





Feel Approaching Storm

Baseball From Old Time

Sport Known as Townball Baseball undoubtedly originated in the United States. The game was an evolution from an older game called townball that also developed in the United States from the old English game of rounders.

Townball was played on a square field at the corners of which were four - foot posts which served as bases. In scoring one run, the player ran around these posts, and if hit by a thrown ball while running, he was "out." The side first securing 100 runs was the winner.

In 1839, with others, according to the Literary Digest, the twenty-year-old Abner Doubleday, who later served as major-general of volunteers in the Civil war in com-mand of the defenses of Washington, drew up the first set of baseball rules. But it was not until 1845 that the Knickerbocker Baseball Club of New York, the first organized club, modified the game by substituting bags for bases, limiting the number of players to nine on a side and setting the game at nine in-


