

The Fuel Crisis—Is it Real?

The Fuel Crisis—Is it Real?

If the President and the Congress ever really make up their minds that the fuel crisis of which they all speak so much is truly a reality, conversion of coal to oil and gas will be a real part of the American industrial picture.

But, as of this moment, the national leadership is content to point with alarm and to depend upon the country's untapped, and largely unknown, resources—and on the uncertain supply of oil from the Near East and Soviet Russia.

Congressmen Carl D. Perkins and Tim Lee Carter recently lost their attempt at passage of a bill to provide federal loans and guarantees, as well as funds for federal construction of coal conversion plants. Now, the whole program of oil and gas production from coal seems to be bogged down in troubled discussions of what effect such plants would have on the environment and what would be the social and economic impact on the area in which plants may be located.

These are matters worth discussing. But, if the situation is as serious as we have been told, there is no choice—unless the United States is willing to stake its future on a fuel supply from the Arab nations and Russia.

Congressman Perkins was looking far down the road, some 20 years ago, when he first introduced a coal conversion bill. He knew then that coal could be the ultimate answer, because Germany, under tight blockade and fighting for its life, produced oil from coal during World War II, and one of its coal conversion plants was brought, intact, to this country after the war ended. Germany did this quickly, because it was do or die. And yet we plan and temporte.... even hint of an armed takeover of Arab oto become self-sufficient.

Whatever the cost of coal conversion, no price is costlier than

to become self-sufficient.
