DAMAGE IN DRIFT FIRE \$65,000

ARSON IS SEEN AS FIRE CAUSE INVESTIGATED

BUILDING, CONTENTS, RECORDS OF TURNER ARE TOTAL LOSS

It was learned here Wednesday from an authoritative source that the fire was of incendiary origin. No clue as to the identity of the arsonist has been gained, however.

Fire discovered in the store of W. J. Turner at Drift, shortly after Saturday midnight, resulted in total loss of building and merchandise at an estimated damage of \$65,000.

Interior of the store, one of the largest in Floyd county, was ablaze when the fire was discovered, and a hastily-organized bucket-brigade was powerless to halt the flames. Absence of wind was credited with enabling firefighters to restrict the fire to the store.

Explosion Threatened Bucket Brigade

Firefighters worked under constant peril from an explosion of 1,500 gallons of gasoline in underground tanks at the roadside fronting the building and from several truckloads of powder stored in a small building nearby. Damp earth was heaped on the gasoline supply, and water was thrown on the powder magazine.

It was reported here that insurance on the building and stock was only a fraction of the loss. Mr. Turner had only recently added large shipments to his stock.

According to information received here, the store, a frame structure on a foundation of stone caught from the rear. Cause of the fire had not been determined Tuesday.

The building was comparatively new and contained a stock of merchandise ranging from hardware and drygoods to groceries and fresh meats. It was said here that most of Mr. Turner's accounts were lost in the blaze and that contents of the safe were partially destroyed.

Funeral rites were conducted Sunday afternoon from the Walters residence, the Rev. A. C. Harlowe, of the Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was made in the Richmond cemetery here under the direction of the Malone Funeral Home.

RIVER GROUP TO ORGANIZE

LOCK-DAM PLANS DISCUSSED HERE IN MEETING

Preliminary phases of the complete organization of this section in behalf of canalization of the Big Sandy river were discussed at a meeting here Monday night of representatives from Floyd, Pike and Johnson counties.

H. C. Bowles, chairman of the river committee of the Pike County Economic Improvement Association, announced that final organization will be effected at a meeting in Pikeville next Tuesday.

The organization is planned for the collection of data for submission to the Huntington district office, U. S. engineers, who are expected in the Big Sandy valley within the next month.

The War Department has allotted \$50,000 for the preliminary survey for the proposed lock-and-damming of the Big Sandy. This improvement, its advocates claim, will provide cheap river transportation for Eastern Kentucky coal.

WPA Work in Floyd Cited in Review

The Works Progress Administration during the 5½-year period from July 1, 1935 to Jan. 1, 1941 built 119 miles of highways and streets in Floyd county, a review prepared by the office of George H. Goodman, state WPA administrator, shows.

The report also shows that the WPA during this period built 25 bridges and viaducts totaling 753 linear feet; 938 culverts of an aggregate length of 23,024 feet; three miles of sidewalk and paths; one mile of curbing; one mile of gutters; four schools, one garage, three miles of sanitary and storm sewers, 41 manholes and catch basins, 1,361 sanitary privies, 5,580 linear feet of retaining walls.

This month, WPA-constructed roads in the county are being given their final "dressing up" before inspection by county officials. The county, upon acceptance of these projects, will be expected to maintain them.

THIRD STREET WORK BEGUN

CITY, STATE JOIN IN IMPROVING THOROUGHFARE

Reconstruction of Prestonsburg's Third street began Monday morning, with the city and state highway department co-operating in the undertaking.

City prisoners and other workmen began excavating the space between curbs and sidewalks for laying of a rock base, and when this is completed highway department employees under the supervision of J. D. Fitzpatrick will apply a two-inch black-top surface from sidewalk to sidewalk. While preparations for the general surfacing are being made, workers were making temporary repairs, filling the holes in the streets that have plagued motorists for several years.

Co-operation of the highway department was enlisted at a special meeting of the City Council Friday evening. All materials—rock for base and black-top surface—will be supplied by the highway department. The town will be charged cost of the stone but the surfacing will be gratis.

Councilman C. H. Smith was asked by the Council to direct work of preparing the street for surfacing, and A. C. Carter's offer of his services on the improvement project was accepted. As work began Monday morning Policeman Arthur Blackburn was in charge of prisoners at work.

MAYO RULES STUMBO MAY HOLD OFFICE

APPELLATE COURT TO BE ASKED ITS OPINION

Dr. W. L. Stumbo is eligible "to vote, to be voted for, to be nominated for a public office and to hold public office," Special Judge W. P. Mayo ruled Monday in dismissing petition of Boone Arnett and the intervening petition of Ernest Boyd which attacked Dr. Stumbo's eligibility on the grounds that such rights had not been restored to him following his conviction on a federal charge.

Holding that neither the plaintiff, Arnett, nor the intervening petitioner, Boyd, is entitled to the relief, or any part of the relief, sought, Judge Mayo ordered that Dr. Stumbo recover costs of the court action from the plaintiffs.

The opinion was based on the premise that restoration of citizenship was granted the defendant by Governor Keen Johnson on Feb. 5, 1940 and that this act restored to Dr. Stumbo all rights, eligibilities and privileges of citizenship.

Clarke & Francis, attorneys for Arnett, and Bond & Bond, Boyd's counsel, immediately indicated that the case would be taken to the Court of Appeals.

In permitting the filing of Boyd's intervening petition, the special judge's opinion pointed out that the petition was filed on the terms that it be traversed of record (all affirmative allegations automatically denied).

