Frankfort, Ky., March 15 (Spl.) A bill providing for county as well as state-wide hunting licenses, fixing the cost of county licenses at \$1 and the state licenses at \$3, and repealing the ban against merchants possessing more than 16 rabbits at one time, passed through the Senate of the Kentucky state legislature the day before adjournment by a vote of 20 to 6. The

tive James W. Chapman, of Ashland, also increases non-resident hunting licenses from \$10.50 to \$15.50. The bill also changes the open sea-



The tendency of pedes rians is to place too much faith in approaching drivers. The pedestrian thinks that the motorist can see him and will automatically slow down to let him pass. But thinking isn't enoughyou've got to be sure.

Drivers aren't any better mind readers than pedestrians, and it is often difficult for them to know just what the pedestrian's next move will be. So be a little more considerate of the motorist when crossing the streets and walking along the highways, especially at night. A motorist has just as much right to expect the person afoot to observe the rules of traffic as the pedestrian does the

Inasmuch as adult fatalities occur chiefly at night, it cannot be overemphasized that the person who goes walking after dusk on the highway should protect himself by making sure of being seen by motorists. To walk on the highway at night in all dark clothing is sheer folly. The things that can be done by pedestrians to increase their visibility include: Carry a flashlight or lantern; wear a white shirt, coat, suit, pants, dress or hoes; hold a white handkerchief conpicuously opened; knot a handkerchief on the arm; carry a newspa-
