County Judge-Executive John M. Stumbo is seeking re-election to a third term as Floyd County Judge-Executive.

Judge Stumbo has served since 1983, when he took over the office after the death of Jerry Lafferty Jr.

Prior to this he was superintendent of Mountain Enterprises, Inc., and was superintendent for the Adams Construction Corporation for 21 years.

Judge Stumbo, a U.S. Army World War II veteran, has been chairman of the Big Sandy ADD and the Ken-

Bradley makes "listen and learn" visit to area

When U.S. Senator Bill Bradley, Dem.-N.J., made a brief visit to Eastern Kentucky last fall, he expressed an interest in coming back to the area to learn more about the people and the issues of the region.

That's what he did last weekend, at the invitation of Dr. Deborah Floyd, president of Prestonsburg Community College.

Bradley, who came without the usual congressional entourage, re-

quested that the visit be as private as possible so he could meet and talk with the people in the area without drawing media attention.

He called this a "listen and learn" visit. Stating an "interest in the college's health education and wellness programs, he asked Floyd to plan an informal visit that would focus on the people of the area.

The senator, hosted by PCC personnel, did not go away hungry. The former professional basketball player's visit was punctuated by meal stops. Shortly after arriving at the college on Saturday, he talked about

health care reform over lunch with some area doctors at Billy Ray's Restaurant in downtown Prestonsburg.

That evening he joined the family of Harry Vincel and June Cooley at their Prestonsburg home for steaks on the grill and entertainment by noted Knott County author James Still.

Sunday breakfast was taken at the home of Woodrow and Narcie Burdett on Cow Creek. And Sunday "dinner" was served at the Warfield home of John and Bonnie Triplett. John Triplett, who serves on the PCC

Federal suit alleges board failed student

A federal lawsuit was filed last week against the Floyd County School Board, superintendent and a grade school principal alleging that school officials are not providing an adequate education for a special needs student.

Velma Banks filed the lawsuit on behalf of her son, Travis Banks, who is an eighth grade student at Duff Elementary.

The suit claims school officials are failing to provide a free appropriate public education for Travis Banks and that the student has not been provided with an Individual Educational Program as required under federal law.

The lawsuit also claims that the school system has shortened Banks' school day or school week; that the student was unlawfully expelled from school for the majority of the spring term; that the student was not fully evaluated to determine his individual educational needs; and the school system denied Banks an equal opportunity to participate in non-academic and extracurricular activities.

Also the lawsuit claims that Duff principal Ralph O'Quinn held Travis Banks on October 11 while other students kicked Banks about his head, a part of his body to which he has been subjected to brain tumors in the past.

O'Quinn said Thursday that he was unaware the lawsuit had been filed and that he would not comment on the case.

The lawsuit claims that Travis Banks suffers from a traumatic brain injury which has produced serious emotional disturbances and other health impairments and, therefore, the student is classified as an individual with handicaps.

The complaint also alleges that the student was expelled from school for possession of a white substance O'Quinn said was cocaine, but which turned out to be citric acid. "A harmless substance obtained... in the course of (Banks') education in a science class."

The suit seeks punitive damages, costs for compensatory education, a temporary injunction requiring the school board to educate Banks, attorney fees and a trial by jury.

School board attorney Cliff Latta could not be reached for comment on the suit.

Civil suit filed over incident at Wayland

A Wayland woman has filed a federal lawsuit against a Wayland auxiliary policeman and Wayland City Commissioners claiming the officer discharged a weapon at her feet at her home last April.

Joyce Martin, who filed the suit, claims that auxiliary policeman Douglas Harvey fired his weapon in the ground beside her feet during an altercation between Wayland police chief Danny Francis and a juvenile, Martin's husband, Glen, said Wednesday.

The lawsuit claims that Harvey acted in a grossly negligent manner with obvious disregard to human life in the course of responding to the complaint.

Wayland Mayor Eugene Mullins and city commissioners were named in the suit because they allegedly failed to see that Harvey was properly trained and supervised.

There is no telephone listing for Harvey or Mullins and they could not be reached for comment on the lawsuit.

Grand jury gets six cases from 'Fall Harvest' busts

One preliminary hearing was held and five were postponed Wednesday for defendants charged with drug-related crimes in connection with the October 19 drug roundup by Kentucky State Police.

Six other cases resulting from the

roundup were waived to the Floyd County Grand Jury, which meets next month.

At Wednesday's hearing, Pikeville attorney Randall Starnes represented Ronnie L. Watkins, 30, of Harold, who is charged with possession of cocaine.

Kentucky State Police trooper David Watkins testified Wednesday that he arrested Lawson July 4 at Store House Hollow near the Floyd/Pike County line. During a search of Lawson's vehicle, Watkins said that he found two half-gram bags of a white substance under a floor mat in the vehicle that Lawson said was cocaine.

Lawson said that he bought the substance earlier in the day from Joe Hopkins for \$100, Watkins testified.

Hopkins, 59, of Harold was also arrested in the drug roundup and charged with four counts of trafficking in cocaine.

