Fannin's one-vote victory will stand :

Archer will drop election challenge

A one-vote margin will apparently stand in a hotly contested race for the mayor's seat in Prestonsburg.

An expected legal challenge to the November 2 outcome by second place finisher George Archer has been scrapped, Archer's attorney said Tuesday, clearing the way for mayor-

elect Jerry Fannin to assume the post. Fannin won the four-candidate election with 442 votes, one more than the 441 picked off by Archer. A canvass last month provided no change in the vote count and set up plans for a legal challenge from Archer.

On Tuesday, Archer's attorney, Phil Damron, said it would be better for the City of Prestonsburg not to

file a lawsuit concerning the election.

"George basically ran because he thought it was in the best interest of Prestonsburg," Damron said. "It's in the best interest for Prestonsburg not to file suit at this time. It's more important to have an orderly change of administration rather than to have it tied up for months."

"We want to congratulate Mr. Fannin and offer our help, if he wants it," Damron added.

If no contest of the results of November's election is filed by 4 p.m. Thursday, the election could be certified at that time. County Court Clerk Carla Boyd said Tuesday. The only other issue to be resolved relating to the election is setting a time for a coin toss to decide the winner of a Wheelwright City Commission seat. Andy Akers and David Hall each received 136 votes in that race.

Fannin could not be reached Tuesday to comment on Archer's decision.

Damron said that although he had evidence of election law violations in the mayor's race, he and Archer's main focus will be to lobby state legislators for improved election laws.

"We will try to get legislation passed that allows people over 65 to vote on absentee machines," Damron

Floyd doctor has "family" reunion

Dr. Chandra M. Varia estimates that she has delivered about 3,400 babies during her fourteen-and-a-half-years as an obstetrician/gynecologist in Floyd County.

After December, the 54-year-old physician will no longer deliver babies. Instead, she will be concentrating on her gynecology practice at her office in Martin.

Why is she giving up her obstetrics practice? "I love obstetrics," she said in an interview last week. "I love every baby I delivered. But I wanted something more. There were few obstetricians here when I started. There is no scarcity of obstetric doctors now."

"I will continue my gynecology practice here," she quickly emphasized. "I'm not retiring."

Instead, she said she will concentrate on preventive medicine for women, such as detecting breast cancer and treating sexually transmitted diseases.

Saturday afternoon, the doctor, who is known by her first name, bid farewell to her obstetrics practice by throwing a huge party in honor of all the children she birthed. Dr. Chandra said she set up the special celebration because "I wanted to see what the children look like. I wanted to meet their parents and see what the children are doing."

For the unique reunion, appropriately named "A Celebration of Chil-

dren," Dr. Chandra extended an invitation via the local news media to the families of children she delivered at two hospitals: Our Lady of the Way in Martin and Highlands Regional Medical Center in Prestonsburg.

The festive four-hour event, held at Allen Central High School, was replete with music played by the Allen Central High School band, Christ-

Cats claw their way to 2A championship game

The Prestonsburg Blackcats football team will make their first appearance in the state football finals this Friday afternoon when they face a traditionally strong Mayfield Cardinal team in a 4 p.m. kickoff.

Coach Bill Letton's Blackcats moved into the championship game by virtue of a 16-15 thriller over Danville last Friday night at Admiral Stadium. The win snapped the Admirals' 42-game winning streak and prohibited them from making a third consecutive appearance at Cardinal Stadium in Louisville.

A goal line stand in the second overtime ended the season for Danville at 13-1. Admiral quarterback Colin Rogers last run was stopped at the 1-yard line by Tim Lewis and the celebration began for Prestonsburg.

"I was laying on the ground on the last play," confessed halfback Jody Cornette. "I just held my hands over my eyes. I couldn't stand to look. I then looked up and everyone was yelling and I said, 'All right!'"

Danville had closed a 16-9 Prestonsburg lead to 16-15 on a 1-yard run by Rogers in the second overtime. The Admirals elected to go for the win by running the two-point conversion rather than kick the extra point to tie.

What turned out to be a big play was the safety that Prestonsburg got

in the third period to take a 9-6 lead. Danville had intercepted a Thomas Ratliff pass at their own 2-yard line. The Admirals were caught in the end zone for the safety.

"I've watched the game three times," said Dr. Don Chaffins, "and we won all three times. We were very fortunate to win that game. Looking at it again on tape, it appeared that Danville was disorganized at the line of scrimmage. On one play they were running into each other."

Dr. Chaffins has this week's sports

saying: "We muscled Russell, invaded Danville and now we're going to shuffle the Cards."

Prestonsburg and Bardonia are the only undefeated teams that will play in the different classes at Cardinal Stadium.

Prestonsburg improved to 14-0. The Blackcats seniors will be playing their final game for their alma mater.

Mayfield will be going to Louisville for the third consecutive year, having lost to Danville in last year's state championship game. Mayfield defeated a good Fort Knox team 28-10 to earn a berth in this year's title game.

Mike Brown, a sophomore, is the Cards' leading rusher. Brown scored four touchdowns against Fort Knox last Friday night. The Cards are a hard-hitting defensive unit giving up an average of eight points per game. Mayfield scored 21 points in the fourth quarter to erase a 10-7 Fort Knox lead.

The contest will be televised by WYMT on a tape delay basis on Saturday at 6 p.m., following the Kentucky/Indiana basketball game.

Tickets for the championship game are on sale at Prestonsburg High School during school hours. For more information contact the school.

The game will be played at Cardinal Stadium, home of the University of Louisville Cardinals. The field is astro turf. A large Floyd County following is expected to attend the game.

Following 1-64, fans are to turn onto the Waterson Expressway and exit at the Fairgrounds exit. The stadium is behind Freedom Hall.

The championship game has caused two changes in Floyd County School system's schedule. Floyd County schools will not be in session Friday as Floyd Countians will be given have the opportunity to support the Blackcats in the Class AA state football championship game.

Also, the Floyd County Preseason Basketball Tournament that began Monday night will not be played on Friday night due to the championship game.

Rescue teams still searching for teen

Johnson County Coroner J.R. Frisby arrived around 10:45 a.m. on standby in case rescue workers had any success.

Forty-five minutes later, though, he learned that efforts at the College Street bridge to recover the body of a Paintsville boy believed drowned in Paint Creek would have to continue downstream.

Before dark the day before, two tracking dogs from the Kentucky Search Dog Association had detected a human scent near a waterfall under the bridge. Operations stopped for the night, with rescuers set to begin the next morning.

Efforts resumed around 11 a.m., but by 11:30 a.m., when the dogs were unable to detect the scent again, officials decided to move their operations down the creek.

It was Tuesday, November 30, Day Four in the search for 13-year-old Darrell Michael Preston, reported missing since he tried to retrieve a canoe that had capsized in Paint Creek Saturday night. Darrell and a 17-year-old boy had been in the canoe — one of two allegedly stolen from Johnson Central High School — when it overturned near the Johnson County Public Library on Main Street around 7:40 p.m.

After four days of dragging the

The climax of the event was the announcement by Dr. Chandra and her husband Mahendra Varia, a veterinarian at Martin, that they are setting up a \$25,000 endowment at Prestonsburg Community College and the University of Kentucky. Floyd County School District purchases classroom computers

The Floyd County School District has purchased 163 EduQuest Model 40 computers for classroom use.

The majority of computers will be divided among the county's 15 elementary schools. These computers will be installed in a staff/student production center, which is primarily used for portfolio writing. The students will also be able to use the computers to produce the school newspaper in the center, and teachers will have access to create lesson plans.

Each school in the district will also be given one computer for use by special education teachers and students.

"As a former classroom teacher for 23 years, I've seen how computers can make students come to life in the classroom. It's a real motivator," said Floyd County Technology Coordinator Harold Burchett. "I might have been a more effective student and teacher if I would have had access to the technology that is currently available to our students."

According to Dick Murphy, marketing representative for EduQuest, Floyd County has been very aggressive in keeping up with the changing technology in today's schools.

"Technology is an effective tool in the classroom," Murphy said. "It's important for parents and teachers to see that children are given the opportunity to advance academically by using computers and software in the classroom, particularly when those same parents and teachers see tech-

nology play such a critical role in their workplace."

EduQuest, an IBM company, develops and markets education software, hardware and services for primary and secondary school administration and students.





Respect our flag

Editor: On his show of Jan. 14, 1969, comedian Red Skelton closed with the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag as he said he'd learned it as a child from a teacher in an Indiana school. He gave the Pledge because "he said he felt people—adults as well as children—had lost its meaning. He said he received 20,000 letters as a result of the presentation. Recordings of the Pledge were sent to disk jockeys, who reported enthusiastic response when they played it. The text of Red's

Pledge of Allegiance follows:

From the Red Skelton Hour, Jan. 14, 1969.

I remember this one teacher. To me, he was the greatest teacher, a real sage of my time. He had such wisdom. We were all reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, and he walked over. Mr. Lasswell was his name... He said: "I've been listening to you boys and girls recite the Pledge of Allegiance all semester and it seems as though it is becoming monotonous to you. If I may, may I recite it and try to explain to you the meaning of each word."

"I—Me, an individual, a committee of one.

"Pledge—dedicate all my worldly goods to give without self-pity.

"Allegiance—my love and my devotion.

"To the Flag—our standard, Old Glory, a symbol of freedom. Whenever she waves, there is respect because your loyalty has given her a dignity that shouts freedom is everybody's job.

"Of the United—that means we have all come together.

"States—individual communities that have united into 48 great states; 48 individual communities with pride and dignity and purpose, all divided with imaginary boundaries, yet united to a common purpose, and that's love for country.

"Of America.

"And to the Republic—a state in which sovereign power is invested in representatives chosen by the people to govern. And government is the people and it's from the people to the leaders, not from the leaders to the people.

"For which it stands.

"Omnation—meaning, so blessed by God.

"Indivisible—incapable of being divided.

"With liberty—which is freedom and the right of power to live one's own life without threats or fear of some sort of retaliation.

"And justice—the principle or quality of dealing fairly with others.

"For all—which means "it's as much your country as it is mine."

Since I was a small boy, two states have been added to our country and two words have been added to the Pledge of Allegiance—"under God." Wouldn't it be a pity if someone said,

Is the job stress killing you? Count yourself lucky. I've states, a national report notes, the leading cause of workplace deaths isn't stress, accidents or disease.

It's murder.

Of the 7,600 Americans slain on the job over the last ten years, 13 percent were killed in Alabama, Connecticut, Maryland, Michigan, South Carolina and in Washington, D.C.

By the dangerous nature of their jobs, police officers were naturally among the top three occupations on the most-likely to be murdered at work list. Surprisingly, though, retail workers were also among the big three.

We've noticed a dramatic change in shopper attitudes during the past ten years, but this is scary.

Our newspaper types are often criticized for what some readers call "sanitizing the news," omitting some things that we know to be true but which are not really critical to the gist of any particular story.

But, should we justify it and let the chips fall where they may?

Around the turn of the century, a Texas editor did just that after a continuous stream of complaints that his stories weren't completely truthful. Here's what he said.

"A lot of people in this town brand the editor a liar when ordinary human mistakes of life show up in his newspaper. You have a little charity for every man in town but your editor. You claim you want the facts, and I'll be damned if I won't give 'em to you!"

And he did, indeed, in these excerpts from his next issue.

"John Cordle, our groceryman, who voted with the Republicans in 1896 and consumes more mail-order whiskey than any other member of the Baptist church in this country, is doing a poor business. His store is dirty

and dusty. It is a wonder he has any business at all."

"Marned, Miss Susie Scuggs and Horace Guffin last Saturday at the Methodist parsonage, the Rev. James C. Williams officiating. The bride is a very ordinary town girl, who flirts with all the traveling men she meets and never helped her mother three days all put together in her whole life. She is anything but a beauty, resembling a gravel pit in the face and walks like a duck. The bridegroom is a natural born loafer and a bum. He never did a lick of work until his stepdaddy ran him off from home last fall. He went to the county seat and just before starving to death accepted a job at the livery stable."

