Betsy Layne to host next board meeting

BETSY LAYNE — The Floyd County Board of Education will hold its monthly meeting at Betsy Layne High School on Monday, and a large number of consent items will be discussed and voted on by board members.

The items include an agreement between the Prestonsburg City Police and the board for a drug interdiction program, a memorandum of understanding between Mountain Comprehensive Care and Floyd County Schools regarding application for the OWV grants, a retroactive agreement of prior approval of the Teen Outreach Program with Allen Central and Prestonsburg High Schools, use of the Prestonsburg Elementary Gymnasium by Big Sandy Community and Technical College, an out-of-state trip for South Floyd Middle School Honors Club to Tennessee in March, a memorandum of agreement with Morehead State University for the dual credit program, and the Commonwealth Commitment Resolution.

The regular monthly meetings of the Floyd County Board of Education begin at 6:30 p.m. Full agendas are available at the meetings and the public can ask questions and make comments before the board begins the discussion of regular agenda items.

Police warn of car burglaries

PRESTONSBURG — A rash of vehicle burglaries reported earlier this year in Johnson County where as of yet unknown suspects or a suspect used electronic devices to gain entry into primarily GMC model vehicles has also been a problem in Prestonsburg, police said Thursday, as well as several surrounding counties.

Since Christmas, there have

been more than 40 reports of vehicles broken into in Prestonsburg said Prestonsburg Det. Stevie Little, who added that it was a widespread problem, extending not only from Johnson to Prestonsburg and the rest of the county, including surrounding counties such as Pike and Martin counties.

"We've had as many break-ins as anybody else," Little said. "None have been forced entry. They're using keys and key fobs, but we're experiencing the same problem and

have been investigating it since the first report came in around Christmas."

Those investigative efforts lead to a small break in the case recently as Little, looking into a stolen laptop taken from one of the vehicles in Prestonsburg, decided to let technology give a helping hand in getting a location to start a search.

"I followed up on an investigation on a stolen laptop taken out of a vehicle here in the same type of break-in," continued Little. "When


I obtained information from the IP address the computer had been used on I was able to track it to a location in Allen."

Little said a search warrant was taken out for the Allen residence and the laptop was located, but the owner of the residence said he had purchased the laptop "secondhand."

The laptop was recovered, along with other items such as cameras, iPods and guns, as well as items

Randall James Hicks, 24, was wanted in Noble County, Indiana for possession of precursors with intent to manufacture methamphetamine.

According to Floyd County Sheriff John K Blackburn, police in Noble County were happy to hear that Hicks had been apprehended.

"They wanted him bad," Blackburn said. Hicks, who was arrested along with his wife on meth-related charges in 2009, was listed on Indiana's Most Wanted website after he became a fugitive from justice. The website included a mug shot along with distinguishing marks and other information to assist in identifying Hicks.

from another residence that were linked to the case, Little said, in addition to a firearm stolen out of Pike County.
Through investigation, it was learned the items at the Allen residence were sold by Jeffery Collins, who has since been arrested at his workplace on Wednesday and charged with two counts of receiving stolen firearms and one count of receiving stolen property and was later lodged at the Floyd County Detention Center. Collins allegedly sold the laptop to the Allen resident, who has not yet been named by police.
But Little says to expect more arrests in the future in connection to the rash of break-ins.
"There will be other people charged and we are actively looking for suspected involved in this," Little said. "We're close."

One victim of a recent break-in, Judy Skeens, of Prestonsburg, whose vehicle was broken into at Jenny Wiley Lodge, is clearly angry about the trend, saying she has no intention of continuing to be victimized in order to serve the needs of others.
"My purse was taken with all my personal belongings, my debit card, my credit card, my checks, and my driver's license, and my social security card," Skeens said. "Not enough is being said about this. I went to the bank to close out my account and was

told of all kinds of stories of vehicles being broken into and valuables being taken."
Skeens' reaction was, many might say, understandable and also presumed at least in part, the motive behind the break-ins.
"I am mad and I am not going to stop until these sleazy druggies are locked up," she said. "Everyone needs to watch for suspicious people that are around vehicles and call the cops. I feel violated knowing that they have my personal property."

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



Pain clinic reform needed, not a full ban

It's little wonder that officials in Eastern Kentucky counties want pain clinics banned within their county lines.

With the drug problem seemingly exacerbating despite the best efforts of some, our troubles with addiction have indeed reached epidemic proportions.

Perry County's judge-executive said last week that he sees no reason to approve a local ordinance in regard to pain clinics unless it is significant in its scope and effect.

We agree, and on the surface this is one step that could play an important role in taking some prescription pills off the street as it begins to tackle the issue of supply and demand.

But in truth, a ban on over-prescribing pain clinics will not do enough to tackle our regional drug addiction problem when only a handful local governments are willing to do anything. What we need is meaningful statewide legislation that puts a regulatory leash on all pain clinics, while banning outright those that essentially serve as pill mills for addicts.

A Knott County ordinance which bans pain clinics that only accept payment in cash is an excellent starting point. Additionally, pain clinics should never serve walk-ins off the street without a physician referral.

