

Plans to bring horse racing to Eastern Kentucky have

Plans to bring horse racing to Eastern Kentucky have often been as clear as a jockey's goggles on a muddy track, but the concept behind the proposed development is really nothing new.

The picture has been clouded somewhat by the public-private relationship formed to effect the development and a last-minute thurry of activity to accumulate information needed by the state Racing Commission.

Those familiar with a now-definite system of funding private enterprises through industrial revenue bonds will recognize similarities in the proposals for financing development of the Floyd County project.

In the late 70s, industrial revenue bonds were normal.

the proposasi of manning development of the Propy County project. In the late 70s, industrial revenue bonds were primary sources of funding for a variety of commercial ventures. like shopping centers. Bonds were issued under government authority, by either a city commis-sion or county fiscal court, and they were repeat by the

private company which used the proceeds. Government agencies had no risk or obligation to repay industrial revenue bonds.

The receip project in Floyd County, which is actually to be a multi-purpose facility, will utilize government sponsored bonding and privately invested funds. Bonds issued by the county's fiscal court do involve some risk and obligation on the part of the county, but there are protections but it in, as well. Here's a summary of how the project will work:

The county's fiscal court has authorized the sale of \$2.7 interest rate... probably below five percent.

Revenue from those bonds will finance the construction of project elements that do not deal with actual racing or gambling. For instance, bond proceeds will pay for the construction of a convention center/studium, set acquisition and preparation, parking and access acquistion and preparation, parking and access

roads.
• Private investors have pledged approximately \$3.5 million toward the project. Those lunds will pay for

racing/gambling related costs like the race track itself,

racing/gambling related costs like the race track itself, stables and and intertrack wagering facility.

Private investors make up a corporation known as Mountain Racing, Inc. That corporation will lease the entire facility while liveracing is being conducted, about 45 days a gear, and will lease the intertrack wagering facility on a year-round basis.

Lease purposes from the private corporation will equal bond payments plus ten percent. As long as the racing project remains alload, financially, the county will bear no expense.

Should the private corporation fail the county.

will bear no expense.

Should the private corporation fail, the county would be obligated to pay off the bonds. A "fail-safe" system would give the county the option to convert the site, located on Route 3, to an industrial park where coal severance proceeds can be used to retrie the debt.

During the 20-year term of the bonds, the private corporation may at any time pay off the total indebtedness and become the sole owner of all facilities and property.

No, public funds will finance only the elements not associated with racing. Will bids be taken on the construction process? Yes, a single proposal was accepted by the fiscal court last week only to assure state racing officiats that a commitment was available. The bid remains sealed and

Who are the private investors?



Carroll attended a special meeting of the newly-formed Floyd County Public Properties Corporation, which is made up of fiscal court members, friday morning to ask the corporation to accept a contract with Simpson and Associates of Tribe, Florida to build the "East Kentucky Stadium Facility."

District Two Magistrate Jackie Editord Owens said at Friday's meeting, he felt the project should be put out for bids to allow local countractors to vie for the project.

The contract with Simpson and Associates was not available for Friday's meeting prompting court members to postpone action to Monday's meeting prompting court members to postpone action to Monday's meeting, Owens and Magistrate Gerald DeRossett did not attend Monday's meeting.

The contract stipulates that public bidding be conducted on the project and, should any company offer lower costs, the Simpson and Associates contract will be voided in favor of the lowest bid.

Owens also objected to a provi-sion in a sub-lease agreement with Mountain Racing that would allow the corporation to obtain ownership of the facility and property if the \$2.7 million bond issue is paid in full.

"We buy the sucker and let them have it when it's paid off," Owens said, "We should've been informed; we should've had (the lease) before the meeting."

Under terms of the sub-lease ap-proved by the court, the project's indebtedness will be retired through lease payments from Mountain Rac-ing, not by county funds.

The sub-lease agreement with the racing corporation references exhibits to be filed along with the lease agreement in the Floyd County Court

Had the board been paying attention, they might also have learned that the systems so



Burchett to be tried in shooting

A judge found Flem Burchett competent Wednesday to stand trial in the shooting death of Johnson County Sheriff Gene Cyrus but said Burchett is too retarded to face the death penalty. Pike Circuit Judge Bayard Collier heard testimony from two psychiatrists who said Burchett, 64, of Oil Springs, most likely has an IQ below 70. State law classifies someone at that level as severely mentally returded and prohibits the death penalty in such cases.