"Tom Spradlin married Miss Cordie Meador last trades' day at the county seat. It ain't generally known, but the marriage was brought about mainly by a Remington shotgun manipulated by the bride's father. Tom concluded that marrying was the healthiest thing to do until other arrange-

ments could be made."

As you can see from those true accounts, sometimes our "sins of omission" are really blessings in disguise.

Dr. Chandra Varia may have been born and raised in a faraway land, but the Martin OB/GYN is as deserving as anyone to be called an Eastern Kentucky native.


Dr. Varia and her husband have contributed tens of thousands of dollars to causes which will improve the quality of life for scores of young people, many of whom she brought into this world.

Flea markets are prime source for gun dealers

At a roadside flea market in Johnson County, pistols, rifles and shotguns are bought and sold as freely as puppies, chickens and mining lights.

Because Kentucky does not regulate gun sales, flea markets are a prime source for big-time gun dealers from major cities, according to the agents with the Federal Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

The flea market in Staffordville, just outside Paintsville, offers weapons without a waiting period, which is required in a number of other states.

A wide range of guns is available at the flea markets. Recently, a thick-handled .357-caliber Magnum pistol that once belonged to a police officer was offered for \$250. Also on sale was a \$500 AK-47, one of the most popular — and controversial — assault rifles.

The AFT said similar flea markets are held throughout Kentucky, including Shelbyville, Georgetown, London, Prestonsburg and Pikeville, and once a year at the annual Court Days swap market at Mount Sterling, where thousands of guns are for sale.

Randall Lacy, the agent in charge of the AFT's office in Lexington, said many of the sales at flea markets result in boxes of new weapons being shipped to large cities such as New York and Chicago.



A pistol that sells for \$50 to \$100 in Kentucky, he said, might resell in New York for \$500.

"The people in Eastern Kentucky, they do not understand what New York's problems are or what Chicago's problems are," Lacy said.

Federal law permits gun collectors to sell accumulated arms, but it requires people who sell guns for profit to obtain a \$10-a-year federal license," Lacy said. — *Louisville Courier-Journal*

Knott board votes on school's status

The Knott County school board has voted to change the classification of a remote mountain school — a move some think may jeopardize the school's future.

The board voted 3-2 to change the state classification of Cordia school from "permanently isolated" to "transitional." The state school board must approve the plan, and a public hearing on the changes must be held.

Cordia, which is partly financed through a private corporation, has produced students who became doctors, lawyers and teachers. But the school spends more tax money to educate its 275 students than larger schools in the area.

The State Education Department has said transitional status does not mean a school's days are numbered because some schools have been transitional for 30 years before being replaced.

But Alice Whitaker, head of the non-profit Lotus Creek Community School Inc., which helps finance the school, is concerned that the board's vote will hurt fund-raising efforts. — *Louisville Courier-Journal*

Book describes plan by FBI to arrest Letcher County politician on drug charge

Using the wife of former Special Agent Mark Putnam as bait, the FBI was going to try to arrest a Letcher County politician on a cocaine charge, but the operation was quickly called to a halt by officials in Washington, D.C.

FBI agents in Dixeville and Covington decided to try to bring charges against the politician after he gave two grams of cocaine to Kathy Putnam at a Pikeville nightclub in November 1988.

With an FBI tape recorder hooked up to her telephone, Mrs. Putnam later called the politician and told him "that coke was really good." She then made plans with him to schedule a second meeting before FBI officials in Washington stepped in.

The allegations are included in the new book *Above Suspicion*, which examines the events leading up to Mark Putnam's arrest on a manslaughter charge in June 1990. The book, written by former Wall Street Journal reporter Joe Sharkey, was released November 12 by the New York publishing firm Simon and Schuster.

Putnam resigned from the FBI in June 1990 after he confessed to killing an informant from Pike County who said she was pregnant with his child. — *Whitesburg Mountain Eagle*

While Health Care, NAFTA, Somalia and other issues boil over on the front burner of the Clinton administration, simmering away on the back burner, almost unnoticed, is a trade issue of potentially shocking proportions. One that could have profound implications for thousands of Kentucky residents whose livelihoods depend on the investment of foreign automakers and auto parts suppliers.

U.S. policy makers, in their discussions with Japan on a trade framework agreement are being pressed by some special interests to move beyond trade promotion to negotiating guaranteed sales for certain U.S. companies with the threat of trade sanctions for refusal unspoken but omnipresent.

In the next couple of weeks, U.S. negotiators will finalize demands on the Japanese government to reduce the \$31 billion bilateral trade deficit in the automotive sector. Completion of the overall framework negotiations are under a U.S.-imposed deadline of early January, 1994.

Both governments have accepted the goal of trade deficit reduction, but the question is whether this is to be done by increasing competitiveness and expanding opportunities through promotion and cooperation, or by dictating sales through government edict. Trade promotion is a legitimate practice pursued by all governments. Pre-determined sales would be a dramatic departure from established U.S. and international trading

principles. The "You buy this or else!" approach is bad policy certain to fail, increasing bilateral tensions in the process.

But if that is not frightening enough, voices within the U.S. auto parts industry are demanding that success be measured not only on numerical targets but on the basis of sales by "traditional companies" — fully American-owned companies, only. Funneling sales to U.S. businesses according to who their owners are would involve the U.S. government in overt discrimination and an unprecedented intrusion into the American market place.

Excluded from the privileged group of auto parts companies would be, of course, the new competitors from Japan that invested in the U.S. according to U.S. demands of the 1980's. In Kentucky alone, at least 37 parts plants employing nearly 10,000 residents would be affected. Also excluded would be some 200 European parts manufacturers who have invested in the U.S. both to sell to U.S. companies and to supply European vehicle manufacturers here, specifically BMW and Mercedes. But worst of all, discriminating in this way would exclude those foot-soldiers of American competitiveness, the joint ventures. It is through joint ventures that U.S. and foreign technology combine at the leading edge of industrial advancement and job creation.

Markets are complex creatures. No matter how dedicated, government regulators can never, and so should never, attempt to fine-tune them to the alarming extent now being discussed. While the subject of auto parts trade may seem arcane to many, it is a good example of a market not to be tampered with.

The auto parts industry is a complex fabric of companies from all over the world, shaped by the forces of competition and driven by an increasingly demanding consumer voice. In America it provides a strong, vibrant and resilient base for the U.S. vehicle industry—including the Big Three and foreign producers, alike. It would be impossible for governments to measure all the dimensions of this market activity, much less determine its outcomes in advance. The world is still littered with the dysfunctional economies of the failed nations that experimented with this statist approach in the recent past.

And do we in America really want to discourage foreign investment in this way, suffocating competition in the process? Do we really want to send the signal to other nations that they can and should do likewise? Do we want to tell successful U.S. companies that are selling to the Japanese and Europeans—having raised their standards, lowered their prices and focused intently on the customer—that their effort and investment were for naught? Next time, just ask the government to "fix it" for you?

The resounding answer of "No!" to all these questions may seem obvious to most Americans, but the pressure in Washington to say "Yes" is extraordinarily high. And yet, as industrial policies go, our approach with Japan in the auto sector, without these additional measures, has been extraordinarily successful.

The Carter Administration, in 1980, negotiated an agreement committing Japan to encourage automotive investment in the U.S. The agreement specifically called on the Japanese auto parts industry to dispatch a mission to the U.S. to seek viable factory locations. At the time, Japanese manufacturers produced no vehicles in the U.S. and exported some 2.4 million units here.

Today, seven Japanese companies roll their cars, trucks and motorcycles off U.S. production lines. In Kentucky, the Georgetown Toyota plant employs more than 4,300 people, produces about 240,000 vehicles a year and represents a \$2 billion dollar investment. Together the vehicle manufacturers have invested \$10 billion in U.S. facilities and employ 35,000 American workers.

The framework discussions must succeed for the benefit of the economies and consumers of both countries. But the remedies we find for the trade deficit must be market-oriented, not government-imposed, for progress to be made.







You can work and still get retirement benefits

Social Security District Director
For the Big Sandy Area
Social Security estimates that nearly 140,000 people will file for retirement benefits in September. But many of them will not be "retirees" in the true sense of the word because they'll keep on working. They also will receive Social Security checks.
If you are 62 years of age or older, you can continue to work and still get all of your Social Security benefits as long as your earnings don't exceed certain limits. If you earn more than the limit, your Social Security check will be reduced. For example, in 1993, you can earn up to \$7,680 and receive all of your benefits if you are under age 65. For every \$2 you earn over this limit, \$1 is withheld from your benefits. If you are between age 65 and 69, the 1993 limit is \$10,560. For

every \$3 you earn over this limit, \$1 is withheld from your benefits. When you reach age 70, your Social Security benefits are not reduced, no matter how much you earn.
If you are under age 70 and continue to work, you must contact us promptly to give us an estimate of your earnings for the year if you expect to earn more than the annual limit. If you later find that your earnings will be higher or lower than you estimated, you should contact us again to change your estimate. And by each April 15, you must let us know how much you earned in the previous year if you receive some Social Security

benefits. We will send you an annual earnings report form that you must file in addition to your Federal income tax return. There is a substantial penalty for not filing an annual report of earnings on or before April 15. If you are still working at age 70, you no longer have to report your earnings to us.
These types of income do not count toward the earnings limits: investment and interest income, Veterans or other government benefits, annuities, capital gains, gifts or inheritances, rental income (unless you are a real estate dealer or you rent a farm to someone and have an active role in

managing the farm), income from trust funds, moving expenses, travel expenses, and jury duty pay.

Tuition deposit is required for MSU students

Students pre-registering for the spring 1994 semester at Morehead State University will be required to make a \$50 nonrefundable payment to hold their class schedules.

The payment, which will be deducted from tuition, was implemented to curtail the number of students who pre-register when they are uncertain as to whether or not they will be returning to the campus for the next semester.

This semester, students may make the down payment between December 1 and December 17. A similar payment period will be designated for future advance registrations. Pre-registered students who neglect to pay will have to register again at the start of the semester as their schedules will have been deleted.

Students with fully processed financial aid in excess of \$50 will be exempt from the down payment, but will receive a Notification of Intent card with their billing statement. The card must be signed and returned in order to hold their class schedule.



My Christmas List

Here I am on December 24, and it is my first Christmas on the streets. After my mother lost her job, the streets became my home. I've been homeless now for about seven or eight months. People on the streets begin to lose track of time after awhile. Christmas is tomorrow, and I will be alone.

No presents, no tree, no hot dinner, and no Christmas carols.

You may not believe this, but I would give all of those wonderful holiday traditions up just to be with my mother. We were separated in an old shelter last July. She just vanished. I never saw her again.

After awhile, I learned to survive on my own. In the beginning, I had my mother, but now I am alone and fending for myself. I must admit that it is hard.

I had gone from your average "middle-class" family to a life of terror and humiliation on the streets. My home is a box, in what the wealthy call "Peasant Park." I lie alone and pray each night the same prayer. "Dear Father, protect, love and comfort me. I am sorry for whatever I did to end up here. Please return me to the life I once had. Amen."

Tonight I pray for my mother to return and take me to a warm home.

As I walk along Coleman Street, I can see into the windows of the homes. Lights dance around the Christmas trees as children gather around, shaking boxes with excitement. The smell of ham and turkey with stuffing and homemade rolls seem to seep out from under the wooden doors. Oh, how I wish that I could be with my

mother at home celebrating Christmas.

Tonight seems so dreadfully cold. My nose, cheeks, and toes are beginning to sting with each step I take. I will sleep in Saint Mary's Cathedral tonight. They run a shelter for the homeless.

I don't like sleeping there, though. People always steal my belongings. I guess I don't have much to lose now. I have already lost my watch, my winter scarf, cap and, worst of all, my pride and dignity. I am always embarrassed. I used to look down on the homeless, and now I am one.