We see the whole issue of instituting bans on pain clinics not as one to rid our communities of an abusive system of medical care, but to improve the system that already exists so that abuse either no longer exists or becomes negligible.

A full ban on every pain clinic simply isn't needed, but we hope our local officials, and eventually our state legislators, can work to find a happy medium that leaves in place a responsible method of treating chronic pain, but weeds out the inordinate prescription of pain meds that is helping saturate our region with addicts.

The big score in this year's Super Bowl

For me the most significant statistic coming out of this year's Super Bowl wasn't the 31-25 score in the Green Bay Packers' hard-fought victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers. Nor was it the \$1.3 billion cost of the new, monstrously huge football palace built by the Dallas Cowboys, where the game was played. Rather, the number that impresses me is 111,968.

That's the number of people who own the Packers—each of whom is an ordinary Green Bay resident and devoted cheesehead.

Unlike all 31 of the other football teams, the Packers aren't the personal plaything of some rich family or profiteering corporate consortium. Instead, it's a non-profit community enterprise owned and managed by local fans as a project, according to its bylaws, "intended to promote community welfare." Green Bay's citizens elect the team's board of directors, and this hands-on and community-minded board then hires and fires the team administrators and coaches.

Public ownership means that no impulsive greedhead can sell the beloved Packers and move them in the dead of night to a cash-rich big city. It also produces unmatched fan support, even in years when the Packers do poorly on the field. In fact, if things aren't going well, fans don't have to whine helplessly about it on the shock-jock call-

in shows. As citizens of this small city, they can talk directly to the team management. Or as shareholders, they can vote to change managers.

Interestingly, at a time when politicians and pundits across the country are demonizing the very idea of public ownership, the good folks of Green Bay are showing that it works beautifully and adds immeasurable strength to the community. Not only are these Green Bayers Super Bowl champs again this year, but they've produced more NFL championships in their city than any other set of owners has done.

Hearings shouldn't demonize the Muslim-American community

In March, the House of Representatives will begin hearings on preventing domestic terrorist attacks. Rep. Peter King, the lawmaker leading the hearings, unfortunately has made it clear he intends to use his post to stoke fear and suspicion about American Muslims rather than explore critical homeland security issues.

Of course, we must confront and punish violent extremists. But our elected officials must be the first to acknowledge our security is threatened not by the millions of Americans who practice Islam, but by a handful of violent extremists, Muslim and non-Muslim.

Un-Christian Activities Rep. King, in his highly public hearings, intends to explore the "radicalization" of American Muslims and what he sees as a lack of cooperation between Muslim communities and law enforcement. Before he starts,

King should look at what the experts say. The nation's top law enforcement official, U.S. Attorney General Eric Holder, recently said that "the cooperation of Muslim and Arab-American communities has been absolutely essential in identifying, and preventing, terrorist threats."

The actions of a handful of violent extremists don't represent the beliefs of an entire faith community. In fact, National Counterterrorism Center Director Michael Leiter, in earlier testimony before Rep. King and the Homeland Security Committee, said that the prevalence of violent extremists in American Muslim communities was "tiny... a minute percentage of the [U.S. Muslim] population."

Local law enforcement officials agree. This month, Los Angeles County Sheriff Lee Baca, who oversees one of the largest law enforcement operations in the country, in one of the nation's largest American Muslim population centers, said he hadn't seen any evidence of the lack of cooperation that King claims exists: "Muslim Americans in the county of Los Angeles have been overwhelmingly astounded by terrorists' attacks—like everyone else—and overwhelmingly concerned about a non-repeat performance of that kind, and are willing to get involved and help."

We've seen hearings like Rep. King's before. In the 1950s, Sen. Joseph McCarthy exploited widespread fears provoked by the Cold War to launch a ruthless hunt for what he saw as a wide web of communist subversion in the United States. McCarthy targeted individuals not by their actions, but by their identities and affiliations. In doing so, he destroyed the careers of many innocent people and succeeded in further spreading a culture of fear and suspicion that did nothing to make the United States safer. Rep. King, relying on speculation rather than fact, and targeting a large and diverse community of Americans simply because of their religion, threatens to do the same.


Americans don't want to return to the fear and resentment of the McCarthy era. If Rep. King is serious about his goal of preventing violence, he should expand his investigation to include all forms of dangerous extremism, and refrain from stirring up fear and demonizing millions of patriotic American Muslims. There's a place for a serious look into extremism in America. But any such investigation should be based on fact, not fear.





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EARLY FISHING FORECAST: Smallmouth season starts now

FRANKFORT — My wife gives me funny looks when I am rounding up my waders, vest, hair jigs and reposing the reel on my favorite stream, smallmouth rod when the first warm front hits in late February. She believes it is a case of cabin fever and missing my fishing buddies, but in reality, a late February warm front is one of the best times in which to catch trophy stream smallmouth bass.

