Wesley Burke was thit at approximately 7:25 a.m. near his home at Allen by a vehicle driven by Phillip Caudill, a Prestonsburg High School student. Burke was taken to High-ands Regional Medical Center and was later flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center.

Burke sustained severe internal injuries, a head injury and numerous contusions and abrassions, a family member said Tuesday afternoon.

Police at the scene said that the boy apparently darted into the path of the vehicle, which was traveling on Route 1428 near Allen Elementary. There was no evidence that Caudill

ment.
Previously, the General Assembly appropriated over \$2 million toward the golf course project and it would require an additional \$6.6 million to build the course.

"I'l am adamantly dedicated to the golf course addition for Jenny Wiley State Park." State Representative Greg Stumbo said Tuestday. "The potential tourist dollars that it represents for not only the park, but for local business owners in this area is phenomenal. The completion of projects such as the golf course are immortant factors in the expansion of important factors in the expansion of the tourism industry in Eastern Ken-

"She has anulterior motive," Judge
Caudill said Tuesday, "and for at
least 10 years she has been voicing
that motive—the children of Floyd
County. Her sole interest is the children of Floyd County."
Smith told those attending the ceremony that she intends to seek their
advice on how to improve the school

advice on how to improve the school system. "It's not just me," Smith said. "I will ask you for all the belp you can give me. I want the children to have the best school system they can have. We can be as good as any school system in the state. We just have to work at it."

After Tuesday's ceremony, Smith said she hoped to establish a good line of communication so that parents and teachers can understand the difficulties each are facing due to the demands of Kentucky's Education Reform Act.

Jim Parks, spokesman for the Department of Education, said Tuesday that Smith was chosen because of her "knowledge of the district and her commitment to education reform."

Smith was chosen over five other applicants for the District One board seat. For the past 10 years, Smith has often been at odds with the local board of education, wanting board members to be more open about how orien been at odds with the local board of education, wanting board members to be more open about how the school system's business was being conducted. Smith and other concerned citizens founded the Ployd County Education Forum, which has been an outspoken group advocating change in the Floyd County School System.

Smith will serve until January 1995.

"This is what it's all about," said Sumpter as he watched the childrens eyes light up at the sight of Santa Claus.

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

in upgrades for Jenny Wiley State Park and another \$3.7 million for Yatesville Lake, two of the Big Sandy region's top tourism attrac-

At Jenny Wiley, a new golf course and parina are proposed as are improvements to the park's public swimming pool.

At Yatesville, the governor proposes to

build a marina, campground and install sew age treatment facilities.

As we have noted before, any money spent to enhance tourism in Eastern Ken-tucky is a wise investment and sixteen or so million bucks is a drop in the bucket compared to the potential returns.

If we were to propose any changes to the governor's plan, we would toss in a few million for development at Paintsville Lake to complete the chain. And, if cuts are

needed, they should be made in regions that aren't so desperate for jobs

State Education Commissioner Thomas Boysen has proposed relaxing legal requirements that force teachers to obtain a master's degree by their tenth year of teaching or give up their jobs.

That makes sense and so does Danny Greene, director of the David School in Floyd County and the chairman of the state education department's Professional Standards Board

"Compliance with bureaucratic rules requiring teachers to complete a certain number of graduate classes has no relation to teaching ability." Greene noted. Exactly. Teaching ability should be measured by

The Labor Department's Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA) is levying a \$5,000 penalty daily against the Sovereign Mining Company of Dwarf for its failure to comply with a federal order to temporarily reinstate a fried miner.

On November 18, an administrative law judge of the Federal Mine Safety and Health Review Commission, an independent agency, ordered the miner temporarily reinstated to his job at Sovereign's Mine No. I after MSHA determined that the miner may have been fired for raising concerns about safety at his workplace. Sovereign mittally agreed to return the miner to temporary, duty, but subsequently informed him that he was again laid off.

"This clear and deliberate defiance of federal linw will not be tolerated," said Ed Hugler, deputy assistant secretary of labor for mine safety and health. "We will levy these fines daily until the company complies with the order and we intend to collect the total civil penalty amount incurred for this violation,"

The Federal Mine Safety and Health Act of 1977 provides protection for miners who may be the target of adverse treatment by their employers upon voteing concerns about their safety on the job. name is Saint Nicholas, and his feast

So holy was his life that public veneration was recorded soon after his death, and fifthcentury records indicate that his grave was a crowded pilgrimage site.

