ISBELL WARNS FARMERS OF PENALTY

ACP PAYMENTS MAY BE DEDUCTED FOR FIRES

County Agent S. L. Isbell this week prepared to serve notice on Floyd County farmers co-operating in the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program of the stiff penalty which may be imposed on them if they burn over woodland or make no effort to control forest fires on their lands.

The penalty, it is pointed out by Mr. Isbell, provides for a deduction of all or part of a farm operator's ACP payments for the year 1940.

At the same time, the county AC committee named Marion Roberts, Dick Burchett and James Harmon to represent it before Circuit Judge Henry Stephens Jr., and to petition him for instructions calling upon the April grand jury to make indictments against any person guilty of wanton or malicious destruction of woodland by fire.

The committee by unanimous vote authorized County Agent Isbell to notify farmer-members of the 1940 program of the penalty provided by the ACP ruling.

Of Floyd county's 60,000 acres of woodland, it is estimated that 40,000 acres are burned over each year, destroying young timber, wildlife and exposing the topsoil to the ravages of erosion.

"For every acre of hillside woodland burned over," the County Agent said, "there is a loss of 120,000 pounds of valuable topsoil within the year."

Floyd county already has been hard hit by forest fires this year.

The letter relative to forest fires follows, in full:

"In the spring when you are getting ready to plow you often burn broom-ledge, weeds and brush to clear the land of such trash, and so fires easily get out of hand.

"As you no doubt know, the 1940 AC Farm Program provides that either all or part of a farm operator's payment may be deducted if he burns over his woodland or makes no attempt to control any fires which may be started.

"A woods is a crop of trees, just as a field of corn is a crop. No one would want a cornfield burned. No one should burn a crop of trees that may have been growing for 30 or 40 years.

"Here are a few simple rules for burning which make it easy to control a field fire:

"Burn late in the evening when there is no wind. Plow several furrows around any field to be burned in

LOCK AND DAM HOPES RISE

HEARING CONDUCTED AT PIKEVILLE MARCH 15

Big Sandy lock and dam proponents view with increased enthusiasm the valley's chances of winning the fight for a canalization system which will give this section water transportation to market for coal and other products.


This brighter outlook is a result of last Friday's public hearing, held at Pikeville by Lieut.-Col. J. D. Arthur, Jr., head of the U. S. Army engineers district office in Huntington.

The meeting, which was attended by several hundreds of citizens and officials from the counties of the valley, saw strong pleas presented in support of the project. Congressman A. J. May offered a strong oral argument. Supporters of the lock and dam plan argued that river transportation will revive industry in this section where they contend, adverse freight rates have retarded business.

Railroad representatives filed objections to the plan on several grounds, among which were arguments that the proposed waterway is not practical, that it is not needed to carry on present or future transportation and that it would directly compete with the railroads. Rail interests were granted 30 days in which to file briefs in support of their arguments.

Norman Allen 'On Loose' Here; Editor Gets His Name 'In the Paper'

Norman Allen, an escaped lunatic, while defying arrest here Thursday morning and reportedly threatening a bank robbery, almost went into the automobile business.

His first visitation was to the Valley Chevrolet Sales where he promptly "boarded" a new auto, meanwhile warning employees to "stand back," enforcing his orders with repeated motions toward an inside "pistol pocket." The key in the unlicensed car awaited his twist of a wrist, and so he "set sail," literally speaking. Only the matter of negotiating a turn down the Mayo Trail and the fact that in so doing he "killed" the engine of the auto prevented Allen from wending his way downtown at the wheel, with every pedestrian and motorist a possible victim.

Earl Patrick, manager of the automobile agency, snatched the keys from the man when the car driven by Allen stopped; whereupon, Allen leaped to the wheel of another car. As Patrick approached, Allen left the car to arm himself with a nearby stone of a weight as much as one hand could conveniently handle. Patrick dodged, gathered for himself some rocks.

But no action ensued at the spot. An employee of the garage left in an auto, anxiously seeking police aid.

WARRANT CITES SALISBURY

ROADHOUSE OPERATOR TO FACE CHARGE OF VIOLATING CURFEW

Charged with operating his "Top Hat Country Club" near East Point, in violation of the closing hours for "places of entertainment" as ordered by County Judge E. P. Hill, Jr., a few months ago, a warrant this week was issued against Stacy Salisbury. Trial is scheduled for Monday.

The action followed the refusal of the Court of Appeals to reinstate an injunction permitting Salisbury to operate the roadhouse after Judge Hill's curfew order, naming the closing hours as nine o'clock week nights and 10 o'clock on Saturdays. His order declared these were places "at which great numbers become drunk and intoxicated, at which fights and riots occur, and at which poor persons unable to afford such pastime spend money which their families need."

Following the order, Salisbury obtained temporary injunction in the Floyd circuit court against the early closing. He protested his patrons were orderly and that few arrived before nine or ten o'clock, and that he needed to stay open until midnight.

After the injunction was dismissed by Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Jr., Salisbury was granted an appeal, in which he requested the Appellate Court to reinstate the injunction. This was denied by the appellate court because of lack of jurisdiction. The appellate judges, in their decision, said that the proper action for Salisbury was to appeal the judgment given in circuit court, instead of petitioning that the temporary injunction be reinstated.

GIBSON SOUGHT FOR SLAYING OF BROTHER

IDLE WPA WORKERS , PARTICIPANTS IN FIGHT

Charged with the fatal shooting of his brother, Charlie Gibson, during a fight on Middle Creek, near Goodloe, early last Thursday afternoon, Lincoln Gibson, about 35 years old, is being sought this week by Floyd county officials.