On my way to Saint Mary's, I find a couple of Coke and Pepsi cans. I can get a few cents for them downtown, tomorrow.

Dressed in a torn pair of jeans — at least a size too small — an old pair of rubber boots, and a faded red sweatshirt, I walk through the Saint Mary's shelter door. The heat feels so good. I have been on my feet for this never-ending day in the 30° temperature. At last, I can rest my aching body.

Two ladies, about fifty or sixty years old, sit at a table where I am supposed to sign in.

"Merry Christmas, son. Are you alone tonight?" one asked me in a kind voice.

"Yes, Ma'am," I say, looking down and away from them.

Yes, I am alone — all alone.

I walk into a large room filled with at least one

hundred beds. Almost every one of them are filled. The floors around are dingy looking and the smell is terrible. Now, I know why I prefer my box in the park, although the temperature this Christmas night is too cold for anyone to endure.

In the right corner of the room, I see something that raises my spirits as high as they can go — Santa Claus! The shelter must have brought him in.

I am fourteen years old and, possibly, a bit too big to sit in Santa's lap, but I don't care. If anyone can help me, it will be him.

I don't really believe there is a real Santa Claus, but, for some reason, this Santa seems different. Maybe it is his long, white beard or his shiny black boots. He just seems so real.

I sit on his left leg. His red velvet costume feels warm. For once in a long time, I feel loved. Not necessarily by Santa, but by someone.

"Ho, ho, ho!" he laughs merrily. "What can Santa bring you?" he

hears what I am saying. "Santa, please let me wake up in my old home with my mother."

"Well, son, I'll do what I can," he replies softly.

I am the kind of person who can read people by looking into their eyes, but this Santa has eyes that I cannot read.

Eleven o'clock rolls around. Lights out. A few people keep arguing, and they are thrown out. One pulls a gun from his coat. I'm not scared, though. Things like this happen every day.

I find a bed next to the window. I press my cheek against the cold glass and look up to the shining stars.

"Star light, Star bright. First star I see tonight. I wish I may, I wish I might, on the first star I see tonight, I wish for Santa to fulfill my Christmas list."

My head hits the hard pillow and I fall fast asleep, doubtful that my wish will come true. "Silent night. Holy night. All is calm ..."

I hear someone singing. I sit up and barely open my eyes just enough to see my mother sitting at the foot of my bed.

"Oh, mother!" I scream, as I throw my arms around her.

"My sweet Joey. How I have missed you!" she cries in that voice I have so longed to hear.

Workshop events were coordinated by Floyd County Schools instructional personnel, Patricia Watson and Delma Spears who work with writing/language arts programs.







"A Day on Campus" visits to Kentucky colleges and universities often provide students their first glimpse of campus life and insight into the relevance of higher education. 

State panel to deal with Medicaid fraud

Prescription drug fraud is draining the state's Medicaid funds, making fewer dollars available for those Kentuckians who really need them. So to put an end to one of the reasons for escalating health care costs for Kentuckians, Human Resources Secretary Fontaine Banks Jr. created a special three-member panel on Prescription Drug Fraud and Abuse to deal with fraud in the state's Medicaid system.

"Without placing the blame on any one part of our health care system at this time, we must move immediately to investigate circumstances that have allowed the costly over-prescribing and reselling of expensive-based drugs to go on," Banks said.

Problems with Kentucky's Medicaid system have led to increased health care costs for everyone in the state, members of the governor's Task Force on Health Care Reform have said during the group's studies on revamping the state health care system.

The task force put its findings into a package for lawmakers, and although another special session on health care reform seems unlikely this year, the state Medicaid system will probably be scrutinized during the upcoming regular session of the General Assembly which convenes in January.

Masten Childers, deputy secretary and general counsel for the state Cabinet for Human Resources, said recent audits of the state Medicaid system have documented a host of problems.

"Prescription drug fraud is just one of the major drains on our ailing Medicaid funds, but the potential savings run into many millions," Childers said.

The panel is charged with coming up with answers and solutions to the state's Medicaid woes. It will initiate and oversee investigations and recommend changes in Medicaid procedures to stop over-use and re-selling of drugs under the Medicaid program.

WIC 'prescriptions' provide healthy foods for women and children

Every month, 112,000 Kentucky mothers and children are healthier because of prescriptions.

"Food prescriptions," that is.

The WIC nutrition program, formerly called the Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children, provides vouchers that are redeemed at certain grocery stores for specific nutritious foods.

The voucher for each mother, child and infant is tailored to meet individual nutrition needs.

Marvin Miller, WIC director for the state Department for Health Services, says that WIC is another element of local health departments' emphasis on preventive health care.

"Just as a doctor might write a prescription to correct a health problem or help prevent one, nutrition counselors at local health departments write 'food prescriptions' to improve diets," he said.

"These 'prescriptions' can help a pregnant woman who is low in iron, or a baby who is not growing fast enough or a breast-feeding mother who needs certain foods."

"Research increasingly points out how important our diet is," he said. "The WIC program provides both nutrition education and nutritious foods for pregnant and breast-feeding women, their young children and babies."

Miller said that eating right is one of the most important elements in proper prenatal care, thus a WIC emphasis on pregnant women.

"Counseling pregnant women about proper nutrition is part of the

overall approach to prenatal care in health departments," he said. "That education along with access to the proper foods through WIC vouchers helps to produce healthier mothers who have healthier babies."

WIC also helps in keeping babies and young children healthy.

"Most all parents know that their children need to eat right in order to grow and develop," he said, "but sometimes parents don't really understand what 'eating right' for children involves."

"Again, with the nutrition information plus food through WIC, mothers can be more certain that their children are eating properly."

Miller says that WIC also helps establish good eating habits in young children.

"Eating patterns can be established at a young age," he said. "If children learn at an early age to eat good food, they're probably more likely to continue these habits."

WIC is available to pregnant and breast-feeding women, new mothers, infants and children up to age 5 who are at 185 percent of the poverty level or below and are at nutritional risk.

Kentuckians interested in applying for the WIC program should go to the local health department in their county.




Home schooling is meeting topic

Cheryl Cozort of Hager Hill has been teaching her three sons at home for the past six years and intends to go on doing so through their high school years. She and her husband, Keith, are not alone. A number of couples from the Big Sandy region have chosen home schooling as an alternative to public school instruction and many others are considering it for their children.

Speaking to about 35 people at a recent meeting at Prestonsburg Community College, Cozort listed the advantages of home schooling and discussed Kentucky laws. "(Home schooling) is legal in all 50 states," she said, "and Kentucky's laws are among the most flexible for those people who wish to school their kids at home."

Accompanying Cozort were two other home schooling mothers, Candy Conrotto of Hager Hill and Sandy Volk of Pikeville. Both have been educating their children at home for eight years with the support of their husbands.

"It used to be that my husband and I would ask each other if we should home school at the beginning of each school year," Conrotto said, "and then it got to the point where we no longer discussed it. We found we had taken it for granted that we would."

All the home schooling parents

made one point in particular quite clear. They believe home schooling gives their children the one-on-one attention they would rarely get in a regular school and allows them to learn at their own pace.

"It also protects them from exposure to violence, drugs and emphasis on sex that is beginning to pervade our schools," one mother said.

"Despite all the advantages of home schooling, though," warned Cozort, "no one should attempt to do it without the full support of the husband or wife. This is a decision that affects the whole family, and couples must make it together or it won't work."

The meeting was held in conjunction with PCC's continuing education program "Topics of Human Concern," coordinated by Dr. John Shiber, associate professor of biology.

Five players, three from South Floyd and two from Allen Central, were ejected from the contest and will face an automatic suspension for their team's next game.



The fight broke out when there was some bumping between Jeremy Hall and Chad Stone. The other players got involved and found themselves ejected.

The ejection may have been a blessing in disguise for the Raiders. Coach Jim Rose was forced to go to the bench early and there he found a pair of players who turned the game up a notch for South Floyd.

The football rested on the 3-yard line.

Two-time state champion Danville was in control of the football. A third consecutive trip to the state finals in Louisville weighed in the balance for the Admirals.

Danville had just scored a touchdown on a keeper by quarterback Colin Rogers who had plunged into the end zone from 1-yard out to narrow the Prestonsburg Blackcats' lead to 16-15 in the second overtime.

It was decision time for Danville coach Sam Harp. Do you go for the PAT to tie the game and send it into a third overtime, or "go for broke" to win the game?

There was no hesitation on the part of the Admirals. They lined up with the football at the Prestonsburg three with Rogers in charge. Their destiny was in Rogers' hands.

The snap went to the senior quarterback who went to the two, and then the 1-yard line, only to be met by 6'2", 260-pound junior lineman Tim Lewis. The lineman stopped Rogers at the one with assists from Kyle Fitzpatrick and Matt Porter.

This ended Danville's reign as Class 2A champions and their 42-game winning streak in the 16-15 loss to the state's number one defensive football team: the Prestonsburg Blackcats.

Thomas Ratliff was the man of the hour for Prestonsburg. He guided the Blackcats down field on two crucial drives.

It was only fitting that the game ended in double overtime since the state's top two teams were battling for the right to go on to Louisville this Friday to face the Mayfield Admirals in the state finals.

"I've never been this happy before," said fullback Dwayne Garza. "It's the greatest feeling that I ever experienced," stated lineman Ryan Elliott.

The game was witnessed by a throng of Blackcat supporters who outnumbered those of the home team. The Prestonsburg side was lined from one end of the football field to the other and some stood in places four deep.

"It was the greatest high school football game that I have ever seen," said senior Blackcat Joey Blinn.

The game was great because it involved two great teams that deserve their No. one and No. two ranking in the AP polls. Both teams are outstanding defensively. Danville was considered the number one offensive team in the state, averaging just over 45 points per contest. Prestonsburg wasn't far behind with a 40-point per game average.

Prestonsburg had taken a 9-6 lead, but Danville tied the game 9-9 on a 36-yard field goal by Jonathan Vanderpool with 1:40 left in regulation play.

Prestonsburg went on to 7-6 just before the half after making 60 at the end of the first quarter. The Blackcats got their fourth safety of the season when they caught the Admirals deep into their own territory. The safety made it a 9-6 score.

The Blackcats had final control of

the football during regulation play but could not get beyond their own 40-yard line and the clock ran out.

Prestonsburg won the toss at mid-field going into the first overtime and elected to give Danville the first attempt to score.

The ball was placed on the 10-yard line and the Admirals had four plays to score. Danville was flagged

The difference in the game, according to assistant coach Bill Bottoms, was that Prestonsburg wanted to win.

"There's nothing better than this," said the veteran coach, whose son Bill played at Centre College in Danville this past football season. "I'm very proud of our kids. They have worked hard all season and for

immediately for a 5-yard penalty. Then on the second play from scrimmage, they fumbled the football and Prestonsburg recovered.

Fullback Seth Hayden carried the ball to the 3-yard line and the Blackcats were knocking hard at the door. However, Hayden was spilled for a 6-yard loss and then the Cats were hit with a 15-yard holding penalty. The ball was settled on the 22-yard line. In some confusion, the Blackcats were penalized again 5-yards for a delay of game, moving the ball back to the 27.

Thomas Ratliff was called upon to attempt a field goal that was way too short and the game went into the second overtime.

In the second overtime, Prestonsburg got first possession and Ratliff moved his team into the lead.

Ratliff hit wide receiver Jason Spudlock with a 65-yard completion placing the football at the 4-yard line. Hayden carried to the three, where Ratliff found Garza in the end zone for a 5-yard touchdown pass. John Stout kicked the point after as the Blackcats led 16-9.

Danville still wanted control of the football in the second overtime. Penick struck on fourth down play. The ball was at the 13-yard line after a Keith Bess had moved the ball to near yard line. Rogers, on the keeper, found the opening and scored for the 16-15 game.

