400 to \$2,000 a year.

In addition to the financial savings which the Center offers Southeastern Kentuckians, many students feel they make better classroom progress—particularly in the all-important first year of college when they live and study in the familiar surroundings of home.





Allen, both of Milan, and three daughters, Mrs. Diehl, of Milan, Indiana, Mrs. Flora Wallen, of Some City, Indiana, and Mrs. Mary Cornett, Columbus, Indiana. One brother, William Allen, of Hindman, a half-brother and a half-sister, Tom Allen and Mrs. Elizabeth Collier, both of Logan, West Virginia, also survive.

The funeral was conducted Wednesday from the New Home Regular Baptist Church at Leburn, Knott county, and burial was made under direction of the Hindman Funeral Home.

### SMALL MINES LAW OPPOSED

By Commissioner Mandt; Additional Tax Burden Would Be Heavy, View

A H Mandt, commissioner of the Kentucky Department of Mines and Minerals, said last week that placing small mines under the federal Coal Mine Safety Act would serve no useful purpose and would saddle taxpayers with an additional tax burden.

The law was enacted in 1962 to give federal mine inspectors power to inspect large mines where major disaster hazards were found. (A major disaster is defined as an accident in which five or more men are killed.) Mines employing 15 or more men in underground workings are covered by the federal law.

Supporting his contention, Mandt pointed out that, according to the records, Kentucky has never suffered from a disaster in a mine employing fewer than 15 men. He also said that since 1945, a period of 17½ years, no disaster has occurred in any Kentucky coal mine. During this period 1,235,000,000 tons of coal were produced in the state. Statistics, he said, showed that during the same period, 37 major disasters occurred in the nation's other coal producing states, taking the lives of 466 miners. Thirty-five of these disasters, killing 602 persons, occurred in large mines.

Bureau of Mines has power to close imminent disaster hazards are found. Only two accidents of disaster proportions have occurred in the nation's small mines, costing the lives of 14 men, during the same 17½ year period.

Kentucky statistical records for 1959 through 1962 show that 114 men were killed in large mines while 79 lost their lives in small mines during the same period.

In discussing the impact the extension of the federal law would have if imposed on small mines, Mandt said they could be burdened with unreasonable and expensive regulations which would have no bearing on the type of accidents which occur in the small mines and would result in many of them having to close. The 2,000 small mines which would be affected play an important part in the economy of Eastern Kentucky which already has gained national attention because of its financial plight. This Mandt pointed out, is true not only of Kentucky, but also of other coal producing states in the Appalachian area. With the closing of the small mines the miners would become a burden on relief agencies and the state and federal government would suffer a substantial loss in tax revenue.

Kentucky currently has about 2,000 small mines and is in the large mine classification in operation. In 1962 these mines produced 67 million tons of coal, ranking Kentucky second among the states in the production of bituminous coal. Kentucky coal is produced in about equal amounts by surface mining by large underground operations and by the small mines.

On the subject of inspections and regulations Mandt said that Kentucky mining laws are adequate and well administered by competent personnel. He added that through new inspection techniques and accelerated safety education the state has made remarkable progress in accident prevention.

In a conference recently held in Washington at the request of Stewart Udall, Secretary of the Interior, to discuss safety procedures as a result of recent explosions at two large mines, spokesmen representing other coal producing states expressed opinions that their state laws were adequate. At this conference the U. S. Bureau of Mines recommended amendments to the federal Coal Mine Safety Act which would place all mines, large and small, under Title II of the Act.

Title II of the Federal Coal Mine Safety Act is designed to prevent major disasters. Compliance with its safety provisions is mandatory; however, it applies only to coal mines in which 11 or more individuals are employed regularly underground. Mines regularly employing less than 15 persons are in the "Title I" classification. The Bureau of Mines has no enforcement powers and so compliance with recommendations is not mandatory under its provisions. The act does provide that federal coal mine inspectors may enter the mines for inspection purposes.

# HUNTING SEASON DATES ANNOUNCED FOR STATE

Frankfort, Ky. — A five-day gun, deer hunting season has been set for Kentucky this fall with the opening date being November 27 and ending on December 1. This is a one-day extension over the previous year. In addition, six new counties have been added to the list of last year but in those six new counties only one day hunting, December 1, will be permitted. The counties to be opened for the first time are Adair, Logan, Marion, Hancock, Taylor and Warren. The archery season will open on October 15 and continue through November 15 in all counties opened. The limit to be harvested this year will be one deer of either sex for both the gun and archery season, according to the regulations of the Department.