Starnes asked Watkins why Lawson was not charged July when he was arrested.

"Because Lawson said he was going to work with us," Watkins said. "We interviewed him and he was

supposed to come to post to set up a meeting."

Watkins said that when he stopped Lawson's vehicle on July 4, the driver fled the scene. Lawson was charged with alcohol intoxication.

Watkins was asked by assistant county attorney Bob Bishop if he was trained to do field tests to determine if the substance was cocaine.

Watkins testified that he was not trained to do such tests, but that Lawson identified the substance as cocaine.

After Watkins' testimony, Starnes asked that the charge against Lawson be dismissed because the prosecution failed to prove the substance was cocaine and that there was no lab report indicating the substance was cocaine.

Judge Caudill ruled that Lawson identified the substance as cocaine and ordered that the case be waived to the grand jury.

In five other cases set for hearings Wednesday, an attorney for the public defender's office, who represents the five defendants, was not avail-

Collins

Collins is the son of Johanas and Mary Collins.
 "The most important issue in this race is returning the government of this county, and it's financial affairs, back to the people where it belongs," Collins said.
 When asked what his plans were should he get elected, Collins said, "My plan would be to have an independent audit of the county's fiscal affairs for the last eight years to see where the money has gone, how much we owe and how much we would owe by the time I took office."

Collins said he would not build a political machine of any kind, but tear the one down that has already been built and restore the government to the people.
 Collins said he would do the jobs that have to be done in the county and not in such a way that they are considered favors.
 "Politics won't play a hand in the way I would administer office because everybody would be free to come and go in their offices just like they should," said Collins.
 Collins said the biggest problem

he is having in this campaign is finding Republican election officers to protect them at the polls.
 "It's almost impossible, according to the people I have talked to," Collins said.
 "I've been to a lot of precincts and I've found good people that said, 'we won't fool with politics anymore, we quit because they run crooked there is no way to do a honest job and I don't want to go out there because I may have to fight some of these racial.' Now that's just the words they've

told me," Collins said.
 "It's hard to find a Republican, or Democrat, that will serve as a challenger because they don't want to antagonize, or they're afraid of the repercussions with the political system in this county," Collins said.
 "I have found a good reception all over the county, I've found a lot of big democrat families that have told me that they are going to be for me," Collins said.
 "The thing about it is we've got an awful situation here trying to combat a political machine in a county where the registration is five-to-one or better."
 "We've got about 2,000 Republicans in the county and most are registered with the other side because they seem to think they have to get food stamps, welfare and anything else that goes on here," Collins said.
 "They don't leave much for a Republican to look forward to."
 "This county needs a two-party system."
 "They need the checks and balances between the two to make the politicians that are elected to give us good government."
 "I don't have any kick against the Judge, but I do want to kick the machine. I want to kick the machine plumb out of the county because it doesn't belong in any county," Collins said.

Stumbo

Stumbo is a member of the County Coal County Coalition.
 He also served on the Floyd County Board of Education for 31 years, 26 of those as chairman.
 Stumbo graduated from Betsy Layne High School and is the son of the late John Morgan and Della Stumbo.
 When asked what the most important issues in the upcoming election, Stumbo replied, "I feel it is the ability to run waterlines and to do the roadwork. I've done this all my life."
 "I know how to run the waterlines

and how to build the roads. I have 32 years experience in road building.
 "I want fresh drinking water to most every house. There are places that are very tough to get to but we're adding lines each year," said Stumbo.
 "Beaver-Elkhorn system is now under contract to add another one million gallons a day. Prestonsburg city utilities is now under contract to add two million gallons a day so we will have the water to reach out to these places," Stumbo said.
 Stumbo said the county had gotten to the head of the hollow in many

places and wanted to continue to the other hollows with the waterlines.
 Stumbo also said that he hopes to have all county roads blacktopped within the next five years. "I think that if we don't have a change in our coal severance tax we will be able to do that," Stumbo said.
 Responding to the Wednesday edition of "Town Talk", a program aired on a local radio station, about allegations that Floyd Countyans pay the highest taxes in the state, Stumbo said that Floyd County had actually lowered the tax rates since he had taken office from 19.5¢ to 16.2¢ per \$100 valuation.
 "We have lowered the tax rate since I've been County Judge, we have never raised the tax rate. We set our budget at the anticipated taxes we will receive. We don't spend and then set the tax rate," he said.
 "Most people don't realize that the county was the one that did the work to get the two shopping centers and the Holiday Inn."
 "Floyd County put the water and sewage in these places. After Floyd County got the centers Prestonsburg annexed them into the city," Stumbo said.
 Stumbo said he intends to do what he has always done. "The records are out there to see, the people see the blacktop, waterlines and fire hydrants," he said.
 "We're talking about water, getting the roads built, that's not built, and blacktopped, fire protection and also we will have the enhanced 911 system in 1994," he said.