Danville had the first possession of the game and kept the football for the first 8:49 of the first quarter. The Admirals were constantly being flagged by the officials, but they seemed to keep coming back and kept regaining the lost yardage.

Danville went on top 6-0 with 3:11 left in the first quarter as Rogers scored on a keeper from 1-yard out. The conversion attempt failed for the Admirals. The drive covered 68-yards on 22 plays. Danville was assessed four penalties in the drive but the Admirals found ways to make up the loss of yards.

Prestonsburg, who has been used to piling up the yardage, found the Admirals' defense up to the occasion and found very little running room.

The Blackcats looked nervous at the onset but later got the wake-up call. With just over three minutes remaining in the second quarter, the Admirals tried a field goal that failed and the Blackcats, still looking for some yardage on the ground, took over the football.

On the first play from the line of scrimmage, Hayden called a 280-yard run which would have been a touch-down. But Matt Porter was moving and the TD was nullified and the Cats

were assessed 5 yards moving the ball to the 15.

Prestonsburg has never been a team to quit and the Cats didn't quit because of the setback. Just the opposite. The lone run by Hayden seemed to make the Blackcats aware that they could run against the Admirals and 12 plays later that covered 88 yards. Hayden plunged into the end zone for a game tying touchdown with 35 seconds left in the first half. Stout SPAT gave the Blackcats the 7-16 lead which they carried into the locker room at halftime. Danville had the football just before the half ended for what Kevin Vaughn called Rogers' time expiration on Danville.

It was a defensive battle for both teams in the second half with Prestonsburg nursing the one point lead. The two teams exchanged turnovers with less than 10 minutes remaining in the third period. Hayden intercepted a Rogers pass and Ben Kinley intercepted a Ratliff pass.

Prestonsburg held the Admirals as they forced them to punt while deep into their territory. The punted football rolled as the players waited for the ball to come to a stop. Jody Cornette then tried to pick up the football and run, but the ball slipped out of his hands and the Admirals recovered the football.

Danville then drove to the Prestonsburg 32 where the Blackcats defense stopped them and took over the first down.

With 10 seconds left in the third, Danville tried a fake punt play that failed to materialize. The Blackcats started the final stanza with the 7-6 lead.

Ratliff tried to hit Sparklock with a pass early in the fourth quarter only to have the pass picked off by Danville at the Admirals 2-yard line. The turnover finished up being a bright spot for the Cats. They scored a safety

when the Admirals could not move the ball out of the end zone and the Blackcat defense accelerated their Prestonsburg led 9-0.

"This is incredible," said lineman Kev Lippert who has been a part of the strong defensive and offensive line the Blackcats have displayed all season. "There is nothing like it."

Coch Parido said that he was happy for the kids who make up the Prestonsburg football team because "they are a great group of kids."

They have worked hard all season and were a 20 point underdog going into the game. But the secret to the underdog is Prestonsburg fans. We played good aggressive defense and shell-shocked Danville.

"It was the best high school game that I have seen," said Joe Back, who has followed the Blackcats the past eight years. "There is no question about it."

This is a football team that is special. Their defense is the sole reason they are going to Louisville Friday. His team has special people on it and great teams are made up of special people.

The Blackcat crowd celebrated after the game. Admiral Stadium was covered with Blackcat fans. There were tears of happiness in the eyes of fans.

"You get close to the players," said Back, and you get excited about what they have accomplished and it causes you shed some tears. But they

are tears of joy and happiness.

Danville's much heralded backfield did not fail to well against the Blackcat front line. Once they found the middle closed up the Admirals utilized their quickness and good speed to get outside on Prestonsburg.

Danville rushed for 207 yards on 54 carries. They had 43 yards passing for 250 total yards.

Kinze Bess led the ground game for Danville with 49 yards on 11 carries. Rogers finished with just 37 yards on 16 attempts.

Rogers had five completions for 43 yards. He was intercepted once. The Admirals tumbled the football twice, losing it once. They were assessed 80 yards in penalties.

Prestonsburg could only grind out 28 yards on the ground on 27 carries. It was the passing arm of Ratliff that moved the Blackcats offense as he was six of seven in passing for 76 yards. On a boot-leg play, Hayden had one completion as Tim Shurtz made a sensational catch while being hit.

Ratliff was intercepted twice in the game and the Blackcats tumbled the football away twice.

Prestonsburg will travel to Louisville this Friday afternoon and will face the Mayfield Cardinals at 4 p.m. kickoff time.

The Jenkins Cavaliers went on a 10-4 run late in the fourth quarter and handed the Prestonsburg Blackcats a 88-85 loss in the Hall of Fame game played at the Prestonsburg Fieldhouse last Saturday evening.

A three-point basket by Jimbo Jarrell put the Blackcats on top 69-66, but Jenkins took advantage of some Prestonsburg turnovers and scored the next six points to go on top 74-69. Prestonsburg grabbed the early 2-0 lead on a lay up by Robinson on a turnover by Jenkins to begin the game. It was 9-4 Prestonsburg on back-to-back baskets by Ryan Ortega. The score was tied at 9-9 and 15-15 before Prestonsburg took a 17-16 first quarter lead.

Robinson's first big lead of the game came in the second period when they managed an eight point lead, 27-19. Jenkins scored the next six and it was a two point game, 27-25.

Prestonsburg rolled back out in front by 10 points, 35-25, behind the shooting of Burke and David Gearhart. Prestonsburg took a 38-32 half-time lead to the locker room.

Prestonsburg maintained a eight-point lead throughout the third quarter until Jenkins scored six unanswered points to narrow the margin to one, 54-53. The Cavaliers took a 58-57 lead with 38 seconds left in the third period. However, a three-point basket by James gave the Blackcats a 60-58 lead at the end of three quarters.

Burke hit a three-pointer to start the final period and the Cats led by five, 63-58. But the Cavaliers fought





WHO WOULD PITINO LIKE TO MATCH WITS WITH IN BIG GAME?

DICK FICK!

With whom would Rick Pitino like to go head-to-head in an NCAA title game? Kentucky's coach was asked last week.

Dean "Bust the Myth" Smith? Mike Krzyzewski? Bob Knight, maybe?

"Dick Fick," Pitino replied. "He could lay on the floor, do all those things. It would be fun."

How would Morehead State's coach feel about it? Could not reach him for comment last week, but let's put words in his mouth anyway.

"Gimme Dean Smith's players and prime time on CBS and let's do it."

Perfect way to begin a basketball season in Kentucky. Laughing. Heaven knows it gets serious soon enough.

PITINO POSITIVES

North Carolina's loss to Massachusetts last week does more than demonstrate how wide open the college game is going to be this winter. Makes UK partisans do a double-take at the schedule.

Wildcats could play as many as five Top 20 teams before Santa Claus heads south. (UofL, IU, Arizona, Ohio St. and Texas).

And, in the middle of what should be a dandy SEC schedule, UK plays UMass Feb. 6 at the Meadowlands. Meanwhile, Pitino is busy trying to set a tone.

"I've loved the four teams I've had here, but I love this one the most because it plays with such heart," he said last week.

"We're a team that's going to be better in a month's time and better a month after that."

Pitino warned, however, "this team will not have a 30-4 record like last year. But, I do feel it can go as far. We simply have to peak at the right time."

WINSTON BENNETT

"It's good to be home again," Winston Bennett said as he strode into Rupp Arena last week.

Smartly dressed and with the straight-back bearing of a Marine lieutenant, or junior bank executive, which he is, the former UK star was on hand to work UK's Cat Calls radio show.

But the former Wildcat captain is being mentioned as a possible assistant coach to Rick Pitino when a vacancy comes.

The possibility raises a number of logic questions. First, why would Bennett defect from the PNC Bank training program and a promising future in his hometown to become a recruiter?

And, accepting that Bennett could recognize the skills and style Pitino demands in a prospect, does he have the personality and stamina to court high school hot shots?

Taking the second first, no, Bennett is stoic, serious and, it says here, would quickly grow weary of the road and playing kiss-up to ten-

agers and high school coaches.

And, only way Bennett would take a UK assistant's job is if Pitino could match and guarantee the money and future considerations equal to Bennett's banking future.

UK's coach can't do either. Footnote: If Bennett is willing, UK basketball could benefit more if he stayed put in Louisville where he is well known, highly respected and can be a lasting community influence for his alma mater.

CAT CALLS SHUFFLE

Tom Leach is a solid choice for UK's restructured pregame Cat Calls radio program on the UK Basketball Network. The consummate radio professional, Leach comes prepared, is glib, quick thinker in the clinches, doesn't try to out-talk a talker, understands the game, and has his ego under control.

Winston Bennett? Excellent choice also. That is if the former UK captain sticks to the straight-talk style that made him popular with fans and media during his playing days ('84-'88).

Too often such radio "anoointments" transform appointees into cheerleaders. They fall into the trap of wanting to please the paymaster instead of remembering that sharing their ex-player views on tactics, strategy, player performance, as well as second guessing, are reasons why listeners tune in and call.

READERS (RIGHT) WRITE. Some readers took exception to questions raised about Rick Pitino's recruiting abilities.

(77-year old) Hazel Porter, Frankfurt: "Our attitude toward Wildcat basketball makes me wonder if some surgeon operated on your brain and left nothing in there but the scissors. Happily, thousands of loyal Wildcat fans who stand in line for tickets, love Rick Pitino, Armani suits, gold cuff links, great recruiting and joyous Final Fours are satisfied! So, why don't you take a hike!"

COMMENT: Thank you for writing. A.M. Futtrell, Lexington: "What's with you? In your last column (also my last) you trashed the (UK) basketball program, the football team, and the announcers. Have a nice day!"

COMMENT: Thank you for writing. Carl Bible of Milford Oh.: "I hear Rick Pitino wants to back out of an agreement to play Cincinnati next year. Maybe Pitino doesn't think Allen Edwards and Anthony Epps can handle UC's vaunted fullcourt pressure. The most vicious press since Georgetown teams of the mid-80s."

COMMENT: Future schedules are normally guarded like gold at Fort Knox. But frankly I don't see why UK would schedule fast-rising Cincinnati anyway unless the payday was enormous.

COMMENT II: Since UK's coach and Xavier's Pete Gillen are good friends, perhaps more likely, a series with the Musketeers at Riverfront Coliseum.

Pitino said two weeks ago he would like to see "us play more games in Louisville and Cincinnati so our fans, non-season ticket holders, would have an opportunity to see us."

Jack Ison (native of) Mt. Sterling, said his hometown's inclusion on the list pleased several of the townies. "Great tradition. It's one of the best," Doug Gibson, Elizabethtown writes. "I can't believe that a former St. Camillus standout like yourself would omit the (Corbin) Redhounds when listing the top sports towns in Kentucky."

COMMENT: Thank you for writing.

'DEAN' DEANED

A no-news item last week sustains this idea I have about myth making. North Carolina Dean Smith allowed All-American center Eric Montross



to foul out with six minutes left against UMass in the NIT.

The Minutemen rallied and won in overtime. But Smith's decision to leave Montross in the game was reported with little or no fanfare in print, nor second guessed by TV reporters.

This, along with Froghorn Vitale, is how a dean of coaches remains one.

The players are to be congratulated on a great season regardless of





Picking the proper rod to fish with may sound simple and uncomplex and a lot of anglers give it little thought, but it is one of the biggest decisions you may make during your search for your day's catch. Once you get the fish on you certainly don't want to lose him and using the wrong rod is the reason we lose a lot of our fish. Although there are thousands of rods on the market today, I am going to give you some of my thoughts on selecting the proper rod to get the job done the most effectively that you can.

First let's talk about graphite rods. To me, graphite serves a lot of purposes, but usually when I choose graphite, I need sensitivity. Graphite rods are very sensitive and are very quick in reflex. What I mean by reflex is that they have a quicker return than glass rods and it is this quick return or reflex action that can cause you to lose fish while using certain baits. Graphite to me is great for flipping, worm fishing, or pitching and sometimes on spinnerbaits. It is also a must for Stugos or Top Guns. Here we need great power, sensitivity, and a quick return to get the advantage over the fish.