This week's sudden warm up after the harsh winter, we've witnessed in Kentucky puts this situation into play. Good smallmouth streams course through most of Kentucky, except for the mud-bottomed streams of the Jackson Purchase. If a stream near you has a rock bottom, pools and riffles, and some holes at least 5 feet deep, it will hold smallmouth bass. Some great and overlooked Kentucky smallmouth streams are so narrow in spots that you can jump

across them. Their deepest holes would barely moisten your belly button. Yet, you can catch smallmouths as long as your forearm from them, especially at this time of year.

First find the winter habitat of a stream smallmouth. Smallmouth bass may migrate long distances in fall to find the deepest holes in the stream that possess boulders, stumps, fallen trees or rock shelves that break current. A deep hole with no current breaks isn't nearly as attractive a place for a stream-dwelling smallmouth to wait out the winter months. They need places to escape the current in a nearby dormant state during the coldest weeks of the year.

With the warm winds and abundant sunshine of late, stream smallmouth will move to the flowing areas at the head and tails of these winter holes to feed. Big females need to eat to provide nutrients for the developing eggs that they will deposit later this spring. When a weather-related

feeding opportunity like this presents itself, they must take advantage.

A light hair jig is the best lure to throw at this time of year. Hair looks more natural in cold flowing water and hair jigs seem to attract bigger fish. Bucktail served as the standard dressing for hair jigs for decades. The stiffness of bucktail makes for extremely subtle movement and produces a slim profile, ideal for crystal clear cold water.

Jigs made from craft and rabbit fur, however, seem to work better for larger smallmouths. It takes little current or movement for these materials to naturally undulate and "breathe," looking like a sluggish crayfish or baitfish in cold water. This seems to fool the large, smart and older stream smallmouth a little better than bucktail, although bucktail still produces plenty of smallmouths.

Fish the hair jig "naked" or without a trailer. You want a small and compact profile for cold water. Jigs

dressed with purple craft hair work great right now with brown and orange a close second, followed by olive.

Throw your jig into the current and let it slowly work its way down into the deeper water of the hole. Once the current stops moving the jig, let it sit still on the bottom for a bit. Reel it a few feet and repeat. Large stream smallmouth often can't stand a hair jig sitting on the bottom, its hair subtly moving with the current in cold water. They strike.

You want your hair jig to just tap the bottom while tumbling with the current. If you never make any bottom contact, the jig is too light. Conversely, if it sinks to the bottom like a stone and gets immediately hung, the jig is too heavy. A 1/8-ounce jig seems the best choice for most streams in Kentucky, but adjust as depth and speed of current dictate. Bring plenty of jigs because they will get hung in water too deep to retrieve.

A 4-inch straight-tailed

watermelon with gold flake finesse worm will also work for late winter stream smallmouth. Finesse worms don't work as well as hair jigs, but they can be Texas-rigged weedless, so they rarely get hung on the bottom. Fishing a hair jig requires a high frustration tolerance because their exposed hook seemingly snags any piece of wood or crevice it comes near. You'll spend a lot of time retrieving or attempting to retrieve hung hair jigs in a stream.

Fish the finesse worm like you would a hair jig, letting the worm tumble in the current and touch bottom every so often. "Deadstick" the worm by letting it sit on the bottom and quiver once it hits slack water. A 1/16- or 1/8-ounce Shaky style head works extremely well for this presentation. Stream smallmouth bass take your lure lightly in late winter. The strike may only be a weird mushy feeling. Set the hook if, anything feels unusual. The water in late winter usually flows

crystal clear. Don't use line heavier than 4-pound test monofilament or 6-pound test fluorocarbon.

However, if warm rain muddies up the water, all subtlety goes out the window. Fish a small, light spinnerbait with a gold blade and chartreuse skirt behind current breaks such as a boulder, log or pocket along the bank. As soon as the spinnerbait clears the break and the current grabs it, reel in and make another cast. The small Beetle Spin style spinnerbaits work great in this situation.

The largest stream smallmouth bass must eat right now. Get out of the house and hook one.

Law to level playing field for Kentucky businesses goes into effect

FRANKFORT — A law signed by Gov. Steve Beshear last year to provide Kentucky-based businesses a level playing field when competing with out-of-state vendors for Kentucky state government contracts is now fully implemented and being applied in the state procurement process.

"My goal is to help strengthen existing Kentucky businesses and protect our valuable jobs," said Gov. Beshear. "I want Kentucky businesses to have every tool

available to create more jobs and help dig out of the current economic crisis."

The regulation outlining how the reciprocal procurement law will be applied in the awarding of state contracts went into effect on Feb. 4, 2011.

Originally proposed by Sen. Gary Tapp during the 2010 Regular Legislative Session, the law requires Kentucky's public contracting agencies, in determining procurement awards, to give preference to in-state bidders

against out-of-state bidders, equal to the preference given to those out-of-state bidders when they bid on contracts in their home state.

If the low bidder for a government contract is from a state that grants a 10 percent preference to its own in-state bidders, then Kentucky-based businesses will receive a 10 percent preference against that out-of-state bidder. With the enactment of this legislation, Kentucky joins 35 other states that have similar legisla-

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