Stumbo for Supreme Court

THE OUTRAGE that Gov. Brereton Jones committed in appointing Sara Walter Combs to the state Supreme Court can be undone in the upcoming election. Eastern Kentucky voters can have the last word by replacing her with Judge Janet Stumbo, who has established a fine record on the Court of Appeals over the last three years.

Sara Combs likes to quote from her favorite author, Antoine de Saint-Exupéry, who said: "That which is essential is invisible to the eyes."
 What is invisible to the eyes—and inaccessible to ear, tongue, touch, or other human sensibilities—is any defense for Mrs. Combs' being on the high court in the first place.
 The only sense that tells us much about her appointment by Gov. Jones last summer is the sense of smell. Had she not been the widow of former Gov. Bert Combs, Brereton Jones would not have given her the job. She does not have the background that, absent cronyism, would qualify her for it.
 Such background as she does have is suspect, including her role in the legal tangle over contributions from employees of a billboard company to the campaign of former Gov. Martha Layne Collins. The charges were defeated by an expiring statute of limitations, but the odor of the case lingers.
 The good news is that voters in District 7 have two excellent alternatives in Judge Stumbo and former Ashland Mayor David Welch. Both are well qualified. Both have earned consideration. Mr. Welch has an extensive record of significant public service, informed by his commitment to opportunity for women, minorities and other oppressed groups. But Janet Stumbo is an even better choice.
 Like Mr. Welch, Judge Stumbo made her way without the help of the high and mighty. He grew up in a racially mixed neighborhood in Ashland. After losing his father at the age of 16, he was educated on scholarship at Berea College and later at Harvard Law. Judge Stumbo is a native of the Eastern Kentucky mountains whose father worked in the boiler room of United Mine Workers hospitals. As a judge she has earned a reputation for sympathy with injured workers and plaintiffs and for being sensitive to criminal defendants' rights.
 However, her Appeals Court decisions are impossible to pigeonhole. She has proven to be a thoughtful, independent jurist.
 Honored by Kentucky Women Advocates for her work in the area of spouse abuse, she will take that sensitivity to the high court if she becomes the first woman elected to that bench.
 Judge Stumbo's judicial service has been marked by diligence, intelligence and imagination. She deserves an opportunity to bring those qualities to the Supreme Court. If you agree, vote for Janet Stumbo next Tuesday.



Editor:
When I became board member, we had one project (the 21-room addition) which the state had put a stop to until things could be made legal. All the problems (dirt pile included). I inherited. Harold was to close, so was Prater. I immediately had to hit the ground running.
Many sleepless nights went by trying to come up with the right decision. It became obvious. Eliminate the large number of aging mobile classrooms as quickly as possible; especially the rented ones. Early in July, I made a public statement. "I know I may be committing political suicide but I have to do what I believe is right." A middle school first, centrally located between Betsy Layne, Joan M. Stumbo, Harold and Prater. This would help eliminate the need for mobile classrooms at four schools. Also, keep Harold and Prater open as a K-5 until the 21-room addition is completed. The conclusion is (whomever wishes to take the credit) we will now have two schools, the 21-room addition and a middle school. Harold and Prater will remain open.
All we can do, is the best we know how.
Please go out to vote. Keep your vote to yourself, that is what the curtains are for.

Need review of criminal justice system

Gov. Paul Patton is asking for a "comprehensive" review of Kentucky's criminal justice system. His call should be considered more than just a platform for his upcoming gubernatorial campaign. His ideas make sense:
• Make the punishment fit the crime. Patton says Kentucky's prisons are "bursting at the seams" even though the most violent criminals are back on the street.
• Restore honesty to the sentencing of criminals. Make a life sentence just that, Patton says. "We have all grown tired of reading about life sentences for violent criminals in the same paragraph that tells us when they will be eligible for parole. Sentences for violent criminals should be swift and severe... jail time, no parole."
• Develop alternatives to sentences for non-violent offenders. For non-violent criminals, Patton says, "punishments must be created requiring criminals to make full restitution to their victims, to support their families

and to repay the state for the burden they have imposed on society. These are all good ideas. Since Patton brought them up, he should work with the attorney general and present legislation to the General Assembly. — *The Paintsville Herald*

THE CASE FOR HIGHER EDUCATION
Dan Lacy
Chairman of the Kentucky
Advocates for Higher Education

It was good news for all Kentuckians when Governor Breton C. Jones announced he would spare Kentucky's eight public universities any further financial cuts this year. However, Kentucky's continuing money woes give little reason to expect that our centers of higher education will be adequately funded in the 1994 General Assembly and beyond unless the extreme importance of full funding is fully explained to the people.

Few would publicly proclaim that our state universities are unimportant. Yet, there are also far too few who would step forward and plead the case for higher education in the face of all the state's many needs. Therein lies the danger to the future of quality higher education in Kentucky.

Unless we begin to widely and convincingly tell the real story about the value of higher education, we face the potential loss of this state's greatest asset — the well-educated young people we must depend on to be the leaders, teachers, doctors and business people of the future. We can ensure our own mediocre future if we fail these young people today.