The new extension does not give individuals who previously received all of their emergency unemployment compensation an extra seven weeks of benefits.

### **End-of-year reminders from Social Security Administration**

From Jim Kelly Social Security District Director For the Big Sandy Area As the end of the year approaches, there are certain Social Security-re-

there are certain Social Security-re-lated matters you should know about.

If you have a child age one or older who doesn't have a Social Se-curity number, make sure you get one before you file your tax return next year. The law requires you to list a Social Security number on your tax return for all dependents over age one.

return for all dependents over age-one.

If you changed your name this year (through marriage, divorce, or any other reason), make sure your new name is listed on your Social Security card and in Social Security's records. If you don't do this, there may be problems posting your cam-ings to Social Security's files. (This could reduce your future Social Se-curity benefits.) Also, the Internal curity benefits.) Also, the Internal Revenue Service may have problems processing your tax return.

If you're already getting Social Security benefits and you moved this year, make sure we have your correct

address. (Sometimes people who have their checks sent directly to their bank forget to tell us about a change in

forget to tell us aboût, a change in their mailing address.) It's important we have your correct mailing address because early next year we're going to send you a form that shows the total benefits you received in 1993. If You may need this form for income tax or for income verification pur-

in to income verification purposes.

If you receive Social Security and work, remember that you can earn more money in 1994 before your benefits are reduced. If you're under 65, you can earn up to \$8,040 next year with no reduction in benefits, If you're 65 to 69, you can earn up to \$11,160 in 1994 with no reduction. If you're 70 or older, there is no limit on your earnings.

If you received benefits and worked in 1993, you need to report your earnings to Social Security by April 15, 1994. 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

A winter storm arning is issued when severe winter weather is imminent.

The weather advisory headlines give a precise picture of conditions so people can make or adjust travel plans and take steps to protect themselves as well as their pets and livestock," he said.

The advisories also will reduce complacency about weather forecasts, according to

"A winter storm watch or warning encompasses just one or all of several weather conditions," he explained.

"And when these conditions don't materialize, some people tend to become

"Heavy snow and ice storms that can accompany these storms are potential killers of people and animals. It's a good idea to do some advance planning to prepare for winter.

### WINTER WEXTHER TERM DEFINITIONS

Do weather forecasts appear to be in a foreign language?

These winter weather term definitions are from Tom Priddy, extension meteorologist at the University of Kentucky.

Freezing rain or freezing drizzle occurs when surface temperatures are below freez-

It falls in liquid form but freezes upon impact, coating exposed surfaces with ice or an icy glaze. This condition is often called an ice storm.

Sleet is frozen rain drops that bounce when hitting the

These ice pellets do not stick to trees. A sufficient depth causes hazardous driving conditions.

Snow is precipitation in the form or white or translucent ice crystals. It falls continuously. intermittently or in flurries

Snow squalls are intense snowfall of a short duration. They are comparable to summer rain showers.

Blizzard, the most dramatic and dangerous winter storm, is characterized by low temperatures and strong winds bearing large amounts of snow.
While snowfall is usually

present during the early stages, most of the snow is fine, powdery particles whipped up from the surrace.

Often these particles are blown in such density that visibility is reduced to only a few yards, creating blinding conditions



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

### Planning a healthy Holiday meal

Holiday time brings on sumpru-ous treats and meals fit for a king. Unfortunately, Italso brings on added calories and fat. Can we ever really have our cake, and cat it too? Careful planning and smart sub-stitutions can help a great deal, ac-cording to Tereas Smith, an assistant professor in the University of Ken-tucky College of Human Environ-mental Sciences. Working in the de-partment of nutrition and food sci-ences, she has a number of helpful suggestions to improve the nutritional content of your holiday feast. "When Itooking at traditional holi-day recipes, try to find ways to lower the fat, cholesterol and sugar content of your meal." says Smith. Substitut-ing recipe ingredients is a great way

the fat, cholesterol and sugar content of your meal." says Smith. Substituting recipe ingredients is a great way to reduce fat and cholesterol.