On other baits such as topwaters, crankbaits, jerkbaits such as the Rogue, Long A or rattin baits like the Milo, I choose glass rods. Here we have baits that the fish will usually explode on very aggressively. I also use glass rods on buzzbaits. With glass we can't set the hook as quickly as we can with graphite. We also won't lose as many fish with glass rods because its reflex is so much slower. While the fish may be trying to shake the hooks out of its mouth

swinging side to side with furious power on the movement back and forth, a fish can create slack line with a graphite rod because the rod and fish will be moving at different speeds.

This slack line in the battle can give the fish an opportunity to throw the hooks and regain his freedom. With glass rods the fish and rod move together at closer speeds. This will keep the fish hooked so you can land

him. The fish will also be able to inhale the bait deeper into its mouth because of lack of pressure on the rod.

As a simple rule, I use glass rods with baits that contain treble hooks and graphite rods with single hook baits. My exceptions to this rule will be discussed in my next article.

wouldn't have had to pack a pack of Tams alongside their banana flips.

The next item was the dinger, though. It was a "new treat" for kids. It makes me sick to even describe it, but in case you missed it, I feel compelled to try. The ad begins "Your kids will love it. If you are as musically talented as I am, you're lucky to tune in a radio station.

You can listen to music. You can enjoy it. But you can't play it.



It hurts to sing, and people ask you to sing solo—that's as in "so low" that nobody can hear you. But something amazing has happened to give folks like us hope.

I'm turning into a musical genius.

I was playing with my 1-year-old daughter in her room recently when I came across her Little Tikes plastic piano. I had no intention of playing it. I wanted to move it to the wall so she wouldn't trip over it and cry.

CLIFTON BRANHAM LIVES A LIFE OF VIOLENCE
There wasn't much law and order as Clifton Branham grew up just after the Civil War in the mountains of the westernmost part of Virginia. Times were hard. Resentment existed between individuals and families. Killing was commonplace.

His mother, Mahalia, was half Cherokee. His father, John C. Branham, had seen her at a Cherokee Indian camp and took her for his bride. Her skin was red-tinted and she looked very much like an Indian with her high cheekbones. Clifton was one of their ten children.

"Clifton was bad even when he was a young boy," Lee Greer said from his home near Pound, Virginia, in 1970. "I remember one time when Clifton kept throwing rocks at my brother. He never would stop until my brother cut him several times with a knife."

Clifton ran away from home at age 12 and hiked about 80 miles to the home of a brother in Johnson County, Kentucky. When he returned a few years later, his family had moved. After awhile he found them living on the top of Cumberland Mountain, near the state line, in Wise County, Virginia.

On a trip to see other "family" on the south side of Pound River, he met Nan Branham, his second cousin. He would later describe her as "his sweet Nannie." After a short courtship they slipped off and were married. Nancy Branham was described as "a good person who went around helping people and the sick."

Granville Cox, a brother-in-law who also lived on Cumberland Mountain, near Osborne Gap, was a notorious moonshiner. Clifton began making moonshine liquor and from that point on he was on the wrong side of the law. When the revenue officers got hot on his trail he crossed from one state to the other.

Clifton was arrested in Kentucky for killing Henry Vanover, the fa-

ther-in-law of bad man Cal Fleming. Cal and his brother Leeman Fleming were later accused along with Dr. M.B. Taylor, "the Red Fox of the Mountains," for the murder of bootlegger, Bad Ira Mullins and several others.

The slain Vanover had killed a man by the name of Roberts who was staying with Bad Ira at his place. Ira was a bad character who hauled whiskey from North Carolina and sold it in Kentucky and Virginia.

Mullins, in retaliation, hired George Johnson, Clifton Branham and Clifton's brother, Tandy, to kill Vanover.

After they murdered Vanover, George Johnson started to leave the country but was waylaid and killed. Tandy and Clifton Branham were arrested and tried in Kentucky for the murder and received life sentences at the Kentucky State Penitentiary at Frankfort.

Clifton became a heavy reader to fill the hours of free time. In reading the Bible he was "saved" after one year in prison and soon took up preaching.

After preaching in prison for 13 years, a parole law was enacted which allowed prisoners who had served ten years or more of their sentence, to be eligible for parole.

Although he and Tandy were paroled, neither became model citizens. Tandy, who was raucous and mean, went to jail with several other men in Kentucky and was killed about six months after his release from prison.

Clifton returned to Wise County where he became embroiled in a family squabble during which he shot and killed his wife with a .32 V&R Johnson pistol.

"I saw Clifton sometime shortly before he killed Nan," Lee Greer recalled. "He didn't look natural. He looked so wild I was afraid of him. He got on his horse and headed for Kentucky after the killing. I never saw him again until the trial."

Grace Greer, daughter of Lee Greer, then said, "My mother was running a store and post office at Pound. Clifton stopped at the store and told her he had killed Nan. 'Oh no, you didn't!' my mother said. 'Here are the exact words of his answer: 'Yes, I left her stretched out in the road.'"

Knowing he must leave the area, Branham crossed the mountain to Shelby Creek and soon went to his cousin John McCarey's home on Beaver Creek in Floyd County, Kentucky. He stayed there for three months during which time he became close with his young second cousin, Haley McCarey.

Her father had a long-standing feud with a Moore family. McCarey told Branham that he would allow them to marry if he would rid him of Anderson Moore. Branham lay on a hill and watched until he had the opportunity to shoot Moore. He and Haley were soon married—six months after he had killed "his sweet Nannie."

Following their marriage they boarded a boat at the mouth of Big Mud, planning to start a new life in Michigan and never return. A drummer, which is what traveling salesmen were called in that era, recognized Branham and got off the boat at Prestonsburg and notified authorities. Police pursued them aboard a skiff, arrested Branham, and took him

to the Prestonsburg jail and soon thereafter on to Lexington.

After two months, Kentucky agreed to release him to Virginia authorities, and Emmet Swindall and John Wesley Hillman were sent to bring him back to Wise to be tried for the murder of his first wife.

Murder is nothing new in this mountainous area. Too often, even today, we read where individuals take the law into their own hands and become accuser, judge, jury and executioner. That is, if they consider the act of its consequences at all. Clifton Branham's impudence during the trial did not aid his cause as he was uncooperative and sassed the lawyers when he was questioned. Haley McCarey, his new wife, attended the entire trial and Clifton's father sat nearby.

The Spirit of Generosity is in the air. It is prevalent now more than at any other time of the year. It is a national phenomenon we joyfully experience in our country between the Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays. This "spirit of caring" attitude affects almost everyone, young and old alike.

Our senior citizens—those beautiful people of Eastern Kentucky 60 years of age and older, are affected by it. Some, because of their fortunate circumstances, perpetuate it. These people have the love, the desire to help, and the resources to keep the Spirit of Generosity alive. Some, because of unfortunate circumstances, benefit from it. These people may have the same love, and the same desire to help others, but they simply do not have the resources to contribute.

Their hearts are in the right place but their needs for basic survival dominate. They cannot afford to help others because they are in a situation where they cannot afford to help themselves. In a recent study it was determined that 28 percent of our senior citizens in Eastern Kentucky live at or below the poverty level. This means that in the five Eastern Kentucky counties served by the Kentucky Benefits Counseling Program (KBCP) at the Prestonsburg office, at least one in four senior citizens are in dire need of assistance in one form or another.

This is alarming, to say the least, but to those who are forced to experience

destiny, it is a painful way of life. Fortunately, for these, the Spirit of Generosity is alive and well in Eastern Kentucky. Not only does this spirit thrive because of caring men and women who use their resources for the betterment of others, but it thrives because of public and private organizations dedicated to reaching others with needs in an effort to fill those needs.

The Kentucky Benefits Counseling Program is one of those organizations. It began in March of this year exclusively for the care and welfare of senior citizens 60 years of age and older. It is supported by federal and state monies and is controlled by federal and state mandates.

The program's chief responsibility is to act as an advocacy on behalf of senior citizens to assure those people that they get what is legally and rightfully theirs. Like any new program, the KBCP went through its early planning stages. Now the KBCP has offices throughout the state. Each office serves several counties and has one Benefits Counseling Coordinator (BCC) in that multi-county or regional office.

This BCC is dependent on volunteers and trained Volunteer Benefits Counselors to reach and assist the senior citizens in all the counties. My office, at Prestonsburg, is locally sponsored by the Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky Inc.

Together we strive to reach and assist senior citizens in a five-county area. Any senior citizen who lives in Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin, Martin or Pike counties is encouraged to call us, toll-free, at 1-800-550-3878. We also encourage you to call us if you know of a senior citizen in need. We cannot help if we do not know!

Now that the KBCP has offices throughout the state, the Spirit of Generosity no longer has to seem so seasonal. We are here all year to serve our senior citizens.



Body condition of cows important to milk production in early lactation

Body condition, or the amount of fat deposits a dairy cow carries at calving, can influence milk production, reproduction, health, and longevity of cows in a dairy herd.

"Dairy cows need to calve with the proper amount of body condition—not too much fat, nor too little," said Donna Amaral-Phillips, extension dairy specialist with the University of Kentucky's College of Agriculture. "Cows that calve too thin may not produce as much milk or breed back as well as cows in good body condition."

Early lactation cows cannot consume enough food during the first six to eight weeks of lactation to support the nutrient needs for milk production, Amaral-Phillips said. To make up for the energy deficiency, a cow relies on her body fat stores as a dietary source. For every pound of body fat mobilized, enough energy can be supplied to support the production of seven pounds of milk. Early lactation cows should lose no more than two pounds of body weight daily.

"Cows need to be in the correct condition at calving, or they will not produce to their potential, and will not breed back quickly," Amaral-Phillips added. "To get cows in the correct condition, body condition must be put on them in the middle of their lactation."

Cows gain weight very efficiently as their milk production declines during the last half of their lactation, she said. If possible, cows should be in the correct condition when they are bred. They should be fed from mid-pregnancy until the dry period. This is the best time to prevent lactation from weighing down the cow.

The best investment in feed is to provide a good ration during the last part of the lactation period that in good body condition, they can gain this in the middle of the next lactation. Amaral-Phillips said the method of putting fat on them during the last half of lactation is not that there is a lot of fat there, but a fat condition in the cow.

How well a lactating cow is managed is the key, with the appropriate amount of body condition and not lose weight too rapidly. A cow that loses the amount of fat from each cow she will lose 15 to 20 percent of her milk production. The higher the fat condition, the more profit can be made. Many nutritional changes made during the

first 120 days in milk will translate into a greater milk production response than if the same changes are made later.

She added, for a sound nutritional program for early lactation cows, calve them with adequate amounts of body condition, prevent rapid losses in body condition shortly before and after calving, and get them to consume as much high quality forage as possible and feed grain to complement the forage fed.



New horizons in pet health insurance

"Wild Things" is loath to burden Bill and Hillary with yet another health-care crisis, but do they realize that fewer than one American pet in a hundred has health insurance? Sure, Socks, being First Cat, gets absolutely free, top-flight medical care from government veterinarians. But 110 million ordinary cats and dogs are living with no coverage, exposing their owners to catastrophic medical expenses, such as \$2,000 for a canine hip replacement, a \$100,000 bill for some very advanced dog-cancer care, or costly new pet dialysis treatments, which unfortunately did not prevent a glamour symbol of the '80s, Spuds MacKenzie, from going to that great doggy tavern in the sky.

Yes, Spuds, the famed Anheuser-Busch party animal, has succumbed to kidney disease at the age of 10 at his home in Riverside, Ill., despite the best care medical science had to offer. Make that HER home. Spuds turned out to be female, despite being draped by the curvaceous Spudettes in Bud Lite ads.