We also stand to lose our finest resource for training and retaining a workforce that must adapt rapidly to ever-changing technologies. And we endanger what is perhaps the state's most important vehicle for improvement in elementary and secondary teaching, economic development and the creation of new jobs, health care and more.

Kentucky's eight state universities — Eastern Kentucky University, Western Kentucky University, the University of Kentucky, the University of Louisville, Morehead State and Murray State Universities, Kentucky State University and Northern Kentucky University — play vital roles in all of our lives every single day. Too often, we just don't realize it.

The Kentucky Education Reform Act has changed forever and for the better how we teach our children from kindergarten through high school. Who is training our elementary and secondary school teachers how to do that? The state's investment in Western Kentucky University has even taken the bold step to offer a quality assurance program for its teacher education graduates. That means if a Western teaching graduate is not adequately prepared in any area, that teacher will get additional training at no cost to the teacher or the school system. Pretty good offer.

Research, the key to all new knowledge, also touches each of us in many positive ways. There are thousands of examples of how university research has helped Kentucky agriculture, boosted economic development, created new jobs and improved health care for all of us.

For example, University of Louisville researchers have developed a biological way to help clean up environmental pollution, while the University of Kentucky's Kentucky Agricultural Diversification Program has helped Lake Cumberland/Western Kentucky poultry industry grow from a \$24 million to \$165 million industry in just four years.

The researchers themselves bring millions of dollars in grants into the state that otherwise wouldn't be spent here. At the University of Kentucky alone, research grants totaled a record \$69 million this year.

Overall, the universities are tremendous contributors to Kentucky's economy. New research from the University of Kentucky shows that every dollar of state money invested in the eight state universities in 1991-92, generated \$3-40 in total spending. That represents an additional \$2.29 billion pumped into the state's economy.

The universities are making these invaluable contributions even as they deal with soaring enrollments of more than 25 percent in recent years. Community college enrollment is up an amazing 94 percent.

The good news is more Kentuckians than ever are getting college educations. The troubling news is that state support for higher education continues to erode in the face of revenue shortages. Recent cuts alone have totaled 10 percent.

The Information Age is upon us. There has never been a time when a top-quality higher education system was more vital to the future of Kentucky's citizens. Now is the time for the best and boldest efforts to advance the cause of education — from preschool to graduate school.

Don't let our state's economic engine run out of fuel. Funding higher education pays off for all Kentuckians.

Regional News Briefs

Plea made in sexual abuse case

A Lawrence County man agreed to undergo psychological counseling in a plea bargain in Boyd District Court Monday in an effort to have four felony sex abuse charges against him dropped.

James David Bartlett, 24, of Louisa, was indicted in April on four counts of sodomy stemming from an incident in which he allegedly had sexual contact with a seven-year-old boy in December of 1991.

Bartlett pleaded guilty at his arraignment in April and continues to maintain his innocence. The charges against him were reduced to one misdemeanor count of second degree sexual abuse last week under an agreed order with Boyd Assistant Commonwealth's Attorney Jeff Preston.

Preston told reporters Monday that he agreed to the plea bargain because the case against Bartlett was based solely on statements made by the alleged victim, who changed his testimony three times.

Boyd District Judge Edwin Rice ordered Bartlett to participate in a counseling program and to have no contact with his accuser. Rice is scheduled to review the case in April, 1994, and charges against Bartlett will be dropped if he has followed the terms of the agreed order. —The Big Sandy News

Doctor sued for negligence

A lawsuit was filed in Pike Circuit Court on October 1 against South Williamson doctor Diane Shafer, alleging she negligently caused the death of Roger Ratliff, formerly of Ransom, by prescribing excessive medication.

The action taken by Ratliff's wife, Carolyn, contends that he went to Shafer for treatment of an ankle fracture, and continued to see the doctor from February 1990 until his death on October 3, 1992.

During this period, Shafer allegedly prescribed a number of medications which included Liodine, Tylenol 3, Xanax and Robaxin. The suit charges that "the defendant, Dr. Diane Shafer, did negligently prescribe an excess of medication for the decedent, Roger Ratliff, and this action by Diane Shafer was a departure from the standard acceptable medical practice."

Anita Johnson, one of the Ratliff's attorneys, said information pertaining to the cause of death was taken from a medical examiner's report. Shafer, an orthopedic surgeon, was sentenced in May to five years in prison for bribing a hearing officer, whom she allegedly married while he was investigating her, to recommend dismissal of Kentucky Board of Licensure charges alleging she overprescribed drugs, gave poor surgical care and admitted patients unnecessarily for treatment.

Shafer is reportedly appealing the bribery conviction. —Appalachian News Express

Jury set to probe shooting

As Kentucky State Police Trooper David E. Ross continues to recuperate from gunshot wounds he suffered last week while responding to a reported domestic dispute, a Lawrence County Grand Jury prepares to hear testimony in the incident.