Cullier scheduled a November 22 trial for Burchett.

Kentucky State Police allege Burchett gunned down the 56-year-old law officer March 18, 1992, as Cyrus stood on the front porch of Burchett's home. Burchett had walked away from his rape trial in Johnson Circuit Court, and Cyrus went to



Rhyne says flipping and pitching are among the best lure presentation techniques because of the accuracy they provide. Casting also works well if the lure is east beyond the target and then retrieved to the tree and allowed to sink.

"The important thing is to give the bass plenty of time to see and react to the lure," says Rhyne. "You can't just drop a worm or jig beside a willow and expect a strike.
"You have to shake the lure and usually make several flips or pitches all around the base of the tree before you'll get a bite."

Water depth is important when

Water depth is important when fishing for post-spawn bass, Rybne adds. Normally, the best areas will be those in which the willow trees offer the first available cover away from the spawning beds. This can mean water anywhere from four to 10or 12 feet deep.
"We usually call the immediate post-spawn season the toughest two weeks in fishing." Rhyne smiles. "It is tough, too. Thank goodness it doesn't last any longer than that."

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

Those hunters wishing to hunt in the Morgan County section of the wildlife management area can do so wildlife management area can do so without any hunting zone restrictions. Those hunters wishing to hunt in the Johnson County section are urged to check this map since a few areas close to the dam have been desig-nated as "No Hunting Zones".

Upland game bird, small grouse or furbearer hunting, trapping or unleashed dogs are prohibited during periods when breech-loading (modern) fire-arms are permitted for deer hunting (see deer guide). Shakeout season closed Unleashed dogs prohibited from March I through August 31, except during permitted field trials.

The Corps reminds all hunters that they are responsible for knowing the proport hunting zones and hunting regulations before hunting on the widdlife management area.

The Corps also posts these bulle-tub boards with park regulations and general hunting and fishing information.

Expenenced fishermen know the importance of water temperature in relation to catching fish. Every game fish species has a preferred temperature range which governs feeding spawning impration, and so forth in short, water temperature will determine how active or machise any given species may be species may be supported to the proper space of the species may be.

Surface temperature has become easy to identify using small, compact temp gauges found on most modern fishing boats. But what about emperatures lower than the water surface-say 2016 so feet deep? Doesn't this have a distinct bearing on the habits of gaine fish? The answer is absolutely.

The overall goals of every pregnancy are simple—to have a healthy mother and her baby. For the mother, that means maintaining or improving physical and emotional health, reducing complications through prompt identification and treatment, and improving standards of care for the labor and delivery process. For infants, the goals of care are the reduction of mortality during birth and early days of life, and the reduction of birth defects. A comprehensive prenatal program of medical and educational care is needed to reach these goals for mother and child.

Highlands Regional Medical Center's Birth Place is a comprehensive prenatal education program aimed at helping new

parents have a happy and healthy pregnancy. The education program is designed to complement the new \$1.2 million redesign and expansion of the Obstetrical Department, scheduled for a September 1993 opening and named the Birth Place.

The program will review with expectant parents the normal physical and psychological changes that occur during pregnancy, healthy maintenance and care during pregnancy, nutritional development.

The importance of prenatal care

The woman who suspects she is pregnant should schedule her first visit with an obstetrician or family practitioner after she has missed a menstrual period. Most books and physicians encourage that early care, but many of today's health conscious parents-to-be are looking for an even earlier way to ensure their baby's well-being and

"The preconception visit may be the single most important health care visit as viewed in the context of its effect on pregnancy," according to a report of federal panel of experts as prenatal care. The "Caring for Our Future: The Content of Prenatal Care," outlined recommendations that all women visit their obstetrician at least once before conception.

The sooner the better

As part of the preconception visit, mothers are asked questions about medical history, past pregnancies and lifestyle factors. Before pregnancy is the best time to evaluate a woman's health. The better her health before conception, the better the chances for having a healthy pregnancy and a healthy baby, according to these experts. Preconception can also give the woman time to change habits that can affect the fetus, such as smoking and drinking, and to start treatment for conditions such as diabetes

While the terminology may be new, the

concept is really just an extension of a not so new principal. "It's just good, preventative medicine." said Kathy Rubado, Public Relations coordinator.