"We were crushed," said Bud Lite marketing director Bob Lachky, confirming the death last week. "Spuds was one of the most powerful advertising ideas in the last 25 years." Like Greta Garbo, Spuds lived reclusively in her final years, and her death was shrouded in secrecy. Not only was Spuds not male—Spuds wasn't Spuds. Her real name was Honey Tree Evil Eye, or Evie for short.

For these true Animal Lovers, a major insurer, Fireman's Fund Insurance Co., has recently launched its nationwide Medipet pet-insurance plan with the slogan "Because they're family, too!" The \$59-a-year Gold Tag plan buys you up to \$3,000 coverage per illness, with a \$300 deductible. If the pet is older than 9, the rate rises to \$99 a year.

Armed with cable-TV infomercials aimed at 20 million viewers and a direct-mail cam-

paign targeting another 600,000 households, Medipet is going to war with our nation's largest pet insurer, Veterinary Pet Insurance of Anaheim, Calif., which claims more than 90,000 policies in 37 states. Both insurers cover most medical treatments and hospitalization, but not pre-existing conditions. Coverage is most helpful for catastrophic-illness care. (No pet hit by a car limps out of the ER these days for less than a grand.) But there are limits: Medipet refuses to pay for dog or cat psychiatry, root canals or dental capping. VPI will not cover pets injured during war while "resisting attack," or during insurrection, rebellion or revolution. Acupuncture, however, is covered. (For more information, call Medipet at 1-800-528-4961 or VPI at 1-800-USA-PETS.)

Dogs and cats are better risks than people, notes Michael Walters of the American Veterinary Medical Association. "They don't smoke as a group. They rarely travel by automobile. And

they are less likely to be victims of street crimes. So a lot of things that put people in the hospital don't put animals there."

The arctic peregrine falcon, which makes astonishing 200-mph dives, was making an alarming plummet toward extinction 20 years ago because of DDT poisoning. But protection since 1973 under the Endangered Species Act and DDT restrictions have allowed the bird to make such a recovery in Alaska, Canada and Greenland that U.S. officials are proposing to remove it from the endangered list. The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is soliciting public comments on this proposal for the next 90 days. Reindeer

Rangifer tarandus
On, Comet! On, Cupid! On, Donner and Blitzen! Now, dash away, dash away, dash away all!

When reindeer dash away, it is to find greener pastures. They eat grass and leaves from willows and birches. During the short Arctic summers where reindeer are found, plants grow slowly and the vegetation cannot stand much grazing. So, reindeer move frequently to a new place. Reindeer may migrate several hundred miles in a year. During migration, several thousand reindeer may gather into one herd.

Male reindeer are known as bulls. Females are called cows. In the fall, the bulls fight with one another to gather their own group of cows, called a harem. Offspring are called calves.

Adult reindeer stand about 3 to 4 feet high and weigh up to 400 pounds. They have large antlers and their heavy coat is grayish brown to almost white. Their large hoofs prevent them from sinking into the snow during winter.

They are a member of the deer family, closely related to Caribou, and live in the northernmost regions of Europe, Asia and North America.

Reindeer make a variety of noises, including snorting when they are frightened. Young reindeer bawl. When reindeer walk, their feet make a clicking sound.

A nomadic people in northern Scandinavia, Lapps, train reindeer to serve as pack animals and to pull sleds and sleighs.

Mistletoe

Phoradendron serotinum
Stand under the mistletoe and forfeit a kiss.

This Christmas tradition probably evolved from the Druids, ancient priests of the Celts. Druids cut the mistletoe that grew on the sacred oak and gave it to the people for charms in Teutonic mythology. An arrow of mistletoe killed Balder, son of the goddess Frigg in mythology. Early Europeans used mistletoe as a ceremonial plant and decorated their homes with it to ward off evil.

Mistletoe is a parasite that grows on trunks and branches of various trees, most often on apple trees. They also grow on lime, hawthorn, sycamore, poplar, locust, fir and, sometimes, oak trees. The dwarf mistletoe is a small variety that grows on pines in the Eastern United States.

Mistletoe, the state flower of Oklahoma, is an evergreen with feathery, oblong leaves. It has tiny yellow flowers that bloom in February and March. Birds eat the white, shiny fruits (berries), but people don't, because the berries may be poisonous to people.

Birds help to scatter the seeds of mistletoe. The seeds cling to the beaks of birds and when the birds sharpen their bills against the bark of trees, the seeds are scattered.

A brother of his great-grandfather who was in the legislature and didn't like being a part of Pike, helped to get a law passed in 1845 to keep Scaff's great-grandfather's farm in Floyd County.

In 1938 John Friedman Jr., of Owensboro, was called upon to assist in designing costumes for "Gone With the Wind."

Southern Baptists with 738,000 members in Kentucky make them the largest religious denomination in the state.

Hascal Halle of Tompkinsville invented the guitar as it is known today.

Fire clay, used to make fire brick, was discovered in the U.S. by Karl B. Grahn at Fire Clay, now Grahn, Kentucky.

cally was ahead of the national celebration. Gov. Robert P. Letcher declared "a day of prayer, praise, and thanksgiving" to be celebrated in Kentucky on September 26, 1844. Thanksgiving was proclaimed a national holiday some years later by a Kentucky native, President Abraham Lincoln.

Reverend John L. ythe preached the first sermon in Kentucky. His service was held at Boonesborough on May 28, 1775.

Big Black Mountain in Harlan County is Kentucky's highest point in elevation, 4,125 feet above sea level.

Col. James Bowie, co-commander of the Alamo and designer of the Bowie knife, was born in Logan County.

The Medical Center of Eastern Kentucky

During the mid 1700s, Capt. Matthias (Tice) Harman and his relatives, of Walker's Creek, Virginia, made periodic hunting trips through an area that became Floyd and Johnson counties in Eastern Kentucky. These hunters, called "long hunters" because of the time spent on the trips, hunted buffalo, bear, mink, elk and game.

They built crude three-sided hunting lodges, usually near waterways or near cliffs for protection. This temporary lodging later became the site of Harman Station, thought to be the first Eastern Kentucky Settlement.

In 1789, on land near today's Combs airport in Johnson County, Harman Station was built to protect settlers against violent Indian attacks by tribes living in the country northwest of the Ohio River and South of the Cumberland. The settlers had invaded the hunting grounds of these Indian tribes, and the Indians wanted to drive them out.

Henry P. Sealf described the area and the fort in his **Kentucky's Last Frontier**.

"The site selected for the fort was almost half a mile below the mouth of John's Creek and about one hundred yards back from the east bank of the Louisa River. The fort ... was about 20 feet square and two stories in height.

"The upper story projected beyond the walls of the lower

story about two feet on every side and this extra space was floored with heavy timbers in which loop holes were cut through which to fire down upon besieging Indians should they

wooden hinges made by the hunters, opened inwards and was secured by an immense beam of oak.

"The roof sloped up from each of the four sides of the fort to a

the hills back of the bottom and passed close by the fort, and upon it the settlers relied for water. The timber about the fort was cut off close to the ground and burned back the full space of

land from Matthias Harman in 1787 and the family settled there until Jenny Wiley's capture by Indians. When the Indians captured Jenny Wiley, they murdered her three children. Most historians agree that the Indians thought they had captured Matthias's family. The Indians were retaliating against Matthias for the murder of some members of their tribe in a November 1788 battle at the head of Tug Fork.



Harman Station was the miracle in the wilderness to which Jenny Wiley found her way about eleven months after she was captured. After several weeks of Indian siege, Matthias Harman escorted Jenny and other settlers up John's Creek back to Walker's Creek where she was reunited with her husband.

The Indians burned Harman's station soon after the group left.

A second Harman Station was built around 1791 during the early summer. Some historians say that Matthias and his family came back to blockhouse bottom in 1791. Samuel Auxier and family lived in one blockhouse; the Harmans lived in the adjacent blockhouse, the usual pattern of frontier forts.

When Johnson County was formed out of Floyd County in 1842, Harman Station was cut off in that county, and as Henry Sealf pointed out in his **Kentucky's Last Frontier**, "the bottom became known as Blockhouse Bottom and the name of Harman Station was relegated to the records of history."



Two natural resources — salt and coal — played prominent roles in the development of David.

Salt — a valuable resource

The story of the small community began in 1767 when Daniel Boone and William Hill explored Middle Creek and discovered a salt lick or spring where the town now stands. The explorers built a small cabin and spent the winter there, feasting off the wild game which frequented the salt lick. When Boone returned home to North Carolina, he told others about his find. At that time, salt was a valuable commodity and sold for as high as \$5 a bushel.

The salt spring proved to be a valuable resource for early settlers.

Settlement began later when Kentucky statesmen Henry Clay and John Breckinridge purchased a great deal of land in the area and sold the land in parcels to early settlers. Some of those early families included the Hamiltons, Harrises, Huffis, Fitzpatricks, Tusseys, Neals, Shephers and Slones.

In 1795, the first salt work in the Sandy Valley was begun in the area, which was approximately named Lick Fork. The salt works provided salt for settlers and later for Civil War troops. Salt was

road. The last three miles to the mining center were impassable in the winter. In 1943, the road was gravelled and, a few years later, the entire road was blacktopped.

The attractive town became known as a model coal camp, and was featured in an instructional movie called "Life in a Model Coal Camp." A few years later, the town would also have the distinction of being the first in Floyd County to have a city water system and an airfield.

In 1941, 250 men worked in the David mine. By 1949, there were 600 employees. Much of the company's success was due to its high quality of coal, known as "Patsy" coal, which contained little impurities.

The town 'David' built

The coal camp was named after David L. Francis, the son of James Francis who was a partner of LaViers in Princess Elkhorn Coal Company. In April of 1946, David Francis, a graduate of Yale and Harvard, became president of the company. Although he lived in Huntington, West Virginia, and had other business interests and obligations, he spent three to four days a week overseeing the operations of the mines and the welfare of the coal town he helped develop.

At the height of its glory, the community had a church, theater, school, recreational facilities, a clubhouse, Boy and Girl Scout cabins, an active Woman's Club, a swimming pool and bathhouse and a general store. A glee club, the "Patsy Teenagers," performed on television and brought additional recognition to the town. Dr. John Archer was the popular town doctor. Another noted figure was the Reverend J.E. Durham, a coal miner who was also pastor of David Community Church.

The end of an era

Life in David was idyllic until the mid-sixties. In 1967, the miners felt uneasy about the permanence of their jobs. The winter of 1967-68, there were a number of strikes and the spring market opened at lower prices. In addition, equipment at No. 1 and No. 2 mines needed repair. There were rumors that the company would be sold.

On March 26, 1968, fifty-six of the three hundred miners lost their jobs. Three days later notices were posted that the mines were closed. With the abrupt departure of the company, all public services were halted and the school, theatre, and swimming pool were closed. Many residents moved out when they found jobs elsewhere. Others stayed on, reluctant to leave the community that had become their home.

On October 15, 1968, the town was sold by David Francis to John Allen. Ten days later, Allen sold the town to Woodrow Branham. By 1972, the once-modern town looked like an abandoned, decaying coal camp. The neglected houses, sewage and water system were in disrepair, and residents were discouraged and frustrated.

Change was soon to come.

A new era

With the assistance of Brothers of Charity, a small religious community that had established St. Vincent's Mission in David in 1970, and the Appalachian Research and Defense Fund of Kentucky, the David Community Development Corporation was formed. The corporation bought the town from Branham on May 14, 1975 and set about to make the town livable again.

The corporation, spearheaded by the late Ashland Howard, a former David coal miner, sold the houses to residents, who repaired and renovated their homes. By this time, the town had only 22 houses, but a spirit of optimism prevailed. A town clean-up program made the community attractive again and, in 1976, David was the winner of a state-wide community beautification award.

The community became well-known in the 1970s as a dying coal town that rebuilt itself.