Ross, 26, a three-and-a-half year veteran of the force, was critically wounded on October 24 when he and Lawrence County Sheriff's deputies Ed Cordle and Tim Ellis responded to a domestic complaint at the Meade's Branch home of 56-year-old Billy Joe Hinkle.



\$22,500 biomass energy grant could fund Kentucky projects

The Tennessee Valley Authority's Southeastern Regional Biomass Energy Program (SERBEP) is making \$22,500 available to help fund one or more projects demonstrating the use of biomass to produce energy. Biomass includes wood and wood waste, agricultural crops and residues, animal waste, processing waste, animal wastes, and municipal solid waste. SERBEP will fund up to 5 percent of the cost of demonstration projects, which may be based anywhere in Kentucky.

Projects that have been funded through this program in the past or are currently in progress include:

- A sawdust-fired boiler to heat a kiln at a wood products company.
- An engineering study of co-firing 10 percent sawdust with 90 percent coal at an electric power plant.
- A demonstration of the use of corn-burning stoves in low-income households.
- A study to identify optimal materials, sized, lime-stone, and biomass fuels for burning in a fluidized bed combustion system.
- A demonstration of a process to manufacture pellet fuel from waste wood.
- A project to recover methane from a closed landfill to power an industrial boiler.

Those interested in requesting partial funding for a biomass energy project should contact Geoffrey Young at the Kentucky Division of Energy, 801-282-0868, to discuss the project and request a proposal form. Formal proposals are due at the division by January 14, 1994.

PCC students to rally against tuition increase

Prestonsburg Community College students will rally against a proposed tuition increase. The rally is set for 9:30 a.m. November 10, 1993, at the Johnson Building on campus. The demonstration will be held as part of a state-wide campaign by University and community college students to protest the proposed 20 percent increase. The Kentucky Higher Education Council will vote on the increase November 8. The Council raised tuition by 20 percent last year, increasing the cost of tuition from \$550 to \$660 per semester. The rally will be held on the college lawn when all school high school students visit the college. No classes are held until 11:30 a.m. during College Day.

Federal Ruling Food Supplements Not Drugs Under Medicaid Program

Medicaid Commissioner Harold R. "Rod" Blom (Blumb) announced last week that effective October 31, 1993, food supplement products will no longer be available to Medicaid recipients as drug products. These products have a National Drug Code designation and because of this were being treated as drugs for Medicaid billing purposes but have now been ruled as food supplement products by the federal government. The Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA), a federal agency, has advised the Department for Medicaid Services in Frankfort that the food supplement products also referred to as mineral nutrition products are considered to be food and as such may no longer be covered under the Medicaid Drug Program. The department is notifying the providers and recipients that these products will no longer be available as drugs. The products will continue to be available to children under 21 years of age through the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment Program.

People hurting under current health care system testify before task force

 One day James Jones was a happy college graduate, a young professional who had really just begun to see what life had to offer.
 The next day life dealt him a harsh blow. He had to have a kidney transplant, and he had to have dialysis treatments while he waited for a donor.
 "I was basically wiped out," the Lexington resident told the Task Force on Health Care Reform during its public hearing last Thursday. "I became uninsurable. I'm lumped in with someone who has AIDS."
 He found a donor and got the life-saving kidney transplant, but there was no way to save his job or his lifestyle.
 "My medicine right now is about \$8,000 per month," he told task force members. "That's out of my pocket. That's only prescription medicine."
 Last month, he got some money from the United Way to help pay his

medical bills. That money ran out Friday, the day after about 15 members of the 25-member task force heard his story.
 "That's it," Johns said. "I sold my car. I've lost everything."
 Johns isn't alone. Several people testified on their own behalfs during the public hearing, pointing similar pictures.
 They had no health insurance. A catastrophic illness struck them. They cannot finance their medical bills.
 Some even go without treatment because they can't afford it.
 But the number of people who testified on their own behalfs was in stark contrast to the loads of lobbyists from medical professional societies, hospitals and other medical-related businesses who went before the committee to basically say they oppose price controls or other strict measures to control health care costs.
 The task force drafted a proposal for health care reform in Kentucky, and took public testimony to hear what people had to say about the proposal. Gov. Brereton Jones is now working with legislative leaders to see when the best time would be to call a special session of the General Assembly to enact health care reforms.

"If it costs \$1 at the hospital pharmacy and it costs \$10 at the pharmacy right next door, somebody's getting ripped off," Long said.
 Barnett said he would be happy to work with the General Assembly to try to correct this problem.





Phone home program stops playing hookey

Skipping school isn't what it used to be. Technology has moved into the truancy office with the Phone Master, a computerized phone home program that notifies parents when their children aren't in school.

At Allen Central, that technology was installed last year, and the school plans to use it again this year. When Allen Central students miss school, their parents will hear the recorded message telling them their children aren't in school. The program also leaves a phone number the parent may call for further information.

The telephone program is in conjunction with a new effort at the school to increase attendance. Some of the ideas being implemented include notifying parents by letter when a

student misses five days of class and having students make up time missed when their absences reach 10 days. If a student fails to make up class time missed beyond nine days, he/she will receive an incomplete grade.