Management areas to be opened to deer hunting are: Pine Mountain, Part Area, Robinson Forest, Dewey Lake Area, Knob State Forest and Camp Breckinridge in Union county. A two-day season, November 23 and 24, has been set for the Western Kentucky Management Area. The Fish and Wildlife Resources Commission, in cooperation with U. S. Army officials has set the week-ends of deer hunting for Fort Knox. They are November 23 and 24 and November 30 and December 1. For Fort Campbell the week-ends to be opened for deer hunting are: October 26-27, November 23; November 9-10, November 16-17. Again this year the state has been divided into two zones for squirrel hunters with a split season in each zone. The Eastern Zone opens on August 31 and continues through October 31 and reopens on November 21 and continues through December 18. In the Western Zone the initial season opens on August 15 and continues through October 31; reopens on November 21 and continues through December 2. The base and possession limits are unchanged. A special squirrel season has been set for Kentucky Woodlands National (Continued on Page 6)



**ALICE LLOYD COLLEGE ADDS DEVELOPMENT DIRECTOR; AIM, TO EXPAND ITS FACILITIES**

Pippa Passes, June 17 (Spl.)—Queenin J. Bogart has been appointed associate director for development at Alice Lloyd College, here. Announcement of the appointment was made by William S. Hayes, director.  
In the new post, Bogart will be responsible for planning and implementing the college's development through the increased acquisition of annual and capital fund support. Area community economic redevelopment will be another phase of his work, since one of the fundamental purposes of the institution is to stimulate cultural, economic and social growth throughout Eastern Kentucky.  
Born in Quincey, Ill., Bogart holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Fort Hays Kansas State College. He served as admissions counselor and director of admissions at Heidelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio, and a similar position at Monticello College, Godfrey, Illinois. He came to Alice Lloyd College after having served as development director for Olivet College, Olivet, Michigan.  
The new position of associate director for development is part of the college's expansion plan aimed at extending educational opportunity in the Southern Mountains to promising youth who must now be turned away due to lack of funds and facilities. The retention of development counsel, the organization of trustee committees, and a campus building plan are vital steps which already have been achieved.  
On the financial level, the college proposes a budget in excess of \$285,000 in 1963-64. This represents a 100% budgetary increase over two years ago. This budget is based on a 20% enrollment increase over that of 1962-63 when the enrollment numbered 195.  
An architect has been selected for the Alice Lloyd Memorial Building and construction will begin as soon as plans for the structure are complete. Other development program construction items include: a library annex, student housing, and accommodation for guests of the college.  
The long-range development plan will center around a 10-year budget plan to be completed during the coming fiscal year. Long-range physical expansion anticipated to include a classroom building, a field-house and swimming pool, expanded science facilities and faculty and student housing.  
It is planned that by 1970, Alice Lloyd College will be offering educational opportunity to more than 500 youths annually.

Wildlife Refuges: It opens on September 15 and continues through September 21; reopens on September 22 and continues through September 29. Management areas to be open to squirrel hunters are: West Kentucky Area, Ballard County Area, and Central Kentucky Area, where the season will open on August 15 and continue through October 15.  
The season for quail, rabbits and furberers opens on November 21 and continues through January 19. The tag and possession limits are unchanged. The grouse season opens on December 1 and continues through January 23. A special grouse season opening on December 15 and continuing through January 15 has been set on the following management areas: Dewey Lake, Pine Mountain, Robinson Forest and Ford Management Area.  
A training season for coon dogs was set for September 1 through October 21, reopening on January 20 and continuing through February 23. A shake-out season, during which coons may be taken with dogs only, opens on October 22 and continues through November 20. The late season for furbearers opens on November 21 and continues through January 19.  
Wild turkey season opens on a selected area in Cumberland National Forest on November 1 and continues through November 3. During this season turkeys of either sex may be taken and the same areas as were open last year will be used. A spring season for a designated area, opening on April 24 and continuing through April 28, has been set during which only turkey hunters with visible boards may be killed. The area included in this hunt is in Whitley, Laurel, Wolfe, Powell, Jackson, Breathitt, Perry, Knott, Clay, Leslie, Pulaski and McCreary.
