

Even a four-year-old tot toddles out to pose with his club as a victorious gladiator!

Bring on the next victim! More daring hunters are ready to take a chance with him, to show their children how to get

rid of the dumb, helpless, wild things!
It is a pity these Ohioans could not come to Floyd or any neighboring hill county and learn about sportsmanship from us. Here they would find men who hunt foxes for the pure joy of the chase -they would find here the essence of sportsmanship.

For your Eastern Kentuckian does not hunt the fox or ride to the hounds to be in at the kill. Their garb, these men who climb the steep slopes and walk the long, high ridges, may be rough; all the amenities they may not have mastered. But these are the men who can teach

And that is to follow the pack, to sit long hours at a fire on a high, windswept knob, to walk through the night in all weathers-not to kill a fox, but simply to listen to the music of the hounds. Their blood tingles not to the thud of the lethal blow or the crack of the deadly shot but to the now-near, now-distant trumpeting of Loud and Drum whose voices are as that of Bugle