A drop-out prevention coordinator will be hired at the school. An attendance committee has also been organized at the school in the effort to control absenteeism. The committee consists of the principal, designee, counselor, teachers, non-certified personnel and parents. The committee will review each absentee case on an individual basis.

Home visits will also be made for students who miss an inordinate amount of class time.

The Kentucky River Giant

The railroads expanded rapidly into the western United States in the years following the Civil War.

The W. W. Cole Circus organized the first extensive tour of the west and contracted the giants, Martin Van Buren Bates and his wife Anna, as the feature attraction. The success of the venture led to other big shows to follow.

The following year the giants anxiously awaited the arrival of a baby. Anna's pregnancy was normal except that she became unusually large. "I was called to the Bates home in Seville, Ohio, on January 15, 1879," Dr. A. P. Beach wrote later. "Mrs. Bates was of such a tremendous size that I could not make a satisfactory examination. She remained in the initial stages of labor for 24 hours, and delivery began at 36 hours."

Dr. Beach called Dr. J. D. Robinson, of Wooster, Ohio, to assist him and after much difficulty they delivered the baby.

"When the membranes broke, fluid I estimated to be six gallons of fluid came pouring out of the mother," Dr. Beach recorded. "The baby was the size of an average six-month old baby."

It was the largest known baby in history, weighing a fraction under 24 pounds at birth and measuring 30 inches in length. The baby's feet were 5 1/2 inches long.

The birth was unique in another respect. Giants are usually born to normal parents and usually have normal sized children. But Martin and Anna gave birth to a giant son.

Unfortunately, the baby lived for only a short while, dying eleven hours after birth. Dr. Beach wrote about the giant delivery in the *Medical Record*, a physician journal of that era. Martin Van Buren Bates also recorded his thoughts.

"We have been blessed with many things during the years," Bates wrote. "But affliction again visited in January, 1879, with the birth of a child. He was perfect in every respect. He looked like an ordinary child except he appeared much larger and older."

The following year found Martin Van Buren Bates and his wife, Anna, the eight-foot tall "Love Giants," touring the Western United States with the Cole Circus again. Afterwards they retired to their farm home in Ohio.

Bates was a good businessman and became quite wealthy. Although he was a large man and magnificent physical specimen, Martin chose to use the legal system to settle problems instead of bullying anyone.

Anna was among the participants in activities involving the ladies of the area prior to her death at the relatively young age of 43.

Captain Bates sent a wire to a firm in Cleveland to have a special coffin made which would be adequate for his wife. The worker, upon receiving the order felt the dimensions must be in error, and made a normal-size coffin. Bates was irate over having to wait another three days for a casket to be made for burying his wife.

The funeral services held on the veranda with the people observing from the yard. Although the Bates home was large, it still couldn't accommodate the large number of people who attended. The following Sunday their special pew in Seville First Baptist Church was draped with flowers and plants. Rev. Ashley preached from the 14th chapter of Mark. "She hath done what she could."

Bates had a large statue made in France and shipped to Ohio where it shadows her grave. Many people have said that it resembles Anna at a young age.

In 1900, Bates married LaVonne Weatherly, the daughter of a local minister and they lived in the town of Seville instead of in the country.

Bates, a refined man, spent his later years enjoying a gentleman's life of leisure. LaVonne, whose father was a former pastor at Seville Baptist Church, was slightly more than five feet tall.

Bates enjoyed discussing the Civil War, its causes, and other issues of the day. He attended street fairs where

he towered over the townspeople. They helped him recall his days of long before when the world's royalty paid to rub shoulders, orcbows, with him and his wife.

Ray Welday was a next-door neighbor and business associate of Bates but at times they had heated disagreements. Bates bought a parrot and trained it for weeks before putting it's cage on the porch where it would continuously tell Welday, "Get off the grass, get off the grass."







Dragons, peasants and puppeteers

Arts in Morehead (AIM) will present an evening of family entertainment featuring the Wood and Strings Puppet Theatre on Wednesday, November 3, at 7:30 p.m. in Burton Auditorium at Morehead State University.

Two productions are scheduled that evening: "An Irish Tale," the story of two poor peasants who have been granted three wishes, and "Out of the Mist...a Dragon," a magical tale of an ill-fated pair of Japanese lovers.

AIM is a cooperative effort of MSU and the Morehead/Rowan County Arts Council. General admission tickets will be available at the door on the evening of the performance at \$6 for adults and \$3 for non-MSU students and children. MSU students with valid I.D. cards will be admitted free.

"The performance is scheduled to begin 30 minutes earlier than traditional AIM productions in order to encourage families to attend," said Thom Yancy, AIM program chair. "Although the stories are simplistic in nature, the visual effects are breath-takingly stunning," he added.

During its visit to the MSU campus, Wood and Strings Puppet Theatre will present two performances for area primary school children and a master class for MSU theatre and art students.