According to reports reaching the Sheriff's office here, the shooting occurred after the two brothers, both WPA employees, had left the store of James Hale, where Charlie Gibson had raised a disturbance. He had left the store and was walking up the creek when Lincoln Gibson caught up with him, when the shooting took place.

Shot through the stomach with a .38-caliber pistol, the wounded man was taken to the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, where he died Friday morning.

The brothers, who were employed on a Middle Creek WPA project, had come to work early Thursday morning and, because of inclement weather, they did not work on that day. The shooting took place soon after the two had eaten lunch. A nephew of the two men, sons of Ike Gibson, of Goodloe, was shot through the hand during the fight, but he did not require hospitalization.

Immediately after a report of the death of the victim reached Prestonsburg Friday Sheriff Dial Salisbury sent Deputies Bill Marshall and Dewey Hicks and Coroner Elliott Prater to search for the wanted man, but they were unable to apprehend him. Other searches have since proved unsuccessful.

The two men were married to sisters, who were the daughters of Pete Bailey, of Middle Creek.

The board orders are in legal form. The minute book contains a list of county board members and subdistrict trustees, the time of the election, qualifications, and tenure of office. Teachers' service record, teachers' certificate record and teachers' salary record are complete. Teachers are paid according to the salary schedule and the monthly reports are of record in the office.

amendments, of covering the full territory. Restricting activities only of those paid altogether by the federal government, and leaving all others to ply their separate ways, unrestricted, the law is partial. Federal officeholders are, in their relations with officeholders paid partly by federal funds and partly by state funds, in the same boat with the feudist who, a prisoner, is disarmed while his enemies lie in wait for him, armed to the teeth.

The sense of fair play possessed by the common citizen seeking no particular advantage over anybody, looking only to his individual rights, dictates that your ordinary man and woman, the rank and file of the nation's voters, approve the fight Kentucky's two Senators are making to extend the Hatch bill a little farther—even if it may never go far enough.

The fact is, Kentucky and every other state should enact "little" Hatch bills so that their own state employees would be required to work only for their wages or salaries and not to spend a great portion of their time in influencing the vote of some good friend or relative or in buying or stealing votes.

True, such a law, universally applied in this country, would destroy political machines, would make it difficult for an officeholder to be re-elected if he did not have popular support. But that's how it should be. Let everybody start from scratch, call upon the voters for their support on the basis of merit.

The ramifications of politics are multitudinous. Politics gives men and women jobs; loses them jobs. Therefore, politics should be removed, as far as possible, from those who have employment under this or that administration, and kept forever away from their successors.

Get this Hatch bill operative throughout the nation, not merely within the ranks of federal employees, and these United States will more nearly approximate the status of a true democracy.

It is admitted that both our Senators have in the past profited from the support of powerful federal and state political machines. But that is no argument that they or anybody else should in the future enjoy such support at the taxpayers' expense.

Now that they are leading the reform movement, those of us who have criticised either or both of them should lend the two Senators every support in this cause.


Also surviving are his widow, two sons and two daughters, all of Ashland, and one other brother, Lee Cartmell, Lanham, Md.



CAPITAL COMMENTS

Senate Bills No. 190 and No. 192 passed the Senate and will be acted on by the House this week.

Senate Bill No. 190 will establish the prevailing wage rate on all public work contracts in Kentucky and was brought up to prevent contractors who charge on the basis of prevailing wage rates in a locality and then import labor from other states at lower rates of pay.

Federally financed projects are exempt from the provisions of the bill where the government prescribes minimum wages.

Public authorities who advertise for bids on a project must determine prevailing wage rates before advertising and make them part of the specifications and incorporate them in all contracts.

The bill also sets the maximum work day at eight hours and maximum work week at 40 hours.

Senate Bill No. 193 increases the death benefit under the Workmen's Compensation Act from \$4,000 to \$4,800 and increases maximum benefit for total disability from \$6,000 to \$7,500.

Senate Bill No. 193 is opposed both by labor and capital. Labor claims the bill puts in jeopardy the 'check and closed shop' system and the use of business agents in negotiations and they strenuously object to the mandatory clause that restricts labor from striking for a minimum of ten days while the Commissioner of Industrial Relations is attempting to arbitrate.

We believe this feature is a good one and will save both labor and capital large sums of money through preventing needless strikes and shutdowns.

Industry claims that it is a useless duplication of the National Labor Relations Act and would subject violators to the probability of being prosecuted by the state and national government for the same offense.

The bills would create a board to promote industrial safety and an apprenticeship council to promote the welfare of beginners in industrial work. Both sides seem to have no objection to these features.

The House passed a bill to increase the maximum penalty for drunken drivers, one authorizing fourth class cities to place their police and firemen under civil service and a resolution of John M. Hunnicutt to appoint a committee to make recommendations of legislative methods.

We related the need of this action three weeks ago in this column but the new plan will call for a 30-day session for introduction of bills, a 30-day recess in which the members will have a chance to study the bills and talk them over with their constituents and then a 30-day session for action and legislation.

After lengthy consultations with dame rumor and all her family, we believe that new faces will be found in the polling places at Frankfort after the first of May—state librarian, commissioner of finance, commissioner of conservation, director of parks and numerous minor offices.

Our grapevine system also tells us that M. R. Bagby, of Grayson, may run for Congressman against Joe Bates and that Assistant Attorney General William Neel, of Cynthiana, may be a third one in the race.