Today, David is known for David Appalachian Crafts Center, a business that provides a national market for local craftspeople. The center is sponsored by St. Vincent's Mission, which is still actively involved in social and charitable work in Floyd County.

The David School, a nationally recognized school which provides alternative education to drop-outs, recently moved from its facilities in the old general store building to a new campus on Reservoir Hollow.

The story of David is that of transformation: from a farming community to a coal town; a town built by a coal company and, later, saved by a corporation and preserved by its people.

produced by filling large kettles with the salt water, which was then boiled down over huge fires.

The Civil War was the demise of the salt works. Raiding parties from both sides of the war repeatedly destroyed the salt works and, after the war, the works was abandoned.

The buying of mineral rights

Up until the 1940s, farming and logging were about the only livelihoods for residents on Lick Fork. The families grew apples, corn, beans, and sorghum, among other crops, on the cleared hillsides. They also raised cattle, sheep and hogs. Game was plentiful and the clear streams were filled with fish.

Logging provided extra income. Loggers felled valuable virgin timber which was sold for \$1 a tree. Money was scarce, and when the unexpected opportunity came along to sell the mineral rights to their land for cash, many landowners did.

Around 1916, Henry LaViers purchased 1,500 acres of mineral rights in the David area from pioneer coal developer John C. Mayo. Years earlier, Mayo had the foresight to buy about 30,000 acres of coal land in Eastern Kentucky to lease to major coal companies.

In May of 1917, representatives of coal companies and investors, including LaViers, began buying up mineral rights from landowners on Lick Fork.

The purchases, some at only \$10 an acre, gave the buyers all coal, oil, gas, salt, mineral, rock and timber rights to the land. To the landowners, the \$3,000 to \$4,000 they received for their mineral rights must have seemed a small fortune. However, they did not realize that they had sold control of the land and its wealth to outside interests.

Coal development begins

Up until the 1940s, Lick Fork was still a remote area with rutted paths accessible only by horseback, mule or wagon. This lack of accessibility delayed the development of coal reserves in the area for over two decades. But on December 4, 1940, the formation of the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company was announced by company president Harry LaViers. The company had 3,000 acres of land on Middle Creek in Floyd and Magoffin counties ready for development. Lick Fork would never be the same.



In 1941, the quiet farming community underwent rapid change. In April, a C & O rail line from West Prestonsburg to the rich Lick Fork coal field was completed, a coal tipples was built, and construction of workers' homes at the railhead had begun.

The first of May, 1941, Princess Elkhorn Coal Company shipped its first load of coal. And Harry LaViers announced that an annual production of 50,000 tons of coal was expected from the coal operations.

The small coal town that had quickly sprung up was soon populated by families who moved into the camp houses before they were finished. The coal company maintained the houses, which eventually numbered 100, and kept them painted and their surroundings neat. The company also built a church and a general store. Also in 1941, a post office was established.

The Lick Fork road was gradually improved. Although the road had been straightened out in 1941, the first seven miles from Prestonsburg was a WPA

Businesses have stake in educating Kentucky's children

When the Kentucky Education Reform Act passed in 1985 it was hailed as the most comprehensive reform in the entire country.

And when the help of the business community was not mandated by KERA, employers all over the state were involved in support of educational change and continue to show that they too are committed to improving the educational system.

It's not an entirely selfless task. Statistics show that Kentucky has one of the least educated work forces in the United States. Kentucky has had one of the highest drop-out rates in the country.

A better educated work force means better workers.

Three years ago the Business-Industry School Partnership Program began in Fulton. Members of the school system and the business community formed an advisory board which looked at ways businesses and schools might better work in partnership.

"The business leaders felt it was important to recruit industry to our town and so many of our young people were leaving or just simply not prepared to enter the work force," said Dianne Owen, Fulton's technology coordinator and a member of the advisory board.

One of the programs initiated at Fulton High School involved bringing in community business leaders to instruct these potential employees on how to fill out a job application, how to respond to questions in a job interview, what questions they needed to ask.

Several businesses such as a local dental association have actually joined in partnership with the high school marketing class to produce a brochure. Interdisciplinary studies involving math and

technology classes have worked with a local contractor, architect and engineers to design a bridge.

Fifth graders in Fulton hear Rotary Club speakers who come to classes once a month and talk about specific careers.

"The business community has been very supportive of this project and hopes the students will be more career oriented and develop better work attitudes," said Owen.

Partnerships with schools aren't the only way businesses have increased their support for education. Many businesses around the state have developed programs at the job site for their employees.

Town hall sessions at UPS in Lexington and Louisville have been held with employees and business to inform them about primary school assessment and school based decision making at UPS.

started a program which encourages employees' involvement in the schools. In Jefferson County 90 UPS volunteers give an average of one hour per week to work with 12 Jefferson County public schools.

"In many ways we are also seeing a revolution in the ways in which businesses are interacting with schools. We are gradually moving away from the check-writing mentality that has characterized business involvement for so long and moving toward a real partnership between business and school."

In this new partnership each utilizes the resources of the other to improve what they do. Schools and businesses are realizing their individual success depends on the other," said Kent O'Neil, Nelson, United Parcel Service CEO.

Commitment to this education revolution doesn't necessarily depend on size either. Small family owned businesses can get involved in a more personal way such as BikeWorld, a small bicycle shop in Paducah.

Students who work at the store owned by Martha Emmons and her husband Hutch Smith must maintain a C average.

"We found a lot of people who wanted to work here were students and we thought that was an advantage for us since those are the ones who are most interested in bikes," said Emmons. "But we had real reservations about school and work and as we thought about what we'd want for our own child we didn't want work to interfere with school or extracurricular activities."

Schedules for student workers also are made flexible enough to work around extracurricular activities such as baseball or band practice. One student worker knowing his grades were marginal adjusts his work schedule around a tutoring schedule.

Advocates of the arts, the Paducah couple also gives free tickets to student workers for the performances at the regional theater.

"We really do bend over backwards sometimes," said Emmons. "Other business owners ask us why we go to this much trouble but we really do feel it's important."

Bud Reynolds, coordinator, South Floyd High School, Hi Hat, Kentucky 41636. Neil is also enrolled in the Technology class taught by Mr. Fletcher at South Floyd. He seems to be gaining valuable experience in this class. There has been talk of having Neil take college classes as soon as next semester at Alice Lloyd College. (Obviously someone will need to drive him over—we can't have twelve year olds driving to Knott County and back.) Neil would still attend South Floyd on a part-time basis.

Whereas Neil is interested in the technical aspects of computer, Sheldon Compton uses the technology in his writing and sharing ideas with others. Sheldon really became interested in writing after his work in the American Studies Class at Wheelwright High School last year.

At the beginning of this school year, he started writing a column in the Floyd County Times entitled "Think About It." I have had several people to comment favorably on Sheldon's writing. Sheldon is in the journalism class where he does an assortment of writing projects. Some of these also appear in the Floyd County Times.

Sheldon reminds us that it is nice to have his work published, but he realizes that the important thing is to keep writing. He knows that his writing has room to grow, and he accepts constructive criticism as well as anyone I have ever worked with. I can hand him a paper back with several mistakes and he simply will say, "Good. I want this to be really good." It is one of the few who really look at all those marks we put on the paper.

(NU) - Every year, medicine misuse leads to the hospitalization and even death of thousands of children. In fact, medication mistakes could be seen as America's other drug crisis.

Also discuss your children's medications with your pharmacist. That way, you can be sure your kids get all the benefits of their medicine.

1. What is the name of the medicine and what is it supposed to do?

5. What written material is available about the medicine?

Kentucky coalfields

A paradise for geologists

For six weeks this fall, Sonny Buter and Daniel Mikes climbed highway cut-through outcrops along U.S. 23 between Prestonsburg and Pikeville, and Route 80 near Martin, studying the rock formations and collecting valuable data for an oil company in the Netherlands. The pair are petroleum geologists who are working on a research project to earn their doctorates in geology from the University of Technology in Delft in the Netherlands.

"Sometimes we think people wonder what two boys are doing along a road looking at rocks," Buter said.

"Girls toot their car horns and wave," Mikes added, smiling. "People recognize us now. They blow their horn when they see us. They are probably thinking, 'What are those guys doing?'"

"Most people who are coal miners know what we are doing," he continued, "because they work with geologists in mines. Geology students from different states come here to study and look at rocks."

"So why are two geologists from the Netherlands studying rocks in Eastern Kentucky?"

"In the Netherlands, we have the same kind of rocks you have here, only they are off-shore and we have difficulty getting to examine them," Buter, 27, explained. "The beautiful thing here is that the outcroppings are very large and you can see them in their real shape. It's a paradise for geologists."

Mikes, 26, agreed. "There is so much more information here than what you normally find in the field."

Both men speak excellent English with Dutch accents. Buter is a native of the Netherlands and lives in Amsterdam. Mikes is a native of Czechoslovakia, but his parents, who were pilots for the Soviet

Union, moved to the Netherlands when he was two years old.

One reason the two chose to become geologists is the opportunity for travel. Mikes has studied the Mediterranean Sea as a marine geologist, and has made excursions to Spain, Switzerland, Great Britain, Germany, France and Belgium. In the United States, he has been to Oregon (where his uncle lives) and California. This trip was his first to Kentucky.

Buter, too, has traveled extensively as a geologist. In fact, this research trip makes his fourth in three years to Eastern Kentucky. Three years ago, Buter was among a group of assistant researchers from the University in Delft who began the outcrop study in Eastern Kentucky. The last three trips, including this one, Buter has stayed with Claude and Ruth Meade who live at Goble Roberts Addition in Prestonsburg. "I met the family at Hillbilly Days in Pikeville, during the first trip," Buter said.

The meeting was a stroke of luck. In preparation for his second research trip to Kentucky, Buter said, "I wrote the family a letter and asked them where I could rent a place and they invited me to stay with them."

Buter said that he is still "not quite used" to the contrast in cultures. "In the beginning I thought people here were kind of rude and not interested in people. Now I know a lot more people and know how to get along. When we go to different shops, the people are friendly and helpful."

So every day, from early October until their departure on November 15 — except when rainy weather kept them indoors studying their collection of data — the young geologists have been out scaling the outcrops from about nine in the morning until dark, examining the rock formations and, along the way, unlocking mysteries of the past.

Facts about the Netherlands

The Netherlands is a small country on the North Sea in northwestern Europe. The Netherlands is often called Holland. The capital is Amsterdam and the official language is Dutch. Many English words, including brandy, skate, skipper, and yacht, have been adapted from the Dutch. Most of the Netherlands is flat, though it has some uplands. Many canals cut through the country. They not only drain the land, but also serve as waterways. The country has large deposits of salt and natural gas, and some petroleum. Dairy farming is the most important form of agriculture, but the country is also known for its exportation of fresh flowers and flower bulbs, especially tulips and daffodils. The Netherlands has produced some of the world's greatest painters, including Rembrandt, Jan Vermeer, and Vincent Van Gogh.

formed by a folding of the Earth's crust between 435 million and 250 million years ago during the last half of the Paleozoic Era, which makes for some interesting geologic sleuthing. During their exploration, the two have discovered trace fossils, the remains of roots, trees and leaves, evidence of burrowing organisms, and all types of bone deposits. As they study the outcrops, they piece their data together and formulate a geologic picture of the whole area, the deposits it contains and how it was formed. "We make photos of all rocks," Mike said, "and make a drawing of the outcrops, looking at the rocks. Then we ask ourselves, 'How did they come here?'" "Most of the outcrops here were formed like the Mississippi Delta is presently forming," Mike continued. "The mountains are composed of sandstone deposited by a river." Other sediment material they have examined in the outcrops are layers of coal, clay and shale deposits. But the geologists' particular interest is in the sandstone. "To know what's going on, we have to look at the outcrops in detail," Buter explained. "The oil company wants to know how the oil will flow in the sandstones in the Netherlands. Oil won't flow through shale... So we have to find out what's in between sandstone. It's also important to know how big a sandstone is so we can calculate how much oil is in there." "Also, when we do find oil in sandstone, how do we get the oil out of there? That's Daniel's part, figuring out the flow of oil." An oil company based in the Netherlands is sponsoring the Eastern Kentucky research trip. Buter said that it is much cheaper for oil companies to pay geologists to study the potential for oil produc-

tion here for application in the Netherlands than for the company to perform core drillings at the cost \$10,000 a well. That being the case, the two geologists are willing to exchange their research data with core drilling data collected by Eastern Kentucky coal companies. "We'd like the core drilling data that is available. We are not interested in the coal," Buter emphasized. "If there are core wells left, we would like to look at them, too. If any coal companies are interested, there is a possibility we can exchange our work. We have really good data, and we can give, in return, a roof rock analysis." The geologists have already made plans to return to the area in the spring to continue their work. Facts about geology

Geology is the study of the Earth and comes from Greek words meaning earth and discussion. Geology tries to explain how the Earth was formed and how it changes. Geologists are scientists who study rocks, soils, mountains, rivers, oceans, caves and other parts of the Earth. They may specialize in many areas. Petroleum geologists explore for deposits of oil and gas on land and on or beneath the ocean floor. Mining geologists search for materials other than gas and oil. Specialists called paleontologists study fossils to learn about prehistoric life. There are also petrographers, who classify rocks; mineralogists, who study and identify minerals in the Earth, among other specialists. Many geologists teach, do research, or work in museums.