While an "Irish Tale" is full of detailed masks, colorful costumes and endearing puppets, "Out of the Mist" is a journey around the world of traditional folk puppetry, according to Wood and Strings artistic director Clarissa Lega.

The show uses reproductions of carved masks of Native Americans on the Northwest Coast, Punch and Judy from Europe and the rarely seen shadow puppets of Indonesia. However, the main characters are reproductions of the exquisite classical style of Japanese puppetry known as Bunraku.

"They become very lifelike after you start posturing them," said Lega, who carefully researched the Bunraku movement. The two male Bunraku puppets stand four feet tall and the young princess is three feet six inches.

Each Bunraku figure features jet-black hair, alabaster white skin, exaggerated eyes and richly detailed kimo-

nos. The puppeteers are dressed in traditional black, complete with black hoods that cover the face. Sometimes it takes as many as three puppeteers to operate a single puppet.

Lega and Leon Fuller, her husband, created Wood and Strings Puppet Theatre, a professional touring company which is part of the Tennessee Arts Commission's Touring Arts Program and the Visiting Artists Program of the Southern Arts Federation.

The company operates on a year-round sched-

ule with three or four puppeteers, three productions and a host of many different types of puppets. One of the most requested artists, associated with Tennessee's "Art on the Road" program, Wood and Strings tours regionally throughout the Southeast.

Should Neon knock off Jenkins, they would move to 4-2 on the year and claim the second place spot while Jenkins would drop to third and Phelps fourth.


Is it all clear now? Allen Central's fate rests in their

Allen Eagles finish season 7-0 with win over Paintsville

It has been 1986 since the Allen Eagles won a county grade school football championship, but that all ended this season as the Eagles flew past everyone else and claimed their first title in seven years.

On top of being crowned county champions, the Eagles won the first Big Sandy Elementary Football Conference, a league that included eight teams. The Eagles finished the season 7-0 to win the prestigious conference title and did it in good form as they defeated a very strong Paintsville football team on the road, 8-0, this past Tuesday night.

"I'm proud of these kids," said assistant coach Jackie Howard. "I'm sure they played a heck of a game for us tonight. He has such good quickness."

It wasn't an easy win for the Eagles as the two powerhouses battled on even terms for 31 minutes and 56 seconds. The last four seconds? That was when the Eagles won it.

Seth Crisp, on a designed play, went on a sweep to the left and found his way into the end zone from the Paintsville 2-yard line. Slone kicked the PAT (which counts for two-points in grade school) to give the Eagles an 8-0 lead with four ticks left on the scoreboard.

"It was a designed play," said head coach Monte Branham. "I called two plays in the huddle and the last one was for Seth to go on the sweep." Allen picked up a first down on the Tigers' 8-yard line with 1:34 left in the game. Slone had a run of 2 yards to the six and the bullock his way to the two with :29 on the clock.

Crisp handed off to Slone at the two but the big fullback was met at the line of scrimmage for a no-gainer. The second play worked for Allen as

Crisp scored. The drive started on the Eagles own 11-yard line with 6:46 left in the game.

The biggest play of the contest came with just under five minutes remaining when the Eagles faced a second and 14 after Billy Mitchell was thrown for a loss of 4 yards.

On a bootleg play, Crisp handed off to Slone who then lofted a pass deep for Mitchell who was surrounded by three Paintsville defenders. On an almost unbelievable play, Mitchell went up high between the defenders and pulled the ball down for a 24-yard completion pass and the ball in Paintsville territory.

On a third-and-eight play, Mitchell, on a reverse, picked up 10 valuable yards moving the ball to the Tigers' 20-yard line. Dennis Lafferty carried the ball 12 yards to the Paintsville eight with 1:34 left.

Osborne returns strong team... Veteran high school coach Bobby Osborne of the Shelby Valley Wildcats agrees with the assessment that there is more parity this season.

"Parity should be as good if not better than last year," he commented. "There will be several teams that will compete for the championship of the regional tournament."

A lot of teams have good experience, players coming back, and I think with the consolidation of South Floyd (McDowell) and Wheelwright they will be a strong team.

"Paintsville will be a strong club. Allen Central has the nucleus to be the region's top team. Elk Horn City will have a good team. Parity will be as good if not better this season."

Osborne looks for some good basketball games this season and the fans should be in for a lot of excitement. The veteran coach views the different camps in the summer as getting the players ready for the big show.

"Anytime, I've been in it a long time. You used to see some real, real good basketball. Nowadays, it is a little more systematic than what it used to be. More kids are getting a little more help and a little more attention. Youngsters are getting more help from camps in the off season and they used to not get that before."

But Osborne believes that despite all the help from camps and other sources that today's players lack something.

"Heart. Years ago we had kids with a lot of heart," said Osborne. "This is what is lacking in abilities today — heart. The heart to play is not like it used to be years and years ago."

The Wildcat mentor said that he has seen that change over the years. "I think that basketball is still good. It's still good in this region. It's still as good here as it is in the state of Kentucky. We don't get the publicity here like the other part of the state gets but still we have a lot of good talent here."