The case was argued on Wednesday afternoon, last week.



AT INDIANAPOLIS

Among the thousands jam-packing the Indianapolis Speedway grounds on May 30, when the classic 500-mile Grand Prix has its 29th running, will be a liberal sprinkling of men wearing the blue-and-white armbands of the AAA contest board. For it is this board, the internationally-recognized governing body of automobile races in the U. S. that has the responsibility of supervising racedom's star event.

Seventy-five men are needed on the complicated task of running the three separate scoring systems that time the cars in a split second and keep a constant check on the positions of 33 roaring speed-wagons. A large technical staff is needed to examine the cars for defects before they go into time trials or the race itself—a thorough-going check-up that includes a Mag-influx test to spot any cracks or faults that might be buried deep in the metal as a potential unseen danger.

Stewards, observers, timers, referees, medical examiners, and medical staff are among others who make up the roster of AAA representatives who have the heavy responsibility of seeing that all goes well on the great day when the best cars and top-flight drivers compete for fame and riches on the Indianapolis oval.





birthplace. "I moved one time in my life," he added Monday; "moved to Knott county, but wasn't satisfied and came home after staying there nine years."

While away from Jack's Creek he became the first man to be elected Constable in Knott county when that county was formed from Floyd, back in the '80's. "I remember when the county officials were sworn in," he recalls. "We went into an old stable to take the oath. No, I never had any trouble. I

arrested Rhodes Pinson and Will Cook, who were regarded as two of the worst men in that section, but I didn't take a gun with me. I knew they could kill me, no matter how well-armed I was. I've seen men after they were shot and cut, have seen plenty of dead men—but never saw a man actually killed. I tend to my own business. You don't see much trouble, or get into much trouble, that way."

Uncle Bill's wife, an aunt of the late Judge John W. Caudill, died 11 years ago. He is the father of 14 children, five of whom are living. His grandchildren and great-grandchildren—by actual count, he says—are 360. Asked about his

great-great-grandchildren, he said, "There's plenty of 'em—don't know how many."

We forgot to ask him if he counted only those who vote the straight Democratic ticket.

**TIDBITS

TALKING LIKE NEGROES

MANY outsiders who visit the South often remark on how the whites talk like negroes; these people are actually reversing what has taken place in historic time. To begin with, the negro when he was brought to America spoke one of gibberish to his master. The slave had to understand and speak, to the best of his ability, the language of the master. His own ways of saying things were almost if not wholly lost. Scholars tell us

that probably there are left a few imitations of African word order or construction in the language of the Gullahs, the negroes of Charleston and the sea islands. Otherwise there seems to be no remnant of African influence. It is not known whether any word in common use, even in the South, owes its origin to these primitive languages of the slaves. "Buckra," a word used in some places in the South to mean the "boss man," is thought to be an African word, but it is utterly unknown to most people in the South and found only in rare works of an earlier period or in books written by actual folklorists.

In slave times there was undoubtedly a wide difference between the speech of the negro house servant and the field hand. The boy or girl who grew up around the Big House consciously or unconsciously acquired some of the vocabulary and some of the intonation and pronunciation of the "quality folks." Farm hands saw and spoke to few of the whites other than the overseer. The few educated negroes must have sprung largely from the house servant class as a matter of course, and it is unlikely that the field hand would have a chance to show any unusual ability that would attract the master's attention.

Negro speech as it exists today, then, is largely the speech of the earlier whites, modified, of course, by segregation and isolation, particularly since slave days. Education and a newer vocabulary have gradually permeated much of the race, so that some of the talk about negro language would lose its point if one did not see the negro actually talking. The negro voice is decidedly richer and of a timbre different from the average white voice; this, to the trained ear, constitutes real negro language, though the words used are those of our own regular vocabulary. In the very nature of things the primitive language of the Poor White, which

is also primitive, has had little effect on the negro, since economically they have been thrown together. Slavery thrived in the fertile agricultural areas; the poor white has grown up in areas lacking in fertility, areas that could not afford the luxury of slavery. Besides, the negro took his cue from the aristocratic Southerner and probably gave currency to the term "poor white trash," showing his disdain for white people not belonging to the quality.

Of course, there have been some few special negro pronunciations that have attracted attention and are usually believed to be of the negro's own coinage, but scholars can trace practically everything in Uncle Remus and similar writings to usages of white immigrants from England, Scotland and Ireland. It can be said that the negro has given a distinctive stamp to certain words and ideas, though they, like most of his music, have come from his former owners.

**Food For Defense
Plan Means More
Money For Farmer**

The government's plan to have more food produced for defense should mean higher prices for some Kentucky products, in the opinion of members of the Department of Markets and Rural Finance at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture.

For instance, the price of eggs is to be based on 22 cents a dozen for fresh eggs at Chicago. This should mean about 18½ cents a dozen in Kentucky, it is said, and compares to a little more than 16 cents last year, 15 cents in 1939, and a little under 18 cents in 1938.

The government is to support a butter price based on 31 cents a pound in Chicago for 92 score butter. This should result in a price of about 37 cents for butterfat in Kentucky, and compares to 25 cents last year, 20 cents in 1939 and 22 cents in 1938.

The Chicago basic hog price is to be nine cents a pound. On account of variations in weights, grades and season, it is not possible to give figures for Kentucky but prices should be materially higher than prevailed last year, it is declared.

The price which farmers are to be paid for chickens is to be based on 15 cents in Chicago. This should mean 12½ to 13 cents here, which is a little higher than prevailed in the past three years.