If a recipe calls for whole milk, substitute skim milk. Instead of using the whole egg, use only the egg whites. Two eggs whites are the equivalent of one egg. A good substitute for sour cream is low-fat of fat-free plain yogurt. Smith suggests mixing a table-spoon of cornstarch and one table-spoon of yogurt, then adding that mixture to the remainder of the yogurtlo thicken it up and bring it closer to the consistency of sour cream. "Many recipes call for nuts. If you really want to include them, try cutting down the amount. Use half of what the recipe calls for," says Smith. Gravies can be loaded with fat and cholesterol. One healthier alternative is to refrigerate the liquid broth overnight. "For vegetables, many people have a tendency to load them up with butter and cream sauces. It's better to use tennon juice, berbs and spices to add flavor to vegetables," says Smith. Fresh vegetables and fruit salads are also a good idea. For gelatin-type fruit salads, use diet gelatin to cut back on sugar and calories.

Desserts are the nutritional downfall formany. Coolies, pies and cakes are especially tempting during the holiday season. Low-fat frozen yogurts and puddings made from skim milk are healthier dessert choices. If you simply can't pass up that deli-

gurts and puddings made from skim milk are healthier desser choices. If you simply can't pass up that delicious pie, try taking smaller portions. "Have a one-inch sliver of pie instead of a big piece. A taste instead of a usual portion," says Smith.

Some people make the mistake of starving themselves all day to save up for a holday feast. "That's a mistake. If you starve all day, you're more likely to overeaf at that holdiday meal. Be reasonable with your meals that day. Try to select foods lower in fat throughout the day to serve up for that holdiday meal." says Smith.

Don't be so quick to run for second helpings. "Give yourself ten or fifteen minutes to see if you're satisfied, before running for seconds, There's a little lag time between eating and feeling full." says Smith.

### More money from beef is the goal for "FACTS" program

Some 450 Kentucky beet calves left Kentucky last week for a feedlor in Western Kansas where they will be feed for the next four to fixe months as part of a project that could add several million dollars to the state's

The calves are part of a special from-farm-to-slaughterhouse" pro-gram that will provide important in-formation to the Kenticky beet in-dustry

In the program, 68 beet producers nominated the calves to the project that will assess just how well Kentacky calves meet the needs of the meat industry. The calves will be followed for the next few months; their progress will be reported back to their producers each month, "Kentucky continues to suffer from a reputation for not always producing calves that do well in the leedles. Recognizing this, the University of Kentacks Cooperative Extension Service started working with producers to prepare their calves for feedlots through the Certified Preconditioned for Health program. As

conditioned for Health program. As a result, Kentucky CPH ealves are now considered to be top flight animals for health. This program just extends that effort," said Paul Deaton, director of the Southern Kentucky Agricultural Development Association.

The program, called FACTS deedlot and Carcass Test), will provide data for Kentucky beef producters to use in ruising animals that will leed out quickly, yielding a desirable carcass, Deaton said.

According to John Johns, I stemson bed cattle specialists with the University of Kentusky College of Agriculture, the difference between a good quadity beef careass and a poor quadity one can be as much as \$400.

"The goal of this program is to help cattlemen produce more of the good quadity calves instead of poor quadity ones," Johns said.

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

### Corps issues Golden Passports

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers will begin collecting a fee for issuing Golden Age Passports beginning January 1, 1994. This fee was directed in recent deficit reduction legislation, the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1993 (Public Law 103-66).

The Golden Age Passport is issued to individuals who are 62 years of age or older. It entitles the holder free entrance at all national parks

of age or offer. It ensures the notice to free entrance at all national parks and a 50 percent reduction in user fees at federal recreation areas.

Eligible applicants may obtain a Golden Age Passport at most Corps of Engineers offices upon showing proof of age. Passports will be issued free of charge until January 1.

"Too often, the roots of sexual dysfunction; eating disorders, alcoholism and drug problems may be in sibling abuse." he said.

He focuse on this largely ignored form of abuse in one of a series of fact sheets published by UK's Cooperative Extension Service under the overall title of "Breaking the Cycle of Abuse."This and the other fact sheets are available through the county Extension office.



### Invasive/Interventional Procedures

If testing determines a patient is at risk of heart attack or other cardiac problem, one of several procedures may be prescribed as treatment

Two of the most common procedures are angioplasty and athrectomy. Angioplasty involves inserting a tiny balloon into a clogged artery and inflating it in order to create an opening and increase blood flow.