Turner to guide Golden Eagles... Former McDowell coach Johnny Ray Turner has switched counties

between those three teams. All three will have excellent teams.

"Then you have teams like Pikeville which is going to be a very good team. Betsy lost a lot of personnel last season, but they're going to be pretty good again. They have a lot of tradition going right now."

Newsome said that teams in the 58th District like South Floyd are going to be teams to be reckoned with.

"Prestonsburg will surprise a lot of people," he said. "Don't overlook Magoffin County. They are going to have a good club. I like Shelby Valley. They will have a nice club over there."

To start with, you would have to say Elk Horn City would have to be the preseason number one pick," said Justice. "With Conley and the kid from overseas they will be a good ballclub."

"Shelby Valley will shock some people, as will Paintsville. They've had some good, young players over the past years. Right now it's hard to look back over the past season and see. I think right now those are the three teams to beat."






Cruise Caudill came a long way. What a fine football player he turned out to be. John Caudill is another who didn't receive the notice that he deserved. A very good defensive player.



Feds Creek Ralph Good is champion at the bits to get the season underway because the Vikings will return a veteran ballclub that some have just overlooked.

It is going to be a balanced region this year," said Good. "The old favorites are still the old favorites. Pikeville will be tough to beat as will Elkhorn City with their new addition. Belfry will be Belfry again."

While Good likes the above-mentioned teams, he is quick to add that there are others.

"Paintsville, they tell me, is loaded. Danny Adams will have a strong club over in Magoffin County."

The veteran Viking team will have to be a good choice for a regional title.

"We return nine seniors this year," he said. "So, if we're ever going to win, we should win this year." Slope, Siltner, Fuller and Miller return for the Vikings and all four are solid players. "We have nine or ten who have played a lot of basketball for us."

Coach Good doesn't see any surprises emerging out of the 15th Region this year.

"No, no surprises. There will be some good games in the 15th Region this year. It will be real tight when the tournament comes around and the winner will depend on who is playing the best at that time."

Rose to inherit strong club... While South Floyd will be in their first year of operation, the Raiders will have some strong talent returning from both McDowell and Wheelwright schools.

Coach Jim Rose will inherit a strong ballclub that several regional coaches say could be a sleeper.

But Rose, who coached in the 14th Region the past four seasons, likes the local team Allen Central as his top choice.

"At this time Allen Central will have to be my favorite to win it all," he said. "Then you have Elkhorn City, Shelby Valley and Paintsville as the next three."

"After those three, you've got parity and just play the field of what and see."

Rose said that overall, the other teams can be put anywhere.

"After you get into this thing, some other team just might surface and be a contender. I don't know just who yet, but all the other teams are so equal after the top four."

Parido doesn't see much change.

While most of the coaches are singing the parity tune, Prestonsburg coach Gordon Parido says there are three teams that could take the title

and the other teams capable of beating those three.

"Allen Central is the best team in the region right now," said the Blackcat coach whose team won it all in 1989. "Elkhorn City is an unknown factor. They've got the kid who transferred in."

"Paintsville had a real young team last year. All those players will be juniors and seniors. I look for those three teams to be the top three."

"I feel like there are four or five other teams that will be capable of beating those three teams."

Parido said that he doesn't think anything has changed in the region.

Everybody has a shot. There's a couple dominating teams like there has always been in the past."

Is there a dark horse?

"I was pretty well impressed when I saw Magoffin County play. Those guys always play hard. They got a little bit of talent coming back and Danny (Adams) over there always tries to down play it as much as he possibly can. They will have a good team."

Parido likes South Floyd.

"They're kind of an unknown factor right now. They've got some good guys coming back from McDowell and Wheelwright. If Jim (Rose) can put those two together like he's capable of doing, they will be a team to be reckoned with by the end of the year."

Belfry. Don't even count Belfry out. They have such a good program. Raymond Justice does a great job over there. They always come around and have a good ballclub."

Parido mentioned Pike Central as a possible sleeper in the race after Mullins and Johns Creek emerged this season.

"Mullins had some good kids this year. They played against last year," he said.

"Shelby Valley is always a traditionally strong team like Betsy Layne. You've got to always count them in your top ten every year. Just tradition alone will beat a lot of people."

Whoever you like this year, you can listen to those coaches and expect to see some of the best high school basketball to come down the Park way in recent years.

the Tigers and then prevent the ball from being run back. What ensued thereafter had everyone wondering what was going on.

The ball was returned to the Paintsville 14, where it was lateral on four different attempts before a Paintsville runner was brought down on the Allen 49.

On the first play from scrimmage, Lafferty broke loose for a 45-yard punt and what appeared to be a sure Allen touchdown. However, he was dragged down at the Paintsville 48.

Paintsville fumbled on their first play from scrimmage with Allen recovering the football. But three plays later, on a pitch out, the Eagles returned the favor.

Paintsville got into Allen territory when they moved to the Eagles' 38. But an alert Kyle Conley picked off