How are fiscal court meetings conducted?

A fiscal court meeting is conducted either by the county judge/executive or by a magistrate or commissioner elected by a majority of the others present to preside at a meeting when the county judge/executive is absent. Each court has its own process, but they generally follow Robert's Rules of Order. Some may invite or allow citizens to speak first; some may not allow citizens to speak at all. Sometimes there is a work session earlier on the day of the regular meeting, or even on a day prior to the regular meeting, where discussion of issues occurs, and the actual regular meeting consists primarily of formal voting. These work sessions are subject to the Open Meetings law, and citizens who wish to participate in the discussion should attend the work session. The court may go into closed (executive) session to handle certain matters.

The agenda does not have to be followed, and the court decides what will or will not be addressed at a particular meeting. To find out just how your particular fiscal court operates, attend some of its meetings.

How do I bring an issue to the attention of the court?

In most communities, the best way to get the fiscal court to consider action on an issue is to meet informally with the county judge/executive, or with a magistrate or commissioner and ask him or her to bring it up. Other issues may be acted on by the fiscal court only upon petition by a certain number of voters. For example, if a special district subject to KRS 65.166 (Fire Protection, Urban Services, Public Road or Sanitation) fails to provide services for which it was created, the fiscal court may dissolve it, but only after receiving a petition from 30 percent of the affected voters. A fiscal court may create a taxing district (KRS 65.182) or a sewer construction district (KRS 76.300) only after receiving a petition from 25 percent of the affected voters, and

may create a non-taxing special district pursuant to KRS 65.810 only upon petition by 20 percent of the affected voters.

A fiscal court may, upon petition by 50 percent of the affected voters, levy taxes in or expand "service districts"—areas within counties that can be subject to a higher tax rate because they receive some special services not available to other portions of the county (KRS 67.650).

May I speak before the fiscal court votes on my issue?

There is no legal requirement that fiscal courts allow comments at their meetings, but many do allow interested members of the public to bring matters to their attention or to comment on issues pending before the court. Before going to the fiscal court meeting, call or visit the county judge/executive's office to find out how to

illegal, it can reverse it. Fiscal court members are, of course, subject to reelection, and many citizens' groups have found that large public meetings to protest a fiscal court action, or other forms of political pressure from the public and the press, have caused fiscal courts to reverse their decisions.

What has to be shown in order to convict a county elected official of official misconduct?

According to the statutes, a governmental officer is guilty of official misconduct when he or she knowingly: fails to perform a duty imposed by law; performs an unauthorized act of his or her official functions; or violates any statute, rule or regulation relating to his or her office (KRS 522.010-522.030).

In addition, fiscal court members can be charged with neglect of office if they fail to attend 50 percent of the regular meetings over a six-month period, or two consecutive fiscal court meetings (KRS 61.170).

The statutes also define a felony called "misuse of confidential information" (KRS 522.040). A public official is guilty of this offense if he or she, based on confidential information gained through his or her office: accepts an interest in a property which may be affected by such information; speculates or wagers on the basis of such information; or assists another person in doing one of the above.

get on the agenda. Many counties require that you give notice in writing of what you want to address in advance of the meeting. Some fiscal courts do allow people to speak, even if they have not asked to be on the agenda in advance of the meeting.

Fiscal courts are required to hold a public hearing before acting in some matters. Some of those issues are: 1) privatization of a water or sewer system (KRS 107.720); 2) creation of a water commission to allow two or more cities or water districts to act jointly (KRS 74.440); 3) participation in a multi-county special district (KRS 65.162); 4) alteration or dissolution of a special district (KRS 65.165); 5) formation of a taxing district (KRS 65.182) or a non-taxing special district (KRS 65.810); and 6) approval of a hazardous waste incinerator or landfill (KRS 224.855).

What can voters do if they disagree with the fiscal court's action or inaction?

In most cases, a fiscal court action, whether by order, resolution or ordinance, can only be changed by another action of the fiscal court. However, it is possible to challenge a fiscal court action by filing a lawsuit. If the court holds that the action is

Appointed


Elsworth H. Stumbo of Harolt has been appointed to the Institute for Aging by Gov. Brereton C. Jones. The appointment became effective in October.







Christmas Origins

The word "Christmas" brings up images of brightly colored lights, decorated evergreens and jolly Santa Claus. But Christmas is more than a season of festivity. It is the day that Christians all over the world celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ.

During the Victorian era, many churches decorated streets of New York with the first fortunate American children to see a exciting day of gifts, sparkling Christmas trees, red and white candy canes and tacks.

The word "Christmas" comes from Cristes massae, an early English name which means Mass of Christ.

The first name Xmas, the Spanish Natividad, and the Italian Natale, might be holiday. Germans call the season Weihnachten, which means "the night."

The word Xmas was commonly used instead of Christmas until the late 19th century, when Christians began to use the word Xmas to avoid the word Christ.

Decorations for Christmas are green and red, which represent the color of life through the winter and the Christmas beliefs in eternal life. The color white represents the blood that Jesus shed for the world.

The Birth of the Savior

The birth of Jesus Christ is the central theme of the New Testament. According to the Bible, Jesus was born in the town of Bethlehem in the Holy Land and told them of Jesus' birth. Mary was visited by the Wise Men, called Magi, followed a bright star that led them to an humble stable where the infant Jesus lay in a manger. From that humble birthplace, the child brought new faith and hope to the world.

The exact date of Jesus' birth is not known. For the first two centuries, Christians were being persecuted in the Roman Empire. The Christian church did not celebrate the birth of Jesus until the late 4th century.

Christmas becomes a religious holiday

In the late 300's, Christians became the official religion of the Roman Empire. By 1100, Christmas had become the most important religious festival in Europe. By the middle of the 4th century, the church in the West was celebrating Christmas on December 25.

Many of the customs now associated with Christmas go back thousands of years when the people of Europe worshipped pagan gods. They celebrated the winter solstice, December 21 or 22, as the birthday of the sun — heralding the beginning of longer days. The early Christian Church took the ancient festival of time and gave it a new meaning for the Christmas season.

Christmas in American colonies

Not until the middle of the 19th century did Christmas generally become a day of festivity and gift giving in the United States. The stern Puritan colonists believed strict festivities were pagan and forbade them by law. During the 18th century, however, the Dutch colonies brought the custom of Christmas stocking and the custom of Santa Claus to the American colonies. The celebration of Christmas died out in the colonies.

Customs

Most American customs were brought here by colonists, such as the Dutch, from their various homelands. Feasting, decorating and singing carols were three customs. Traditional Christmas carols probably began in the early church. Outdoor carol singing seems to have started in the Middle Ages when groups of people went house to house to sing their carols.

Gift giving goes back to the ancient Egyptians, who distributed gifts during their midwinter festival. In the Bible story, the Wise Men brought gifts to Jesus the twelfth day after his birth.

In the 18th century, Christmas customs became popular — decorating Christmas trees and sending Christmas cards. Many well-known Christmas carols, including "Silent Night" and "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing," were composed during this period.

The Christmas tree was first introduced to the American continent in 1685. By the beginning of the 19th century, it became an American tradition. The Christmas tree, the custom soon spread to other countries of Northern Europe, but it is still unusual in Spain and Latin America.

The date of the first Christmas tree in the United States is 1822 in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

The use of evergreens in Yule decorations began in Northern Europe. The use of holly arose because its prickly leaves symbolize Christ's crown of thorns and its scarlet berries suggested drops of blood.

Christmas in other countries

People of different countries celebrate the holiday in various ways, depending on national and local customs. Many Christmas customs that are observed in the United States and Canada originated in the British Isles.

In Britain, most families watch their monarch give a special Christmas message. In Ireland, people put a lit candle in the window to welcome Mary and Joseph. Some Scottish families decorate a Christmas tree and sing carols.

In France, children put their shoes in front of the fireplace so Père Noël (Father Christmas) can fill them with gifts.

In Australia and New Zealand, December comes during the summer. Schoolchildren have a six-week summer vacation at Christmas time.

In Mexico, families feast and celebrate. Children enjoy trying to break a pinata filled with gifts and candy.

Relatively few numbers of Christians live in Asia, so Christmas is not widely celebrated there. Where the holiday is observed, families sing carols, decorate trees and attend worship services.

In Africa, the celebration is not widespread because there is only a small Christian population. People in Christian communities follow Western traditions. They sing carols and form in their language.

Hanukkah

Another significant religious holiday in December is Hanukkah, the Jewish feast of Lights or Feast of Dedication. The Hebrew word Hanukkah means dedication. The Hanukkah holiday begins on the eve of the 25th day of the Hebrew month of Kislev, approximately December 10 and lasts eight days.

During Hanukkah, gifts are exchanged and contributions made to the poor.

Dear Jax,
Why does water put out fire?

Dear Tim,
First, fire kills people, animals and plants. It completely destroys whole buildings. It is very dangerous and you should never start a fire yourself.
Fire is a chemical reaction. It is the element oxygen combining with other elements very quickly. This chemical reaction requires 3 things to start: heat, oxygen (air) and fuel (something to oxidize). Take away any 1 of the 3, and you put out the fire.


Water can do 2 of them. But people should not put water on fires that happen on top of a stove. Those are grease fires, and water will just splatter the fire around more. Dump salt on those fires. It smothers the flames.


WHAT YOU NEED: Your family's permission and assistance - birthday candle - empty jar with lid
WHAT TO DO: Ask a grown-up for help. They usually like the way it feels to show you something. Again, *do not do this experiment without help* from a grown-up. Use a bit of melted wax to stick the candle upright in the center of the lid. Light the candle. Place the jar down over the candle. Watch what happens to the flame.

WHAT IS GOING ON:
All the oxygen in the jar's air combined with carbon in the candle's wax. When there wasn't any more oxygen, the fire went out.
Fire is oxygen combining quickly with stuff. No oxygen; no fire. Water on a fire does 2 things. First, it smothers the fire, cutting off the oxygen. It also cools the fuel down, and cold stuff does not burn. Either one will put out a fire. Keeping new air away from a fire is why you should not open the door of a room that is on fire. It will give the fire more air.



fire = quick rust

When oxygen combines with carbon and does it quickly, we get fire. The chemical reaction creates heat.
When oxygen combines with iron, it's almost the same, only it happens very slowly.
That's why we usually don't think of rust as the same thing as fire.
When oxygen combines with carbon, we get carbon dioxide.
When oxygen combines with iron, we get iron oxide, or rust.
